India not unbeatable, says Bavuma

Feels that South Africa can take a lot of positives from the second T20I

Taking responsibility surely comes easily for a not-soyoung T20 debutant Temba Bavuma. Minutes after South Africa's seven-wicket defeat in the second T20I match, the 29-year-old minced no words in owning responsibility for the team's sub-par total on a good batting surface.

Coming in at No. 3 in the fourth over, Bavuma looked good until he failed to rotate the strike in the later part and eventually departed for a 43-ball 49 in the 18th.

"When David (Miller) came in at No. 5, I think in the 13th over, we were in a very strong position. That's where we probably fumbled a bit in our batting cause. At the halfway stage, I was thinking 180 at least - that could be a very competitive score. But yeah, we just weren't able to get going.

"I'm the one to be blamed. I wasn't really able to get the momentum. I thought the platform was really set for the boys to go and do their

team, the first black African to score a Test century for South Africa said, "They're a formidable team but I don't think they're not an unbeatable side. With our batting, it was just one phase where we

let ourselves down and a quality side like that would

Looking ahead, Bavuma said, "I think there's always a moment in the game where we can win. For us, it's more about being aware of those moments and making sure we're in the right mental space to win those moments. It's something that we can work on. I don't think we were completely outplayed in the game. There are a lot of positives that we can take forward from this game."

Easy at the death overs

Deepak Chahar, who impressed with figures of 4-0-22-2 after three overs in the PowerPlay, revealed, "I find it easy to bowl death overs because, in the PowerPlay, you only get two fielders outside the circle. However, after the PowerPlay, you get five fielders outside."

It may be recalled that in this year's Indian Premier League, Chennai Super Kings' skipper M.S. Dhoni made Chahar bowl his quota upfront in one spell.

The Rajasthan bowler was quick to acknowledge the confidence he got from the IPL. "It benefited me. Whenever you do well in a match, you get confidence."

Chahar, among the aspirants for place in Indian team for the 2020 T20 World Cup, said, "I take every match as my last match. At this time, Indian cricket is at the top and if you want to find a spot, you will have to do very good and, that too, in every match because there is a lot of competition."

Kuldeep in transition mode

Need to make the most of available chances, says spinner

Not too long ago, the India team management backed wrist-spinners Yuzvendra Chahal and Kuldeep Yadav to carry the mantle of the white-ball spin attack.

Both have since fallen out of favour, finding no place in the squads for the last two T20I series.

Challenge

Kuldeep, however, has a chance to make a mark with the red ball, having been named in the Test squad to face South Africa. The change in format presents a challenge to Kuldeep, who has played little First Class cricket in recent times.

Turning out for India-A in the second 'Test' against South Africa-A gives Kuldeep the opportunity to find his rhythm.

"Playing red-ball cricket is difficult, especially when you are a regular in whiteball cricket. It was important for me to come here and bowl as many overs as possible. There is still plenty of work to do," Kuldeep said here on Thursday.

The 24-year-old has taken the white ball snub in posi-

tive spirit.

"I did well in white-ball cricket; my stats are good. Maybe the selectors feel they need to give me a break in Twenty20s, and that some changes are required. I respect that, and I have no complaints. I see this as an opportunity to do well in Tests," Kuldeep said.

Earning a spot in the playing eleven for the Test side is not guaranteed, as Kuldeep is competing with Ravindra Jadeja and R. Ashwin.

"When three spinners like Ashwin, Jaddu (Jadeja) and I are in the squad, it's challenging to pick the right

combination. You need to be ready to grab your chance. Of course, there is pressure because you only get a few chances, and you have to make full use of them," he

Honing his batting

One of the possible reasons for Kuldeep's ouster from the shorter format squads is his lack of batting prowess. It is a shortcoming that Kuldeep is working on.

"I've been working on my batting with (previous India batting coach) Sanjay Bangar. I feel my batting is good at the Test level," he said.

The US-based consultancy company Duff & Phelps has said that the Indian Premier League's brand value has registered a 7% growth

from \$6.3 billion (₹41,800 crore) in 2018 to \$ 6.8 billion (₹47,500) in 2019. This is the company's sixth edition of IPL's an-

nual study. The study also put Mumai Indians' value at ₹809 crore, reflecting an 8.5% growth in 2019 and Chennai Super Kings at ₹732 crore reflecting a 13.1%. Kolkata Knight Riders' (₹630 crore) and Royal Challengers Bangalore's (₹595 crore) value has declined by almost 8%, the re-

The report also said that Sunrisers Hyderabad has made steady gains over the years in terms of its brand value while Delhi Capitals, on the back of its on-field performances in 2019, saw an appreciation of 9% on brand value.

Markram, Mulder toy with Indian attack

Aiden Markram (161, 253b, 20x4, 2x6) and Wiaan Mulder (131 n.o., 230b, 17x4, 1x6) got into the groove ahead of the Test series, with authoritative knocks on the penultimate day of the second 'Test' between India-A and South Africa-A here on Thursday.

The duo powered South Africa-A to 400, 17 runs short of India-A's first-innings total. The home side moved to 13 for no loss, before rain forced play to be called off.

Markram and Mulder, both expected to play central roles for the senior team, toyed with the India-A attack. The duo put on 155 for the sixth wicket, and save for a couple of leg-before shouts, never looked in trouble.

The entertaining stand was eventually broken by pacer Mohammed Siraj, when Markram edged one onto the stumps. Markram, 83 overnight, brought up his 11th First Class century with a textbook cover-driven 4 off

Mulder, touted as the heir to Jacques Kallis' all-rounder throne, was a picture of elegance. Much like Markram, he neatly moved his front

foot to the pitch of the ball and presented a straight bat.

As the Markram-Mulder partnership grew, the Indians began to lose focus. Sirai and Umesh Yadav often strayed in line, drifting onto the pads to offer easy runs. The short balls carried no bite, resulting in ferocious

Chinaman bowler Kul-

deep Yadav – named in the senior India Test squad picked up four wickets, but was largely unimpressive. He frequently overpitched outside off, allowing the batsmen to free their arms.

Kuldeep was left shaken in the afternoon session, when Markram and Mulder smashed him for one straight six each in the same

Dane Piedt hoicked Kuldeep for a six over mid-wicket, but this time, Kuldeep came back strongly to dislodge Piedt's stumps off the next delivery.

Left-arm spinner Shahbaz Nadeem kept it tight, and finished with figures of three for 76 in 31.3 overs.



Bajrang, the last edition's silver medallist, will fight for bronze on Friday.

Bajrang had beaten Poland's Krzysztof Bienkowski, Slovenia's David Habat before overcoming Korea's Jong Choi Son in the quarterfinals. Ravi lost his semifinal bout 6-4 to World champion Zaur Uguev from Russia. Ravi also made it to the Tokyo Olympics in 57kg after overcoming Korea' Sunggwon Kim, Armenia's Arsen Harutunyan, Yuki Takahashi of Japan.
