Eight dead, 37 missing as boat capsizes in flooded Godavari

As many as 27 rescued from the vessel that had no permission to operate

In a major tragedy in Andhra Pradesh, a private boat carrying tourists to Papikondalu capsized in Godavari River near Katchuluru village of East Godavari district on Sunday, leaving at least eight dead and over 37 missing. As many as 27 were rescued.

The accident occurred post-noon when the boat 'Vashista' headed to the tourist destination against an inflow of about five lakh cubic metres of floodwater in the Godavari, which has been in spate for the past several days. The boat, which had no permission to operate from the government, began the trip from Singanapalli Revu in Deviyanam mandal.

Alert locals of Katchuluru village rescued about 14 persons. Most of the tourists who survived were wearing life jackets, locals said.

Admitted to hospital
The survivors were initially admitted to the Rampachodavar area hospital and they quickly recovered.

Nayem Asmi said there were 72 persons on board, including about eight boat crew members, at the time of the accident. Eight bodies have been retrieved.

However, the number of persons on board and the number of victims couldn't be confirmed as different government agencies, including the district administration and the Revenue Department, were giving different figures.

While some of the rescue teams have been withdrawn from the operation, National Disaster Response Force teams will continue the search for survivors through the night.

An Oil and Natural Gas

Corporation (ONGC) chopper has also been pressed into service. More rescue teams will be engaged early on Monday.

Navy deploys aircraft
The Navy has deployed a Dornier aircraft to assist the rescue operations.

Two Naval helicopters would also be deployed from INS Dega at daybreak on Monday, according to an official release.

Deep divers team
A specialised deep divers team with 'Side Scan Sonar' equipment from Uttarakhand will join the rescue operations on Monday.

A majority of the tourists were from Hyderabad, Warangal and Visakhapatnam cities in Telangana.

The State government has announced an ex gratia of ₹10 lakh each to the kin of the deceased.

Boat services suspended
The government ordered the immediate suspension of boat services in the region.

Chief Minister Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy, who enquired about the accident, directed the officials to carry out the rescue operations on a war footing.

President Ramnath Kovind tweeted that his prayers were with the bereaved families.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in a message on Twitter that he was extremely pained by the tragedy.

Mr. Modi said his thoughts were with the bereaved families and that rescue operations were underway at the site of the tragedy. He also asked available Ministers in the district to visit the spot and supervise the rescue and search operations.

Andhra Pradesh Governor Biswa Bhushan Harichandan offered his condolences to members of the bereaved families.

Voices grow louder against Shah's pitch to push Hindi

Comments contrary to spirit of Constitution, says CPI(M)

Union Home Minister Amit Shah's assertion that Hindi, as the most spoken language, could work to unite the country continued to draw sharp reaction from the Opposition parties on Sunday.

"The Polit Bureau of the CPI(M) strongly opposes these efforts, which stem from the RSS conception of one nation, one culture, one language," the party said in a statement, rejecting the "imposition of Hindi".

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Speaking at an event in Bengaluru, Congress Rajya Sabha member Jairam Ramesh said "one nation-one language" would never be a reality. "We may have one nation-one tax, but one nation-one language will never be a reality..." he said.

"We are one nation, we are many languages, we are one nation-many countries,"

Mr. Ramesh was quoted as saying by PTI.

DMK president M.K. Stalin accused the Centre of "autocratic imposition of Hindi", calling for unity among Opposition parties on the issue.

Speaking at a public meeting organised by ally MDMK on the 11th birth anniversary of former Chief Minister C.N. Annadurai in Chennai, Mr. Stalin said, "if we close our eyes for a second, they will impose Hindi and completely discard Tamil. We have been protesting against this since 1938. We protested in 1949, 1950, 1953, 1963 and 1965. We have once again arrived at a stage where we have to protest."

Puducherry Chief Minister V. Narayanasamy also joined the chorus of protests.

Earlier on Saturday, several Opposition parties – including DMK – had opposed Mr. Shah's pitch for Hindi.

The Congress said the three-language formula should not be tinkered with. The remarks also triggered protests in Karnataka.

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee tweeted: "My best wishes to all on Hindi Diwas. We should respect all languages and cultures equally. We may learn many languages but we should never forget our mother-language."

The CPI said the comments smacked of an attack on the very concept of diversity. "The need today is to respect, protect and nurture diversity of our nation so that unity is ensured. The Home Minister's statement is an attack on federalism extending the politics and ideology of RSS to every sphere of life," it said.

NRC will be compiled in Haryana too: Khattar

Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar on Sunday said a National Register of Citizens will be compiled in Haryana. He was speaking to the media after meeting Justice (retired) H.S. Bhalla, former chairman of the Haryana Human Rights Commission. He also met former Admiral J.S. Lamba and Lt. Gen. (retired) Baljit Singh Jaiswal under the BJP's 'Maha Samprak Abhiyan' – an outreach programme to get feedback on the work of the government in the last five years. It concluded on Sunday.

"Under this campaign, we met prominent citizens. We talked about steps for taking the country forward. I spoke to Justice Bhalla on the NRC exercise. He is going on a tour of Assam to study NRC data. His services



would be useful for compiling the NRC in Haryana," said Mr. Khattar.

He said the government was working at a fast pace on the family identity card, and its data would be used in the NRC exercise.

"Constitution of a Law Commission is being considered. A separate department would also be established to utilise the services of intellectuals, professionals and eminent persons in an audit of the development works undertaken," he said.

Saudis to tap oil reserves after attacks on plants

6% of global crude supplies hit; markets closely watch situation

Saudi Arabia will use its vast oil reserves to offset disruption to production, Energy Minister Prince Abdulaziz bin Salman said on Sunday. Drone attacks on two major oil facilities on Saturday knocked 5.7 million barrels per day (bpd) off production – close to 6% of the global crude supplies.

"Part of the drop will be compensated to clients" from storage facilities, Mr. Salman said in a statement.

sents half the output of the kingdom, which is the world's biggest oil supplier.

Riyadh has built five giant


underground storage facilities across the country that can hold tens of millions of barrels of various refined petroleum products, to be tapped into during times of crisis.

The facilities were constructed between 1988 and 2009 and cost tens of billions of dollars.

As markets closely watch the situation, Aramco CEO Amin Nasser said "work is under way" to restore full production.

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

Book market reopens, vendors not on same page on relocation

They say deal struck on relocation could destroy claim to permanent resettlement; some question procedural lapses, others accept the change


After nearly two months in abeyance, the weekly book market at Daryaganj reopened at Mahila Haat complex nearby, on Sunday. However, while some rejoiced at the return of business, others opposed the deal struck between leaders of the market association and municipal authorities on relocation, saying it could destroy any claim to permanent resettlement.

Both factions are now eagerly awaiting the next date of hearing before the High Court on September 25.

At Mahila Haat, an elevated garden complex about 150 metres from the old location, Vijay Pal, who runs a student library in Rajasthan's Sujan-garh, was relieved to see books spread across rows of tarpaulin sheets.

'More organised'

Mr. Pal said, "I have been coming to the market every two months or so to restock our library and I am glad it is back." Compared to the earlier location, where he argued one would have to shuffle through tight spaces, he said, the market seemed

more organised and required less walking.

'Cleaner, safer'

While footfall was low on the

first day of reopening, vendors believed it would soon pick up, adding that the area was cleaner and safer. Following protracted ne-

gotiations between the representatives of the market association and civic authorities, Rajinder Singh, general secretary of the association said that the Zonal Deputy Commissioner had assured them the allotment of the area. While he said that orders had not been drawn up yet, vendors are being rented 4x6 feet plots each at a rate of ₹200 a day. The agreement would be reviewed after two years and the rent would be increased by 10%, he added.

'Invalid agreement'

Vendors opposing the move argued that the agreement

was invalid as the representatives who entered into it had tendered resignations on September 1.

Sumit Verma, one of those vendors who refused to move, argued that without following proper procedure and establishing documentary proof, all booksellers would lose their claim to permanent resettlement.

In a letter to the Deputy Commissioner sent last week, the market association argued that the eviction of

the vendors without a proper survey and other procedures was illegal under the Street Vendors Act.

"There are two angles from which the vendors are looking at the market," said Kanupriya Dhingra, a book history scholar at SOAS. While one section sees it as an "upgrade", the other sees it as a loss of "a thing of past"

she said, adding: "This is not just a dynamic physiognomic change, but also a cultural shift. From being a *patri ki taab bazaar*, it is now a market, implying that there will be a shift in how the new space will function."

Five-day fair gave customers less time to browse this year, say sellers



Typically a nine-day-long event otherwise, this year's fair commenced on September 11 and ended on Sunday – much to the chagrin of book-sellers across the city to whom the fair brings a lot of profit.

'September not ideal' Sandeep Madan (40) has been dealing in the business of books since 22 years and runs a book store in Pitam Pura with his elder brother. He complained that this year's fair, being a shorter one, did not benefit anyone as "customers had lesser time to browse"

that, "The fair is always a good idea."

D.K. Kapur, manager of Jaico Publishing House, meanwhile, said he was happy to find "that the younger generation is keen on reading".

Jaico Publishing House stall is one of those which attracts a lot of customers. They lure them by offering 10% discount on books. Mr. Kapur said that he managed to sell books worth ₹10 lakh, adding

that, "My profession gives me an opportunity to look at new books and I often suggest the good ones to our library for procurement," she added.

Rudraksh recalled his first visit to the book fair. He said he was just eight back then and had got lost at a stall. He was looking for books at the stall when his father drifted elsewhere.

While picking story books for her four-year-old son, former dentist Shipra Sharma said that she had been coming to the fair since she was a child. The long drive from Rohini, where she lives, "is totally worth it," she said.

Railway police helpline flooded with food delivery requests

The railway police in Delhi are having a tough time as a bulk of phone calls – about 80% – on its helpline per day is related to requests for pizza delivery, mobile recharges or other such trivial matters.

200 calls a day

The Delhi railway police control room receives 200 phone calls on an average on its 1512 helpline daily, and 80% of such calls are from passengers either requesting the staff to get eatables such as pizzas and burgers delivered to them or enquire about railway jobs, the police said on Sunday.

"Get my phone recharged, get pizza delivered, I want two burgers, tea, juices, cold water are some of the demands the passengers make," a senior police officer said.

There are also passengers who seek police assistance in getting their electricity bill paid or train tickets booked.

5-member panel to work on Deshbhakti curriculum

It will redefine narrative on nationalism

The Delhi government has formed a five-member committee to work on the "Deshbhakti curriculum" to be introduced in its schools to "redefine the existing narrative on nationalism, Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia said here.

The narrative is "currently limited to chanting *Bharat mata ki jai*", Mr. Sisodia said and stressed that children must learn that nationalism means doing your bit for the country in everyday life.

Mr. Sisodia, who is also the Education Minister of Delhi, rejected suggestions that the Aam Aadmi Party government was trying to ape the BJP agenda ahead of the Assembly polls, saying nationalism is neither the BJP's nor AAP's.

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal had announced last month that his government will introduce "Deshbhakti curriculum" in government schools next year to create a class of patriotic citizens.

"Many people have been calling me saying that nationalism is the BJP's agenda why is AAP doing this," Mr. Sisodia said.

Our definition of nationalism is very different. Patriotism is not just about chanting *Bharat mata ki jai* but doing your bit for the country, he said.

Mr. Sisodia added that a child needs to learn that when somebody jumps a red light or pays a bribe, he or she is cheating the country and that is what the curriculum will be all about.


He said a committee of five members, including officials from SCERT, education researchers and teachers, has been formed to work on the curriculum draft.

The Chief Minister is likely to meet the team in the coming week, he added.

We knew that the moment the word 'nationalism' comes, it will be seen in a negative context but why should we refrain from doing so, he said.

Sachin Sharma, 43, regularly commutes to his workplace at Cyber City in the Rapid Metro. He has been boarding the train at Sector 54 Chowk metro station and alighting at IndusInd Bank Cyber City as a daily routine for the past one year. But he is a worried man now with uncertainty looming large over the continuity of the network.

For a city with an abysmal record on public transport, the news of Rapid Metro network struggling financially has come as a rude shock for the residents. Around 60,000 people commute daily in Rapid Metro, India's first fully privately financed metro system that also acts as a feeder to the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) network, connecting at the Sikanderpur metro station on the Yellow Line.

On shaky ground

Not able to meet its targeted ridership of one lakh – for the first and second phases put together – the almost 12-km-long metro network has been on shaky ground financially since it began its commercial operations on November 14, 2013. The first signs of trouble appeared last year when Rapid Metro Rail Gurgaon Limited (RMGL) accused the Haryana Shehri Vikas Pradhikaran (HSVP), formerly Haryana Urban Development Authority (HUDA), of material

breaches and defaults on the concession contract and asked the Haryana government to fix them within 90 days.

In an agreement reached between the RMGL and HSVP (then HUDA) on December 9, 2009, the company was entitled to participate in property development and advertisement at project site to generate revenue in addition to the fare. As per the contract, the concessionaire has the rights to display visual advertisements inside the rolling stock, the stations or along the route. The company was also allowed to utilize the land over, under and within the stations for property development and commercial exploitation during the concession period, subject to a limit of 250 square metre per station.

No-fare revenue

Passenger fare contributes only 30%-40% to the total revenue of a metro project, de-

pending upon which stage it is in; the rest is the non-fare revenue generated through advertisements and property rights. It is these rights that are the bone of contention between the two partners, with the RMGL accusing the HSVP of not allowing them in full, as per the contract.

Sources privy to the dispute between the two told *The Hindu* that the company also accused HSVP of failing to carry out the development work along the metro corridor as per the Master Plan-2031 and not putting in place a sound feeder bus mechanism, hitting the ridership and causing loss of fare revenue.

The HSVP has rubbished the charges saying the company is levelling false allegations as it is looking for an easy way out of the financial


mess it is in because of its own reasons. It has also accused the RMGL of failing to meet its obligations on ridership.

