Death toll 38 as rain lashes northern States

Rain in the northern States claimed at least 38 lives and triggered landslides that left hundreds of people in Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh stranded and several areas in Punjab, Haryana and Jammu flooded. Three more people were reported dead in Himachal Pradesh where heavy rain over the weekend has caused floods and landslides, increasing the toll to 25. In neighbouring Uttarakhand, the death toll climbed to 12 with two more bodies being recovered on Monday.

Yamuna crosses danger mark, old bridge closed

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Monday appealed to the residents of the Yamuna floodplains to shift to government tents as the river water level breached the danger mark, adding that the next two days were "critical". Traffic movement on the Old Yamuna Bridge, also known as the 'Lohe Ka Pul', was closed in view of the rising water level. More than 23,800 people will be required to be moved out from low-lying areas, according to official estimates.

Attendance thin as J&K schools reopen

Top leaders remain under detention

A very thin attendance of students marked the first day of the reopening of primary schools in Kashmir on Monday, the first time since the abrogation of Article 370 on August 5, which was followed by a largescale security clampdown in Jammu and Kashmir.

"The attendance of students was thin but the staff presence was 30 to 40% in the capital Srinagar. The situation by and large remains normal and people continue to offer their cooperation. There was no untoward incident in Jammu," Information Director Syed Sehrish Asghar said.

Director of Education Younis Malik admitted that there was "nil to thin attendance" in a majority of

schools in Kashmir, "Of the primary schools opened, 72 schools registered a thin attendance of students," he said.

All top schools such as Delhi Public School, Presentation Convent and Burnhall School reopened but no students attended the classes.

Mr. Malik said Budgam district saw only 35 schools opening, with students' attendance between 4 and 12%; Baramulla saw opening of 322 schools out of 671 with 40% staff presence and only 20% students' presence; Kupwara's 137 schools saw attendance of about 1,000 students; and Bandipora's 207 schools saw 10 to 12% attendance.

NRC issues may be tackled via legislative route

Assam Chief Minister says any decision can be taken after the list is published on August 31

Assam Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal indicated on Monday that any decision to challenge the final National Register of Citizens (NRC) through the legislative route could be discussed in future.

"In a democracy, everyone has the right to ask questions. After the publication of the NRC on August 31, if necessary, we will take whatever steps will be required," he said, asked whether the government was exploring any legislative options to delay the publica-

Both the Centre and the State have moved the Supreme Court for re-verification of the documents of 20% of the 3.29 crore applicants in areas bordering Bangladesh as they suspect wrongful inclusions and exclusions. Mr. Sonowal, who had an

hour-long meeting with Home Minister Amit Shah, said that as per the directions of the court, the NRC would be published by August 31 and both the State and Central governments would ensure that it was conducted peacefully.

Millions are set to lose citizenship after the publication of the final list. The register, first published in Assam in 1951, is being updated as per the court directions.

It is a list to segregate Indian citizens living in Assam from those who had illegally entered the State from Bangladesh after March 25, 1971.

The Supreme Court has, in the past fortnight, twice rejected the State's and the Home Ministry's plea for re-

verification.

Around 41 lakh people have been excluded from the draft lists published in July 2018 and June this year. Around 36 lakh have filed claims against their exclusion and objections have been filed against two lakh inclusions. The hearing of these claims and objections are under way at various NRC centres.


