

Shah moots 1 card for all utilities

Home Minister says 2021 census will be digital and could prepare a base for it

Announcing that the 2021 census exercise would be carried out digitally, Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Monday suggested one card for all utilities in future.

Speaking at the foundation stone laying ceremony for construction of a new building of the Registrar General of India (RGI) that conducts census, he said the digital census had the potential to bring all cards such as Aadhaar, passport, bank account, and driving licence on one platform. "Why is it so difficult to link and update birth and death registration with census data," he wondered.

The exercise was conducted earlier in two phases in 2010 and 2015. The next round of recording biometric and family tree details of Indian citizens will be conducted in September 2020, a government notification issued earlier said.

The NPR exercise is different from the census and is not linked to the National Register of Citizens (NRC). For the purpose of the NPR, an ordinary resident is defined as a person who has resided in a local area for the past six months or more or a person who intends to reside in that area for the next six months or more.

Mr. Shah said the Census 2021 data would be the base for the country's future planning, development initiatives and welfare schemes, and people's wholehearted participation would be the key to the success of the exercise.

"India's 130 crore population should be informed about its benefits. The utilisation of census data is multi-dimensional, and will be a significant contribution in the nation's progress," he

He said on the basis of the 2011 Census, the Modi government had planned 22 welfare schemes related to electricity, gas connections, roads, houses for the poor, toilets, bank accounts, and opening of bank branches.

Maradu: SC slams Kerala top official

The Supreme Court on Monday slammed Kerala Chief Secretary Tom Jose for "patent breach of law" by the State in allowing illegal structures like the Maradu high-rise apartments to come up along a fragile coastal zone even as thousands perish or are rendered homeless by natural tragedies like floods which devastate the State.

Justice Arun Mishra, accompanied by Justice S. Ravindra Bhat, spoke directly to Mr. Jose, who was present in the crowded courtroom. "We can prosecute you for culpable negligence," Justice Mishra addressed Mr. Jose in court.

Affidavit inadequate

The court also declared an affidavit filed by Mr. Jose "wholly unsatisfactory" and a reflection of the government's intention not to have a concrete plan to prevent encroachments along the coastal zone, despite the frequent recurrence of natural disasters in the State.

Mob beats up man for 'cow smuggling' in Alwar

Victim suffered multiple fractures This episode was

A mob of cow vigilantes beat up a man alleging that he was smuggling half-a-dozen cows to Haryana in Rajasthan's Alwar district in the early hours of Monday. Police rescued the victim from the crowd and admitted him with multiple fractures at the government hospital in Shahjahanpur.

The man, identified as Munfed Khan, accompanied by a few other persons, was allegedly taking the cows in a pick-up van, which broke a oolice barricade near Khusa Ki Dhani village. Police had put up the barricades on Sunday night after getting a tip-off about smuggling of

Criminal record

The villagers stopped the van and rescued the cows, while the people travelling in the vehicle tried to escape. The mob caught one of them, Munfed Khan, and thrashed him, while at least two others fled from the spot.

The People's Union for Civil Liberties said this was a case of "attempted mob lynching", in which the victim picked up by the cow vigilantes was criminalised and beaten up. "This episode was meant to create a public spectacle and instil fear among the Muslim dairy farmers," PUCL-Raiasthan president Kavita Sri-

vastava said. Ms. Srivastava said the attacks on those ferrying cows had not stopped in the Congress regime in the State and this was the second such case after a similar instance of vigilantism in Alwar district's Kishangarh Bas on December 22, 2018.

Allahabad High Court refuses stay on law student's arrest

SIT had booked her in Chinmayanand extortion case

The Allahabad High Court on Monday refused to grant relief to the Shahjahanpur law student seeking a stay on her possible arrest in an extortion case filed by BJP leader Swami Chinmayanand, who is accused of rap-

ing her. Mr. Chinmayanand, who was arrested on Friday, was shifted on Monday from a Shahjahanpur jail to a Lucknow hospital, where he was tested for cardiac problems.

The Special Investigation Team probing the case submitted a report in a sealed cover before a two-judge Bench.

Expressing satisfaction with the probe so far, the Bench of Justices Manoj Mishra and Manju Rani Chauhan fixed October 22 for the probe team to submit the next report. The woman was



also present in the courtroom. The postgraduate law student had sought a stay on her arrest after the SIT booked her and arrested three men for allegedly trying to extort money from Mr. Chinmayanand.

Fresh petition "If the victim wants any re-

lief in this regard, she may file a fresh petition before an appropriate Bench," the High Court said. "This Bench was nominated to the case only for monitoring the investigation in this matter and has no jurisdiction to pass order on stay of arrest."

Chinmayanand in ICU

Mr. Chinmayanand has been admitted to the intensive care unit of the Sanjay Gandhi Postgraduate Institute in Lucknow, where cardiologists examined him, Jail Superintendent Rakesh Kumar

said. Hospital Chief Medical Superintendent Amit Agarwal said angiography was done and no significant blockage was found, adding that angioplasty was not required.

The 72-year-old will be stabilised with medicines in four or five days and his discharge will be planned in due course of time, the doctor said. Mr. Chinmayanand was arrested last Friday and sent to 14 days' judicial custody.

Man sells mortgaged land, court rejects bail plea

A court here has dismissed the bail plea of a man and his mother for allegedly cheating a private bank by selling a mortgaged property for ₹1 crore despite a stay by the Delhi High Court. Additional Sessions Judge Gurdeep Singh Saini rejected the bail application of Nishant Arora and his mother for selling a flat for over ₹1 crore to the complainant, Nishan Nitti, though the High Court had stayed the operation in 2015. According to the prosecution, Mr. Arora had taken a loan of ₹1.6 crore from a private bank in 2012.

Kurukshetra dancer's leg amputated due to 'negligence'

Case registered after Delhi Medical Council finds lack of diligence on doctor's part

In an alleged case of medical negligence, a 42-year-old dancer, beautician and model from Kurukshetra had to get her leg amputated after two wrongly performed surgeries by a doctor at a city hospital.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (New Delhi) Eish Singhal said that a case under Section 338 (causing grievous hurt by act endangering life or personal safety of others) of the Indian Penal Code has been registered at Chanakyapuri police station on Sunday and investigation is under way.

The victim, identified as Manpreet Kaur alias Sonia and resident of Kurukshetra's Sector 2, alleged that in 2016, she got two surgeries done by a doctor at a private hospital here after which her right leg got infected to an extent that it had to be amputated in December.

Met with an accident

The victim then approached the police and submitted her complaint. The complaint was then forwarded to the Delhi Medical Council which concluded medical negligence on the doctor's part. An FIR was registered.

In the FIR, Ms. Kaur stated

that she had met with an accident about seven-eight years ago and a metal plate was put in her knee because of which she could not bend her knee.

"In October, I met orthopaedician K.K. Mishra at Primus Hospital and he assured me that he would fix my knee. A surgery was conducted and I was discharged in three days. My knee got swollen, I developed infection and there was no sensation in my leg. I continued to visit the hospital for followups and shared the problem with him but he continued to

assure that it will get better," the document stated. The doctor allegedly advised her to undergo another surgery after a month in November to which she agreed

After the surgery, the doctor allegedly told her relative that her knee is damaged and she will not be able to bend it for the rest of her life. He also allegedly asked them to pay ₹5 lakh for further treatment.

Plastic surgery

Rakesh Kumar, Ms. Kaur's cousin, told *The Hindu* that they could not arrange the money for further treatment and returned to Kurukshetra. They consulted another doctor there and the dancer underwent a plastic surgery at a private hospital. The doctor allegedly told her that three nerves in her leg were damaged during the first surgery. "The doctor [K.K. Mishra] never told us about the damaged nerve," Mr. Kumar

Subsequently, at a hospital in Kurukshetra, Ms. Kaur was told that her leg had to be amputated as the infection might spread to her entire body which would be fatal.

The DMC, in their order dated August 21, 2019, observed "Dr. K.K. Mishra did not exercise due diligence in timely detecting the postsurgery infection which might have mitigated the complainant's condition, in spite of the complainant being in regular follow-up with him; the interest of justice will be served if he is suspended for seven days from the State Medical Register of the Delhi Medical Council".