Poor management

Industry experts partially blame the financial troubles of the Rapid Metro on the poor management of the project and bad marketing strategies. The fact that the first Managing Director of RMGL, Sanjiv Rai, was denied an extension and was replaced by Rajiv Banga was enough hint at his "non-satisfactory performance".

It was in sharp contrast to four extensions to 'Metro Man' E. Sreedharan before he retired in 2011, and four-year extension to DMRC MD Mangu Singh, said experts.

On the marketing front too, while the RMGL seemed to be wasting its efforts on wrong choices such as running birthday trains to earn revenue, it failed to attract the larger workforce in the Cyber City to use the net-



work. Experts said that tie-ups with companies operating in the Cyber City and lucrative offers to their employees could have helped the RMGL achieve its targetted ridership, especially when the corridor was connected to the DMRC's Yellow Line.

Extending the RMGL network along the Golf Course Road, the most elite address in the Millennium City, especially when the stretch was being widened to 16-lane highway, for its Phase-II too proved to be an unwise decision. Instead, connecting the Udyog Vihar Industrial Area, housing a large number of garment units and other companies, with the network and extending it further to the Maruti Suzuki plant on Old Delhi-Gurugram Road and bus stand could have added far more numbers to the

ridership. In the future, the extension towards Udyog Vihar could also act as a possible link between the DMRC's Yellow and Blue Lines, further augmenting the ridership.

Financial troubles

The financial troubles of IL&FS, the company that constructed the Rapid Metro, in mid-2018 and the Union government moving an application before the National Company Law Tribunal, Mumbai, seeking suspension of its board of directors on the grounds of massive mismanagement of public funds proved to be the last nail in the coffin of the RMGL.

The RMGL was among the 38 domestic group entities of IL&FS classified as "Red Entity" by the Union government, saying that it could not meet its payment obligations towards even senior secured

financial creditors. The need of the hour is to get all the associated parties on a common platform so that they are able to play their respective roles and ensure that the project runs smoothly," said Sarvesh Tiwari, an infrastructure expert who was earlier associated with the Rapid Metro project.

While the two parties battle it out legally in the Punjab and Haryana High Court – the matter is scheduled for hearing on September 17 – the commuters, the most important stakeholder in the matter, keep their fingers crossed for a favourable outcome.



Missing transport broker found murdered

Two held; accused eliminated him as they didn't want to return borrowed money

A transport broker, who was reported missing, was found killed in a drain in Narela's Alipur on Sunday. Two persons have been arrested in connection with the case.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (Outer North) Gaurav Sharma said that the victim, Manish (30), a resident of Narela Sector B2, was a transport broker in Sanjay Gandhi Transport Nagar. The accused have been identified as Atul (20) and Shivam (21). Atul used to stay with Manish and his wife Sapna, the police said.

Mr. Sharma said that Sapna approached the police on Friday and told them that

her husband has been missing. The next day, she came again and raised suspicion over Atul. She said that Manish had left home with Atul and he hasn't been able to give a satisfactory reply about Manish's absence.

Infant found dead at NSUT campus

An eight-month-old boy was found dead on the campus of Netaji Subhash University of Technology (NSUT) in Dwarka on Friday morning. Parents of the infant allegedly told the police that he had fallen from a height.

DCP (Dwarka) Anto Alphonse said that the victim, Anand, is the son of Lakan, who works with his wife at the campus as labourers.

The police said that a PCR call was received around 11.30 p.m. from a private hospital regarding an infant with severe head injury being brought dead to the hospital. "The hospital authorities informed us that the mother of the victim had told them that the boy had fallen from a height," the officer said.

When the police reached the spot, the boy's mother allegedly told them that she was working near the NSUT canteen and her seven-year-old son was playing with the


When the police started searching for Manish, Atul was found absconding. But with the help of his other friends, he was traced and on his instance, the second accused Shivam was also arrested, Mr. Sharma said.

During interrogation, the accused allegedly told the police that Atul had lent money from Manish and had also asked Shivam to get more. There were issues between Manish and Atul over money matters due to which Atul decided to rope in Shivam, the police said, adding that they are all known to each other and do the same business.

The police said that on September 11, around 11 p.m., Manish and Atul left for work on Manish's bike after which Atul messaged Shivam that they had left and asked him to come to Swaroop Nagar. Upon reaching, the accused hit Manish with an iron pipe and then burnt his bike to destroy evidence.

The accused then took him to Alipur in an unconscious state on their bike, tied both his hands and feet and dumped him in a drain. After that Atul returned home and told Sapna that Manish had gone to his home town in UP, the police said.

Mr. Sharma said that a case under relevant Sections of the Indian Penal Code has been registered and further investigation is under way.

Manning the booths take a toll on women operators

Kherki Daula toll plaza officials claim cases of violence have reduced by 30%-40% after hiring women staff, but the latter claim abuses are daily work hazards

Abuses, threats, and assaults are almost daily work hazards for Sangeeta*, a 20-year-old toll collector at Kherki Daula toll plaza on Delhi-Gurugram Expressway. She is among the 10 women that comprised the first batch of female toll collectors hired through Eagle Hunter Solutions Limited in Uttar Pradesh and deployed at the toll plaza in April 2017.

Among other things, the move to deploy women toll collectors at Kherki Daula toll plaza – arguably one of the most notorious across India because of frequent conflicts between motorists and toll collectors – was aimed at bringing down the cases of violence.

A steady decrease

Millennium City Expressways Private Limited toll operation manager Mohammad Sohrab Khan told *The Hindu* that the steady decrease in the number of misbehaviour cases over the past two years suggested that the move had partially paid-off.

He said there was a 30%-40% fall in the incidents of conflicts mostly because the women toll collectors, unlike their male counterparts, were less aggressive and polite in their dealings with the toll users. Also, the compa-

ny's retention rate for these women employees was higher than the men. He, however, claimed that the incidents of misbehaviour were still relatively very high and a total of 60 complaints had already been reported this year so far.

The number of women employees, a majority of them toll collectors, has increased to double over the

past two years. As of now, there are 40 women employees at the Kherki Daula toll plaza, including two deployed in the control room and one for audit.

"Since the staff in the control room and the audit need to interact with the toll collectors, a need was felt for women staff there as well. The control room staff are in constant touch with the toll

collectors deployed at the lanes and are the first point of contact in case of any emergency," said Mr. Khan.

Abuses vs perks
Working as a toll collector for almost a year now, Bhawna* from Uttar Pradesh's Agra said sense of financial independence, the flexible and short duty hours, support from the staff in case of an

emergency and perks, such as free accommodation, were the reasons why most of the women toll collectors continued to work despite the cases of scuffle and the constant fear of being assaulted. Most of the women toll collectors maintained that their families did not know about the hassles of working at the toll plaza, else they would not have allowed them.

In recent cases, a 40-year-old gym owner, Manjeet from Shikhpur village, had threatened to rape and kill a woman toll collector in June this year when she asked him for the documents to allow free passage.

Manjeet, later arrested, was the co-accused in a 2011 murder case wherein his friend Vijay Veer had shot dead a toll collector, Umesh Kumar Pandey, at Kherki Daula over payment of toll charges.

In yet another incident of misbehaviour over refusal to pay the toll charges, a 26-year-old woman collector was allegedly slapped and abused by a villager this past month. The accused, Rahul, later arrested was also the resident of Shikhpur village.

Most of the cases of violence pertain to the residents of 31 villages in and around Kherki Daula toll plaza that have been exempted from the toll payment on account

of their land having been acquired for the construction of the highway. Besides, there is a sizeable number of cases of impersonation every year wherein motorists with fake IDs seek free passage and resort to violent behaviour. Besides the deployment of female staff, the toll authorities, in a bid to reduce the cases of the altercation, have distributed exempt tags to 7,000 villagers to avoid their interaction with the toll collectors. Even the commercial vehicles registered in these villages have been exempted. The local bus operators have also been given Fastags with monthly passes offering huge discounts.

Mr. Khan claimed that impersonation was a huge menace with people showing fake IDs of police personnel and army men and fake registration certificates to seek free passage. "We have so far seized 500 fake registration certificates and 400 fake IDs this year. Every year, the number comes around 1,000," said Mr. Khan.

Though only a couple of cases of violence were reported at Sarai toll plaza during Mr. Khan's stint there as manager for almost four years, he said a case of violence was reported every 10-15 days on an average at Kherki Daula.

He attributed it to the villagers in Gurugram being financially well-off due to exorbitant cost of land and having a steady income through rent.

Political clout

Besides, the locals wielded political clout and the police were reluctant to take action against them, claimed Mr. Khan.

"Even before the matter reaches the police, the accused uses their political connection to ensure that a case is not registered. The fact that police have not registered a case in even 5% of the complaints is enough evidence," he said. Gurugram Police spokesperson Subhash Boken said an FIR was registered in case any cognisable offence is made out in a complaint after preliminary investigation. He rejected the charge that the police act under political influence.

Toll companies across the country have been experimenting with hiring women as the collectors over the past few years and the response has been satisfactory. Now women toll collectors are a common sight. Mr. Khan said the toll companies were going to continue with it despite the hiccups.

"Names of all women toll collectors have been changed to protect their identities."

ATM cut open, thieves flee with ₹3.5 lakh

A few men allegedly fled with over ₹3.5 lakh after cutting open an ATM machine in south Delhi's Maidan Garhi in the small hours of Sunday, the police said.

An officer said a PCR call was received at 7 a.m. informing them of an ATM cash theft in Asola Market. On reaching the spot, the police found that the machine was cut open and there was no cash.

"Offenders cut the machine using gas cutters and also sprayed black paint on the camera before entering. They disconnected the alarm system as well. The exact amount stolen is yet to be ascertained," the officer said.

No guard was present at that time which suggests that the accused had conducted a recce before committing the crime. A case under Section 381 (theft by clerk or servant of property in possession of master) of the Indian Penal Code has been registered and efforts are on to obtain CCTV footage from the bank.

"It has been revealed that there were more than two people. Involvement of an insider has not been ruled out," the officer added.

'Eliminate confusion over ban on single-use plastic'

Confederation of All India Traders (CAIT) appealed to Union Environment Minister Prakash Javadekar to "eliminate confusion" caused over the ban on single-use plastic, the group said on Sunday.

In the absence of guidelines, there is a lack of clarity

over the category of items which fall under "single-use plastic", on whether plastic above 50 microns is permitted or not and on what alternatives could be promoted, the group said.

It also added that the MNCs should be directed to stop using packaging material, which involved single-use plastic.

The police said Javed had an argument with his wife on Friday morning after which he dropped her to her parental house in Narela's sector B2 where Rachna lives on the first floor.

Around 9.30 p.m., Javed

returned and forced his wife to come with him. When she and her family members refused, an altercation broke out and Rachna intervened. Javed took out his pistol and fired; the bullet hit Rachna's abdomen after which she was rushed to a hospital where she is undergoing treatment, the police added.



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Windfall for Odisha tribals if single-use plastic is banned

5 million in the State involved in plate-making from leaves

As the focus is likely to shift to alternative products from single-use plastic that India plans to ban, millions of people, especially tribals residing in Odisha's forest-rich regions, expect an upturn in their income.

Close to five million people in Odisha are currently involved in plate-making using both hand and machine stitching methods. They depend on two major leaves of forest species - sal and siali - for their earnings.

"Odisha's leaf plate and cup market is worth ₹1,500 crore. While 2.5 million people mostly tribals are sal leaf pluckers, 1.5 million are siali leaf pluckers. Around one million are connected with

other leaves," said Chittaranjan Pani, a leading expert on non-timber forest product trade.

As soon as plastic products are banned, the focus will shift to degradable materials and leaf plates and cups are one of the obvious choic-

es. In 22 of the 30 districts of Odisha, inhabitants of forest-fringe villages are traditionally involved in leaf-plate making.

In some districts, tribal women have already formed federations to get a better deal in the trade.

Lawyers want exemption from wearing helmets

'Causes inconvenience while shuttling from one court to another'

Members of the Balasore District Bar Association have sought exemption from wearing helmets for 12 hours daily, arguing that carrying helmet causes inconvenience to them while shuttling from one court to another.

The Association has passed a resolution on non-use of helmet by advocates during office hours. It demanded that lawyers should not be detained on the pretext of enforcement of the new Motor Vehicle Act. The Association also requested the superintendent of police to approve its demand.

"We face difficulties in keeping our helmets at safe places. We have taken an

oath under the Advocates' Act to render legal services to people. If I am detained midway, I will surely fail to discharge my duty. So lawyers should not be forced to wear helmets during duty hours from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.," said Niranjan Panda, Association president.

Hefty fines

Mr. Panda said the government had introduced hefty fine provisions without doing any consultation with people.

A delegation of bar association members would meet the district police chief to apprise him of the difficulties of wearing helmets during duty hours.

The Odisha government has given a three-month win-

dow during which the transport authorities have been asked not to go overboard in imposition of fines under the amended MV Act. During the first week of September, the new Act was enforced.

The State police have decided to conduct awareness drive to make people understand the importance of wearing helmets and using seat belts in cars.

Meanwhile, Balangir Regional Transport Office has imposed fine of ₹22,500 on a biker for multiple traffic rules violation. Sushant Kumar Meher, owner of the bike, was asked to pay a fine for rash driving, non-possession of valid driving licence, drunken driving and disobeying enforcement authority at Kantabanji.

Activists form forum for river protection

To take up awareness drive in Ganjam

Activists of various organisations in Odisha's Ganjam district came together to form the 'Nadi Surakhya Manch' (River Protection Forum) on Sunday to save rivers from degradation.

The organisation took shape during a meeting convened by the Forum for Ganjam, Mahanadi Bachao Andolan and Aryabhatta Foundation in Berhampur. It was attended by representatives from different parts of the district as well as retired engineers of the irrigation department.

