# Sindhu scales a peak no Indian ever has

Blows away arch-rival Okuhara in the summit clash to win her first title of the year; proves third-time lucky after losing in the 2017 and '18 finals

P.V. Sindhu on Sunday scripted history as she became the first Indian to win badminton World Championships gold by beating arch-rival Nozomi Okuhara of Japan in a lop-sided summit clash on Sunday.

The Olympic silver-medallist Indian won 21-7, 21-7 in the final that lasted just 38 minutes.

### **Never-say-die attitude**

It was third time lucky for Sindhu who had lost to Okuhara and Carolina Marin of Spain respectively in the 2017 and 2018 finals to bag a silver twice. She had won a bronze each in the 2013 and 2014 editions.

Sindhu is now the joint highest medal winner in women's singles in the World Championships history with former Olympic champion Zhang Ning of China who has won an identical one gold, two silver and two bronze between 2001 and 2007.

The fifth seeded Indian, who enjoyed an 8-7 head-tohead lead over the thirdseeded Okuhara ahead of Sunday's contest, was simply unstoppable as she dished out an attacking game right



from the start to race to 8-1

The Indian targeted the deep corners and unleashed her big smashes to gather points at will.A precise netshot helped Okuhara to snap Sindhu's run of straight eight points but the Indian quickly got the control back when Okuhara went wide and then unleashed two good-looking smashes to enter the break with a massive 11-2 lead.

Okuhara tried to step up the pace but an alert Sindhu

was up to the task. The Indian targeted Okuhara's forehand corner to take two more points.

Sindhu used her height to produce those attacking clears which Okuhara could not negotiate. At 16-2, Sindhu

committed a couple of unforced errors before again taking control of the match.

The Indian eventually grabbed as many as 13 game points when Okuhara went long and she sealed the first game with a body blow which her rival sent out. In the second game too,

Okuhara had no answer to Sindhu's razor-sharp re-

## 'Sindhu can win all major events'

Prakash Padukone believes P.V. Sindhu can go on to

dominate women's badminton after her victory in the BWF World Championships in Basel on Sunday. "If she can remain injury-free and choose the right

tournaments, she can definitely win all the major tournaments and be World No.1 for a long time," Padukone told The Hindu. "She's at her best right

now. It's the first time an Indian has won the World Championships. I had a feeling she'd win today but I didn't expect that it would be so easy."

Good augury

Padukone felt Sindhu's win augured well for her chances of winning gold at next year's Olympics but he also cautioned against putting too much pressure on the 24-year-old.

"Now that she's won a very important event, and that too very convincingly, it should give her a lot of confidence going into the Olympics. I hope she will be able to repeat this performance there. But it's not something we should take for granted. We should not put too pressure on her. It's important she takes little breaks in between, tries to peak at the right time," he said.

Sindhu had faltered in successive finals before crossing the line on Sunday but Padukone stated that he had never doubted her ability.

"Earlier, when people asked if she would ever win, I maintained that she definitely would," he said. "I knew it was just a matter of time and a little experience. Even now she's very young. She has a bright future."

# 'It was a near-perfect game'

An elated Sindhu says her next goal is the Olympic gold

India's golden girl of the moment P.V. Sindhu says she played the best and most consistent badminton in recent times in the championships.

In an exclusive chat with The Hindu after being crowned women's singles champion in Basel (Switzerland). Sindhu said she was fully prepared for the final and was in a much better frame of mind.

"Honestly, I was expecting a long battle, given Okuhara's reputation. But, I am glad that I could peak at the right time and never really let the lead slip away," SindI was at my best in this World

championship and that was the key to my success

"Definitely, the Korean coach Kim Ji Jyun's inputs and Gopi sir's guidance were major plus points in my campaign," she said. "I must say Kim has her own effective style of getting the best out of me," she added.

"I never felt any pressure

before entering what was my third final. I just wanted to give my best shot and didn't bother whether I would win or not when the final started," she revealed. "The best part is there were very few unforced errors and it was a near-perfect game," she said

"Well, I didn't expect it to be such a one-sided final but I must say I played as well I could in the most important match of the championship," Sindhu said. "I was really dominating from the start," she added.

### Not a conscious ploy

"It was not a conscious ploy to attack right from the first game but since every aspect of my game was falling in place, I just ensured that the momentum never really slipped away. I am immensely delighted with what is the most important win of my career," she said.

"I can't say whether there was any specific turning point in the championship but I must repeat that I was

at my best in this World championship over a week and that was the key to my success," Sindhu said.

### **Biggest gift**

"Yes, this is the biggest gift I could give to my mother who is celebrating her birthday today and I dedicate this win to my parents, grandparents, coaches, all the support staff at the Gopi Academy and fellow-players who have always been there with me," she said.

"Well, one achieved and the next one is there - Olympics. I will really work hard and will prepare to win that one also by doing well in the Super Series in the run-up to the Tokyo Games next year," an elated Sindhu concluded.

# Manasi makes it a red-letter day

# Rahane, Vihari and bowlers pile on the misery for WI

The hosts, pursuing a target of 419, reduced to 15 for five at tea with Bumrah and Ishant on fire

Ajinkya Rahane scored his first Test century in two years before the Indian speedsters blew away the West Indies top-order on the fourth day of the first Test here on Sunday

Rahane scored a patient 102, but young batsman Hanuma Vihari (93) missed out on his maiden Test century as India declared its second innings at 343 for seven to set West Indies a stiff 419-run

Rahane and Vihari raised 135 for the fifth wicket after India lost skipper Virat Kohli (51) early on during the day.

Jasprit Bumrah and Ishant Sharma then ripped through the West Indies top-order to leave it gasping at 15 for five

Bumrah and Ishant exposed the feeble West Indies' batting line-up with their fiery spells as none of the home batsmen could reach double digits.

Bumrah removed the openers – Kraigg Brathwaite (1) and John Campbell (7) before castling Darren Bravo (2) with a beauty. Ishant joined the party, getting rid of Shamarh Brooks (2) and Shimron Hetmyer (1). Earlier, Kohli's scalp did

not help West Indies much as Rahane and Vihari gradually took the game away from them with their confident batting. The moment Vihari miscued a pull which landed in the gloves of wicket-keeper Shai Hope, India declared its second innings.

It was Rahane's first Test hundred since his 132 against Sri Lanka in August 2017 while Vihari threw away a golden opportunity to get

Newcastle stuns an insipid Tottenham Hotspurs

Sergio Aguero reached 400 career goals with a clinical double as the Manchester City striker inspired the champion's 3-1 win at Bournemouth, while Tottenham suffered a shock 1-0 defeat against Newcastle Sunday.

Raheem Sterling was also on the scoresheet - making it six goals in four games this term for the England winger - as City's second win of the season lifted it to within two points of Liverpool.

It was a landmark day all round for City, with captain David Silva involved in all three of the goals on his 400th appearance for the

Meanwhile, Steve Bruce silenced his critics as Newcastle won at Tottenham to secure its first points under the polarising Magpies boss.

Since taking over from Rafael Benitez in the close-season, Bruce had found himself under pressure after losing his first two games,