Mr. Kumar said that Ms. Kaur's financial condition has deteriorated over the last two years as the beauty parlour and dance academy which she used to run have come to a standstill. "We just want justice for her. She has been wronged," the cousin

Claims tribunal grants ₹23.92 lakh compensation to amputee

The victim's leg was crushed in a road accident in 2015

A Motor Accident Claims Tribunal has awarded a compensation of ₹23.92 lakh to the driver of a vehicle whose right leg had to be amputated after being crushed in a road accident in 2015.

A commercial vehicle had hit the driver from behind when he along with another driver was trying to fix a broken down vehicle. The driver's leg had got crushed between the two vehicles under the impact of the offending vehicle hit.

The injured driver had demanded a compensation of ₹30 lakh but the presiding officer of the tribunal Amit Bansal fixed it at 23.92 lakh.

The driver and the owner of the offending vehicle opposed the claim petition, submitting that the accident had taken place due to the negligence on the part of the petitioner.

The two vehicles were parked in the middle of the road, and due to their sudden stoppage, the offending vehicle's driver did not get enough time to stop despite applying brakes.

Monthly income

However, the tribunal later decide the matter ex parte as the driver and the owner of the offending vehicle preferred not to defend themselves.

As the petitioner could

not prove his monthly income, the tribunal decided his compensation amount by fixing his income at ₹10,478 per month of a skilled worker in Delhi at the time of the accident.

The tribunal added another ₹4,191, 40% of his fixed income, to his monthly earning as he was below 40 years of age at the time of the mishap. So, his total monthly income was fixed at

Awarding the compensation, Mr. Bansal said that the injured was also entitled to interest at the rate of 9% per annum from the date of filing of the petition till realisation of the compensation

Jewar airport: 47 protesting farmers held

Forty-seven farmers were arrested on Monday while protesting in Jewar demanding a hike in compensation for the land acquired for an airport, officials said.

When the farmers proceeded to lay siege to the Jewar toll plaza around noon. they were arrested as the demonstration could have disrupted the movement of traffic, the officials said.

The arrest comes at a time

when the acquisition of land is under way for the Greenfield International Airport in Gautam Buddh Nagar's Jewar tehsil.

The district administration has acquired more than three-quarters of the land required for the first phase of the airport. "The farmers under the banner of the Jewar Airport Kisan Sangharsh Samiti have been on a sit-in for the past one year. We have demanded four times the circle rate in compensa-

tion and one government job to each family affected by the project," Rakesh Singh, a protesting farmer said.

He said the Sangharsh Samiti had been protesting for it since September 2018 at Dayanatpur village and around 500 farmers on Monday participated in the demonstration.

District police chief Vaibhav Krishna said the farmers were held under the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) Section 151.

2 departmental stores selling beer beyond permissible limit sealed

Rules permit sale of only 15% beer and wine at stores

The Excise Department, headed by Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, sealed at least two departmental shops selling beer and wine in the city. Large-scale raids were carried out in Karol Bagh, Janakpuri, Azadpur, Jahangirpuri, Dwarka, Kailash Colony and Govindpuri.

The Minister visited a departmental store at Keekarwala Chowk where among items being sold, almost 90% of them were beer and wine can be sold at a depart- name of departmental

mental store as per the rules. The Minister directed the officials to seal the shop immediately.

Mr. Sisodia said: "According to law, a departmental store with a particular licence can hold 15% of beer & wine, but it has to have 85% of other inventory. These two 'departmental stores' were defaulting, apart from a few soft drinks and snacks, 80-90% of the stock consisted of wine/beer. This is completely in violation of the law. They were running stores. Delhi has 125 departmental stores which are supposed to own a licence in order to keep 15% of wine/beer. The highest limit of refrigeration allowed in such stores is of 300 litres."

"We have been getting complaints from across Delhi that liquor shops are being run in the name of departmental stores, following which raids are being done across Delhi. Excise Department is raiding shops in different parts of Delhi. Wherever we find any violation. wine. Only 15% beer and wine and beer shops in the immediate action will be ta-

How could Uphaar convict be treated as VVIP, asks HC

He was issued short-validity passport remains unanswered," the

The Delhi High Court has questioned the issuance of F-token to Sushil Ansal, convicted in the 1997 Uphaar cinema fire incident that claimed 59 lives, for getting a short-validity passport, saving how could a convict be treated as a VVIP.

Justice Najmi Waziri made this observation as F-tokens are only issued to very very important persons (VVIP) for issuance of a passport.

"It is argued that on July 22, 2018, a short-validity passport was issued on the basis of an F-token issued to the applicant. The F-token is issued only for VVIP persons. It is a matter of wonder as to how a convict in a multiple culpable homicide case could still be treated or classified as a VVIP to avail priority benefits before the Regional Passport Officer, New Delhi.

Inquiry report

"At whose behest or recommendation, if any, was the said F-token issued to him,

court said after going through an inquiry report filed by the Ministry for External Affairs (MEA) on how Ansal's application in May last year for a passport was moved from pre-verification + to post-verification mode. The court also termed as

"inexplicable" how the preverification status was changed to post-verification and the 'stop' put on his passport application was also cleared, despite two adverse reports sent by Delhi Police to the Regional Pass port Office.

When there was such a clear communication on record from the end of the police, "there was no question of the verification being changed from pre-verification to post-verification because the passport office had full knowledge of the facts of the case", the court said.

Taking note of the submission by the government lawyer, the court listed the matter for further hearing on September 26.

Public fights by BJP cadres pushes RSS to take action

The Centre has written to the Delhi government for a "quick response" on a scheme to set up 16 more fast-track special courts to dispose of the over 10,000 cases of sexual assault against women and children, including rape, pending in special courts in the

The Delhi government, however, is yet to reply to the September 5 letter from the Union Ministry of Law and Justice, according to

The Hindu had earlier this month reported that the Delhi government has not sent suggestions on a nine-month-old proposal from the Central government to set up 16 FTSCs. Delhi Law Minister Kailash



Gahlot had then said that they were taking suggesfrom different departments.

These 16 courts are part of 1,023 FTSCs proposed to lowing Supreme Court directions on the matter.

"For a timely and efficient implementation of the scheme... you are requested to convey your reply to us at the earliest. Your quick response will help us in processing the transfer of funds at an early date," reads the September 5 letter accessed by The Hindu.

The letter also said that initially the scheme will operate for one year, and the total funds required for setting up and functioning of the 16 FTSCs for one year is ₹12 crore, of which ₹7.2 crore (60%) will be borne by the Central government. The Delhi government will have to arrange the rest of the money.

The issue of setting up 16 FTSCs was also raised in a meeting chaired by Lieutenant-Governor Anil Baijal earlier this month, according to an official who attended it.

When the State government approached the Delhi HC on the matter earlier this year, the latter said the pendency of cases was increasing every year and stood at 10,009 cases, as of December 31, 2018.

It also said that the city needs 59 such special courts to dispose of the cases and to begin with, 16 FTSCs be set up in Delhi, followed by more in subsequent phases. There are 16 POSCO courts and 10 FTSCs dealing with sexual offences against children and worespectively men present.

Sources said that the September 5 request is pending with Mr. Gahlot's office.

Green panel seeks report on illegal banquet halls

'Halls running without building plans'

The National Green Tribunal has sought a report from the Delhi Pollution Control Committee on illegal banquets halls in west Delhi, while observing that there is an urgent need to regulate banquet halls in order to curb their adverse impact on environment and public

health. An NGT Bench said, "There is dire need of proper regulation of banquet halls to mitigate the adverse impact on environment and public health. Further steps are required for laying down guidelines and mechanism for assessing the adverse impact and also ensuring proper monitoring

mechanisms.' It was hearing a plea filed

by city resident Deepak Datta who sought remedial action against the operation of illegal banquet halls. The petitioner had claimed that the halls were running without requisite building plans and other approvals. The NGT also took note

of an action-taken report, which said that ₹80 lakh was recovered from 91 defaulting banquet halls in terms of inadequate parking, illegal groundwater extraction and operating without consent.

"There is no material to indicate how the compensation recovered meets the norms of 'polluter pays' principle," the Bench said.

The tribunal directed DPCC Member Secretary to furnish an action-taken report by November 30.





