## Govt. data on J&K terror justify lockdown, says SC

Numbers from 1990 present 'formidable reasons'

The Supreme Court on Monday found the government's statistics of thousands of instances of death, terror and violence in Jammu and Kashmir from 1990 as "formidable reasons" for the August

5, 2019, lockdown that followed the withdrawal of the special rights and privileges of Kashmiri people with the reading down of Article 370. Attorney-General K.K. Ve-

nugopal reeled out numbers to prove that the restrictions stopped the bloodshed in the Valley, and there was no dearth of facilities for ordinary Kashmiris.

He told a Bench, led by Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi, that since 1990, 41,866 persons had lost their lives in 71,038 terror incidents. They included 14,038 civilians, 5,292 security personnel and 22,536 terrorists.

"A terrible state of affairs... These are formidable  $reasons \ [for the \ lockdown]...$ These are security matters," Justice S.A. Bobde, on the Bench, said.

#### 'No bullets fired'

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta submitted that "not a bullet has been fired after August 5".

# Drone strikes on Saudi facility lead to jump in crude prices

Supplies to India will not be affected, Saudi Aramco officials tell oil companies

Drone attacks last week on Saudi Arabia's crude processing facility, the largest in the world, have impacted half of the country's crude oil production and about 5% of the world supply. Following the attacks, on Monday, Global Brent crude futures shot up more than 20% to \$66.91 per barrel.


However, allaying Indian fears, Saudi Aramco officials told oil companies that the attacks would not result in a shortage of supplies, the Ministry of Petroleum has said.

Ratings agencies, however, said India would see a rise in prices due to the increase in the risk premium.

"Yesterday [September 151, Saudi ARAMCO officials informed the Indian refiners that there would be no shortage of supplies to them," the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas (MoPNG) said in a statement. "MoPNG is closely monitoring the situation in consultation with Indian refiners and Saudi

tations," the statement said. Saudi Arabia is a major source of oil imports for India, accounting for nearly 18% of the 226 million tonnes of crude the country imported during 2018-19, according to data with the Ministry of Commerce.

India, which imports more than 80% of its crude oil requirement, is particularly vulnerable to geopolitical risks arising out of the oil producing countries.

"While the oil markets await further updates on the resumption of supplies from Saudi Arabia, they will nevertheless be nervous as any retaliatory measures by Saudi Arabia and its allies will keep the market on tenterhooks," said K. Ravichandran, senior vice-president and group head, Corporate Ratings, ICRA.

"As a result, oil prices should factor in sizeable geopolitical risk premium, which will be negative for Indian consumers," he added. Nevertheless, this impact is likely to be short-lived as the market will rebalance swiftly once the tensions abate."

#### Petrol price may rise by ₹5

Prices of petroleum products like petrol and diesel are likely to go up by up to ₹5 a litre each over the course of the next few days after international crude oil prices shot up following the drone attack on Saudi Aramco's facility at Abqaiq. ## Rupee tumbles 68 paise

Rise in crude oil prices spooked all the emerging market currencies with rupee being hit the worst, despite the Central bank's intervention that helped the currency to reduce losses. The rupee opened weaker at 71.75 against the dollar, compared with the previous close of 70.93. It hit the day's low of 71.68 before closing at 71.60, down 68 paise. This was the first season of weakening of the domestic unit after eight days of gain. > PAGE 15

## Faroog detained under PSA, his house declared a jail



Move comes ahead of Vaiko's plea in Supreme Court against his detention

Hours before the Supreme Court was to hear a petition by Rajya Sabha member Vaito against the detention of National Conference leader and former Chief Minister Farooq Abdullah, the Jammu and Kashmir Home Department issued orders to detain the Srinagar Member of Parliament under the Public Safety Act (PSA) for 12 days on Sunday night.

As per the latest order under the PSA, his residence has been declared a subsidiary jail.

A senior government official told *The Hindu* that Dr. Abdullah would be detained initially for 12 days, but the period could be extended for a maximum of three months. Any detention beyond three months will have to be ratified by the PSA Advisory Board. The maximum detention period under the PSA enacted in 1978, is two years.

Mr. Vaiko last week moved a habeas corpus petition in the court to have the State government produce the former Chief Minister in court and set him free.

The court heard the petition on Monday and issued notice to the Centre and scheduled the hearing for September 30. When the Bench, led by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi, turned to Solicitor General Tushar Mehta for a response, he questioned the locus standi of Mr. Vaiko to file a habeas corpus petition for Dr. Abdullah. This petition was reserved for family members alone, the law officer said.