"Initially we have decided to take up an awareness drive among people living on the banks of the rivers regarding the degradation of riverbeds in the recent past due to human activities," said Sudhir Raut, convener of the Manch. A booklet describing scientific details about deterioration of the rivers in Ganjam district will be published.

The Manch has urged the government and the administration to be strict against indiscriminate sand lifting, form small check dams on rivers to increase use of water as well as groundwater recharging, dredging on riverbeds at required points to streamline the flow at the middle rather than at sides that increases erosion.

Bees delay Kolkata-Agartala Air India flight

A Kolkata-Agartala Air India flight was delayed for around two hours on Sunday after a swarm of bees was noticed in front of the aircraft while it was taxiing towards the main

runway here, an airline official said. The plane with 136 passengers and crew members on board the AI 743 flight was scheduled to depart at 9.40 a.m.

The bees were noticed by the pilots when the Airbus

A319 was ready for the take-off. The pilots brought the aircraft to a standstill as further movement could have damaged the plane and harmed the passengers if the bees entered it through the engines, the AI spokesperson said.

Fire services personnel were called to tackle the problem. Before this incident, the flight had been delayed for some time due to a technical snag. The plane finally embarked for the Tripura capital at 12.45 p.m.

Five kg cannabis seized

Audit recommends inquiry into expressway trauma care centre

Note questions its location, land deal, non-involvement of experts in construction

Days after Health Minister Eknath Shinde inaugurated a trauma care centre on the Mumbai-Pune Expressway, it has emerged that an internal audit had raised serious questions over the centre's location and had even recommended an investigation into the deal to construct it on private land. The centre will provide medical aid to the injured within the golden hour.

The *Hindu* is in possession of the audit enquiry note addressed to the Maharashtra State Road Development Corporation (MSRDC), which questioned an agreement of the land, dated November 16, 2012.

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-Shiv Sena government, which has been digging out old cases against the previous government of the Congress and Nationalist Congress Party (NCP), has maintained silence over the note and according to sources, has not even replied to

the audit enquiry. Mr. Shinde, who also handles the MSRDC portfolio, is from the Sena. The minister did not reply to phone calls.

Jaidatta Kshirsagar, former NCP leader and MSRDC minister in 2012, has now joined the Sena and is the minister for Employment Guarantee and Horticulture.

"The trauma care centre was constructed without any involvement of experts in the field and therefore, it is

not matching with the requirements of a level-IV trauma care centre," the audit note said.

The MSRDC had entered into an agreement in 2012 with Woodstock Helicopter Pvt. Ltd. for leasing the land at Ozarde village, Maval taluk, Pune, for providing the trauma care centre along the expressway.

"The actual beneficiary of the deal is Woodstock, in which they ensured right of

way to and permission for commercial exploitation of their huge land parcel acquired/to be acquired with restriction of access to all other land owners in the vicinity, which would not have been possible but for this agreement," the note said. It pointed out that the MSRDC has a sufficient land bank along the expressway, which could have been developed for a trauma centre of the required level.

"The company (MSRDC) may initiate probe into the deal and find out the reasons for entering into such an agreement without due diligence/vetting, and responsibility may be fixed for negligence, if any," it said, while seeking a reply from the MSRDC.

Chandrakant Pulkundwar, joint managing director of the MSRDC, told *The Hindu*, "The MSRDC after following due procedure has finally put the trauma care unit to best possible use for saving lives of accident victims on the expressway."

NCP's attitude ahead of polls like sour grapes, says Fadnavis

Taking potshots at the Sharad Pawar-led Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) ahead of the Assembly elections, Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Sunday said the NCP's attitude has become like "sour grapes".

"As long as [former Satara NCP MP] Udayanraje Bhosale was with them, they put him forward and sought votes in his name... They were even eager that he lead the NCP's Shiv Swaraj Yatra. But now that he has joined us, the NCP is rallying against him," he said.

The CM was speaking to reporters during the third phase of the Mahajanadesh Yatra. Mr. Fadnavis later ad-

dressed rallies in Wai and Satara city. Stating that the BJP and the Sena had only taken those opposition leaders to win maximum number of Assembly seats, Mr. Fadnavis predicted an "unprecedented victory" for the saffron alliance.

Mr. Bhosale, a direct descendant of Maratha warrior king Shivaji, had joined the BJP in the presence of Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Saturday, dealing a blow to the NCP in Satara district, considered as one of the party's strongholds in western Maharashtra. The BJP has successfully poached both warring royals - Mr. Bhosale and sitting Satara MLA Shivendraraje Bhosale - from the NCP.

Meanwhile, Mr. Fadnavis denied accusations of an alleged lathi charge on NCP supporters during the BJP's Yatra in Bhigwan (which

forms part of the Baramati Lok Sabha constituency) on Saturday.

Mr. Fadnavis's address was briefly interrupted by NCP

demonstrators when the CM criticised the Pawar clan.

"There were barely seven NCP demonstrators who were trying to disturb my address... they dispersed as soon as the police arrived. Is there an Article 370 in place in Baramati, which mandates that no other party other than Mr. Pawar's can hold rallies and public meetings there?" Mr. Fadnavis asked.

He further said the seat-sharing arrangement between the BJP and the Shiv Sena will be announced soon, and denied any knowledge of the Sena surveying all 288 Assembly seats with a view to contest independently in the event an alliance is forged. "I have no such information. We will

decide soon on the seat-sharing arrangement of our 'Mahayuti'."

The CM claimed in the last five years, the State had attracted the maximum industrial investment and maximum foreign direct investment (FDI), and said 25% of the total employment generated in the country was generated in Maharashtra.

"The MoU realisation rate in the State is 45% as opposed to the country's figure of 35%. Ask the NCP which projects it had completed. Had it done so, it wouldn't be in the political wilderness today," Mr. Fadnavis said, stating that several of the projects launched by the BJP will come to fruition between 2020 and 2023.

Sharad Pawar terms turncoats cowards

Direct message

Mr. Pawar's attack is seen as a direct message to Mr. Bhosale who happens to be the descendant of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj. He went to Delhi on Saturday to meet BJP president Amit Shah

Taunting his former colleagues who have been claiming that they switched the party for the sake of development of their respective regions and therefore wanted to be with the ruling side, Mr. Pawar said in his 52 years of legislative career, he has been in Opposition for 27 years. "But I never faced a single problem while working. Rather I could work more when in Opposition."

Agriculture

He said this is not the time to sit close to rulers who brought the worse condition for agriculture. "This is the time to fight those who failed to create jobs."

The existing Assembly has witnessed 22 MLAs switching their political parties from which they had won the elections in 2014. Of them, 17 are sitting MLAs from the Opposition, who joined either the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) or Shiv Sena. The defection started with former Leader of Opposition Radhakrishna Vikhe-Patil joining the BJP before the 2019 Lok Sabha polls.

Only two legislators – one each from the BJP and Sena – have shifted to the Opposition. Katol's former BJP MLA Ashish Deshmukh and Surendra Dhanorkar, former Sena MLA from Varora in Chandrapur, joined the Congress before the general elections. Mr. Dhanorkar is now the lone Congress MP from Maharashtra.

BJP's Anil Gote from Dhule has rebelled against the party while Sena's Harshvardhan Jadhav from Aurangabad's Kannad Assembly seat contested the Lok Sabha elections against his party candidate. Sena's Pratap Chikhlikar is now BJP's MP from Nanded.

Among the opposition MLAs who switched the sides, the NCP has suffered the most with eight of its MLAs deserting the party. Among them, five joined the Sena and rest the BJP. Seven Congress MLAs have quit the party, of whom three joined

the Sena and BJP respectively. The lone Congress MLA, Nitesh Rane, is part of the Maharashtra Swabhiman Party, founded by his father Narayan Rane, which is now part of the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance.

Vilas Tare of the Bahujan Vikas Aghadi and Sharad Sonawane of the Maharashtra Navnirman Sena have joined the Sena.

"Those who are afraid, those who cannot live without power, and those who have something to hide are joining the ruling alliance. We wish them well. But after the 2019 Assembly polls, they will find themselves either defeated or in the Opposition once again. The people will give them a fitting reply," NCP spokesperson Nawab Malik said.

Social activist Anjali Damania said in olden days, people used to take sides depending on the ideology with which they agree.

"Now the only ideology that runs our country is power. The induction of people like Kripashanker Singh, Ganesh Naik and Narayan Rane, who have very serious charges of corruption against them, along with a long list of Congress and NCP leaders, clearly shows that the BJP is not at all interested in fighting corruption. Its only agenda is to destroy the Opposition, and this is very dangerous for democracy," she said.

The Jana Sena Party (JSP) has demanded that the government declare health emergency in Andhra Pradesh and include treatment of dengue and malaria under Aarogyasri scheme. The government failed to take preventive measures to tackle seasonal fevers, JSP Political Affairs Committee member Kona Tata Rao alleged here on Sunday. He said 120 persons had lost their lives in the State in the last couple of months due to the fevers.

Kerala CM joins chorus of protest against Home Minister's push for Hindi

Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan on Sunday joined several Opposition leaders who condemned Union Home Minister Amit Shah's statement that Hindi was best placed to be "India's common and unifying language."

The State's newly appointed Governor, Arif Mohammad Khan, however, tweeted to support Mr. Shah, saying "unity through Hindi as a national language alongside the mother tongue."

Mr. Khan later clarified that all languages spoken in India were national languages. The Constitution did not call Hindi a national language but placed a responsibility on the country to develop it as an official language.

In a scathing Facebook post, Mr. Vijayan said Mr. Shah had wilfully exacerbated language divisions to divert public attention from critical issues that plague the nation.

He said he saw a conspiracy by the Sangh Parivar to open a new battlefield in the name of the language to produce more schisms within society. The Union Minister's

statement that Hindi could unite the nation was "pure idiocy", Mr. Vijayan said.

The Chief Minister pointed out that south Indian and northeastern States had their ancient languages while Mr. Shah wanted to make Hindi their mother tongue.

Attack on people'
Mr. Vijayan characterised Mr. Shah's words as an attack on people who viewed their native language on the same pedestal as their mother.

Stating that Hindi was a language spoken by a large section of people, he said it was wrong to impose it arbitrarily on people who spoke other tongues. Moreover, the Constitution envisaged a republic that respected and upheld linguistic diversity, he said.

The Chief Minister said the Sangh Parivar had attempted to resurrect language conflicts, which had long ceased to exist to provide cover for the fumbling Central government.

His words seemed to echo the sentiments of West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam president M. K. Stalin and Pattali Makkal Katchi leader S. Ramdoss, a BJP ally, among other leaders.

In Kerala, Mr. Vijayan also found common cause with Kerala Pradesh Congress Committee president M. P. Ramachandran and Leader of the Opposition Ramesh Chennithala on the issue. Both the Congress leaders had slammed Mr. Shah for "attempting" to stoke linguistic fervour.

Embrace diversity: Siddaramaiah

One language not possible, says Jairam Ramesh

A day after Union Home Minister Amit Shah said that Hindi was the only language that can unify the country, former Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah on Sunday termed him a "wicked insider in a joint family who finds ways to break the unity".

Mr. Siddaramaiah tweeted: "This home wrecker needs to be taught a lesson!! India has rich history and diverse geography. Each explains its own vibrant cul-

ture and practice. We have to embrace the diversity to remain united."

Boat tragedy exposes serious safety lapses

'Many private parties ply without licence, fitness certificate'

Despite frequent boat accidents in the Godavari and Krishna rivers claiming several lives, no precautionary measures are being taken to prevent them.

Twenty-one persons drowned in the Krishna on November 12, 2017, when a boat carrying tourists to Pavitra Sangamam, near Ibrahimpatnam, on the outskirts of Vijayawada, capsized. Sixteen persons were rescued.

Nineteen persons drowned when a boat overturned in the Godavari near Manturu village in East Godavari district in May, 2018. Seventeen persons survived.

According to officials, many private boat operators don't follow the rules prescribed by the Indian Registration of Shipping and the Inland Vessels Act, 1917.

Sources say that more than 40 boats operate in the Krishna and about 75 in the Godavari. However, only a few possess fitness certificates as per the Public Carriers and Ferry Act, 1890.

sonnel said owners should follow all fire safety norms and ensure that the boats contain fire extinguishers, caution boards, sand buckets and other fire-fighting equipment. "Inflammable material should not be carried on the boats and smoking should not be allowed. Boat drivers should not allow overcrowding on the vessels," a fire official said.

To prevent tragedies, officials should conduct raids regularly at the tourist spots, said B. Soujanya, a tourist.

Boat owner booked

The police have registered a case of criminal negligence against Venkata Ramana, the owner of the boat that capsized on Sunday, and a few others for operating the boat though the Godavari was in spate.

Meanwhile, Telangana Chief Minister K. Chandrasekhar Rao has announced ex gratia of ₹ 5 lakh each to the victims hailing from Telangana.

Flats no longer our responsibility: builder

With the deadline set by the Supreme Court for the demolition of the four Maradu apartment complexes nearing, the Kerala government has called an all-party meeting here on Tuesday at 3.30 p.m. to discuss the issue.

The Supreme Court on September 6 gave the authorities time till September 20 to demolish the illegal apartment blocks at Maradu in Ernakulam district for violating Coastal Regulations Zone (CRZ) norms.

The Chief Minister's office said the residents, who are staging demonstrations against the order, had refused to leave even as the deadline for vacating the

flats ended on Sunday.

Meanwhile, CPI State secretary Kanam Rajendran said he did not think that any political party would oppose the Supreme Court verdict. The law was broken by the builders, he said. The CPI cannot support people who violated the law. The all-party meeting was being

convened considering the humanitarian aspects on the issue, he said.

A Supreme Court bench comprising Justices Arun Mishra and M.R. Shah had also directed Chief Secretary Tom Jose to be present in the courtroom on September 23, when the case is to be heard next.

KCR opposes uranium mining plan

Telangana CM seeks support of all parties in opposing project at Nallamala forest

The Telangana government has categorically said it is not in favour of granting permission for uranium mining in the Nallamala forest of Amrabad in Nagarkurnool district.