Cong., BJP begin exercise to identify bypoll candidates

By-elections for two Rajasthan Assembly seats scheduled for October 21

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT

The ruling Congress and Opposition BJP in Rajasthan have started the exercise for identifying candidates for by-elections to two Assembly seats - Mandawa and Khinvsar – scheduled for October 21. After facing defeat in the 2019 Lok Sabha election, the bypolls will be a challenge for the Congress, while the BJP pins its hopes on new State president Satish Poonia.

The by-elections were necessitated after the sitting MLAs vacated the seats following their election to Lok Sabha. Mandawa MLA Narendra Khichar won as the BIP MP from Jhunjhunu, while Rashtriya Loktantrik Party MLA from Khinysar. Hanuman Beniwal, won from Nagaur after his regional party entered into an alliance with the BJP and joined the NDA just before general elections.

The candidates' nominations can be filed till September 30 and the date for with-

drawal of candidature will be October 3. After the polling on October 21, the results will be declared on October 24, according to the Election Commission.

Impact on civic polls

The by-elections are important for Congress because of their perceptible impact on the municipal polls due in November this year, for which the rival factions in the party wish to field their favourite candidates with the winning potential. Moreover, the party wants to send across a message of its effective governance even after its

defeat at all the 25 Lok Sabha seats in the State.

For the BJP, the appointment of Mr. Poonia – a Jat leader with strong association with Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh – as the party chief may help at the two Jatdominated seats. The party is yet to make up its mind on entering into alliance with the RLP, though former Chief Minister Vasundhara Raje may not play a major role in the candidates' selection, unlike in the Lok Sabha

Mr. Beniwal said on Monday that the RLP-BJP alliance would contest both the As-

sembly seats and he would like to field his party's candidate in Khinvsar. "We are willing to support the BJP candidate in Mandawa. The final decision will be take at a meeting of office-bearers of both the parties in a couple of days," he said.

The Congress, which has strengthened its position in the State Assembly after the recent merger of six Bahujan Samaj Party MLAs, may give ticket to a member of Nagaur district's influential Mirdha family. The party has lost the Khinvsar seat during the last three successive elections, as Mr. Beniwal won first on the BJP ticket in 2008 and later as an Independent in 2013 and as the RLP candidate in

Mandawa was earlier considered a stronghold of veteran Congress leader Ram Naravan Chaudharv, who died in 2012. His daughter Rita Chaudhary defeated Mr. Khichar in 2008, but the latter emerged victorious as an Independent in 2013 and and as a BIP candidate in 2018.

'Nutrition Mission awareness has surpassed our expectations'

NITI Aayog Member elaborates on goals of programme

September is being observed as 'Poshan Maah' (nutrition month) across the country to ensure mobilisation at the grassroots level to achieve the targets laid down under the 'Poshan Abhivaan' or the National Nutrition Mission (NNM). Launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in 2018, the programme aims to reduce levels of underweight, stunting, low-birth weight as well as anaemia by 2022. Member (Health & Nutrition), NITI Aayog, Vinod K. Paul talks about the journey so far.

It has been nearly 18 months since the launch of Poshan Abhiyaan. How much

ground has been covered so

■ The Poshan Abhiyaan has surpassed our expectations in terms of awareness at the grassroots level. The Jan Andolan [people's movement] is very vibrant, which is important because it is ultimately about behaviour change. Chief Ministers and Ministers have participated in 15-16 events resulting in a high level of political visibility, which augurs well for the programme. Secondly, our clearest focus on the holistic interventions to ensure optimum care in the first 1,000 days has also percolated down well. Then, there is convergence among different Ministries, which is starting to happen. There is also the role of technology through mobile phones and tablets given to anganwadi workers, which is a multipurpose tool effective for behaviour change, education, managing care and collecting data. The Integrated Child Development Scheme-Common Application Software (ICDS-CAS) is the biggest-ever IT-driven public health programme in the

world.

In the remaining phase, our aim is to accelerate these efforts as well as focus on care of small babies, or undernourished babies. These children account for 25%-30% of children in poor households.

What are the main pillars of Poshan Abhiyaan?

■ There is an interplay of three broad themes of which nutrition intake is only 50% of the story. There is low birth weight among newborns due to poor maternal health, which accounts for 25% of the problem: illnesses among children such as diarrhoea are responsible 25%-30% undernutrition.

When we look at undernutrition like this, we look at what needs to be done holistically: maternal health. childhood illnesses and optimum amount of feeding breastfeeding, complimentary feeding and food adequacy. Only 10% of children get adequate nutrition in our country.

There are also socio-cultural determinants which form an outer circle, including maternal literacy, women empowerment, and prevention of child marriage, etc.

Will there be a review from time to time?

National Family Health Survey-5 is currently picking up data. We expect the first set of State-level reports early next year, which will give us early phase trends so that we can learn from them and decide where our action should be focussed and recalibrate our efforts. And next year, which is a year after NFHS-5 data collection, there will be another survey which will tell us where we were in the middle years of NNM.

What is happening with the data being collected through ICDS-CAS?

■ There is data analyses going on. Apart from its reporting within the Ministry of Women and Child Development, it is also presented to the National Nutrition Council. We are also using Artificial Intelligence to map how various cohorts of small children are doing over a period of time, what is the coverage, and why are some districts lagging behind and then making required interventions.

The Maternity Benefit Programme, or the Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana, is also linked to nutritional outcomes of children. How is that performing? Don't you think it is exclusionary in so far as it's only for the first-born?

I would say it is doing reasonably well, knowing that it took a little bit of time last year to take-off. In December 2017, only two lakh beneficiaries had reached, in March 2018 about 22 lakh, and now we are at 98.5 lakh.

Benefiting the mother of the first-born is in the design of the scheme. Every scheme has its finite scope and focus. But we can have discussions [on how to reach + those not covered under the schemel.

Bureaucrat seeks Info Commissioner's removal 'As Vidisha District Collector, he had violated revenue code to transfer pond to private entity'

The Shahdol Commissioner has raked up grave charges against a serving State Information Commissioner, who during a past tenure had purportedly violated the revenue code to transfer a pond, meant for government ownership, to a private entity for a nominal fee "causing heavy loss" to the Madhya Pradesh government.

Although the 12-hectare Mansarovar pond on unoccupied land in Gyaraspur of Vidisha district should have been vested in the government, wrote Shahdol Commissioner R.B. Prajapati to a State-level Principal Secretary, Rajkumar Mathur, the District Collector had parted away the State's rights in 2005 in an "illegal and unauthorised way".

"Therefore, I request you to initiate the removal from the service of Mr. Mathur, now a State Information Commissioner," wrote Mr. Prajapati, even though the district falls under the Bhopal division.

'Delay in inquiry'

Due to the delay in an inquiry and the pendency of the case with the General Administration Department, he wrote, Mr. Mathur acquired the constitutional post for which he was "ineligible on moral and statutory grounds".

according to him," wrote Mr. Prajapati, "the Mansarovar pond was a private land, it should have been vested in the State Government under Section 251 of the Madhya Pradesh Land Revenue Code, 1959. Instead, he gave it up for exchange."

According to the Section, all tanks situated on unoccupied land in the State on or before the date of coming into force of the Act should vest in the State government. The Act abolishes the rights of intermediaries in the area on a tank, which may be used by villages for irrigation.

Moreover, although the pond didn't fulfil the exchange parameters laid down under the revenue book circular, still it was given up under it in an illegal and unauthorised way, he

"The Section is one of the most important ones enacted in public interest," he wrote, "It has the same effect as the Madhya Pradesh Ceiling on Agricultural Holding Act, 1960, under which there is a provision to vest private

land in the State government by declaring it surplus," he

'In cold storage'

Mr. Prajapati claimed he had brought the case to the attention of the GAD and other departments on July 14, 2008, as a consequence of which the Under Secretary to the Government of India (Ministry of Personnel and Training) had directed the State's Chief Secretary to take action. "However, no serious inquiry was undertaken and the case was thrown into the cold storage," wrote Mr. Pra-

Patient left 'unattended' inside MRI machine

Inquiry ordered into allegation

NGT orders action against university run by MP Azam Khan Plea alleges that it was an encroachment on the floodplain of the Kosi and obstructing the passage of the river

The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has directed action against a private university run by Samajwadi Party MP Azam Khan, following a plea which alleged that it was an encroachment on the floodplain of river Kosi.

A Bench headed by NGT Chairperson Justice Adarsh Kumar Goel observed that concerned statutory authorities should take appropriate action as river Kosi is a tributary of the Ganga.

