New Zealand move to No. 2 in Test rankings

Dubai: New Zealand cricketer Henry Nicholls has hailed the team for attaining the No. 2 position in the International Cricket Council (ICC) Test rankings. The 27-year-old said that upgradation in the rankings is a result of the work the team has put in over the past few years. "It is pretty cool, it is a testament to the cricket we have been playing for the last 12 months if not longer," ICC quoted Nicholls as saying. The Kiwis have four batsmen featuring in the top 20 with Williamson occupying the No. 2 position, Nicholls at No. 5, Tom Latham and Ross Taylor at No. 12 and No. 19. "It's not something that I go out and try to achieve or focus on, but to be around some really great batters in the world, it is pretty humbling," said Nicholls.

Women's IPL exhibition games likely during playoffs, says BCCI official:

The women's T20 exhibition matches, which will be staged during the IPL, is once again likely to be slotted during the playoffs as the BCCI that remains the only window available for these games. Rana shines in Delhi's win: Nitish

Rana's unbeaten half-century guided Delhi to a seven-wicket win over Kerala in a Group 'A' match of the Syed Mushtag Ali Trophy T20 cricket tournament, here on Monday. Kerala won the toss and chose to bat but couldn't make the most of it, posting a modest 139 for 7 in 20 overs. Skipper Ishant Sharma struck the first blow for Delhi, having K B Arun Karthick caught and bowled for a duck and Kerala never really got going as the impressive Navdeep Saini got Rohan Prem (8), to a return catch.

Manish Kaushik among three Indians to enter semis: Commonwealth Games silver-medallist Manish Kaushik (60kg) was among the three Indian boxers who advanced to the semifinals and assured themselves of medals at the Makran Cup in Chabahar, Iran. Kaushik, also a national champion, defeated Salar Moumivand 5-0 in his quarterfinal bout. Also making the semis were, former national champion Duryodhan Singh Negi (69kg) and Rohit Tokas (64kg). The total number of Indians in the medal rounds stands at eight after Commonwealth Games silver-medallist Satish Kumar (+91kg), Manjeet Singh Panghal (75kg), Sanjeet (91kg), Lalit Prasad (52kg) and Deepak (49kg) made the semis on Saturday.

Saurav enters pre-quarters; Joshna makes exit: India's Souray Ghosal entered the men's pre-quarterfinals even as compatriot Joshna Chinappa crashed out of the women's event of the ongoing PSA World Squash Championship in Chicago. Sourav now remains the lone Indian in the fray. Souray, seeded 11th, defeated France's Lucas Serme 13-11 11-6 11-8 in his second round match that lasted 48 minutes on Sunday. However, 14th seed Joshna suffered a shock defeat against Hong Kong's Joey Chan 10-12 7-11 7-11 in the second round of the women's singles event.

Magic put it across Raptors: Terrence Ross came off the bench to score 28 points and Montenegrin center Nikola Vucevic added 23 points and 12 rebounds, sparking Orlando Magic's 113-98 win over Toronto Raptors. The Raptors, who played without Kawhi Leonard, fell to 44-17 and slid two games behind Milwaukee for the best record in the NBA and the Eastern Conference. The Magic improved to 28-33 and were rank ninth in the East, one game behind Charlotte for the final playoff position in the conference, Jonathan Isaac added 16 points and DJ Augustin added 12 for the Magic.

Open: Grandmaster Abhijeet Gupta won the Cannes International Open after taking an easy draw with Pier Luigi Basso of Italy in the ninth and final round that concluded here on Monday. BCCI sports medicine hub in offing

Board Looks To Tie Up With Research Institutes For Proposed Centre Of Excellence; Grand Project, Worth Nearly Rs 500cr, Running Six Months Late

New Delhi: The Indian cricket board (BCCI) has had talks with medical research institutes and universities in a bid to make its upcoming centre of excellence in Bengaluru a ground for sports medicine research, TOI has learnt. The BCCI also wants to create a sports medicine curricullum and upgrade the qualification criteria of physios and trainers.

All this is part of BCCI's long-term plan to build a centre of excellence spread over 40 acres of land and shift the operations of the National Cricket Academy (NCA). The project, estimated to cost around Rs 500 crore, is running six months late. The board acquired the land close to the Bengaluru in Sept 2017.

Operations at NCA have been under the scanner for some time now and the handling of Wriddhiman Saha's injury

has put a question mark on its relevance. NCA COO Tufan Ghosh, brought in to play a key role in setting up the facility and creating a centre of excellence, said, "I can't give you the details but we are already in talks with a leading university in Bengaluru."

According to the blueprint, accessed by TOI, BCCI feels it requires the affiliation of medical universities and research institutes to groom physiotherapists and trainers and increase the number of referral doctors so that botched up cases like Saha's are minimized. Interestingly, Ghosh had been involved with hospital operations before taking up his role at the NCA in Dec 2017.

These parameters have been set by Team India Shankar Basu and his team at the NCA.