Denying permission, Chief Minister K. jected permission for uranium mining in the Nallamala forest in 2016. He charged that some political parties were manufacturing a movement when there was no permission for mining at all and the media too were falling into their trap.

Mr. Rama Rao claimed that it was the Congress government which had permitted for uranium mining in 2009 itself and the Central Government's Atomic Minerals Division and Department of Atomic Energy were exploring the possibility.

He said the Central government agencies did not need permissions for their work and even if they were successful, the State government would not grant permission for mining.

Vulture culture: How the bird was saved from extinction

The number declined from 40 million in the 80s to a few thousand by 2009

In the late 1990s, when the population of the vultures in the country had begun to decline sharply, one White-backed vulture was rescued from Keoladeo National Park in Rajasthan, where vultures were dying at an alarming rate.

To study the cause of deaths of vultures, a Vulture Care Centre (VCC) was set up at Pinjore, Haryana. It was here that the rescued vulture from Rajasthan was brought.

Later, a few more vultures from Haryana, Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh were

brought in.

Starting with just a few vultures, the VCC, until then the sole facility for conservation of vultures in the country, has come a long way in the past two decades. At present there are nine Vulture Conservation and Breeding Centres (VCBC) in India, of which three are directly administered by Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS).

Thriving population

"The total number of vultures in these VCBCs is more than 700," said Sachin Ranade, assistant director, BNHS. Mr. Ranade said that

the three species of vultures bred in the VCBC are the White-backed, Long-billed and the Slender-billed vulture.

"By the time we started these vulture conservation

breeding centers in 2004, the vulture population had already crashed significantly, almost by 99 %. As vultures are slow-breeding birds, intervention was of immediate requirement otherwise

the vultures would have become extinct," said Vibhu Prakash, deputy director at BNHS.

The major reason behind the vulture population getting nearly wiped out was the drug Diclofenac, found in the carcass of cattle the vultures fed on. The drug, whose veterinary use was banned in 2008, was commonly administered to cattle to treat inflammation.

Dr. Prakash said that the objective of the VCBCs was not only to look after the vultures and breed them in captivity, but also to release them into the wild. The first objective of the VCBC was to produce a few hundred pairs of each of the three species of the endangered vultures.

Referring to the release of two Himalayan Griffon into the wild from the Pinjore VCBC in 2016, the scientists said that the objective of the test release was to see what happens when a species is kept in captivity for a long time and then set free.

Self-reliant in 40 days

He further added that for almost a month after their release, the vultures stayed around the centre, and within a month were flying well. "They joined other vultures and by 40 days they had started locating their own food and water, and soon they flew away. Unfortunately in those days we only had wing tags, so we lost track of the vultures," he said.

Enthused by the success

of the release of the pair, scientists at BNHS are now planning more releases. Mr. Ranade said they are planning a release of more Himalayan Griffons at the Rajabhatkawa Centre in Bengal later this year. Two of the birds will have satellite PTT (platform transmitting terminals) attached to them, and the rest will have wing tags and rings. The White-backed vultures from Pinjore are scheduled to be released next year.

"If after releasing the birds we don't find any drug-related mortality in the next one year, then we will release 20 more White-backed vultures to Madhya Pradesh," the scientist said.

Survey of India to deploy 300 drones for mapping country

High-resolution maps will facilitate digitisation of land titles in villages

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
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Waiting for reforms

The stimulus incentives hold promise, but structural reforms are nowhere on the horizon

People who have been yearning for major economic reforms from the Narendra Modi government, it seems, will have to wait to have their dreams come true. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Saturday presented the third round of stimulus measures to resuscitate the struggling economy, but once again these have largely failed to live up to the initial hype around them. The previous two rounds of the stimulus plan, presented at press conferences held by the Minister over the last few weeks, focused primarily on reviving the automobile sector, boosting the confidence of foreign investors who were spooked by the Budget announcements in July, and improving the health of dangerously fragile state-owned banks by doing everything short of privatising them. This time around the focus has been on helping out the underperforming export and real estate sectors through piecemeal fiscal reforms. Among other things, Ms. Sitharaman announced a new tax refund scheme and greater priority sector lending for the export sector to incentivise exports. It is expected that the new tax breaks to the exports sector will cause a dent of up to ₹50,000 crore to the government's revenue. Further, external commercial borrowing norms have been eased to make it easier for Indian real estate companies to tap funds from abroad, and funds worth ₹10,000 crore have also been allocated to aid the completion of affordable housing projects. With lack of demand and major supply-side bottlenecks being the primary issues facing exports and real estate, it is doubtful whether the present measures will be enough to revive these flailing sectors.

Overall, cutting across all three stimulus rounds announced till date, the government has been relying almost entirely on providing fiscal relief, in the form of tax cuts coupled with a tiny amount of government spending, to wade through what seems like a structural crisis in the economy. The hope seems to be that these measures combined with a looser monetary policy stance adopted by the RBI will boost spending and revive growth. This is, however, a far cry from what many expected from a government that promised radical structural reforms when it rose to power in 2014. Without enacting any major supply-side reforms like land and labour reforms that can raise potential growth, it is also hard to see how greater spending can raise growth for very long. The government may believe that the present slowdown, marked by five consecutive quarters of dropping growth, is merely a cyclical one. But given the size of its victory in two consecutive elections, the government should aim higher by trying to push through long-pending structural reforms that can raise India's growth trajectory to the next level.

Effort worth emulation

Rajasthan's Jan Soochna portal is a step in the right direction for transparency in governance

Fourteen years since the implementation of the groundbreaking Right to Information (RTI) Act, which has helped shed light on government works and administration, the launch of the "Jan Soochna Portal" (public information portal) by the Rajasthan government on Friday marks a milestone in increasing transparency and accountability in governance. The portal details various schemes run by 13 government departments – the employment guarantee programme, sanitation, the public distribution system among others, by not only explaining the schemes but also providing real time information on beneficiaries, authorities in charge, progress, etc. The information provided is in-depth, covering the whole gamut from the districts, blocks and panchayats, allowing access to details of schemes implemented at these levels. This is a laudable effort by the State government which is worthy of emulation by other States. The RTI Act had dealt with the citizen's right to know about public information and required public authorities to expeditiously provide information on request from the citizenry. This aspect of the Act brought a sea change in accountability and has led to the possibility of a well-informed citizenry on the workings of the government.

While RTI filings have increased exponentially and RTI-activism has become part and parcel of civil society, there have been dilutions in the Act pertaining to the appointments of information commissioners, therefore impinging on their autonomy. Besides, the response rate to RTI requests has also slowed down compared to the flurry in the immediate aftermath of the Act's implementation. These problems with the RTI law apart, it is important to note that Section 4(2) of the Act, which specifically enjoins upon public authorities to publish information proactively, has not been implemented holistically so far. While government departments have successfully taken to e-governance and there has been a rapid release of public information on various government-run websites, this information has often been parceled, dispersed and difficult to parse. Some of the better maintained central websites have also tended to deploy "dashboard" information, which is meant more to showcase data and records rather than release structured information for extensive study and for the knowledge of the citizenry. As a one-shot portal for public information on government programmes, the JSP, therefore, can advance the objective of transparency. The challenge would be to ensure that the information flow remains unhampered over time. Besides this, it is important to educate the citizenry about the use of data on the portal. While digital connectivity and literacy have increased over time, these have not adequately translated into digital knowledge of public affairs.

Why India's growth figures are off the mark

The over-reliance on the organised sector for official GDP data is causing a gross miscalculation

During the global financial crisis, it was said that the experts were behind the curve. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) and financial sector experts continued to predict till October 2008 that the global economy would grow rather than shrink. They were way off the mark since the global economy was rapidly slipping into a great recession.

Explaining the markdown
Is India facing a similar situation at present? The economic growth rate (quarterly) has been sliding for the last five quarters from 8% to 7% to 6.6% to 5.8% and now to 5%. Yet, experts have been talking of a 7% annual rate of growth; every quarter when the rate of growth has been announced, they have argued that things have bottomed out and that the rate would rise henceforth.


The Economic Survey in July talked of a growth rate of 7% for the current year. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI), in its August policy statement, talked of a slowdown to 6.9%, from the 7% predicted in June and 7.2% predicted before that. The Asian Development Bank cut its growth forecast from 7.2% to 7% in April 2019. Similar is the case with the IMF which cut its forecast for the year from 7.3% to 7%. So, they all talked of a 7% rate of growth when a year earlier it had fallen below that.

How could these agencies be so far off with their estimates? The reason is that they are not independent data gathering agencies and depend on official data. So, if official data is erroneous, their projections would also turn out to be incorrect. Clearly, the government is interested in projecting a good image and so discounts bad news and ramps up data.

The question to ask is, if the economy is growing at 5 or 6%, which is historically a good rate of growth, why is investment rate not rising and consumption in the economy stagnant? Where is growth dissipating? The alternative explanation is that the rate of growth is much less than 5%; that is why investment rate and consumption are stagnating or declining.

The investment rate has hovered at around 30% for the last several years because the capacity utilisation in the economy has been around 75%. Unless this rises, fresh investment will mean even lower capacity utilisation and lower profitability since capital will be underutilised. In June, the stock market was at a record high and yet the investment rate did not rise. Data from the Monitoring Indian Economy Pvt. Ltd. shows that investment proposals are at a 14-year low. In the last year, the RBI has cut interest rates four times and by a total of more than 1%; but the investment rate has not budged.

Impact of announcements
The government has been in denial but now experts in the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister, in NITI Aayog and the RBI have admitted that there is a slowdown. The Ministry of Finance has now gone into hyper



drive to make major announcements so soon after the full Budget was presented in July. This is an admission of there being a slowdown in the economy.

Unfortunately, none of these announcements will lead to a recovery since they do not address the source of the problem. An hour before the latest data on economy showing slowdown was to be announced, the government announced the big bank merger. Was this to divert attention from the data to be released? Be that as it may, bank mergers will have little impact on the immediate problem of the slowing economy. It may only further disturb a major chunk of the banking system in the coming year – and that would not be good for a slowing economy. The package for the automobile sector or making banks pass on interest rate cuts to businesses, announced a little earlier will also have little impact since the problem did not originate there.

The announcement of a transfer of ₹1.76 lakh crore from the RBI to the government will only cover the shortfall expected in revenue (which is a result of an unduly high projection of revenue growth). It will allow the government to maintain the fiscal deficit target at 3.3%. But, this will not provide the need-

ed stimulus. For that the fiscal deficit would have to be allowed to rise or there has to be an increase in expenditures on the basis of mobilisation of additional revenues. The fiscal deficit today is at about 9% if the States and the public sector units are taken into account. And how much can the government raise is a political decision that has not yet been taken.

The source

So, where does the problem originate from? It is from the unorganised sector which has been in decline since demonetisation. It was further hit by the Goods and Services Tax though it is either exempt from it or there is a simplified provision for this sector. This sector producing 45% of the output and employing 94% of the workforce, has been in decline, which is pulling down the rate of growth of the economy. But, why does it not show up in the growth data?

In simple terms, the reason is that the data for this sector is collected once in five years (called reference years) since the sector has tens of millions of units for which data cannot be collected monthly, quarterly or even annually. In between the reference years, the data is only projected on various assumptions.

The government document on estimating advance annual estimates and quarterly estimates makes this clear. For estimating quarterly growth it uses, "latest estimates of Agricultural Production, Index of Industrial Production (IIP) and performance of key sectors like, Railways, Transport other than Railways, Communication, Banking, Insurance and Go-

vernment Revenue Expenditure". Except for agriculture, these belong to the organised sector of the economy.

Even for the annual estimates, basically data for the organised sector are used – like in the case of mining, banking, hotels and restaurants, and transport. For construction, steel, glass, etc are used which are also derived from the organised sector production. Thus, the implicit assumption is that the organised sector can be a proxy for the unorganised sector. But with the economy suffering three shocks in quick succession over the last three years which adversely impacted the unorganised sector, this assumption does not hold true. Most of the experts have implicitly accepted the government's fallacious argument and have thus fallen behind the curve.

In brief, the official data only represents the organised sector. To incorporate the unorganised sector, data from alternative sources need to be used. The decline in the workforce, the rise in the demand for work under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, etc. suggests that the unorganised sector has declined by at least 10%. If this is taken into account, the current rate of growth is much less than 5%. If the government does not accept this, then it must reveal the rate of growth of the unorganised sector that it is using in its estimates and which is not based on using the organised sector as a proxy.

A dilution that falls short of the law

Several loopholes in the process of the substitution of Article 370 make the action problematic

The manner in which Article 370 was substituted by the Centre to carve up Jammu and Kashmir is fraught with several loopholes and challenges. Technically, Article 370 has not been abrogated. Rather, vide Constitution Order No. 273 dated August 6, 2019, "Declaration under Article 370(3) of the Constitution", the existing Article 370 has been substituted by a new paragraph whereby all provisions of the Constitution of India, as amended from time to time, without any modifications and exceptions, have been made applicable to Jammu and Kashmir. This action of the President which amounts to the virtual abrogation of Article 370 in its essence is a matter of legal and political debate.

Process adopted

As the first step toward achieving its goal, the Centre issued a fresh Constitution (Application to Jammu and Kashmir), Order 2019 one day earlier on August 5, 2019. This superseded the Presidential Order of 1954 purportedly with the "concurrence of the Government of

State of Jammu and Kashmir", thus paving the way for the virtual abrogation of Article 370 the following day. The important aspect of this move was to substitute the expression "Constituent Assembly of the State" with the expression "Legislative Assembly of the State" in proviso to Article 370(3). Under the existing Article 370(3), it had been provided that the President could abrogate or amend Article 370 on the recommendation of the Constituent Assembly of the State which had ceased to exist in 1957.