"A report dated August 13,

2019 has been filed by the U.P. Pollution Control Board to the effect that land has been illegally grabbed by the trust and action has been taken, against which appeal is pending before the Divisional Commissioner, Moradabad. FIR has also been registered and process for cancellation of lease has also been taken," the Bench not-

The green panel further added, "in view of the report, we are of the view that action may also need to be taken for encroachment of

the floodplain in accordance with law in view of the fact that Kosi River is contributo-

ry of river Ganga. The concerned statutory authorities may proceed in accordance with law accordingly." The directions came when

the Tribunal was hearing a plea moved by petitioner Shailesh Singh who sought action against illegal construction on the floodplain by the Mohammad Ali Jauhar University. The plea said the construction was obstructing the free passage of the river, resulting in scarcity of water and devastation of the environment.

The FIR reveals that Mr.

Khan, who represents Rampur in Lok Sabha, and his close aide allegedly 'grabbed land' from 26 farmers for the construction of the Mohammed Ali Jauhar University, the plea added.

Joint committee

Earlier, the NGT had directed a joint committee, comprising the U.P. State Pollution Control Board and the Rampur district magistrate, to look into the matter and furnish a report.

The Samajwadi Party has alleged that the allegations

were false and Mr. Khan was being targeted due to political vendetta.

Last week, the Allahabad High Court had dismissed a writ petition challenging the demolition order against Rampur Public School of Azam Khan issued by the Rampur Development Authority for alleged illegal construction.

The court had said the petitioner had the remedy of appeal against the notice before the commissioner concerned.

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

South Korea keen on fresh start in Odisha

Envoy Shin Bong-kil meets Naveen

Putting behind the bitter experience of steel major POSCO's unsuccessful bid to set up a plant in Odisha, South Korea has evinced keen interest in forging a new relationship in investment and business with the State.

South Korean Ambassador Shin Bong-kil, who led a business delegation, met Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik and key functionaries of the industries department here on Monday. "Recognising the

State's potential in natural resources, POSCO had made \$12 billion investment commitment in 2005 to set up a steel plant in the State – it was not only the single largest overseas investment by a South Korean company, but also the single largest foreign investment ever made in India," said Mr. Shin.

'Fast-growing State' Observing that POSCO's mega investment had faced many hurdles, he said: "I understand both sides have learnt from POSCO's experience and now need to make a fresh start. Odisha is a

State growing very fast." The delegation included representatives of Samsung, Hyundai, Kia and LG. Commenting on the slowdown in the automobile sector, the Ambassador said: "I think the phenomenon is temporary. Korean automakers, have been doing very

well in India." Addressing the delegation, Mr. Patnaik said, "We are in the process of promulgating a strategy document, Vision 2030, to ensure that 50% of primary metal produced in the State is value-added within the State."

The Gana Surakhya Party (GSP), launched on Sunday, is expected to challenge the Bodoland People's Front, which has been running the Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC) since its creation in 2003. The BPF is a partner in the BJP-led alliance that rules the State.

The GSP's birth has assumed significance ahead of the election to the 40-seat BTC early next year across the districts of Kokrajhar, Chirang, Baksa and Udalguri, politically polarised between the Bodos and the non-Bodos.

The Bodos are the largest plains tribe in the

30% of the population in the Bodoland Territorial Areas District, administered by the BTC. Nineteen communities, including Muslims, form the non-Bodos. Backed by the non-

Bodos, Mr. Sarania has won in the Lok Sabha election from Kokrajhar twice since 2014. "We had to form the GSP because of the 'atrocities' on the non-Bodos in areas under the BTC and also because no party has cared for them," he said. "We hope to win the BTC election next year... On the BTAD army formed alongside his party, he said: "This is a non-violent army, without guns. It will have 5,000 volunteers in each BTAD district for protecting the lives, property and livelihood of north-eastern region, the non-Bodos."

A man wanted in connection with the 2003 'jihadi conspiracy' case in Gujarat was arrested on Monday morning when he arrived at the city airport from Saudi Arabia, officials said.

The withdrawal of Article 370 was an instrument of change in Jammu and Kashmir, said national working president of Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) J.P. While the Sharad Pawar-led Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) and the Congress have tentatively agreed to contest 125 seats each in the forthcoming Maharashtra Assembly elections, relations between the two continue to be marred by severe distrust.

On Sunday, senior NCP leader Ajit Pawar's announcement that the NCP would be contesting on four of the eight Assembly seats in Pune city, leaving three for the Congress and one for an unnamed 'friendly party' has not gone down well with the leadership of the Pune City Congress.

Mr. Pawar had said that the NCP would contest the Parvati, Khadakwasla, Wadgaonsheri and Hadapsar Asssembly seats while the Shivajinagar, Kasba Peth and Pune Cantonment seats would be contested by the Congress.

"Who is Ajit Pawar to announce this arrangement? We have received no official communication on this from the Maharashtra Pradesh Congress Committee president. How can he [Ajit Pawar] do so unilaterally without consulting us?" said a senior Pune Congress leader, requesting anonymity.

Pune City Congress spokesperson, Ramesh Iyer, said that of the 'friendly parties', neither the Samajwadi Party nor Raju Shetti's Swabhimani Paksha had any toehold in urban Pune city nor had expressed any interest in contesting from here.

"We have strong candidates like Abu Bagul and Sachin Tawre, among others, for the Parvati Assembly seat up for him," said another senior Pune-based Congress leader.

"It was due to Sharad Pawar's intransigence and personal rivalry that led to the defection of senior Congressman Radhakrishna Vikhe-Patil to the BJP. This has resulted in the Congress to lose Ahmednagar. The same was repeated in Shirol (in Kolhapur) where Satyajeet Desh-

mukh [son of veteran Congressman Shivajirao Deshmuk] was compelled to exit the party owing to the NCP's high-handedness. One wonders whether the alliance with them is worth it," he said.

According to a city-based political analyst, ever since Sharad Pawar split the Congress to form the NCP in 1999, the parent party's seat tally has been steadily declining in the State with Mr. Pawar calling the shots.

To make matters worse, both Ashok Chavan, the former MPCC chief, and Balasaheb Thorat, the current president, have proven incapable of firm negotiation with the NCP, causing the Congress in Maharashtra to drift like a rudderless ship.

"MPCC chief Balasaheb Thorat is busy campaigning to preserve his home turf of Sangamner, while other big leaders like Ashok Chavan and Prithviraj Chavan are tied down in their own constituencies in Nanded and Karad respectively. As a result, there is no strong voice at the top to lend expression to a coherent strategy and address problems plaguing the leadership in each district," said a former chief of the Pune Congress unit.

Over 1,000 kg of plastic + waste found at Goa beach

Over 1,000 kg of plastic waste has been found at a beach stretch near Panaji by a team of scientists and students of the Goa-based National Institute of Oceanography (NIO), an official said on Monday.

During a campaign as part of the International Coastal Cleanup Day 2019 last Saturday, the NIO team collected garbage from the Caranzalem beach for two-and-a-half hours and found the area littered with various plastic material.

"The waste collected from around one-km-long stretch of the beach included 1,078 kg of plastic, 486 kg of organic waste including paper and other trash, 720 glass bottles and 125 metal cans," a spokesperson of the NIO said.

The trash consisted of plastics used for food and other packagings, plastic caps, spoons, cups, glasses, straws, pens, bags, toys and decorative items, fishing net pieces and tarpaulin sheets, he said.

"Our addiction to singleuse plastic and lack of its waste management has resulted in a global epidemic of plastic pollution," he said.

The garbage was later handed over to the Corporation of City of Panaji for further processing, he said.

The international coastal cleanup campaign began over 30 years ago, the spokesman said.

"We know plastic has a negative impact and we know where it is coming from. We need to prevent this pollution, and more importantly, cut it off at the source," he added.

The NIO, a constituent laboratory of the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), undertook the drive in association with the National Centre for Coastal Research and the Ministry of Earth Sciences.

Over 130 staff members and students participated in the drive, led by NIO's Director Sunil Kumar Singh and senior scientists Mahua Saha and Rakesh Sharma.



"If HoDs are not permitted to raise the concerns of students, the FTII management could easily steam roll decisions not favourable to the student community," Mr. Majumdar said.

