'We should have WC playoffs like the IPL' West Indies tour: Bharat in

Arun says the teams that finish first and second in the league phase deserve some incentive

Bharat Arun has been a quiet achiever as India's bowling coach, putting together an aggressive wicket-minded attack that can sting.

Despite India's shock exit in the ICC World Cup semifinal, chiefly caused by a batting collapse in the first 10 overs, Arun, in a conversation with The Hindu, felt there were many positives for Virat Kohli's men from the competition.

On India topping the 10team group stage: We performed with consistency and aggression and were the team of the World Cup till the semifinal, topping in a gruelling format revived after 1992.

On the semifinal defeat against New Zealand: The whole team was heart-broken. Just 45 minutes of bad cricket saw us out. Also India batting on the second day hurt us. The ball always does things in the mornings in England and it moved. On day one, the pitch actually eased out and the momentum was with us.

On the format for the knockout stages: There should be some incentive for the teams that finish first and second in this long, demanding league phase. We should have playoffs like in the IPL. On the criticism directed at M.S. Dhoni: It was very unfair. He has contributed so much to the Indian team, is a legend. In fact, on many oc-

casions, Virat Kohli bounces off ideas off Dhoni, respects him. In the semifinal, we were all confident till Dhoni was there. We could see he was lining himself up for the big hits in the final over. Sadly, the run out happened.

On the harmony within team-management and the support staff: It's not that we agree on everything. We have our arguments and discussions on various aspects like the composition of the team and the strategy. Everyone voices his opinion. But, at the end of the day, the other person's view is respected and a collective decision is taken.

On the relationship between skipper Kohli and vice-captain Rohit Sharma: It has to be seen to be believed. Rohit often runs up to Kohli to discuss things. They get along very well, share great admiration for each other's ability. Kohli led the side well, is maturing as a captain and it's nice that he has Rohit for support. The spirit in the camp was wonderful throughout.

On the Indian bowling in the World Cup: Many felt we were the bowling side of the tournament. Jasprit Bumrah was brilliant with

his pace and variations. His hard-to-pick short-pitched deliveries skid on to the bat-

Bhuvneshwar [Kumar] showed character, moved the ball. Hardik Pandya was a revelation with his changes of pace and effective shortpitched deliveries. He was keen to pull his weight as a bowler and often completed his 10 overs. And the extremely talented, multi-dimensional Ravindra Jadeja showed finger-spinners had a role to play too. It was a difficult decision to leave out Mohammed Shami in the semifinal but had we made it to the final at Lord's he would have been in the eleven as the fourth paceman. On wrist-spinners not

having a great World **Cup:** The conditions did not really suit them, it was cold. The batsmen also played them well, a lot off the back-

On the effective deliveries in the tournament: The deliveries on a good length that moved. The slower off-cutter bouncers, the quick bouncer and the cross seam deliveries.

On how the final concluded: I agree with Sachin Tendulkar that one more Super Over could have been played. Why look only at boundaries when there are so many methods to make runs? Looking at the number of wickets lost is the best way to decide.

The cricketing fraternity, somewhat disappointed with the way he batted in the World Cup, believed that he would announce his retirement from white-ball cricket after having bid adieu from the traditional Test cricket after the second Test of the 2014 series against Australia in Melbourne.

Those who have wished Dhoni well right though his spectacular career believe that he would not allow his procrastination to be a stumbling block to the Indian team selection.

at a basket that's not really full, but offers options. One is Andhra's wicketkeeperbatsman K.S. Bharat. The rationale is that performances for India-A should be given meaning and recognition.

If there is an award for an India-A player of the year, the 25-year-old Bharat would be among the front-runners. Rishabh Pant, though, would be the first-choice wicketkeeper for the Test se-

159 in the fourth and final Test against Australia in Sydney. In fact, Pant should figure in all three teams.

The Prasad-led selection committee has chosen Bengal's Wriddhiman Saha and Bharat in the India-A team for the three multi-day matches against the West Indies-A to be played in July-August in Antigua, Port of Spain and Tarouba.

Saha, 34, is trying to stage a comeback after an injury forced him out of the team after the first Test against South Africa at Cape Town in January 2018. Saha returned to active cricket during the IPL and, most importantly, in the Mushtaq Ali T20 tournament for Bengal.

In the last 12 months, Bharat has played 11 unofficial Tests against the 'A' teams of West Indies, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Sri Lanka and England Lions, scored 686 runs with three centuries and two half-centuries, held 41 catches and effected six stumpings.

Impressive record

Overall he has an impressive record of 65 First Class matches, 3798 runs with eight centuries, 20 fifties and 223 catches and 27 stumping and thus has made a strong claim for a Test squad spot.

He has scored three centuries against Australia-A (106 at Alur), England Lions (142 at Wayanad) and Sri Lanka-A (117 at Hubli), and these good numbers cannot

No suspension for over-rate offences: ICC

International cricket captains will no longer run the risk of being suspended for slow over-rates, with the ICC deciding instead to dock points and fine the entire side for any such violations, starting with the upcoming World Championship.

The recommendations of the ICC Cricket Committee were approved by its board in order to curb the menace of slow over-rates. The world Test championship, which runs from 2019 to 2021, gets underway with the Ashes, starting August 1. "In World Test Championship matches a team that is behind the required over rate at the end of a match will have two competition points deducted for each over it is behind," the ICC said in statement here.

Indian batting icon Sachin Tendulkar has been inducted into the International Cricket Council's Hall of Fame alongside South African pace legend Allan Donald. Joining Tendulkar and Donald in the Hall of Fame was two-time World Cupwinning Australian woman Cathryn Fitzpatrick.

"It's a huge honour for me," Tendulkar said at the induction ceremony held here on Sunday night. The 46-year-old former righthand batsman is regarded the greatest to have played

the game along with Sir Donald Bradman and remains the top run-accumulator in both Tests and ODIs. He has 34,357 runs across formats and is the only batsman to have 100 internationals hundreds under his belt.

The 52-year-old Donald is one of the finest bowlers to have played the game and had 330 Test and 272 ODI wickets to his credit before calling it quits in 2003.

Fitzpatrick is the second highest wicket-taker of all time in women's cricket with 180 ODI scalps and 60 in Tests. As a coach, she guided the Australian women's team to three World Cup titles.

India's men and women overcame England in contrasting finals to repeat their last year's team championship double-gold medal feat at Commonwealth Games by lifting the glittering trophies on the third day of the 21st Commonwealth table tennis championship.

While the women rolled over England 3-0 in an onesided affair to win a historic first gold for India in the tournament's 48-year history, A. Sharath Kamal's boys made a stunning comeback to edge past England 3-2 and retained their team title.

Challenging

The men's final turned out to be far more challenging than India anticipated. Veteran Sharath suffered a shock defeat to England's promising youngster Tom Jarvis. G. Sathiyan then led 2-0 against England's top paddler Sam Walker but the latter rallied to help England double the lead, leaving the gallery spellbound with his powerful backhand winners.

Harmeet Desai then survived tense moments before overcoming England's David McBeath to celebrate his birthday in style. An aggressive Sathiyan and a composed Sharath then saw India home by making short work of Jarvis and Walker, respectively, to help India win its third team championship.

After breaking eight times defending champion Singapore's run in the semifinals, Manika Batra, Archana Kamath and Madhurika Patkar sailed past the England girls without breaking sweat.