The Centre made this amendment in proviso to Article 370(3) as a part of a well-conceived strategy. The strategy was that after such substitution, the powers of the Legislative Assembly would be used by Parliament during President's Rule. Parliament would then recommend abrogation of Article 370 to the President, which it has done leading to the issuance of C.O. No. 273 dated August 6, 2019, virtually abrogating Article 370.

Now if it is shown that the amendment made in proviso to Article 370(3) is illegal, the consequent action of the President in issuing of C.O. No. 273 would also become illegal.

The order dated August 5, 2019 had been issued by the President purportedly with the "concurrence of the Government of State of Jammu and Kashmir" as required under Article 370(1). The Government of State had been



defined in Article 370(1) itself, read with C.O. No. 44 dated November 15, 1952 as a person recognised by the President "on the recommendation of the Legislative Assembly of the State" as Sadar-i-Riyasat of Jammu and Kashmir acting on the advice of the Council of Ministers. The expression 'Sadar-i-Riyasat' was substituted by 'Governor' in 1965.

If this was the definition of the "Government of State" in Article 370(1), the order dated August 5, 2019 cannot be said to have been issued with the concurrence of the Government of the State. The simple reason is that the Governor who is said to have given the concurrence as Government of the State was not a person recognised by the President "on the recommendation of the Legislative Assembly of the State" as Governor of Jammu and Kashmir as required under law. Therefore, the order

dated August 5, 2019 has not been validly issued.

Otherwise too, the August 5, 2019 order is illegal as it has the effect of amending Article 370 as well which could not have been done. The reason is that while exercising powers under Clause (1) of Article 370, the President is not competent to amend Article 370 itself; and his powers are confined only to amending the "other provisions of the Constitution" in their application to Jammu and Kashmir, meaning thereby provisions other than Articles I and 370. This is clear from the conjoint reading of sub-clauses (c) and (d) of Article 370(1). Consequently, the amendment introduced in proviso to Article 370(3) vide the order dated August 5, 2019 whereby the expression "Constituent Assembly of the State" has been substituted by the expression "Legislative Assembly of the State", is bad in law on this basis also.

Since the amendment made in proviso to Article 370(3) is illegal, the consequent action of the President in issuing the C.O. No. 273 virtually abrogating Article 370, based upon a recommendation made by Parliament which in turn became possible due to the said illegal amendment, is also rendered illegal.

Adverse effect

Apart from the issue of the legality or otherwise of the order virtually

abrogating Article 370 in its essence, another question which arises is whether it was at all required to be done, weighing its likely adverse effects. The true nature of Article 370 as it existed is best exemplified by the then Home Minister Gulzari Lal Nanda's statement in Parliament on December 4, 1964 just a few months after Nehru's death. Nanda had said, "May I submit that Article 370 is neither a wall nor a mountain, but that it is a tunnel. It is through this tunnel that a good deal of traffic has already passed and more will. There is no wall between Jammu and Kashmir and India. At the most, you can say it is some kind of movable partition. We can move it on our own. There is nothing coming in the way."

And the noted journalist B.G. Verghese had once asked, "If Article 370 vests the people of Kashmir with a certain sense of identity and autonomy within the ambit of federal relations, how is India diminished or endangered in any way?" The virtual abrogation of Article 370 will leave indelible scars on the psyche of the vast population inhabiting the strategically located territory of India; otherwise there had been practically nothing 'special' about Kashmir's 'special status' for all the years that have passed by.

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Mission successful, end product defunct

Completed in record time and launched with fanfare, the Train 18 project now finds itself off track

Perhaps the most abiding image of the recent saga of the Chandrayaan-2 mission, which came tantalisingly close to getting the Vikram space-craft to make a soft landing on the lunar surface, was that of the Prime Minister embracing and consoling the chairman of the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO). That single act said eloquently what words could not have expressed adequately: that though the mission could not achieve one of its prime objectives, it had notched up a series of outstanding successes along the way for which the entire nation is proud.

As the grand finale unfolded on television screens all over the country, despite the let-down at the end, a strong wave of support and sympathy was visible for the band of dedicated scientists and engineers of the space agency, who had given their all for the success of the mission. Watching the sequence of events, as a former railway professional, I could not help but reflect on the sharp contrast of the Chandrayaan-2 with another initiative, this one by the Indian Railways, which succeeded in achieving its objectives on schedule and yet, within a few months, unravelled in an unexpectedly different manner.

A technological marvel

A little less than a year ago, in October 2018, the country was celebrating a technological achievement of a purely terrestrial nature: the successful rolling out of a gleaming state-of-the-art, semi-high-speed (of 160 kmph-200 kmph speed) train set called 'Train 18' in an incredibly short time span of 18 months. If Chandrayaan-2 brought India close to joining the select band of three countries in the world to have successfully achieved a soft landing on the moon, Train 18 propelled India into the exclusive club of about a half a dozen countries in the world that have the capability to turn out a brand new design of a high-speed/semi-high-speed train set in such a short time.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi flew down to witness the landing of the lunar vehicle at the satellite tracking centre in Bengaluru. A few months earlier, in February, he had flagged off the inaugural run of the Train 18 as 'Vande Bharat Express' in Varanasi. The train has provided a trouble-free performance in the last six months. Unfortunately, perhaps it was the outstanding success of the Train 18 project that proved to be its undoing.

The unravelling had commenced even before Train 18's inaugural run as Vande Bharat Express. Following top-level changes in the Railway Board at the turn of the New Year, a vigilance investigation was launched into certain alleged procedural irregularities and allegations of undue favours shown to a particular indigenous firm in awarding contracts for the crucial propulsion system.

It was also reported that deviations had been observed from the specifications prescribed by the Research Design and Standards Organisation (RDSO). Meanwhile, the man who had spearheaded the Train 18 project – from its conception and design to its launch – as General Manager of Integral Coach Factory (ICF) and who retired at the end of last year, was not even extended an invitation for the train's ceremonial in-

augural run in February 2019. (In contrast, some former ISRO chiefs were invited to witness Vikram's descent.)

As though to add a touch of dark humour, a few months after the train's inauguration, post the general election, it was announced at the highest policymaking level of the Indian Railways that "The Railways would be willing to start import of complete train sets from foreign suppliers if they agreed to establish the coach manufacturing facility in India". (This is equivalent to ISRO going in for import of its rockets and space vehicles from the U.S. or Russia!)

With the train set's production having come to a halt in ICF, Chennai, despite tenders having been floated, Project 18 is as good as dead now.

What explains this vast divergence in the way the two missions, Chandrayaan-2 and Train 18, panned out? The two organisations, ISRO and the Indian Railways, are as different as chalk and cheese. Though both the public sector organisations have notched up a series of successes that truly reflected the spirit of 'Make in India' long before the phrase became fashionable, their objectives and organisational structure are entirely different. While ISRO functions mostly in 'mission mode' to achieve spec-

ific goals of a mission, the Indian Railways operates normally in 'maintenance mode', to keep the wheels of the railway network moving as efficiently as possible with the least disruption. This aim is achieved through more than a dozen functional departments that normally work in close coordination. Only certain specific projects or initiatives are undertaken in 'mission mode'. The Train 18 project was one such undertaking that required the planners to cut red tape and reduce needless procedural hassles. It is likely that in the process, certain 'sacrosanct' boundaries of departmental silos were breached for no other reason than to speed up decision-making.

Impact of internal turf wars

It is not the intention here to pass judgments on the rights and wrongs of actions and decisions that enabled the launch of Train 18 in record time, or of the subsequent decisions that effectively derailed the mission. What, however, is of public interest is the enormous damage that the scourge of interdepartmental rivalries and internecine turf wars within the Indian Railways has done to the organisational morale and synergistic functioning of the nation's prime public transporter. Unfortunately, Train 18 appears to have become the latest victim of this age-old malady of the Indian Railways.


A committee of experts under economist and NITI Aayog member Bibek Debroy, tasked among other things to suggest ways of breaking down departmental silos within the Indian Railways to improve efficiency and speed of decision-making, gave its recommendations in early 2015. The 'Mission Train 18' episode is proof, if any evidence is at all required, that nothing has changed since then and that the departmental silos are alive and well. It is futile to expect the techno-bureaucracy of the Indian Railways to reform itself. The ball is in the court of the political leadership to push for reforms in this area. Otherwise, the Indian Railways will continue to notch up more successes like Train 18 that fade into oblivion, unlike ISRO where, it seems, public opinion reckons even a failure as a victory.

Heeding the voice of conscience

At difficult times, journalism must retain its ability to scrutinise the state rather than becoming a cheerleader

Some readers felt that that my column on the communication blackout in Jammu and Kashmir, ("A disturbing downward spiral", September 9, 2019), did not display the restraint that is necessary in these unusual times. I agree with them that we live in unusual times. How else can one explain the current situation where courts get to decide who should meet whom and whether the deliberations of such meetings can be shared with the larger world? On September 13, the Jammu and Kashmir High Court allowed two MPs of the Lok Sabha belonging to the National Conference (NC) party to meet Farooq Abdullah and Omar Abdullah, the president and vice president of the NC, respectively.

The court ruled that the meeting of the petitioners with their party leaders should be restricted to a "courtesy call to know about their wellbeing" and should not be followed by interactions with the press.

I agree with legal scholar Gautam Bhatia's contention that the Supreme Court has become "the absentee constitutional court" (September 12, 2019). Instead of deciding one way or the other on crucial constitutional issues following the Union government's decision to downgrade Jammu and Kashmir's 'special status' under Article 370 of the Constitution, and strip it of statehood, the highest court in the country "has dodged, ducked, evaded and adjourned", and the judiciary "has simply vacated the field, absented itself, and chosen to walk away", wrote Mr. Bhatia.

Guided by values

In this scenario, I am not surprised that some readers mistake the news judgment of this newspaper that is guided by a set of values to be directed, instead, by prejudice. A sensitive news ombudsman recognises the perimeter of his role and realises that any overreach would not only kill journalism, but also eventually undermine democracy itself. At difficult times, journalism must retain its ability to scrutinise the state rather than becoming a cheerleader.

As a news ombudsman, I evaluate com-

plaints relating to journalism using three critical markers: fairness, balance, and accuracy. In a newspaper like *The Hindu*, news and views are clearly labelled. Citizens' views reveal legitimate aspirations. They cannot be subsumed by the stranglehold of the ruling establishments over public narratives. In his judgment in *Manoj Narula v. Union of India* (2014), Justice Kurian Joseph observed: "When things go wrong constitutionally, unless the conscience speaks, it is not good conscience; it will be accused of as numb conscience."

Bias is a nebulous term

When a news ombudsman makes it clear that he cannot be a party to numb conscience, a few tend to interpret his reading as bias. Bias is a nebulous term. Nathan Robinson, editor of the magazine *Current Affairs*, dealt with this vexatious issue in his column in *The Guardian* recently. He wrote: "It should be obvious that there can't be such a thing as a neutral journalist. We all have moral instincts and points of view. Those points of view will colour our interpretations of the facts. The best course of action is to acknowledge where we're coming from. If we show an awareness of our own political leanings, it actually makes us more trustworthy than if we're in denial about them."

If some reduce the moral compass of journalism to bias, journalists need to take a cue from the American Press Institute (API) in dealing with this exasperating issue. The API effectively argued that "draining a story of all bias can drain it of its humanity, its lifeblood. In the biases of the community one can also find conflicting passions that bring stories to life." It then asks, "What if journalists acknowledged that bias does exist, that it is built into the choices they make when deciding what to leave in and what to leave out? That bias is embedded in the culture and language of the society on which the journalist reports? And that 'news judgment' does reflect the journalist's background as well as the news organization's mission and business model?"

Is it possible to be free of opinion regarding the situation in Jammu and Kashmir? Isn't it a false balance if we equate the official narrative with the reality, as if they are two equal sides to the issue? Journalism cannot become a collateral cost to being oblivious to people's experiences.

The litmus test for free speech

The court should uphold constitutional rights by reaffirming the Brandenburg test

Freedom of speech and individual liberty are enshrined in Articles 19(1) (a) and 21 of the Constitution. However, these rights, like all others, are not absolute but subject to reasonable restrictions. What would be a reasonable restriction is an extremely important matter to consider, as on that would depend the validity of several detention orders and prosecutions in India.

Reasonable restrictions

In America, the earlier decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court had laid down the 'bad tendency' test to determine whether the restriction was reasonable or not. This test was that free speech or acts could be prohibited if they were likely to adversely affect the welfare of the public. However, Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, a celebrated judge of the U.S. Supreme Court, felt that the 'bad tendency' test was vague. In *Schenck v. United States* (1919), he laid down the 'clear and present danger' test to determine the reasonability of the restriction. This test means that a restriction would be reasonable only if the speech or action constitutes a clear and present (and not remote) danger to state security or public order.

The 'clear and present danger' test was not consistently followed by the U.S. Supreme Court, though. In *Dennis v. United States* (1951), for instance, a 'balancing' test was adopted.

In *Brandenburg v. Ohio* (1969), the 'clear and present danger' test was expanded, and the 'imminent lawless action' test was laid down by the U.S. Supreme Court, which the court has followed since. This test states, "The constitutional guarantees of free speech and free press do not permit the state to forbid or proscribe advocacy of the use of force or of law violation, except where such advocacy is directed to inciting or producing imminent lawless action".

The word 'imminent' used in the judgment is very important. Imminent means 'likely to happen very soon,' 'at hand,' or 'fast approaching.'

Two decisions of the Indian Supreme Court – *Sri Indra Das v. State of Assam* (2011) and *Arup Bhuyan v.*

State of Assam (2011) – followed the decision in *Brandenburg v. Ohio*, and so Brandenburg has become the law in India too.

Incorrect decisions

By applying the Brandenburg test, it becomes evident that the prosecution against the Bhima Koregaon accused; Professor G.N. Saibaba; activists Shehla Rashid; and Pawan Jaiswal, the journalist who published a report that children in a primary school in Mirzapur, Uttar Pradesh, were getting only roti and salt in their mid-day meals; among others deserve to be quashed as these acts or speeches did not create any danger of an imminent lawless act. The recent detention of many persons in Kashmir (except those accused of militant activities) would also be illegal from that standpoint.