Mr. Sathvin said that representatives of the students' community would be meeting the chairman and other Academic Council members in Mumbai.

"Bhupendra Kainthola, Director FTII, will also be present and we are hoping for a resolution of this issue," Mr. Sathvin told *The Hindu*.

In 2015, the functioning of the institute had been paralysed for four months with students agitating against the Information and Broadcasting (I & B) Ministry's appointment of Gajendra Chauhan, TV actor and BJP member, on grounds that he lacked requisite "creative credentials" to helm a prestigious institute like the FTII.

"Mr. Sibal, please limit your arguments to the question of interim relief only," Justice Ramana observed.

The former legislators, including Pratapgouda Patil and A.H. Vishwanath, had earlier approached the court jointly and separately against their disqualification. The petitions have urged the court to set aside the former Speaker's decision to disqualify them from the Karnataka Legislative Assembly.

MLAs see hope in EC's submission

Demolition begins on Krishna floodplains

Notices sent months ago: CRDA official

Three months after the demolition of 'Praja Vedika,' an unauthorised structure built by the TDP government, the Andhra Pradesh Capital Region Development Authority initiated action on Monday against unauthorised private properties built in the Krishna River's floodplain area, at Undavalli village of Guntur

The drive began with the demolition of the RCC ramp constructed on agriculture land owned by Paturu Koteswara Rao. At least 10 metres of the ramp, supported by pillars, was jutting into the river, an official said. There is also a room with RCC roof adjoining the

Workers engaged by the CRDA wore life jackets while demolishing the structure piece by piece with sledgehammers. "We issued notices months ago," CRDA zonal assistant director T. Narendranath Reddy told The Hindu. "The owners responded, but couldn't provide a valid reason for constructing the ramp. The case was then disposed of, and on Saturday we gave the speaking

"The construction has no

permission and there were no dwellers on the property. We have initiated the demolition in accordance with the instructions given by the higher authorities," Mr. Red-

dy said. The property is close to Aqua Devils Welfare Association Club and Tulasi Gardens on the Karakatta road and not too far from the temporary residence of TDP national president N. Chandrababu Naidu. Mr. Reddy said provisional notices had been issued to owners of l 29 unauthorised structures.

Five cases in HC

According to CRDA, confirmation orders had been issued along with speaking orders for five buildings till date as it found no merit in the grounds mentioned by the owners. The CRDA is examining the explanation submitted by the remaining owners and five of the cases are before the High Court.

Former Chief Minister and TDP national president N. Chandrababu Naidu is residing temporarily in one of the structures owned by industrialist Lingamaneni Ramesh. On September 20, a fresh notice was served on Mr. Ramesh asking him to remove the structure within

The TDB is planning to obtain patent for the unique and sought-after prasadams like 'Ambalapuzha palpayasam' and 'Kottarakkara unniyappam'and 'aravana', offered at the famous shrines managed by it. Obtaining the patent would bar others from naming or selling the prasadams under the same

If things go as per plan, 'aravana', the jaggery dessert offered at the Sabarimala Lord Ayyappa Temple, 'unniyappam', the sweet ball prepared at Kottarakkara Ganapathy Temple and 'palpayasam' and milk porridge at Ambalappuzha Sree Krishna shrine will get patent rights under the Geographical Indications of Goods (Registration and Protection) Act.

All these prasadams are known for their unique taste and preparation.

A top TDB official said the move was to check the sale of counterfeit versions by hawkers.

"Several instances of the sale of fake products under the pretext of famous temple prasadams have come to our notice.

"We have taken legal steps against those behind the cheating. In view of that, we have taken the decision to apply to get patent for our unique prasadams," TDB president A. Padmakumar said.

Vembanad model to track CRZ violations +

NCESS team used digital images to map changes

косні The Vembanad model of identifying changes in the coastal belt could be emulated to track illegal structures along the Kerala coast.

It was while considering an affidavit by Chief Secretary Tom Jose on Monday that the Supreme Court orally hinted at the need to conduct a survey of the Kerala coast to identify the number of illegal buildings.

It took just a fortnight for geoscientists in 2013 to identify the major changes in the 100 metre Coastal Regulation Zone (CRZ), which could be probable CRZ violations, along the banks of Vembanad covering Kochi, Kottayam, and Alapuzha districts, said K.V. Thomas, former head of the Coastal Process Group of the Nation-

al Centre for Earth Science Studies (NCESS), Thiruvananthapuram, who led the programme.

The Vembanad model could be tried out along the entire Kerala coast, he said.

The changes and modifications on land due to reclamations, filling of filtration ponds, clearance of mangroves, and construction of buildings between 2003 and 2011 in the stretch north of the Thanneermukkom bund and south of Periyar south of Kodungallur were assessed

using satellite images downloaded from Google and World View images.

The assessment, which was initiated after an order from the Supreme Court in 2013, succeeded in identifying nearly 5,000 suspected

violations, he said. The changes were listed as new buildings in the CRZ, reclamations with new buildings in CRZ, reclamations with no new building in CRZ, and structures other than reclamations and buildings,

namely boat jetties and

bridges, in the CRZ area. The data thus generated was shared with all local bodies along the banks of the lake. Details like the year in

which the changes/modification were initiated and lati tude and longitude of the locations were also provided. A detailed list of changes in the CRZ area of the Kochi Corporation and the Maradu municipality were provided in a tabular form.

The local bodies were required to do the field verification to ascertain whether the modifications were in violation of the CRZ, explained Dr. Thomas.

Though the data, which was then called 'land use modifications', were handed over to all local bodies, including Maradu municipality and Kochi Corporation, the purpose of the programme was defeated by not physically verifying it, said K.K. Ramachandran, former member Secretary of the Kerala Coastal Zone Management Authority.

Survey of dragonflies hints at impact of floods

Alarming fall in odonate population in Kerala

A survey of dragonflies and damselflies held in the Silent Valley National Park (SVNP) has discovered eight new species, but reported an alarming decrease in the odonate population, raising concerns over the ecological impact of the successive

floods in the State. The three-day survey, conducted last week jointly by the Silent Valley National Park and the Society for Odonate Studies, showed that several dragonfly species, including the Global Wanderer (Pantala flavescens), were missing from the national

park. V. Balachandran, secretary of the Indian Dragonfly Society, said that the aberrant rain pattern and the successive floods in the State could have decimated the population of dragonflies and damselflies in the SVNP.

"Odonates spend much of their lifetime as eggs and larvae under water. The floods could have washed them off. We need to conduct more studies in other parts of the

State to get a clearer picture," said Mr. Balachandran.

However, eight new odonate species were found in the survey held in 11 camps across the buffer and core areas of the national park.

"Our study teams came up with 75 species of dragonflies and damselflies, taking the total number of odonate species in the Silent Valley to 91," said Silent Valley Wildlife Warden Samuel Vanlalngheta Pachuau. The new species found in

the survey includes the Hemicordulia asiatica (Asian Emerald), which was reported from the Periyar Tiger Reserve in 2017. This rare dragonfly had gone unreported for over 80 years, and this was its second sighting from any protected forest in the State.

Macrogomphus wynadiccus (Wayanad Bowtail), Onychogomphus nilgiriensis (Nilgiri Clawtail), Epithemis mariae (Rubytailed Hawklet), Palpopleura sexmaculata (Blue-Tailed Yellow Skimmer) and Neurothemis intermedia (Paddy Field Parasol) were the other interesting finds among dragon-

Agrocnemis splendidissima (Splendid Dartlet), Lestes (Scalloped dorothea

Spreadwing), Onychargia atrocyana (Black Marsh Dart), Phylloneura westermani (Myristica Bambootail), Euphea disper (Nilgiri Torrent Dart) and Protostica gravely (Pied Reedtail) were some of the decorated findings among damselflies.

Biological indicators

Mr. Pachuau said odonates were great biological indicators and studies on them would provide crucial information on the health of aquatic habitats and variations occurring in the climate. Odonates are good pest controllers, too.

"Regular monitoring over a long period will help us assess the changes in our natural landscape. The Silent Vallev National Park aspires to be the front runner in such initiatives," said Mr. Pachuau.

Giant earthworm found at the foot of Western Ghats

Measuring 3 ft 5 cm, it was discovered by farmworkers

Farmworkers in the land belonging to Gopalakrishna Katta in Kollamogaru village, near Kukke Subrahmanya in Karnataka, were aback when they saw a "snake-like creature" while removing soil for roadwork in January. Assuming it was a snake, they rushed to the landowner's house to inform him.

