Former World No. 1 Srikanth, who has not won a title at the BWF World Tour in the last 22 months, stave off a spirited a challenge from Ireland's Nhat Nguyen 17-21, 21-16, 21-6 in a match that lasted 66 minutes.

Praneeth, ranked 19th, who has been conferred with the Arjuna Award, defeated 66th-ranked Jason Anthony Ho-Shue of Canada 21-17, 21-16 in 39 minutes.

first round match, World No. 30 Prannoy, who is on a comeback trial after recovering from a stomach problem, fought back to beat 93rdranked Eetu Heino of Finland 17-21, 21-10, 21-11.

The former World No. 8 will next face Chinese legend Lin Dan, seeded 11th, in the second round. Prannoy had defeated Lin at the 2018 Indonesia Open and 2015 French Open.

India vice-captain Ajinkya Rahane got some muchneeded runs under his belt ahead of the first Test as the visitors scored 188 for five in the second innings before their three-day warm-up game against West Indies-A ended in a draw here on Monday.

Rahane, who has not scored a hundred in more than two years, made a fighting 54 off 162 balls before a reverse sweep led to his dismissal. Rahane, the stand-in captain in this game, had opened the innings after failing in the first essay.

Rahane and Hanuma Vihari had resumed the innings at 84 for one and both managed to score half-centuries. Vihari made 64 off 125 balls, with nine fours and

Ball set rolling to pick support staff

The national selection panel kicked off a four-day procedure to appoint support staff members of India's men's cricket team by interviewing 18 candidates on Monday, combined for the batting and bowling coach positions.

Four of the five national selectors - chairman M.S.K. Prasad, Sarandeep Singh, Gagan Khoda and Jatin Paranjape – assembled at the BCCI headquarters in the morning and continued to interact with aspiring candidates for the batting and bowling coach positions. *The Hindu* understands that the selectors interacted with 13 candidates for the batting coach's position while five appeared for the bowling coach role.

Ten candidates appeared in person at the BCCI headquarters, which included Lalchand Rajput, Pravin Amre, Hrishikesh Kanitkar, Shitanshu Kotak, Amol Muzumdar and Vikram Rathour (for batting coach) and Venkatesh Prasad, Subroto Banerjee, Amit Bhandari and Paras Mhambrey (bowling).

Sanjay Bangar, the incumbent batting coach whose retention is uncertain, is the only remaining candidate to be interviewed. The other eight candidates, including overseas

While former captain Dilip Vengsarkar, Sanjay Manjrekar, Ajit Agarkar, Irfan Pathan, Parthiv Patel and Rohan Gavaskar attended the meeting in person, former captain Sourav Ganguly joined videoconferencing.

Dravid recuses

While Rahul Dravid - whose alleged CoI led to the meeting – recused himself, V.V.S. Laxman and Sachin Tendulkar, were also embroiled in the CoI conundrum, were reported to be indisposed.

With CoA chairman Vinod Rai being unable to attend the meeting, former India women's captain Diana Edulji and Lt. Col. (retd.) Ravindra Thodge interacted with the cricketers for almost two hours.

Referring to the meeting as a "vibrant discussion". Edulji said the CoA would now prepare a white paper based on the discussion and forward it to amicus curiae P.S. Narasimha.

"A white paper will be prepared and we are trying our best to see what is best for cricket," Edulji told reporters after the meeting.

"We don't want to hamper anybody, but stay within the rules. And, as and when the Supreme Court decides, the amendments will be the line down everybody."

The Hindu understands that the cricketers sought relaxation in the CoI rules pertaining primarily to running coaching academies besides working for a State association on a coaching assignment or as commentator for matches in India.

"Suggestions were sought and we spoke about former

players, current players and what is happening now. And it was a long and good discussion.

The players explained the whole thing and the decision-makers have heard us," said Irfan, Jammu & Kashmir player-cum-coach and also a commentator.

Impressed with his skillset, the Indian team management has decided to keep speedster Navdeep Saini as a net bowler for the two-Test series against the West Indies, aiming to groom him future red-ball assignments.

"Navdeep Saini has been asked to stay back by the team management for the Test series. He will stay back primarily as a net bowler. They want to groom him for Test format keeping an eye on the future," a senior BCCI official said on Monday.

Saini, in fact, bowled six overs during the West Indies-A first innings in the ongoing practice match.

"He has performed well in red ball cricket for the past few years. He has the pace, and ability to hit the deck, move the ball both in the air and off the pitch.

"If he is groomed well, it will only increase our pool of fast bowlers for the toptier cricket. That's how the team management is looking at him," the official said.

Akhtar, on Sunday, slammed Archer for not showing the basic courtesy of checking on Smith after the Australian was felled by his bouncer during the second Ashes Test in

"Bouncers are a part &

parcel of the game but whenever a bowler hits a batsman on the head and he falls, courtesy requires that the bowler must go & check on him. It was not nice of Archer to just walk away while Smith was in pain. I was always the first one to run to the batsman," Akhtar tweeted.

In response, Yuvraj wrote, "Yes, you did! But your actual words were 'hope you're alright, mate, because there are a few more coming."

ing the batsman was never the idea. "It is never the plan. You are trying to get a wicket first. To see him go down, everyone stopped everyone's heart skipped a beat," Archer said. Archer lighted up Lord's

on his Test debut with some hostile fast bowling. He took five wickets across two innings and peppered the Australian batsmen with short deliveries that clattered against their helmets and bodies.

One of those forced Smith to retire hurt on Day 4 after the ball hit the prolific former Australia captain on the left side of his neck and he collapsed immediately. Smith eventually managed to recover and walk off.