Recently, the Bombay High Court rejected the plea of Gautam Navlakha, an accused in the Bhima Koregaon case, for quashing the criminal proceedings against him, observing that there was some material to indicate that the accused was in contact with Naxalites. But being in contact with a militant organisation cannot by itself be a crime, as it does not result in any imminent lawless act. One could be a writer who contacts Naxalites for doing research about them, or a social activist, or even a sympathiser. That would be legal, being within the ambit of the Brandenburg test.

It is submitted with respect that the Bombay High Court's decision is incorrect, and should be set aside by the Supreme Court, which should reaffirm the Brandenburg test. That would pave the way for quashing several detentions and prosecutions (many of them based on manufactured evidence) which are a slur on democracy and liberty.

In these critical days in India, when onslaught on liberty and freedom of speech is commonplace, it is the higher judiciary which must do its duty as guardians of the citizens' constitutional rights. The court must not succumb as it did during the Emergency.


Corporate fault lines



Ex-inmate of Muzaffarpur shelter home gang-raped

Crime committed in moving car: police

A woman, who had been an inmate of the infamous Muzaffarpur shelter home, was allegedly raped by four men in a moving vehicle in Bettiah town of West Champaran district, the police said on Sunday.

The Muzaffarpur shelter home had hit the headlines in 2018 after a social audit report highlighted that over 30 girls were allegedly raped at the government-aided shelter home, run by an NGO.

Bettiah town police station SHO Shashi Bhushan Thakur said that the woman was admitted to a government medical college on Saturday evening and an examination was conducted by a team of doctors on Sunday, he said.

Medical report

It will be confirmed whether she was raped only after getting the medical examina-

tion report, he said.

The woman, in her police complaint lodged with the Bettiah town police station on Saturday, alleged that four men forcibly took her inside their vehicle while she was passing through the area where she lives on Friday evening, and raped her in a moving vehicle, police said. The men then dumped the woman in her locality after raping her.

All the four men had covered their faces with masks but she could remove the masks and identify them.

While all the four persons belonged to the same family, two of them were brothers, she said.

Over 30 girls were allegedly raped at the shelter home run by Brajesh Thakur, the chief of a State-funded NGO. The alleged sexual exploitation of the girls was first highlighted in an audit report submitted by TISS to the State's Social Welfare Department.

Man falls while removing hoarding in Chennai

Incident follows death of woman techie

The police are yet to arrest AIADMK functionary Jayagopal, who put up banners for his son's wedding. One of the banners fell on Subasri. The police said they were yet to ascertain his whereabouts.

Inept handling of economy, says Swamy

BJP MP Subramanian Swamy, who has often criticised the government's economic policies, believes only people with a solid grounding in macroeconomics can pull the economy out of its current tailspin.

Dr. Swamy has come out with a book in which he takes a critical look at various aspects of the Indian economy.

Today, the economy suffers from clueless economic stewardship, cloaked in spin, and media management, while the economy is debilitated by serious multiple structural flaws that make this current slowdown unlike any other we have experienced in India since 1947, he writes in *"Reset: Regaining India's Economic Legacy."*

He also opines that the slowing of inflation is not an achievement in the absence of robust demand signals and weak purchasing power among the masses. It is a form of deflation, he writes.

In the book, he is also critical of the UPA governments (2004-2014), saying it had some of the most senior Ministers committing gigantic corruption.

Comparing Narendra Modi with his predecessor Manmohan Singh, Dr. Swamy says, "He is the exact opposite of Dr. Singh. He is not the person of letters, and one who has an unstudied familiarity with macroeconomics but not macroeconomics."

India asks Pak. to keep peace


More than 2,000 ceasefire breaches reported this year

Intensifying the war of words, India on Sunday asked Pakistan to stick to the 2003 ceasefire agreement and maintain peace at the Line of Control. A government source said the Indian military response had been restrained so far despite more than 2,000 ceasefire violations by Pakistan.

Unprovoked firing

"This year, they have resorted to more than 2,050 unprovoked ceasefire violations in which 21 Indians have died. We have repeatedly called upon Pakistan to ask its forces to adhere to the 2003 ceasefire understanding and maintain peace and tranquillity along the LoC and the International Border," said a source, mentioning that India has not responded to unprovoked

provocations and attempted terrorist infiltration.

The statement came after Pakistan summoned Indian Charge d'Affaires Gaurav Ahluwalia and conveyed Islamabad's condemnation of alleged ceasefire violations by Indian forces on September 14 in the Nukial and Jandrot sectors of the LoC.

Pakistan's charge

Pakistan said that Indian firing claimed the life of one ci-

vilian of Balakot village near the LoC, and urged India to allow the United Nations Military Observer Group in India and Pakistan to look into such incidents.

The exchange between Pakistan and India came in the backdrop of a similar diplomatic spat between Islamabad and Kabul after alleged shooting from militants in Afghanistan killed a Pakistani border guard.

A war may lead to nuclear conflict: Imran

Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan has said there was no question of talking to New Delhi after it revoked the special status of Jammu and Kashmir, as he warned about the possibility of a conventional war with India which could go beyond the subcontinent.

"So that's why we have approached the United Nations, we are approaching every international forum, that they must act right now," he said.

"I am a pacifist," he told Al Jazeera, adding that Pakistan would never start a war. "When two nuclear-armed countries fight, if they fight a conventional war, there is every possibility that it is going to end up into nuclear war. The unthinkable," he said.

CPI(M) says Sitharaman to blame for slowdown

Party urges people to 'rise in protest'

The CPI(M) on Sunday criticised Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, saying decisions taken by her Ministry had resulted in the economic slowdown.

In a statement, the party said that instead of announcing a big increase in public investment to build the much-needed infrastructure, generate employment and thereby boost domestic demand, the Finance Minister once again announced measures that in the first place had caused this economic slowdown bordering on recession.

Low purchasing power

"The emphasis on targeting private investment in the realty sector and the effort to boost exports cannot succeed. Global trade volumes were shrinking and houses were not being purchased because of sheer lack of pur-

chasing power among the people.

The ₹70,000 crore worth of packages announced yesterday [on Saturday] instead should have been put to use in increasing public investment and paying the arrears of the MNREGA [Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme], which would have boosted the purchasing power in rural India," the statement said.

It called upon the people to rise in protest against the policies that "only favour the maximisation of profits at the expense of growing misery for the people.

Gangwar insulted north Indians: Opposition

He said job aspirants lacked quality

Union Labour Minister Santosh Kumar Gangwar has said there is no dearth of employment opportunities in the country, but recruiters visiting north India complain of lack of "quality people" to fill vacancies.

Opposition leaders accused him of insulting the people of the region.

The comments came amid criticism of the Centre over the unemployment rate rising to a 45-year high of 6.1% in 2017/18.

"Recruiters who visit north India complain of facing dearth of quality people for the posts they need to fill," he told presspersons in Bareilly, his Lok Sabha constituency, on Saturday.

Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra said: "Mr. Minister, it has been more than five years for your govern-

ment. There is no job creation. Whatever jobs were there, they have been snatched due to the economic slowdown brought by the government. You want to escape by insulting north Indians."

Bahujan Samaj Party chief Mayawati said in a tweet that such comments were laughable and added that an apology should be tendered to the nation.

Book traces Thackerays' origin to Bihar

It also details differences in the style of rival cousins Raj and Uddhav

A new book on the Thackeray cousins, Raj and Uddhav, reveals that much in contradiction to the anti-north Indian political rhetoric deployed by both the Shiv Sena and the Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS), the patriarch of the family and father of Shiv Sena founder, Balasaheb Thackeray, traced the family's origins to Bihar.

Ironic twist

The book, *The Cousins Thackeray: Uddhav, Raj and the Shadow of Their Siblings* (Penguin Random House), by journalist Dhaval Kulkarni makes this point fairly early on, quoting 'Prabodhankar' Thackeray's own book, *Gramyanachya Sadyanta Itihas Arhat Nokarshahiche Bande* ('A History of Village Disputes or Rebellion of the Bureaucrats').

Organisers of the 'Seren-dipity festival' said the event Mr. Alam had been invited to attend had artists from several other countries including Sri Lanka and Nepal.

"Of all the people we invited, only Mr. Shahidul Alam's visa was denied," said an organiser who did not want to be identified, and said they hoped he could attend another event later this year.

The British High Commission declined to comment, and said the British Council was a "venue partner".

"When he was incarcerated, people around the world, and so many from India, had protested his imprisonment...it is ironic that he was denied the opportunity to come and speak here in person," the organiser said.

Mr. Alam was nominated Time Magazine's person of the year last year, after spending more than 100 days in jail for having "live-streamed" a protest by student activists demanding road safety reforms.

This is not the only inter-

esting thing in the book, which is one of the first to look at the third generation of Thackerays in public life. According to it, the seeds of competition between the cousins were sown in December 1993, when Raj Thackeray had organised a *morcha* (rally) of unemployed youth in front of the Maharashtra Assembly in its winter home in Nagpur. "It was evident that the Nagpur *morcha* would be huge. A night before the *morcha*, Raj got a call from Matoshree (the Thackeray home)

team), asking him to ensure that Uddhav too got to speak at the public meeting. Raj, who was staying at the Hotel Centra Point in Nagpur, was disturbed as he felt Uddhav wanted a share of the credit," Mr. Kulkarni quotes an unnamed former close associate of the family as saying.

Rivalry on court

The book also details the differences in the style and approach of the two cousins, especially through an example of a badminton match played by both in 1997, where Uddhav, while playing with his cousin and his associates, fell down and was laughed at. "He [Uddhav] did not say anything then, but stopped coming to play from the next day onwards.

He, however, enrolled for classes at Bandra's MIG club and soon attained a commendable mastery over the game," the book quotes a friend of Raj Thackeray as saying.

Hulk-inspired Boris says he will get UK out of EU

'Is the EU supposed to be scared by this?'

Prime Minister Boris Johnson insisted on Sunday that "huge" progress was being made in Brexit talks and declared Britain would break out of the European Union just like the comic book hero "The Incredible Hulk".

The Conservative leader made the comments ahead of meetings with European Commission chief Jean-Claude Juncker and EU negotiator Michel Barnier in Luxembourg on Monday.

Mr. Johnson told the *Mail on Sunday* he was "very confident" of getting a divorce deal at an EU summit on October 17, in time for Brexit on October 31.

In an odd analogy, he compared Britain to the Marvel Comics character Hulk – the destructive alter ego of scientist Bruce Banner who turns into the ferocious green giant when enraged or stressed.

"The madder Hulk gets, the stronger Hulk gets and he always escapes, no matter how tightly bound in he seemed to be – and that is the case for this country," he said.

But Mr. Johnson is facing strong opposition in Parliament to his threat to leave the EU without a deal on October 31 if his negotiations fail.

Iran rejects U.S. charge that it was behind attacks on Saudi oil plants

Tehran says U.S. bases, aircraft carriers in the region are within its missiles' range

Iran dismissed accusations by the United States that it was behind attacks on Saudi oil plants that risk disrupting global energy supplies and warned on Sunday that U.S. bases and aircraft carriers in the region were in range of its missiles.

Yemen's Houthi group claimed responsibility for Saturday's attacks that knocked out more than half of Saudi oil output or more than 5% of global supply, but U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said the assault was the work of Iran, a Houthi ally.

'Oil price may rise'
The drone strikes on plants in the heartland of Saudi Arabia's oil industry, including the world's biggest petroleum processing facility, were expected to send oil prices up \$3-\$5 per barrel on Monday as tensions rise in the West Asia.

Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Abbas Mousavi, speaking on state TV, dismisses

sed the U.S. allegation as "pointless". A senior Revolutionary Guards commander warned that the Islamic Republic was ready for "full-fledged" war.

"Everybody should know that all American bases and their aircraft carriers in a distance of up to 2,000 km around Iran are within the range of our missiles," the semi-official Tasnim news agency quoted commander Amirali Hajizadeh as saying.

State oil giant Saudi Aramco said the attack cut output by 5.7 million barrels per day, about half the kingdom's production, at a time

when Aramco is trying to ready itself for what is expected to be the world's largest share sale.

Aramco gave no timeline for output resumption but said early on Sunday it would give a progress update in around 48 hours. A source close to the matter told Reuters the return to full oil capacity could take "weeks, not days".

Traders and analysts said crude may spike to as high as \$100 if Riyadh fails to quickly bring back supply.

The kingdom, the world's top oil exporter, ships more than 7 million barrels of oil

to global destinations every day.

Riyadh said it would compensate for the loss by drawing on reserves which stood at 188 million barrels in June.

Saudi ready to act

Mr. Pompeo said there was no evidence the attack came from Yemen, where a Saudi-led coalition has been battling the Houthis for over four years in a conflict widely seen as a proxy war between rivals Sunni Muslim Saudi Arabia and Shi'ite Iran.

Riyadh has accused Iran and its proxies of being behind previous attacks on oil pumping stations and the Shaybah oilfield, charges Tehran denies.

White House adviser Kellyanne Conway said the attacks "did not help" prospects for a meeting between the two leaders during the United Nations General Assembly this month but did not rule out the possibility.

"I'll allow the President (Trump) to announce a meeting or a non-meeting."

Hong Kong protesters call on U.K. to protect them from China

Police fire tear gas, water cannon to disperse demonstrators

Pro-democracy protesters rallied outside Britain's consulate in Hong Kong on Sunday, urging London to do more to protect its former colonial subjects and ramp up pressure on Beijing over sliding freedoms.

Hundreds of demonstrators sang *God Save the Queen* and *Rule Britannia* outside the consulate, waving the Union Jack as well as Hong Kong's colonial-era flags.

The protest came as another large rally made its way through the city streets on Sunday afternoon in defiance of a ban by police, who warned the gathering was illegal.

