### No disrespect for seniors in party, says Rajnath

'Govt. not politicising security issues'

Union Home Minister Rainath Singh on Sunday said it was, in fact, his idea - proposed during his second term as BJP president - to put a 75 year age cap on party candidates. Speaking to The Hindu,

he said it was the correct way forward for the party, and respect for senior leaders should not be reduced to the question of nomination. "Whether it is Advaniji or Joshiji, their contributions cannot be undermined by anyone. To be honest, it was under my presidentship of the party (the second term between

2012 and 2014) that I mooted the idea that those aged above 75 should not be given ticket. Issuing ticket to fight an election cannot be the only yardstick for conveying respect to senior leaders. We respect them and shall do so in the future too," he said.

Mr. Singh also dismissed suggestions that the government was politicising national security issues. "The Congress has attempted to do this, along with other opposition parties. We have only appreciated the valour of our armed forces," he

# It's 'Modi once more' versus 'Justice for all'

BJP, Congress unveil campaign themes ahead of first phase

Four days before the first phase of voting for the 2019 Lok Sabha election gets under way, the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Congress on Sunday unveiled their campaign slogans.

The BJP pitch sought a second term for Prime Minister Narendra Modi with its main slogan 'Phir ek baar, Modi sarkar' (the Modi government once again), while the Congress promised justice to all with its tagline 'Ab hoga nyay' (Now, there will be justice).

Unveiling the BJP campaign theme, just hours after the Congress launch, Union Finance Minister Arun Jaitley revealed the focus areas of the party's campaign.

### Larger theme

"The first theme of our campaign will be 'Kaam karne waali sarkaar' (A government that works). Our second theme will be 'imaansarkaar' government). Our third theme will be 'Bade faisle lene waali sarkaar' (A decisive government that takes big decisions)," he said and added all these themes would serve the larger theme of 'Modi once more'.

### 'Vote sambhal ke' campaign focuses on idea of India

Filmmaker Bordoloi's series features prominent names from the film world


After appeals by filmmakers, authors, scientists and theatre artistes, it's the turn of celebrities, mainly members of the Hindi film fraternity, to take to short videos urging people to vote with care and concern for the country and its citizens. Vote Sambhal Ke (vote with care) is the implicit advice.

The two-three minute videos, up on YouTube, have been directed and edited by former journalistturned-scriptwriterfilmmaker Satyen K. Bordoloi.

The series kicked off with actor Kalki Koechlin asking people to think before voting. "Vote right, or vote left, but vote with deliberation and purpose," she says, before going on to recite the last few lines of the poem, "Man, You Should Explode" by Marathi poet, writer and Dalit activist Namdeo Dhasal.

In the second video, writer, director and actor Tigmanshu Dhulia talks about how there can be no bigger religion than the nation, so one must vote for someone who wouldn't destroy India's social fabric.

More videos are likely in the next few days, including from filmmaker Vikramaditya Motwane, writer Anjum Rajabali,

filmmaker Saeed Mirza and actor Swara Bhaskar, ahead of the first phase of polling on April 11.

Mr. Bordoloi said he decided to deconstruct the oft-heard litany that the film fraternity is not political enough.

The videos are streaming under the umbrella Truth Deserves You Production on Bordoloi's YouTube channel. Even as the video began streaming on Sunday, several Bollywood notables waded into political debates on social media. Filmmaker Mahesh Bhatt put up links to two sections of Anand Patwardhan's Vivek (Reason), an eight-part documentary on the increasing radicalisation of India. The two sections talk of the work of rationalist Narendra Dhabholkar and communist leader Govind Pansare, and raise questions about their murders
