Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro will visit Russia "soon", the Kremlin said on Friday, in an apparent attempt by the embattled leader to shore up support. "Indeed, the visit is being planned," President Vladimir Putin's spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters. "And it will take place fairly soon," he added, declining to provide precise dates. AFP

President Donald Trump on Friday announced new sanctions on Iran that he said were the toughest-ever against another country but indicated he did not plan a military strike, calling restraint a sign of strength.

The Treasury Department unveiled action against Iran's central bank after U.S. officials said that Tehran carried out weekend attacks on rival Saudi Arabia's oil infrastructure, which triggered a spike in global crude prices.

"We have just sanctioned the Iranian national bank," Mr. Trump told reporters in the Oval Office. "These are the highest sanctions ever imposed on a country."

But Mr. Trump indicated he did not plan a military response, attacking both critics who thought he would trigger war and hawks seeking a military response.

"The easiest thing I could do (is) knock out 15 different major things in Iran," Mr.

"Treasury's action targets a crucial funding mechanism that the Iranian regime uses to support its terrorist network, including the Qods Force, Hezbollah and other militants that spread terror and destabilise the region," he said.

The Qods Force conducts international operations for Iran's elite Revolutionary Guards, who are in charge of protecting the clerical regime. Hezbollah, the Shiite militant group and political party in Lebanon, is among closest regional Iran's

Behnam Ben Taleblu, a senior fellow at the Foundation for the Defense of Democracies, which supports tough action on Iran, said that the latest measures are a way "to push Tehran to shun funding terrorism."

"It proves to Tehran that there will be no stopping U.S. sanctions unless Iran changes its behaviour," he said.

**Development fund hit** 

The United States also imposed sanctions on Iran's sovereign wealth fund, a development fund whose board of trustees includes President Hassan Rouhani as well as Etemad Tejarate Pars, a company that the Treasury Department said had sent money internationally on behalf of Iran's Defence Ministry.

Mr. Trump in June authorised a military strike after Iran shot down a U.S. drone, only to call it off at the last moment. He recently said that he hopes for talks with Mr. Rouhani, who responded that Mr. Trump must first ease sanctions.

## Pak. activist flees to U.S., seeks political asylum

She spoke against Army's sexual abuse

Gulalai Ismail's campaigns to empower Pakistani girls have won her international awards and recognition as one of her country's foremost activists.

But when she spoke out against sexual violence and disappearances allegedly carried out by the Army in northwestern Pakistan, her fortunes quickly changed.

The 32-year-old said she feared for her life. After four months on the run, she succeeded in eluding a vast hunt and has turned up in the U.S., where she is seeking asylum.

Ms. Ismail said she never sought to become an overseas dissident but sees a closing of the political space

"I never wanted to leave Pakistan," she told AFP in an interview in Washington. "I believe that I can better work towards democracy and civil supremacy and

"The toll from the hospital attack in Qalat has jumped to 39 killed, 140 others wounded," Gul Islam Seyal, the spokesman for the provincial governor, said.

Earlier, authorities had said the blast had killed 20 people.

The surge in violence, with civilians paying the heaviest price, has come after U.S. President Donald Trump called off talks with the Taliban that could have seen Washington begin withdrawing troops.

## Twitter shuts down fake news accounts

Twitter said on Friday it shut down thousands of accounts worldwide for spreading misinformation, including some artificially amplifying pro-Saudi messaging as part of a regional propaganda war.

The move affected pro-Saudi accounts coming from Egypt and the United Arab Emirates directed at Qatar and Yemen, Twitter said, as well as others from China seeking to sow discord among protesters in Hong Kong. Also, fake accounts were suspended in Spain and Ecuador.

Notably, it closed the account of Saudi royal court adviser Saud al-Qahtani.

## Bill de Blasio drops out of Democratic presidential race

He was unlikely to qualify for the fourth Democratic debate

Bill de Blasio, the Mayor of New York City who entered the Democratic presidential race on the premise that his brand of urban progressive leadership could appeal on a national scale, said on Friday that he was ending his

candidacy. Mr. De Blasio's announcement came as it became clear he was unlikely to qualify for the fourth Democratic debate next month, cementing the notion that he lacked the support and funds to sustain his bid.

"I feel like I've contributed all I can to this primary

campaign, and it's clearly not my time," he said in an appearance on MSNBC's 'Morning Joe." "I'm going to end my presidential campaign, continue my work as

mayor of New York City, and I'm going to keep speaking up for working people."


Mr. De Blasio focused his campaign on trying to improve the lives of those working people.

He tried to position himself as the most suitable Democrat to take on President Donald Trump, given his familiarity with Mr. Trump as a real estate magnate in New York. He branded the President "Con Don".


