If there is a change of mindset in India's approach to T20 cricket, it could well come across in Wednesday's clash against South Africa.

For long, India has found it tough to justify its rather conventional approach to batting in the first 10-12 overs, keeping wickets intact before going for broke at the back-end.

Since Virat Kohli categorically stated that the batting depth is being considered in any combination, it obviously allows the top-order to play with more freedom.

Change in approach?

The other day at Dharamshala, Kohli emphasised, "If all teams across the world are batting till No. 9, 10, why can't we?" That, in effect, compels the specialist bowlers to spend more time at the 'nets' with the bat in their hands!

At the same time, it could help the international T20 careers of Ravindra Jadeja and Krunal Pandya, who have better batting credentials than Kuldeep Yadav and Yuzvendra Chahal.

Given the inexperience of this visiting team when it comes to playing on Indian pitches, the spinners could prove a handful, especially the variety offered by leggie Rahul Chahar.

Team wants fearless, not careless cricket: Rathour

It doesn't require a brilliant cricketing brain to separate 'fearless' from 'careless' when batting. But some youngsters of the present Indian team need the difference to be spelt out.

On Tuesday, India's newly appointed batting coach Vikram Rathour put it in as many words. "All the young players need to understand that there is a fine line between fearless cricket and careless cricket.

"What the team management is asking from them is fearless cricket, having clear a gameplan and playing with intent. At the same time, you can't be careless."

Phenomenal player

Rishabh Pant is the obvious reference point. And the articulate Rathour, also a former National selector, was categorical.


"As far as Rishabh is concerned, he is a phenomenal player. He just needs to sort out his gameplan, needs to bring in a little bit of discipline into his game.

"We want him to play all his shots. That is what makes him special. He is an impact player, but at the same time you can't be careless."


The duo came together with India-A in a spot of bother at 31 for two, and put on 135 to steer their side to

They patiently played out the opening bowlers Vernon Philander and Lungi Ngidi, both of whom extracted movement in the morning session. When the sun came out and the pitch dried up, Gill and Karun opened out.

Gill, who has been included in the Test squad to face South Africa, was in fine touch. He was particularly strong off the front foot, driving the fast bowlers straight down the ground with aplomb.

One stroke off Philander stood out for its audacity the youngster simply flicking his wrist to dispatch an overpitched delivery from out-

side off to the long-on fence. He was on course to reach a fifth First Class century, un-

Gill earned a reprieve on zero when he edged Philander between third slip and gully. Gill, who made 90 in the previous match, is looking forward to joining the Test side. "I'm very excited. Being picked for the Test team is a big deal for every cricketer," he said.

Karun, meanwhile, built on the great form he showed in the Duleep Trophy. He was aggressive after lunch, hitting speedster Lutho Sipamla for three boundaries in an over. When the spinners Dane Piedt and Senuran Muthusamy came on, Karun disrupted their rhythm by using the sweep shot regularly.

'Want to keep the rhythm going' Ngidi says he has done a lot to recover from injury

Midway through South Africa's stuttering ICC ODI World Cup campaign, fast bowler Lungi Ngidi was ruled out due to a hamstring injury. He could only watch from the sidelines as his side struggled in the mega event, finishing with just three wins in nine matches.

The strapping pacer is now back in action, turning out for the touring South Africa-A here. In the first 'Test' against India-A - his first competitive match since tne injury iay-on bowled well to pick up five wickets.

The 23-year-old is keen to get into the groove before he joins the senior Test team to take on India.

"The hamstring injury was caused maybe because I was trying to bowl too fast. Missing the latter half of the World Cup was disappointing, but injuries are a part of

I went straight to my recovery routine, and now I'm feeling very fit. I've done a lot of training to recover from the injury. I'm happy with the way I'm bowling, and I want to keep the rhythm going," Ngidi said here on Tuesday.

South African speedster Dale Steyn for support and inspiration. "Steyn has the perfect blue print for a fast bowler. Taking 400 Test wickets is something all of us aspire to achieve. He has been very influential, he gives us a lot of good advice. Having him around is great for the team," he said.

Keeping a close tab

While he did not reveal further details, it is learnt from highly reliable sources that the ACU is keeping a close tab on a few players who have also played at the

Former India all-rounder Dinesh Mongia, member of the Indian team which finished runner-up in the 2003 World Cup, announced his retirement from all forms of game on Tuesday. Mongia's final appearance came in 2007 for Punjab before he joined the Indian Cricket League (ICL) and was subsequently

banned by the BCCI. The punishment for playing the ICL left Mongia without any official connection with the game and he was lost to cricket. Most players banned by the Board for their association with the ICL were granted amnesty but Mongia remained the lone cricketer who was kept out of the official circuit.

"Those were hard days," recalled Mongia who took up coaching assignments to stay in touch with the game. Last season, he was made a State

It was considered "amnesty" by Mongia, who wants to take up coaching assignments now.

From his under-19 debut for Punjab in October 1995, Mongia made rapid progress to earn a First Class debut in February 1996.

Six years of consistent scoring pushed him into the Indian team for a debut against Australia in 2001 at Pune. He figured in 57 ODIs but never played a Test.

He played in 121 First Class matches and hit 21 centuries.

Mongia also turned out for Lancashire and Leicester-