But little did the workers realise that they had found a giant earthworm, measuring 3 feet and 5 cm, which has not been reported in the Western Ghats and the coastal belt of Karnataka so far. It was the landowner's son, Nishant Katta, a postgrad-

High drama as ABVP attempts to storm Jadavpur University

Police prevent clash with Left supporters

A confrontation was averted at Kolkata's Jadavpur University on Monday as police prevented supporters of the Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad (ABVP) and students' wings of the Left parties from coming face to

ABVP supporters took out a procession in protest against the incident on September 19 when Union Minister for State Babul Suprivo was heckled at the University.

The procession of a few hundred ABVP members started from Golpark in south Kolkata but was stopped at Jodhpur Park near the University campus.

Police personnel who were deployed in large numbers since the morning had put up barricades and prevented the ABVP members

'Use of force'

Meanwhile, Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee broke her silence on the incident and accused the BJP of forcible entry into the University. "You are all witnessing what is happening at Jadavpur University. They are using force everywhere," the Chief Minister said while participating in an event in Kolkata.

The State government-run University had on September 19 witnessed a violent standoff between a section of students and Union Minister Babul Supriyo that continued for five hours and had ended at the intervention of Governor Jagdeep Dhankar.

In a related development, fashion designer-turned-BJP member Agnimitra Paul met the Governor on Monday and also lodged a police complaint against a student for making "objectionable" statements against her on so-

Justice Bhat who put CJI under RTI is now SC judge

He had declared Chief Justice of India as a public authority

Among the four sworn in as Supreme Court judges by Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi on Monday is Justice S. Ravindra Bhat, who, exactly 10 years ago as a Delhi High Court judge, dismissed a Supreme Court appeal and declared the Office of the Chief Justice of India subservient to the Right to Information regime.

Justice Bhat, along with Justices V. Ramasubramanian, Krishna Murari and Hrishikesh Roy are the first to be sworn in after the judicial strength of the Supreme Court was increased from 31

'Public authority'

But for Justice Bhat being part of history is nothing new. In September 2009, as a Single Judge Bench, he declared the Chief Justice of India a "public authority" under the Right to Information (RTI) Act.



Rejecting an appeal, the first of its kind, by the Central Public Information Officer of the Supreme Court, he held the CJI's office has a duty to disclose the details of personal assets of other apex court judges.

"All power - judicial power being no exception - is held accountable in a modern Constitution. Holders of power too are expected to live by the standards they set, interpret, or enforce, at least to the extent their office demands," Justice Bhat had told the Supreme Court in his 72-page judgment of

The judgment said there was "no clue" that the RTI Act exempted the CJI from its ambit. In fact, it does not even spare the President of India. Besides, Justice Bhat wrote that a "judge's independence, paradoxically imposes duties on him."

The judgment said that a judge whose decisions could impact peoples' lives, property, liberties, individual freedoms as well as interpret duties and limitations placed upon state and nonstate agencies has an obligation to disclose his or her personal assets to someone or an authority.

The ruling was on an RTI request made by activist Subhash Chandra Agarwal in the Supreme Court for the complete correspondence between the Collegium and the government on the appointments of Justices H.L. Dattu, A.K. Ganguly and R.M. Lodha.

'J&K situation not normal, but peaceful'

Police chief says youth are being picked up, counselled and handed back to families

Director-General of Police, Jammu and Kashmir, Dilbag Singh has said there has been 3,000 cases of young men being picked up and released subsequently in the Kashmir Valley since August 5.

In an interview to The Hindu, Mr. Singh said the police's intention was not to cause any harm to the youth in the long term and preventive detentions were a temporary kind of arrangement for the maintenance of law and order.

He said "the situation was not normal but peaceful" as there were no restrictions in place anywhere in the State. "People were cooperative as they had understood that violence doesn't pay."

The DGP said there was no definite timeframe for the release of political leaders or

restoration of mobile phone and Internet services in the

"Detentions are a dynamic process. There are certain areas where youth come and throw stones. Our purpose is to not cause any harm to them... they are subsequently counselled and handed back to their families," Mr. Singh said.

He said some 200 people

were retained in jails as they were repeat offenders and multiple cases were registered against them. "There are cases where an

entire village would come and give assurance for a boy. A small kid cannot understand the consequences of his acts. But there are repeat offenders, you counsel them but they do not correct themselves. We cannot allow people to commit crime... but now even that number is going down. More and more people are released. Very few are in detention," he said. Mr. Singh said the police and security forces were exercising restraint and "pellet guns were used in almost zero


cases". "Earlier pellet gun injuries used to be in hundreds. This time only two such incidents have been reported. Look at the kind of pressure we are

working under... as many as 90 security force personnel have been injured, some got stitches, a few have fractured limbs ... but we are using minimum force," he said.

He said the number of people lodged in jails outside the State was not more than 200 and they were shifted due to acute pressure and lack of space in jails here. Those arrested also include Iammu and Kashmir High Court Bar Association president Mian Qayoom. Regarding Mr. Qayoom's arrest, the DGP said, "The

Bar president is very well known for his past records resulting in certain activities that are prejudicial to maintenance of peace and order-...They aligned with the Hurrivat in the past and participated in activities not very conducive to mainte-

nance of peace and order."

Texan outreach

Though both leaders gained from the Houston rally, it was not diplomacy at its best

The Houston gathering of the Indian diaspora in the U.S. on Sunday addressed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and U.S. President Donald Trump was a resounding success in meeting its stated and implied objectives. Mr. Modi has drafted Indian diaspora communities in several countries for advancing his strategic objectives. The diaspora in the U.S. is of pre-eminent significance given its increasing political heft and the centrality of the U.S. in India's strategic architecture. Mr. Trump's appearance at the rally and his effusive support for India were a reflection of the community's influence in U.S. politics. He named fighting "radical Islamic terrorism" as a key common interest of the two countries, spurring a standing ovation by the audience, including Mr. Modi. Mr. Trump also emphasised border security, a controversial topic in both democracies. Mr. Modi presented the ending of autonomy for Jammu and Kashmir to the cheering crowd as a significant achievement of this government. The rally galvanised the diaspora in support for Mr. Modi's politics in India, and enticed Mr. Trump.

The rally's unintended outcomes could be more complex. The massive movement of people across national borders has created diasporas that, in turn, have created new political forces. This is a particularly sensitive component of global politics. Its enthusiasm for India notwithstanding, aspirations of the diaspora and the priorities of India don't necessarily converge. Drawing its members too deep into India's domestic politics, and India's involvement in their politics, are both fraught with risks. Mr. Modi nearly endorsed Mr. Trump's re-election bid, and the jamboree was unprecedented for the divisions it created among the diaspora. Civil rights groups and groups of Kashmiris, Dalits and Muslims, who have been critical of Mr. Trump, also called out the Modi government for its policies. Democrats by and large took a dim view of the event, and the audience and Mr. Modi greeted Majority Leader in the House of Representatives Steny Hoyer's reminder that India drew on its strength of Nehruvian secularism with stony silence. Mr. Trump's implied endorsement of Mr. Modi's Kashmir policy was music to the ears of those in the audience, but the underlying principle of his America First nationalism that it has no role to play globally other than protecting its own interests could lead to outcomes not to India's liking. The absence of four of the five Indian-American members of the U.S. Congress – all Democrats – at the gathering was also noteworthy. The transposition of India-Pakistan rivalry into a contest between the two diasporas is also unpleasant. Despite what Houston achieved for the two leaders, a line may have been crossed in the mixing of partisan national politics with international diplomacy.

Credibility deficit

The Justice Kureshi episode raises fresh questions about the Collegium's role

n modifying its recommendation concerning Justice A.A. Kureshi, the Supreme Court Collegium appears Leto have succumbed to pressure from the Union government. Modifying its resolution of May 10 that the senior judge be appointed Chief Justice of the Madhya Pradesh High Court, the Collegium has now decided to send him to the Tripura High Court. It was quite apparent that the Centre was averse to the elevation of Justice Kureshi, who is from the Gujarat High Court, but serving in the Bombay High Court on transfer. The government did not act on the recommendation for months, raising the suspicion that it was blocking his appointment. The Collegium modified its decision after considering letters from the Department of Justice on August 23 and 27, and "accompanying material". It is not known if the controversy has ended. It is possible that the Collegium and the Centre have arrived at a compromise under which the government drops its opposition to his appointment as Chief Justice on the condition that he is sent to a smaller high court. However, until his appointment as head of the Tripura High Court is notified, there will be a lurking doubt on whether the latest resolution is in line with the Centre's approval. Under the current procedure, the Collegium may reconsider a recommendation, but the government is bound to implement a decision that is reiterated.