"We have a right to go to protests, to the streets, and we have to voice our demands to the government," a secondary school student at the rally who gave his name as Alvin, said.

But the rally descended into violence when small groups of hardcore activists – known within the movement as "braves" – tried to attack the city's main go-

vernment complex. Police fired tear gas and deployed water cannon trucks after Molotov cocktails and rocks were thrown over security barriers surrounding the complex, which has become a frequent flashpoint in the ongoing protests.

As evening set in, protesters retreated, chased by riot officers and water cannon firing blue-dyed water.

The once-stable international hub has been convulsed by weeks of huge, sometimes violent rallies calling for greater democratic freedoms and police accountability.

The movement is the biggest challenge to China's rule since the city was handed back by Britain in 1997 and shows no sign of ending, with local leaders and Beijing taking a hard line. Under a deal signed with Britain ahead of the city's handover to China, Hong Kong is allowed to keep its unique freedoms for 50 years.

Democracy activists accuse Beijing of renegeing on those promises by tightening political control over the territory and refusing calls for universal suffrage.





Gunas lead to actions

In the 14th chapter of the Bhagavad Gita, Lord Krishna describes the qualities of sattva, rajas and tamas, and says one of them could be the predominant quality in a person. A person's next birth is determined depending upon which quality predominates in him at the time of his death, said Valayapet Ramachariar in a discourse. If sattva guna is the dominant quality at the time of death, then he is born in a family which has atma jnana in his next birth. In the next birth, he will worship the Lord, and will acquire more of sattva. If rajas is the dominant quality at the time of death, then in the next birth he is born in a family which engages in actions, with a view to attaining certain results. He will then perform more actions to enjoy the fruits thereof. This behaviour keeps repeating. How can such a man experience anything but sorrow? If at the time of death, tamas dominates, then in the next birth, he is born as an animal, or bird or even a piece of vegetation, thereby being devoid of the ability to acquire knowledge. The man with sattva guna, in his next birth is born in a family whose members have jnana, and he too moves higher up getting closer to the state of being a sthitapragna. He eventually attains liberation. The man with rajas performs tasks to enjoy the results, and he reaches svarga, is reborn, and again dies and so the cycle repeats in his case. The man with tamas keeps moving lower down, until he is born not even as an animal, but as a lower form of life, like an insect or worm or a blade of grass.

Lord Krishna says that the person who understands that it is the gunas which make us perform acts, will attain His state. In other words, when one knows that the gunas are the motivators to action, then one is released from repeated births and deaths.

Q. I have opened a capital gains account with a balance of ₹20 lakh. A major part of this would go to my builder who will be handing over the possession of our apartment shortly. Please let me know if the income tax authorities will allow me to use the balance only for interior wood work, false roofing or also for electrical appliances.

SVS MANI

A. As per section 54, the proceeds of capital gains are to be used for purchase or construction of house property. Such proceeds, in your case, deposited in the capital gains scheme account are to be utilised for payment to the builder and for such other expenses to make the house habitable and not for other expenses. In casethat amount is not fully utilised, then the balance is to be treated as long-term capital gains in the year of possession of the property or at the end of three years whichever is earlier.

It is to be noted that the amount deposited in the account is to be utilised in the aforementioned manner within three years from the date of transfer of the original asset.

Q. I am an NRI and have invested ₹2 crore in mutual funds (MFs). If I become a resident Indian and opt for monthly dividend option with a return of 10%, what will be the tax amount that will be deducted from my monthly dividend income. Apart from this, is there any other tax I need to pay to the Government of India?

A. Dividend received from registered mutual funds are exempt from income tax. However, redemption/sale of mutual fund units attract income tax in the following manner; for equity-oriented mutual funds, redemption within one year from purchase is treated as short term capital gains and tax is payable at 15% on such gains plus cess and surcharge, if applicable; in case the said nature of funds are redeemed post one year, it is treated as long-term capital gains and tax is payable at 10% on such gain plus cess and surcharge, if applicable if the quantum of such gain/s exceed ₹1 lakh.

For debt mutual funds, on redemption within two years, tax is payable as per income slabs for individuals/senior citizens/super senior citizens on such gains plus cess and surcharge, if applicable. On redemption post two years, tax is payable at 20% on such gains plus cess and surcharge, if applicable

Q. I have been an NRI for the past 28 years and returned for good over two years ago. What's my NRI/RNOR status?

VIJAYAKRISHNAN

A. For determination of your residential status in a particular financial year, the first criterion would be to calculate the number of days you were in India in a particular year. If it exceeds 182 days in all, you become a resident for that year. The next step would be determine the type of resident, whether you qualify to be a resident but ordinarily resident (ROR). You must have been a resident of India for at least two out of ten immediately previous years and have stayed in India for at least 730 days in immediately seven preceding years. If you fail in anyone of the two conditions, then you will be resident but not ordinarily resident (RNOR).

On the taxability of income, if you are a resident/ROR, income earned by you from anywhere in the world is taxable in India subject to double taxation avoidance agreement provisions and if you are a RNOR, only those incomes earned by you which are either received or accrued in India are taxable in India.

Mental accounting imposes discipline on the manner of your spending

put money into neat covers and write 'rent,' 'milk and vegetables,' 'electricity' and a handsome ₹100 for emergencies.

This mental accounting imposes discipline on how we spend, and more importantly, provides a tremendous mental reward system when you actually save anything kept for any of these buckets. It encourages you to save, even if it is to reward yourself with some other purchase.

Instead of treating all money as purposeless blobs that transit through your account, if you separate your pool of money into buckets, either based on the source of the money or what you intend to do with it, you are lending purpose to the unit of money. In the world of savings and investments, this can be a smart thing to do.

Spending limits

Let us look at the benefits of mental accounting when it comes to spending. In the days when credit or debit cards were not available, you may have seen your father or grandfather

Needless to say, you could do with the same discipline too!

A far more significant benefit of mental accounting, if used well, happens in investing. Three things happen when you invest with goals in mind: one, you know how much you need to save and fine-tune your savings, you know when you need to achieve it and most importantly, you know what financial products to choose, to save for the goal. Most of you go to your adviser or relationship manager saying you have some surplus and want to invest. You sel-



risk deposits or fixed income product, since you have no leeway to go for high risk or long-term products. This is the key 'make or break' point for your financial goals and wealth building. Having no goal often leads to wrong choice of products.

goal. So, what went wrong?

You did not do the mental accounting of segregating the purposes for which you were investing. If you had done this, the purpose would have had an end date. If you knew this end date, then you would have chosen the right investment product and would have got the money with some returns (without deep discounts or losses) when you needed it. If you knew your medium-term goal was to get admission in a premium school for your child in 2-3 years, then you would have an idea on how much is needed and you could have followed up with saving more.

Also, the question of locking it into long-term insurance products or high-risk products and losing money or getting a poor deal would not even arise. For example, in this scenario, I'd simply tell you to go with low-

A question of (right) choice

Annuity policies come with an array of options

K NITYA KALYANI

Having decided to buy an annuity policy, you can choose from various options. Before that, let us look at the tax implications.

Up to ₹50,000 per year of your annuity purchase price brings you a tax deduction under Section 80CCC of the Income-Tax Act, 1961. This is over and above the ₹1.5 lakh under Section 80C for life insurance policy premiums, Employee or Public Provident Fund and so on. Any contribution to the National Pension Scheme will also come under this ₹50,000 umbrella.

On the vesting date, you can commute up to a third of the accumulated amount without tax and the balance is applied towards the annuity. The annuity itself, the pension payments you receive after vesting date, are taxable as part of your income. This is important when you plan your post-retirement income flows.

How would you like to receive your annuity is the next decision.

This is a choice you have to make while purchasing the annuity and cannot change.

There are about a dozen options that most life insurance companies offer. The simplest one is annuity for life, which involves annuity

payout until your lifetime.

This can be on a single life or joint life with your spouse.

You can opt for annuity guaranteed for a certain period (5, 10 or 15 years for example) and then for life and the payout will be for the longer of the two. Then, there is an annuity of any of the above options with return of purchase price to your

nominee. Some firms offer options of a specified portion of your purchase price to return, 50% or 100%, and options where the annuity rises at a specified rate year-on-year, to match rising costs of living. All these choices impact the quantum of your annuity.

Immediate annuity

A 45-year-old would pay ₹8 lakh or so for an immediate annuity of ₹43,000 a year for his lifetime.

Should he want a guaranteed pension for 20 years and then for a lifetime, the purchase price would be a bit higher at ₹6.5 lakh. With

return of purchase price, an annuity for life costs ₹7 lakh approximately. In case of a critical illness or an accident leading to permanent disability, your annuity policy can come to your rescue by way of return of purchase price.

This is a rider, an additional cover you have to buy at the inception of the policy.

These optional extras differ by company and policy and can cover accidental death and dismemberment waiver of premium, etc.

One important decision you have to make is whether you want a unit-linked annuity. In a linked annuity, your premium over the years is invested in capital markets and the corpus that results on the vesting date will be your purchase price. So, your capital available to invest in an annuity is subject to market risk, something you have to be aware of.

One question that comes up in the mind when you calculate the 'return' rate on an annuity is, even a bank fixed deposit appears better. Maybe, but don't forget that the premium or purchase price you pay towards an annuity includes a risk premium for longevity.

Lapsed bike insurance? Follow these steps

Compare rates and buy the policy online

Across the country, there has been a mad rush to renew lapsed insurance policies by motorists, thanks to the new Motor Vehicles Act that has imposed stiffer fines for those driving uninsured vehicles. Apart from the fine, there are other reasons why you should renew your lapsed motor insurance policy.

that said, with traditional players, there is the comfort of a good track record in settlement. If you want to save some money, you can buy just the third-party cover, which is mandatory under the law, instead of a comprehensive cover that includes own damage insurance. A third-party insurance will cover only the legal liability arising out of damage to the property of a third-party or bodily injury/death of the third party.

Another way to save on premium is to take a lower insured declared value or IDV. This is the market value of a vehicle, less depreciation (depending on the age of the vehicle). Your bike/car will be insured for this value. Note that, on damage to the vehicle, this is the maximum amount the insurer will pay you. The insurance aggregator sites also will give you the option of going for a lower IDV.

While you will be saving on premium by going for a lower IDV, you may end up paying from your pocket for repair in case of damage to the vehicle if it is under-insured.

Buying motor insurance online is very simple today. You can either go to the same insurer's website, login with the policy number and renew it or look for a new insurer and take a fresh policy. You can login to the websites of online aggregators such as Policybazaar.com, Coverfox Insurance and Renewbuy.com, and compare the premium rates offered by different insurers.

After you select your bike's manufacturer, model and variant, and the year of registration, and specify the RTO where it was registered, the site will throw up premium rates offered by different insurance companies.

With the new-age insurers – Digit and Acko – buying online motor insurance is even simpler, involving just three or four steps. But

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RITU DALMIA:

Conquering Italy with *kadhi*

Standing between two cultures, trying to explain one to the other, the chef is now expanding her reach with two restaurants and a catering arm

It is party time at Viva Viviana Varese, a new ristorante by Milan's famous chef Viviana Varese. Sprawled across Italian marketplace Eataly's second floor, with a beauteous view of the iconic Piazza Venticinque Aprile 10, more than 700 guests will walk in and out as the evening progresses, eating dishes prepared by 30 chefs – all of whom are Varese's friends and have flown down from various parts of Europe and Asia to pitch in. Eventually, the evening will end with some of these chefs clearing a counter, and dancing at the pass!

For now, however, chef Ritu Dalmia is at the pass, dishing out *kadhi pakori* to sober revellers, who carefully hold spoons of the silken yoghurt sauce to their tongues and pronounce it the most elegant Indian food Milan has ever tasted. But she is, in fact, feeding much more than *kadhi* to



Italy. She is building a veritable restaurant empire there – in a country that she has always so closely identified with ever since she visited it as a 20-year-old handling her father's marble business.

Ahead of her time

In the early 1990s, Dalmia, who'd always been interested

in cooking, shook off the ties of the family business. She took up a short cooking course at the Case Vecchie school run by the formidable Anna Tasca Lanza, who specialised in Sicilian gastronomy. Then she returned to Delhi to open Mezza Luna, an ahead-of-its-time Italian restaurant in Hauz Khas Village, in 1993. This was much before India had learnt to appreciate *al dente*, and it inevitably failed.

But Dalmia did not give up, moving to London for a few years, before coming back to open Diva in 2000.

That was a watershed moment for Indian standalone restaurants. Along with Rahul Akerkar's Indigo (1999) and AD Singh's Olive (2001), Di-

va would usher in a new era of cosmopolitan gastronomy. Dalmia's Italian – where ingredients, textures, freshness and flavours were not compromised on or bastardised – found acclaim and acceptance, paving the way for Italian food in India.

In many ways what Dalmia is doing in Milan, the least gastronomically-conservative of all Italian cities, is the mirror opposite of what she did in Delhi. If the idea then was to bring Italy in all its uncompromised flavours to India, now the idea is to take India in all its untrammelled glory to Italy. This is a chef and restaurateur who stands firmly between two cultures, lives between two cities (Delhi and Milan), and tries to explain one to the other.

A concerted expansion

In October 2016, industrialist Anil Singh bought a majority 51% stake in Dalmia's company, Riga Foods. The expansion in Milan is a result of this funding, and has enabled the chef to not just open Cittamani, a modern Indian restaurant that turned two this year, but also Spica earlier this year. At the latter, the global food is inspired by her travels, from South America and Thailand to Mumbai, and where the octopus ceviche is as effortlessly done as the *keema pao*. Then, there is a 20% investment Riga Foods has made in Viva, which has enabled Dalmia to partner with kindred creative soul, Varese. "All these restaurants under one umbrella means I will also have a bigger base for my catering business in



Europe," she points out, always a savvy Marwari, as she is fond of calling herself.

