Violence prompts poll panel to pull campaign plug in Bengal

EC cuts electioneering by a day; says fear psychosis is widely prevalent in State

In an unprecedented move, the Election Commission on Wednesday imposed a blanket ban on political parties' campaigning activities in the nine parliamentary constituencies of West Bengal from 10 p.m. on Thursday, in view of the "growing incidence of

disruption and violence." The decision came a day after violent clashes during a roadshow of BJP president Amit Shah in Kolkata, following which the party lodged a complaint with the Election Commission.

The Trinamool Congress had also approached the Commission seeking inter-

Elections on May 19

Polls in these constituencies are to be held in the last phase on May 19 and the 48hour silence period was to start on Friday evening.

The order bars campaigning activities till the conclusion of elections on May 19.

Exercising its powers under Article 324 of the Constitution, to ensure the conduct of free, fair and peaceful elections, the EC directed that no person "shall" convene, hold, attend, join or address any election-related public meeting

SC decries Sharma's detention

The Supreme Court on Wednesday pulled up the West Bengal government for keeping BJP Yuva Morcha leader Priyanka Sharma behind bars overnight despite the court's May 14 order to release her immediately on bail.

A Vacation Bench of Justices Indira Banerjee and Sanjiv Khanna even threatened contempt action against government.

Ms. Sharma was arrested by the State police and sent to 14 days of custody for allegedly posting a morphed image of West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on social media.

The court called her arrest "prima facie arbitrary" in the first place. However, on May 14, while granting her bail, the Vacation Bench asked her to apologise for the "meme." The apology was not a condition for her release, though.

Returning to court on Wednesday, senior advocate Neeraj Kishan Kaul said the court's order was not complied with by the State. Ms. Sharma was not released from jail on May

'Monsoon to reach Kerala on June 6'

IMD's forecast expects 'slight delay'

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) on Wednesday said the southwest monsoon will be "slightly delayed" over Kerala and arrive on June 6. The normal onset date is June 1.

The IMD forecast is in line with the one by private forecaster Skymet, which said on Tuesday that it will reach Kerala on June 4.

The IMD has been using a customised model, since 2005, to forecast the monsoon's onset over Kerala. From 2014 to 2018, the agency claims, it got the date wrong only in 2015.

This model crunches six meteorological parameters: minimum temperatures over northwest India; premonsoon rainfall peak over

the south peninsula; outgoing longwave radiation (OLR) over the South China Sea; lower tropospheric zonal wind over the southeast Indian Ocean; upper tropospheric zonal wind over the east equatorial Indian Ocean; and OLR over the southwest Pacific region.

It has a built-in error margin of 4 days. That is, a June 6 onset can mean any day between June 2 to June 10.

"Conditions are becoming favourable for advance of southwest monsoon over the southern part of Andaman Sea, Nicobar Islands and adjoining southeast Bay of Bengal during 18-19th May," the IMD press note says. Generally, the monsoon reaches Kerala within 10 days of crossing the An-

No contractor to dispose of cattle carcasses in Pisawa, where stray dogs had mauled a girl to death

Shaken by a pack of dogs mauling a seven-year-old girl to death earlier this week. Mathura district are loath to step out to their farms, let alone send their children to the government school.

Devki's death on Monday, when she was trudging through the fields to deliver food to her father Bhoop Singh at their farm a kilometre away from home, is linked not only to a dog menace in the area but also to 'cow politics'.

Village headman Kali Charan said there's no one to dispose of carcasses since potential contractors are afraid of being attacked by right-wing activists; the previous contract expired six months ago. A district-level official admitted as much: "No contractor is coming forward because of the fear of getting lynched while transporting cow carcasses.

The immediate solution is castration of dogs.'

'No other option'

"We are left with no other option than to dump the cattle carcasses on the outskirts of the village, where stray dogs and birds feed upon them. The dogs have turned violent in the absence of a regular supply of meat," said Suraj Pal Singh, another

Pisawa residents are agitated over the fact that no officer from the district administration has visited the village after the tragic incident. "Instances of cattle being attacked by stray dogs are common in the area but this is the first time a human life has been lost," pointed out Sita Ram, a villager. "We are pained that no govern-

ment official is taking the incident seriously nor has anyone visited the victim's family even four days after her death," he said.

The farmers have just harvested the rabi crop and are readying their farms for the kharif season, but the fear of stray dogs is keeping them away from their fields.

"To guard crops from stray animals and nilgai,

farmers have to spend the night in the field. The district administration has failed to stop the stray cattle menace. Now, the fear of dogs has forced us off the fields. There seems to be no end to the problems of farmers," said Rameshwar Singh, a farmer.

While calls to Mathura District Magistrate Sarvagya Ram Mishra went unreturned, Sudhir Singh, an official of Chhata tehsil under which Pisawa village falls, said that a new contractor to dispose of animal carcasses will be selected after the election model code of con-

duct period ends. At Devki's home, mother Kamlesh is inconsolable. "Every day before going to school, she used to take food for her father at the farm. She was her dad's favourite... she never allowed her siblings to go. I can't forget the last time I saw her before she left for the farm," she said of the third of her five

Yerwada central jail didn't consult Centre on Sanjay Dutt's release

In a startling revelation, the Yerwada central prison authorities in Pune have said the Central government was not consulted on granting remission of jail sentence to actor Sanjay Dutt, convicted in the Mumbai serial blasts case. He was sentenced to five-year imprisonment under the Arms Act, a central legislation and was granted remission on the grounds of "good conduct."

Replying to questions

filed under the Right to Information (RTI) Act by A.G. Perarivalan, a life convict in the former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi assassination case, the Deputy Superintendent of the prison said there was no record of any correspondence or file noting since the case did not pertain to "premature" re-

The official said the actor's release was ordered as per the remission rules of the Maharashtra Prison Manual. There was no rule to consult either the Central or State governments for the release, he said.

The relief given to Mr. Dutt was for "good conduct" as per the prison manual and not derived from Consti tutional or Cr.PC provisions.

However, Perarivalan's advocates argue that Mr. Dutt's release should have been done only with the concurrence of the Centre since he was convicted under the Arms Act.

'Indians eager to cut alcohol intake'

It reflects awareness of abuse, says global survey of recreational drug use

A global survey of recreational drug use, which for the first time polled respondents from India, has found that Indians - more than from other nationalities are seeking help to reduce their alcohol intake.

Alcohol, tobacco and cannabis were the most common stimulants used by Indians. Of the nearly 1,00,000 respondents from 30 countries, Indians reported 'being drunk' on an average of 41 times in the last 12 months – behind the U.K., the U.S., Canada, Australia and Denmark in that order but well above the global av-

erage of 33 times. The Global Drug Survey (GDS) is an anonymised, online survey that uses a detailed questionnaire to assess trends in drug use and self-reported harms among

regular drug users and early adopters of new trends. Though the survey is not

designed to determine the prevalence of drug behaviour in a population, it throws light on "stigmatised behaviours and health outcomes of a hidden population that is otherwise difficult to reach...and can be used to inform targeted interventions," according to a description by the organisation in a 2018 editorial in the medical journal *Lancet*.

Indian respondents to the survey, conducted online during October-December 2018, appeared more than other nationalities to be eager for help with reducing

their alcohol intake. According to the 2019

GDS, 51% of the respondents wanted to 'drink less' in the following year and 41% 'wanted help to do so' again the highest percentage among other countries.

"It might genuinely reflect high levels of concern among drinkers of being aware of consuming at levels known to be harmful," said Adam Winstock, among the key authors of the survey, in an email. Mr. Winstock is a London-based psychiatrist and founder and director of