"There are no institutes in India that offer these courses. There is only one which can train you for the ASCA Level 1 degree. Generally, trainers register online and take the tests. Thus, the process is

quite tough," BCCI official said. "This will bring about uniformity in trainers across the country and it will also help Indian trainers making it to the IPL teams. This will help in monitoring the players round the year."

ADMINISTRATIVE UNCERTAINTY

While the process of setting up the centre of excellence has been delayed by administrative uncertainties plaguing BCCI for the last two years, the board is looking to get the cricketing facilities ready over the next 18 months. Ghosh refused to comment on the reasons behind the delay. According to the initial project plan, the BCCI wants to get at least four full grounds ready by the end of 2020. The plan talks about 'mimicking pitch conditions across the world-importing clay and soil and making hybrid pitches'. These grounds will be used for practice games, trial matches and other BCCI events.

The basic hurdle facing the BCCI is getting the budget sanctioned. "Who sanctions this big sum of money? According to the new constitution, the apex council should decide. But the CoA is still running the board affairs," said a senior BCCI official.

NCA BUDGET SOARS

For now, however, it is the NCA which is likely see a rise in its annual budget. The BCCI had nearly doubled the budget for NCA and other academies last year from Rs 26 crores to Rs 50 crore. This year, however, the NCA's medical expenses on players (excluding major injuries to centrally-contracted players) has already touched Rs. 1.05 cr till January compared to Rs 55 lakh in the previous financial year. The per-player budget at the NCA has also nearly doubled from Rs 1.3 lakh to Rs 2.2 lakh. However, with a 16% increase in the budgeted number of players, another Rs 15 crore could be asked for:

"The NCA has opened its doors to state players. We have already seen 68 state players by January. The endeavour has been to technically educate players about possible injuries and to prevent these players form aggravating injuries. NCA used to see just three or four players at a time, now there are always 17-18 cricketers," a source said.

"It (the slow strike rate) was probably fair enough. With the way the wicket was behaving, it was difficult to score for any batter, let alone a guy who is not known for his power-hitting in Chahal," Maxwell said in Dhoni's defence as his analogy of Chahal's pyrotechnics invited a few chuckles.

ICC to apprise BCCI of World Cup security

Dubai: The International Cricket Council (ICC) will clear India's "doubts" about security at the upcoming World Cup but the world body is unlikely to even discuss a possible boycott of Pakistan when its Chief Executives Committee (CEC) meets here on Wednesday. The committee of administrators running Indian cricket wrote a letter to the ICC urging it boycott countries from where "terrorism emanates" but did not specifically name Pakistan.

The quarterly meeting of the ICC will start in Dubai on

Wednesday with the Chief Ex-

ecutives (CEC) meeting meeting where BCCI CEO Rahul Johri's letter will be tabled and the matter will be discussed.

The BCCI had expressed its concern about the safety of the players and officials during the World Cup which starts May 30 in England. "The ICC will provide all

the details of the security arrangements made for the World Cup. It will be same for all the participating nations and England and Wales Cricket Board have always provided top notch arrangements," a senior BCCI official said. PTI

New Delhi: India's core group of top male boxers, competing in the prestigious Makran Cup boxing tournament at Chabahar city in Iran, are without the services of a doctor or other medically trained staff, TOI has learnt. Specialized medical staff is a mandatory requirement in a contact sport like boxing, where physical injury is com-

mon during training and bouts. The Iran tournament serves as significant preparation for the Asian Championships in Bangkok in April. India's 10-member boxing contingent includes the likes of Commonwealth and Asiad medallists Satish Kumar and Manish Kaushik and India Open gold win-

ner Sanjeet. According to sources, the support staff has an arrangement in mind — in case of injury, they will seek the help of medical personnel attached with other participating nations to attend to Indi-

A separate 12-member senior team, comprising 10 male and two female boxers, is set to travel to the 38th Gee Bee International boxing tournament in Helsinki, Finland from March 7-10, also without medical personnel. This is because the Boxing Federation of India (BFI) has decided to give preference to other support staff, including a video analyst, over a doctor. The Helsinki tournament will feature the likes of former Asian champion and

pa, youth world champion Sachin Siwach and Asian silver-medallist Sumit Sangwan. BFI executive director Rai Ku-

mar Sacheti admitted that a doctor should have accompanied the team. "We should send them, but it's not mandatory that in all tournaments, a doctor accompanies the team. We have to see which support staff personnel is more important for a particular tournament. Organisers also limit entry. Like, (if) we are sending a team of 10 boxers, then we can only send three-five coaches, one doctor/ physio and one masseur. So, we decided to send a physio to Iran and the video analyst we have sent as it's our desire that we should send a doctor full-time." For the recently-concluded

Strandja Memorial tournament in Sofia, Bulgaria — where Indian boxers clinched an impressive seven medals — the BFI had sent the Sports Authority of India (SAI)-appointed doctor at the NIS Patiala centre, Anil Bhan, with the team.

TOI had on Jan 31 reported that national campers at NIS Patiala were without the services of a doctor. The BFI recently engaged a doctor named Pradeep, but, according to sources, he completed his degree in sports medicine only in 2017 and has no prior experience of managing a national-level team.