Catering is clearly a mainstay of the empire she is building. Any major Indian wedding or event in Italy is incomplete without her gourmet blessings. Her top clients include business families such as the Ambanis as well as a host of celebrities like Anushka Sharma and Virat Kohli, whose wedding she catered. However, she also seems to be extending the scope of the business.

At the mega Google annual conference this year, inside the exclusive Sicilian Verdura Resort, she catered to global A-listers that ostensibly ranged from top CEOs to actors like Tom

Cruise to Coldplay's Chris Martin, whose performance supposedly kicked off the shrouded-in-mystery annual extravaganza. Every vendor was made to sign non-disclosure agreements. Dalmia obviously does not share any details, but it is apparent that having a restaurant empire in Milan is going to consolidate this arm of the business and grow it further.

With diversity in her mix

At Cittamani, more conquests are being made. As Dalmia chats with a group of guests who have come for lunch, persuading them to come again that evening for my pop-up of Kayasth Khatirdari, a senior editor from *Corriere della Sera*, the leading liberal pap-

er in Italy, who has dropped in, laughs as he tells me, "I am always amazed by her charisma, at how Ritu is able to seduce everyone!"

It is perhaps an innate ability to navigate disparate cultures. In culinary terms, this is more than apparent in the way she dresses up typical Indian flavours and makes them comprehensible to Italians. *Kachori*, after all, could be a variation of the fried, puffed-up *pizza fritta*. As I fail to find suitable plantain to make a mock fish dish, she suggests *topinambur*, the tuber of the Jerusalem artichokes that has a similar texture. It works perfectly. A chef without this ability to understand deeply diverse cultures and cuisines equally cannot hope to pull off this task of introducing one to the other, I muse.

In the meeting ground of diverse cultures, there exists a potential, creative and business, that Dalmia is tapping.

The mystique behind the wall

Interest in the reign of Mughal rulers has once again ignited after the latest discovery at Delhi's Maulana Azad Medical College

The discovery of a 19th century wall below the mortuary of the Maulana Azad Medical College on Bahadurshah Zafar Marg has led to various conjectures. It was constructed by the British in 1874 for what was then a jail. During the Mughal period, State prisoners were executed there. The head of Dara Shikoh was said to have been thrown nearby on the orders of his brother Aurangzeb, and the headless body buried in the vaults of Humayun's Tomb.

Why was the *Phansi Ghar*, or hanging house, situated at this

spot? Probably because it was on the outskirts of the city, as Shahjahanabad's limits ended at Delhi Gate. Two sons and a grandson of Bahadurshah Zafar were also executed opposite the jail at the Khoo-ni Darwaza.

Their bodies were thrown to rot in front of the Northbrook Fountain in Chandni Chowk.

In the early 20th century...

The alleged conspirators of the 1912 Hardinge Bomb Case - Master Amircand, Master Awadh Behari, Basant Sanyal, and Lala Hanwant Sahai - were also incarcerated here. While the first three were hanged (Sanyal in Lahore), Hanwant Sahai was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Andamans, his sentence later commuted to a jail term of seven years.

I met Lalaji in 1966 at his dingy

abode in Chandni Chowk when he was an ailing octogenarian. He did not disclose the name of the freedom fighter who actually threw the bomb at Charles Hardinge when he was on his way in a State procession to the Red Fort.

The then Viceroy escaped death, though his elephant-keeper (mahout) was killed and he himself wounded.

Travellers on their way to Nizamuddin used to say that after the execution in early 1930s of Bhagat Singh, Raj Guru, and Sukhdev - who were also probably kept at the British prison earlier - they often heard voices of the condemned prisoners from the jail.

Stories to tell

Samuel Joseph, who had found employment in the Agra Jail about the year 1892, had an interesting story to tell.

After being reprimanded by his mother and asked to find a job, a kind hearted sentry took Joseph to the jailor. He was told to report for the next day.

Joseph himself rose to become a jailor over the years. He later served in the Delhi Central Jail and also in a number of UP towns, where he once had the notorious Sultan Daku as his prisoner. He even earned a commendation medal from the British government.

According to Joseph, the Delhi jail

was actually built on the site of an inn or sarai, constructed by Sheikh Farid Khan, treasurer of Jahangir. Samuel, my grandfather Lazarus' older brother, died in 1952. He used to say that Farid Khan was also instrumental in reclaiming land opposite the Agra Cathedral. This land belonged to the "Father of Mughal Christianity", the Armenian Khwaja Zulqarnain. The plot was initially used as the city prison; the British made it the Central Jail. The vast area has been converted into Sanjay Place shopping centre.

As for the sarai built by Farid Khan, it came up on the site of an inn of Firozshah Tughlak's time. Though the Maulana Azad Medical College has been built there now, Bhuri Bhatiyari-ki-Masjid of the Tughlak period still exists in a corner. It is said to be related to the Bhuri Bhatiyari-ka-Mahal near Karol Bagh, which has now almost disappeared, except for a ruined gateway.

Dauran-Jithani-ka-kuan (Well of Sisters-In-Law) that was also a landmark untraceable, unless exists filled up on the premises of J.P. Hospital. There were two other wells in the jail, one for condemned prisoners and the other for short-term prisoners, which supplied water for drinking and bathing, when there was no piped water supply.

Perhaps these wells too were filled up with masonry when the hospital was built (next to the erstwhile Irwin Hospital) in an area once covered by vegetable fields and Shahji-ka-Talab or lake, near which Ravana's effigy was burnt before Dussehra celebrations were moved to the Yamuna bank.

This how Time brings about unimaginable changes. But the Khoo-ni Darwaza of Sher Shah's reign, overlooking Maulana Azad Medical College and Hospital mortuary, remains a silent witness to the past.

Whether it is capturing the deep-flowing Ganga, the hearthland of Punjab, or gigantic melas where colours are splashed all over as joyous celebration and scantily clad holy men show us the earthen side of our country, the opening of this exhibition at AIFACS gives an insight into the India we don't see much of, in our urbanised lives.

Students of the Raghu Rai Center for Photography in Gurugram went the extra mile for their pictures, traversing long distances on foot or driving in jeeps through the Himalayas. The pictures capture a range of emotions: pain, pathos, joys and elation of humans. Animals: cows, mongrels, owls, are also seen.

One of the most stark images is of a mentally challenged man with grey hair on head and chest, lost to his surroundings and oblivious to even his present state. On his forehead, there appears a gap, possibly a bullet mark? "It looks like a third eye," said an observer.

Twenty-one students were short-listed by Nitin Rai, curator and director of the institute. His father, photographer Raghu Rai, is like a father-figure to the young boys and girls.

"We take them out and allow them to shoot what they like. If they like portraiture we show them specialised work. For landscape I take them personally to different places," says Nitin. Black and white dominates even though colour images like of Sikh men showcasing their strength and speed in rural sports are striking pictures that deserve attention.

Elaborating on his father's principles, Nitin says: "We want our students to capture life spontaneously, candidly. It doesn't matter which camera they choose; their images should be expressive. If there is no expression then all technical skills go waste."

I meet Raghu Rai, who politely tells me: "Ap dekhieye

them on my lens. Hospitals fascinate me."

So what is a superfood really?

If you've nodded your way through several conversations where people gush about the latest nut or berry, and wondered what all the fuss was about, here's a primer for you

Eat quinoa and you're sorted for protein. Slather avocado on wholegrain toast, and you'll grow into a hipster. Throw seaweed, chia seeds, and kale into a cold-pressed juicer, and you're Gwyneth Paltrow. Pop a few activated almonds and live forever.

All these are leading characters in the superfoods drama. Supposedly full of magical goodness and powerful health-boosting properties, these so-called superfoods are touted as ingredients that keep you super-healthy, provided you eat them regularly, in sufficiently large quantities. You'll have to pay through your nose for some, but, say some dieticians and celebrities, who like to be seen as leading a healthful life, you are then set for life.

Well, no. Like many words that have wormed their way into our food



lexicon, a superfood is an idea that is as appealing as it is false. The trouble, of course, is no one really knows what a superfood is.

Worse, there is no clear evidence that any of the foods 'labelled' as such are actually any better than locally grown fruits, vegetables and grains we consume every day as part of a balanced, healthy diet.

In fact, the European Union (EU) has banned the use of the word on products' packaging unless it is backed up by "convincing research" which does not seem to exist. This does not stop food conglomerates from sponsoring research to promote a particular food.

Unregulated marketing...

In India though, the lack of strict food and marketing regulations has ensured that superfoods are "super business", as leading nutritionist and food influencer Rujuta Diwekar puts it.

"These foods fly off the shelves as all you are required to do is consume them and not make any lifestyle change... what could be better than that!" she says sarcastically. Rujuta, who has built her reputation on championing the art of what she terms 'uncomplicated' eating, stresses that any food that links people to the culture, climate, and cuisine of the region is a superfood.

"The idea of a superfood is that it is good for people and not profits, and that it is in tune with Nature, soil, water tables, birds, butterflies, and bees.

THE BEST IN YOUR BACKYARD

If you can find a weekly farmer's market or fresh vegetable market in your community, you have probably found your superfoods – not one, but many.

Focus on finding the freshest variety of unprocessed, plant-based foods and pairing them with whole grains and some lean sources of protein in a way that delights you.

If you have a place to plant a small kitchen garden, the greens and little plants you grow sans lab-made chemical fertilizers, are also superfoods.

The local fish market is another place to find superfoods.

If you can cook your food at home (most of the time) and flavour it with garlic, ginger, onions and light spices, they are capable of adding joy to your meals. And joy can be a superfood too.

To put it simply, something like kale would be ideal for Europeans in their winter and quinoa is a good staple for certain regions of South America. Not anywhere else."

In their defence, all the foods that have today been accorded this elevated status are legitimate health foods. Avocado is loaded with healthy monounsaturated fats, and grapefruit is a great source of vitamin A and C. But they aren't the only sources. Produce billed as superfoods are berries, greens, whole grains and other natural foods. It is the 'science talk' built around them, partly due to clever

marketing, and somewhat due to ongoing dietary research, that has resulted in the rampant exaggeration of their abilities.

For instance, antioxidants found in most of the so-called superfoods are promoted heavily because they are said to 'mop up' cancer-causing free radicals in our body that have the potential to cause inflammation, early internal-body ageing, and even damage our DNA. However, many plant-based foods with colour have antioxidants. For instance, curcumin in turmeric, polyphenols in grapes, and beta carotene in carrots, all have antioxidant


properties. As regular healthy people, or those who may have minor deficiencies, we don't need blueberries or acai berries that have travelled many miles.

...And the problem it causes

Dr Maya Adam, Director of Health Education Outreach and Faculty Lead at the Stanford University School of Medicine, says the commercial food industry has today fine-tuned the art of responding to what's trending in terms of consumer demands. "For example, in the 1980s, many people were trying to eliminate fat from their diets and you could see packaged foods everywhere that advertised themselves as low-fat or fat-free. (What they didn't advertise was that they often added a lot of sugar and artificial flavours to make the lack of fat palatable.) Overall, our sugar intake increased so much that we got sick from that – and now, you can find hundreds of products on the supermarket shelf that are advertised as "sugar-free" or "low-sugar". The same has happened with the so-called superfoods."

Dr Adam says people are looking for a 'magic bullet' for their dietary dilemmas, and food manufacturers are capitalising on this demand by providing us with packaged (often imported and sometimes even heavily processed) versions of foods that should probably just be part of our regular diet – in their unprocessed, natural forms. Seconding Rujuta, Dr Adam says: "If avocados are available where you live, they can be a delightful, healthy addition to your salads, your breakfast or your beans and rice! If not, there are probably locally-grown foods that will serve your health just as well."

Ultimately, there is only one dull truth that even nutritionists who are at loggerheads with each other readily agree upon – it is that nutrition science is extraordinarily complex and mysterious. The corollary clearly then is that no single food, no matter how rich in vitamins and antioxidants, can replace a balanced diet combined with regular exercise. Sadly, there isn't any shortcut through that supermarket shelf.

Think before you speak

How I have allowed myself to be set up

At immense cost to my sense of self-worth, I have recently come to realise that when I yield to gossip, to hearsay, and rumours and react based on such incomplete information, particularly when it relates to pulling up people, I invariably pass harsh judgement and leave the recipient frustrated and hurt.

Recently, I was given a list of complaints about a colleague of mine by a client. Assuming my client was talking based on neglect of my colleague, I lambasted my colleague and left him quite disheartened.

Another colleague of mine who was present, called me aside and explained the situation as it was and shared verifiable facts.

He pointed out my indiscretion, without blaming me. I realised in pouring venom on my colleague that I had actually cast aspersions on him. All this with insufficient information.



Three-time All-Star Marc Gasol became only the second man to win an NBA crown and the World Cup in the same year after Spain brushed aside Argentina 95-75 here on Sunday.

Spain, which survived double overtime against Australia to reach the final, led throughout in Beijing to win international basketball's biggest prize a second time.

The only previous occasion was in 2006 with the two Gasol brothers, Marc and older sibling Pau, on the team.

Pau did not feature in China because of injury.

The latest triumph was particularly sweet for the 34-year-old centre Gasol, who three months ago also played a key part in the To-

ronto Raptors' run to the NBA title.

Gasol, who had 14 points, seven rebounds and seven assists, joins Lamar Odom, a double winner in 2010 with the United States and Los Angeles Lakers.

Surprise finalists Argentina had not triumphed since it hosted the inaugural World Cup in 1950.

As a contest, the final was over by the fourth quarter – although the Argentines did rally belatedly to reduce Spain's previously mighty lead.

Australia wait goes on
France roared back after half-time to defeat Australia 67-59 and claim a second World Cup bronze in a row – and extend the Boomers' long wait for a major medal.

"It will be difficult to maintain the ranking points. But the good thing is we don't have to defend it any ranking

"We are playing a Canadian pair. Satwik and I haven't played them though I had faced them at the Swiss Open with Pranaav Jerry Chopra. So that experience will count. I know we are coming back from an injury, but there is no pressure," Chirag added.