It is quite acceptable if the Collegium and the government resolve their differences through consultation and correspondence, but the final decision should not be opaque, mysterious and indicative of executive pressure. It is common to charge the Collegium with lack of transparency, but in this case, the government is equally guilty. If the Law Ministry had a bona-fide objection to Justice Kureshi, it could have disclosed its opinion on his suitability. The failure to do so has the inevitable consequence of the public imagination concluding that the ruling party is blocking his elevation because of judicial orders he had passed while serving in Gujarat. As for the Collegium, it is unclear why it could not have disclosed what the government had wanted in its communications. This episode makes a dent in the prevailing narrative that the Collegium system is a shield against executive interference in judicial appointments. The time may have come for the two sides to come up with fresh clauses in the existing procedure of appointments under which the Collegium's decisions are implemented within a time-frame, and the government's objections and reservations, if any, are made public. Only then can the credibility deficit be bridged. But, even so, what is indisputable is that the Collegium system is deeply flawed, and is in need of urgent remedy.

Making the grand Indian PSB mergers work

Only a visionary leadership can bring the efficiency parameters of the merged entities in line with those of private banks

The initial enthusiasm of market analysts to the bank merger announcement is giving way to wariness and scepticism. There is a feeling that the potential benefits would take several years to show up and, meanwhile, the turbulence in the banks could take a toll on the real economy.

The merger move demonstrates once again the lackadaisical approach of policy planners in implementing sensible banking reforms in Public Sector Banks (PSBs), first mooted by the Narasimham Committee more than a quarter century ago. While the committee had cautioned against merging weak banks, the government has ended doing precisely that. The consolidation should have been a gradual and calibrated exercise resulting in a smaller number of well-capitalised and professionally managed PSBs with a sound governance structure. Instead, what has come is a shotgun 'reform' decision at a time when PSBs are in deep malaise.

A key concern about merging the ten PSBs into four in one stroke is a lack of clear articulation of the rationale behind bringing disparate and weak banks together, some of whom were still under the Reserve Bank of India's Prompt Corrective Action (PCA). Further, such merger announcements generally trigger confusion, anxiety and insecurity in staff, leading to a slowdown in business. When decades-old brands are sud-

denly obliterated, there is widespread dismay. Poor communication within PSBs exacerbates the challenges. The smooth manner in which SBI merged five of its associate banks (ABs) in 2017 is not a relevant example in this regard. SBI had managed the ABs over the years with its own senior team, and all associates had already been functioning on common technology platform. In fact, left to its own, SBI would have preferred a gradual acquisition. The merger was forced upon it in the worst year of its history.

Reversing decline in returns

The efficiency gains from the mergers for large PSBs would be largely illusory in the absence of a sound management with a vision for the future. The post-merger scale economies that large international banks seek to achieve with ruthless measures are not feasible in India. Our objective should be to create bigger PSBs that can mirror the efficiency parameters of leading private sector banks here. The chief goal should be to reverse the decline in the PSBs' Return on Equity (RoE) after investing considerable sums in bringing them on a common technology platform, and introducing better risk management measures. The merged entities should become agile and capable of meeting the challenges in retail and mass market segments from private players and open banking sources.

To smoothen the merger process, six measures may be worth considering. First, it needs to be ensured that there is no leadership vacuum in the anchor banks. Mergers require strong skills in thought leadership, results leadership and people leadership. The technical skills needed for integration planning, transforming business support functions and value build-up have to be cultivated. There is a strong need to revamp Human Resources (HR) practices and culturally integrate the expanded workforce through sustained training initiatives.

in the near term. There is a decelerating trend in loan approvals by PSBs, as brought out in the last RBI report on Trend and Progress of Banking. More risk aversion on the part of bankers, coupled with their internal preoccupations, could further slacken credit growth. Loan melas and directed lending measures would not be the ideal solution. Instead Non-Banking Financial Institutions (NBFCs), which have a better understanding of the market needs, need to be tapped to ensure better credit flow. In terms of size, NBFCs are about 15% of the combined balance sheet of all banks. They should be enabled to step in more actively to fill the gap in funding Small and Medium-sized Enterprises, which are facing real issues as regards credit availability.

Here, it may be good to consider expanding the scope of the partial credit guarantee scheme announced in this year's budget to cover all NBFCs treated as Asset Finance Companies, instead of restricting it to the top-tier NBFCs, which any way have access to multiple sources. The proposed sixmonth guarantee could also be raised to two years to build a sustained momentum.

Further, the Credit Guarantee Fund Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises managed by SIDBI may be revamped to assist more NBFCs. Drawings by NBFCs constitute just 7% of the disbursements made so far, and smaller firms are not even aware of this option.

Ownership tangles

Fifth, the government should resolve the tangles in the ownership of the merging PSBs in insurance, asset management and other ventures. Some ventures involve foreign partners, and some are market-listed. The anchor banks should be free to take the best course that would optimise the value of such investments.

Lastly, the government should consider converting a few 'weak' PSBs outside the merger into regional banks. This was one of the recommendations of the Narasimham Committee. Banks such as Bank of Maharashtra and Punjab and Sind Bank that have spread manpower, network, and resources thin could be turned into vibrant regional institutions to serve agriculture, trade and commerce.

While such consolidation can result in handsome productivity gains, what matters is the quality of execution by a stable and committed leadership, aided by a shrewd and benign ownership.

Climate justice through judicial diktat

The Supreme Court has erred in the Maradu case by placing the liability squarely on the apartment owners

Supreme Court order for demolishing a set of apartments in Maradu, a suburb in Ernakulam, has caused a legal and political crisis. The deadline for demolishing the four backwaapartments ended last Friday. However, the 350-odd families residing there have refused to move.

On September 11, while the rest of Kerala gorged the quintessential Onam sadhya, residents of these four complexes were on a hunger strike at the Maradu Municipality office. They have now gained wider support with all major political parties, including the Congress, the Communist Party of India-Marxist (CPI-M) and the Bharativa Ianata Party (BJP) opposing the demolition. After dithering initially, Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan has stated that his government will pursue all options to protect the

residents. In 2006, the Maradu panchayat had granted building permissions for constructing the apartments. However, after a directive from the local self-government department, the panchayat issued a show-cause notice to the builders

for violating Coastal Regulatory Zone (CRZ) rules. The builders got a stay order from the Kerala High Court in 2007 which allowed them to continue construction. The High Court ruled in favour of the builders stating that they can't be held responsible for the failure of local authorities to comply with statutory provisions.

After a Division Bench upheld this verdict, the Kerala State Coastal Zone Management Authority (KCZMA) approached the Suthree-member panel to examine whether the buildings violated CRZ norms. Based on the panel's report that the buildings fell within CRZ-III, the Supreme Court on May 8 ordered the demolition of the apartments. After dismissing the review petitions, the apex court on September 6 ordered the demolition to be completed by September 20.

On Monday, during a suo motu hearing on the lack of action on the part of the State in carrying out its order, the apex court pulled up the Kerala Chief Secretary, accusing the State authorities of "playing with nature".

Blind spots and concerns

The case raises multiple concerns regarding environmental governance and adjudication. Even the key question of whether the apartments fall within CRZ-III, which would prohibit construction with-

in 200 metres from the High Tide is unsettled. The three-member panel appointed by the Supreme Court stated that as per the CRZ notification of 1991 and the Kerala Coastal Zone Management Plan, 1996, the area in question came under CRZ-III. Maradu became a municipality in 2010 and consequently, the 2011 CRZ notification categorised it under CRZ-II, though the Union Environment Ministry approved this only in February 2019.

The Court held that since at the time of construction, the area fell within CRZ-III, these were unauthorised constructions. The Court adopted a narrow view by merely examining the bureaucratic categorisation and ignored that the construction was based on permission granted by the local government and orders of the High Court. While the Kerala High Court held that permit holders shouldn't be made liable for the regulatory oversight of local authorities, the Supreme Court did not address this question.

