Sharma (L) in the first ODI but batted a bit slowly for his 51 As India Look To Solve Middle-Order Puzzle; Second ODI Today

Adelaide: Mahendra Singh Dhoni's inability to set the pace during middle overs will remain a major cause of concern when India take on Australia in a do-or-die second ODI on Tuesday in their bid to keep the three-match series alive.

Hardik Pandya's sudden suspension on disciplinary grounds has badly affected the balance of the batting order, which was apparent during team's 34-run defeat in the opening match despite vice-captain Rohit Sharma's 22nd hundred in 50-over format.

Dhoni's 51 off 96 balls and the failure to rotate the strike has brought into focus the rejigging that skipper Virat Kohli and coach Ravi Shastri will have to think about.

Dhoni has been slotted at No. 5 and even though vice-captain Rohit wants the veteran to bat a notch higher, cues from India's training session made it clear that the team is unlikely to tinker with the batting order.

India's batting order came under the spotlight at the Sydney Cricket Ground. The top three (Rohit, Shikhar Dhawan and Kohli) have enjoyed a fairly consistent run since 2016. But it was a rare occasion when Dhoni had to come out in the fourth over of the innings.

Dhoni averages 52.95 while batting at number four, which is higher than his current career-average of 50.11 over 333 games. It is even higher than his favoured batting positions of No. 5 (50.70) and No. 6 (46.33).

Virat Kohli's splendid innings off 126 balls at Adelaide in the World Cup

encounter against Pakistan on February 15, 2015. Assisted by Shikhar Dhawan's 73 and Mohammed Shami's four-wicket haul (4/35), India had recorded a 76-ball win.

Dhoni's career strike-rate at No. 4 is 94.21. which is higher than his overall career strikerate of 87.60, or his strike rate at No. 5 (86.08) and No. 6 (83.23). When India last played ODIs in Australia in January 2016, Dhoni batted at number four in two matches but only scored 18 runs. In fact, since that series, Dhoni has batted at number four in only eight ODIs, with the last instance being the 2018 Asia Cup.

He averages 24.75 in this interim, with a strike-rate of 77.34 and a highest of 80 against New Zealand in October 2016. This presents a quandary, which the Indian team management might struggle to sort out.

Ambati Rayudu did well enough in the Asia Cup and in the home series against West Indies, and both batsmen merit a longer run in

their respective positions to help settle this batting line-up in the run-up to the English summer. No pre-match short-list has been announced for this second ODI. All-rounder Vijay Shankar arrived here on Monday afternoon, thus might not be available for selection.

While India coped in the Asia Cup and against West Indies when Hardik Pandya was out injured, playing three spinners in subcontinental conditions helped. In overseas conditions, Pandya's absence restricts the team's capability with both bat and ball.

Despite his suspect action, Rayudu is free to continue bowling in international cricket, but it remains to be seen if the team management would want him to.

Kedar Jadhav provides an alternative option in that light, and he could come into the playing eleven at Dinesh Karthik's expense.

There is every chance that the bowling composition will remain unchanged, despite Khaleel Ahmed being off-colour. He batted in the nets alongside Yuzvendra Chahal on Monday. Mohammed Shami, one of the three fast bowlers, was most impressive in the first match and given the delicate situation of this series, he will certainly not be left out.

The team management also banks on Ravindra Jadeja's all-round skills, and as such Chahal's chances of an immediate return to the side looks doubtful. PTI

Pandya and Rahul apologise; preliminary probe begins today

Mumbai: As directed by the chairman of the BCCI's Committee of Administrators (CoA) Vinod Rai, and in line with the legal opinion sought from law firm Cyril Amarchand Mangaldas, Board CEO Rahul Johri, on Tuesday, will conduct a preliminary enquiry in the matter involving cricketers Hardik Pandya and KL Rahul and their controversial talk show with filmmaker Karan Johar.

Pandya and Rahul flew back from Australia late on Sunday. The cricketers will now make themselves available for a telephone conversation with Johri, following which the CEO will forward the report to an ombudsman. The ombudsman, yet to be appointed, will then take a final call on the report which will then be submitted to the CoA.

Both cricketers have sent their respective replies to the showcause notices sent by the CoA and have pleaded guilty to the charges. The CoA had given the cricketers seven days to reply to the showcause/suspension notices sent on Friday and Pandya and Rahul have profusely apologised for their actions. They will miss out on the entire

series against Australia and will also miss the series — five ODIs and three T20 Internationals — in New Zealand, which make for a total of 11 matches. The CoA will take a further decision on whether the cricketers need to be given a longer ban based on the ombudsman's report. A severe financial penalty can also be expected.

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear the BCCI matter on Thursday and the CoA expects the two-judge bench to oversee the appointment of the ombudsman. Should the hearing not take place as scheduled, the CoA chairman will then appoint an ad-hoc ombudsman — in line with the legal opinion sought — and conclude the hearing process.

Johannesburg: Fiery fast bowler Duanne Olivier took key early wickets as South Africa wrapped up a clean sweep of their series against Pakistan with victory by 107 runs on the fourth day of the third and final Test on Monday.

Pakistan resumed their second innings needing a further 228 for victory with seven wickets in hand. but their chances faded when Olivier removed the dangerous Babar Azam (21) and captain Sarfraz Ahmed (0) in consecutive balls.

The home side chipped away at the wickets to bowl the visitors out for 273, with Olivier (3-74) and Kagiso Rabada (3-75) the pick of a hostile South African attack that has been key to the team's success.

The teams begin a five-match one-day international series on Saturday with the first game in Port Elizabeth. They will also play three Twenty20 matches.

"I'm extremely proud, a 3-0 series win is just what we asked the guys for," stand-in South Africa captain Dean Elgar said at the postmatch presentation.
