Gayle threw his bat in the air, put his helmet on top of it and walked off the field. He then hurled the helmet up in the air and caught it while approaching the boundary

Dananjaya has Kiwis in a spot of bother

Spinner picks up five-for on rain-affected day; Taylor holding fort

Sri Lanka's Akila Dananjaya spun a web around New Zealand's batsmen, picking up all five wickets to fall, on a rain-shortened opening day of the first Test.

Ross Taylor held firm with an unbeaten 86 against the guile of Dananjaya to take the touring side to 203 for five when rain forced early stumps. Mitchell Santner was the other unbeaten batsman at the crease.

Both sides selected three spinners and the 25-year-old Dananjaya, who in the past has been suspended from bowling in international cricket for an illegal bowling action, made a quick impact.

After Kane Williamson chose to bat, the opening pair added 64 before Dananaya struck twice in the space of four deliveries to send back Tom Latham (30) and Williamson (0).

Dananjaya then induced an edge from Jeet Raval to dismiss the other opener for 33 at the stroke of the lunch break to reduce New Zealand to 71 for three.

Taylor staged a fight back

for the Black Caps with Henry Nicholls and added 100 for the fourth wicket before Dananjaya dismissed the latter.

Nicholls failed to connect a sweep shot and was out leg before for 42 and B-J. Watling soon joined him in the dressing room after being out in similar fashion to hand the offspinner his fourth five-wicket haul in Tests.

BCCI asks Subramaniam to stay back

The BCCI on Wednesday went back on its decision to call back the administrative manager, Sunil Subramanium, after he tendered "an unconditional apology" for misbehaving with senior officials from the country's High Commissions in the West Indies.

In what could have been a first in Indian cricket, the BCCI had contemplated calling back the manager midway through the tour, but the Committee of Administrators (CoA) chief Vinod Rai let him off with a severe reprimand following his apology.

"Sunil Subramaniam didn't know that it was a request from the government of India. I had initially thought of recalling him, but in the evening, after he tendered an unconditional apology, I decided to keep him for the remainder of the tour," said Rai.

"He will complete the tour as his apology has been accepted," added the CoA chief.

Rain washes out day one

Ashes holder Australia lead the five-match series 1-0 after its 251-run win at Edgbaston last week.

In 17 of the last 19 Ashes, the team that has led 1-0 has won the series. The exceptions were in 1997 when Australia lost at Edgbaston, but won the sixmatch series 3-2 and 2005 when England lost at Lord's but won the five-Test series 2-1.

Cricket ball goes vegan!

Earley Cricket Club in Reading, 64 kilometres west of London, had introduced a vegan tea for their players. That was down to their founder and chairman Gary Shacklady, who found most cricket club teas consisted of ham sandwiches, not much use to him when he

Struggling with his form, West Indies all-rounder Carlos Brathwaite said he is working on his fitness and trying to "reprogramme" his thoughts to get his batting back in order.

Brathwaite scored nine, 10 and zero across formats in the ongoing limited-overs series against India.

"I think batting-wise I have to reprogramme my thinking about hitting and swiping and batting properly," he told reporters on the eve of the final ODI against India.

"We are having a lot of honest conversations with the coaches and the staff and I think one thing that's kept me back is my fitness. I have been working very, very hard in the past 12 to 14 months on my fitness – I believe I can get a bit stronger as well."

Brathwaite's last memorable innings came in the World Cup when he blasted an 82-ball 101 to take West Indies to the brink of victory against New Zealand.

But his attempt to hit a match-winning six in the penultimate over cost him dearly as his team lost by five runs.