The process of adjudication through a three-member committee also raises questions since it further delegated the task to another technical committee, which the residents allege, did not give them a fair hearing.

This case reveals the court's massive blind spot: the real-world implications of its verdict. The order cryptically states "let all the within a period of one month from today" without clearly stating who should undertake the demolition.

Alarmingly, the court is silent on the fate of the owners and residents of the apartments. Unlike most judgments on evictions, the court does not pronounce on the question of rehabilitation or compensation for those who would lose their homes.

A technocratic approach

While the demolition is ostensibly for protecting the environment, the Supreme Court order doesn't sufficiently explain how the constructions in question damage the environment. Instead of a jurisprudence on environmental justice, it adopted technocratic proceduralism for arriving at its verdict. Ironically, more serious environmental damage is likely to be caused by the demolition of the apartments. A report by IIT-Madras has highlighted that air pollution caused by the demolition would pose severe health hazards to those residing nearby, besides the long-term environmental costs of the debris generated. Fearing the "collateral damage" of the demolition, a person residing close to the apartments has filed a petition in the Supreme Court opposing the unplanned implosion/explosion of the buildings

The case highlights the pathologies of executive and judicial deciurban development in India. While State authorities and courts were complicit in allowing the buildings to be constructed in the first place, liability is now being placed squarely on the apartment owners. In some regards, it is a continuation of the jurisprudence based on court-appointed committees rather than hearing affected parties that resulted, especially in Delhi, in the demolition of numerous "illegal slums". This logic has now come back to bite the middle class. For environmental justice, what we need is a strong environmental governance system that enables all stakeholders to prevent violations instead of the court becoming India's new demolition man.

The importance of listening well

A very instructive passage on the difference in norms of debate among ancient Indian scholars, on the one hand, and kings and their subjects, on the other is found in the ancient text, Milinda-pañha. It records an exchange between the Indo-Greek king Milinda (Menander) and the Buddhist monk Nāgasena.

When the king fails to understand a point made by Nāgasena, he asks, "Will you discuss with me again?"

Nāgasena says: "If your Majesty will discuss as a scholar (pan d i)ta yes; but if you discuss as a king, no." "How do scholars discuss?"

"When scholars talk a matter over with each other, there is a winding up, an unravelling; distinctions are made and counter-distinctions; one or other is convinced of error, and then acknowledges his mistake; and yet thereby they are not angered. Thus, do scholars, O king, discuss."

"And how do kings discuss?" "When a king, your Majesty, discusses a matter, and he advances a point, if anyone differs from him on that point, he is apt to fine him saying: 'Inflict such and such a punishment upon that fellow!' Thus, Your Majesty, do kings discuss."

Debates in ancient India, the text seems to say, were tranquil, stressfree events in which participants did not hesitate to change their opinions where necessary, a far cry from royal (political) discussions in which disagreement with political rulers was frequently fraught with danger and winning a debate was almost, and sometimes literally, a matter of life and

ror. Public arguments are meant to compel citizens to openly acknowledge when proven wrong and force governments to admit their mistakes and change policies. But is any of this possible without proper listening? It is said that it is the privilege of powerful people to speak and the lot of the powerless to listen. The beauty of democracy is that it obliges the powerful to listen.

Of course, even democratic governments do not always listen to their electors. But as soon as their legitimacy dips below a certain threshold, as soon as their habit of turning a deaf ear to their people threatens their survival, they seem instinctively to know that it is absolutely crucial to start listening.

Something akin to this appears to have recently taken place in India. A month ago, the current government appeared not to be listening to anyone. And although it is arguable that only a few top corporates were eventually heard, it is equally true that after months of silence on the pleadings of the 'people' to do something about the economic slowdown, the government finally listened to someone. Can we not now take this as an opportunity to demand an extension of this courtesy to others? To the farmers, or the poor more generally? To, say, teachers, scholars, dancers, musicians, painters, town-planners on education and cultural policy? To Kashmiris, Dalits and the minorities? Should not the government listen to those who dissent from their policies?

It is pretty obvious to me that the answer to these questions must be in the affirmative. Good governments make a habit of listening to citizens. Indeed, in democracies, those temporarily in power need to develop

further presupposes that others have much to teach us, especially those who, in important aspects, are diffe-Such good listening is especially

on one side alone. Good listening

needed in times of deep disagreement when we forget that there are as many views as there are people and delude ourselves into believing that the world is divided in two: us and them. We believe that only two views exist, and the one held by us is correct. This particularly crude form of binary thinking exacerbates conflicts, and deepens polarisation. A polarised world contains prefect conditions for people to stop listening to each other. It is precisely at such times that we need encouragement to start listening, so that we can broaden the horizon of our experience, to break the horrible habit of dismissing differences. Listening helps reveal hidden commonalities that bolster cooperation. It dispels mistaken assumptions. It brings greater acceptance. In such deeply divided times, should it not be the duty of democratic governments to encourage people to de-escalate bitterness and discord and begin listening to one another?

Listening to many The government has made a good beginning by listening to a few. Since good democratic governments strive to be inclusive, to win the trust of all, they must listen to the many, become *bahushruta*. Deliberative democrats often emphasise the importance of good arguments and wish the best argument to determine its decisions. But can we ever know 'the best argument' if we haven't listened to all of them? Unless we ensure that, as far as possible, all points of view have indeed been taken into account? This inclusion is impossible without listening to voices that may have been repressed before, voices of the powerless and the vulnerable.

A continuing conversation between governments and citizens and among citizens themselves is crucial in a democracy. But good conversations presuppose good habits of listening. Governments must take seriously their duty to be not only sushruta, but bahushruta. Citizens too must take more responsibility for cultivating these public virtues.

Inequality is a concept that underpins most interventions focussed on social justice and development. It resembles the mythological serpent Hydra in Greek mythology – as the state attempts to deal with one aspect of inequality, many new aspects keep coming up.

In recent times, several government and private sector services have become digital. Some of them are only available online. This leads to a new kind of inequality, digital inequality, where social and economic backwardness is exacerbated due to information poverty, lack of infrastructure, and lack of digital literacy. According to the Deloitte report, 'Digital India: Unlocking the Trillion Dollar Opportunity', in mid-2016, digital literacy in India was less than 10%. We are moving to a global economy where knowledge of digital processes will transform the way in which people work, collaborate, consume information, and entertain themselves. This has been acknowledged in the Sustainable Development Goals as well as by the Indian government and has led to the Digital India mission. Offering services online has cost and efficiency benefits for the government and also allows citizens to bypass lower-level government bureaucracy. However, in the absence of Internet access and digital literacy enabling that access, there will be further exclusion of large parts of the population, exacerbating the already existing digital divide.

Moving governance and service delivery online without the requisite progress in Internet access and digital literacy also does not make economic sense. For instance, Common Service Centres, which operate in rural and remote locations, are physical facilities which help in delivering digital government services and informing communities about government initiatives. While the state may be saving resources by moving services online, it also has to spend resources since a large chunk of citizens cannot access these services. The government has acknowledged this and has initiated certain mea-

sures in this regard. The Bharat Net programme, aiming to have an optical fibre network in all gram panchayats, is to act as the infrastructural backbone for having Internet access all across the country. However, the project has consistently missed all its deadlines while the costs involved have doubled. Similarly, the National Digital Literacy Mission has barely touched 1.67% of the population and has been struggling for funds. This is particularly worrying because Internet access and digital literacy are dependent on each other, and creation of digital infrastructure must go hand in hand with the creation of digital skills.

The importance of digital literacy

Internet access and digital literacy have implications beyond access to government services. Digital literacy allows people to access information and services, collaborate, and navigate socio-cultural networks. In fact, the definition of literacy today must include the ability to access and act upon resources and information found online. While the Kerala High Court judgment acknowledges the role of the right to access Internet in accessing other fundamental rights, it is imperative that the right to Internet access and digital literacy be recognised as a right in itself. In this framework the state would have (i) a positive obligation to create infrastructure for a minimum standard and quality of Internet access as well as capacity-building measures which would allow all citizens to be digitally literate and (ii) a negative obligation prohibiting it from engaging in conduct that impedes, obstructs or violates such a right. Recognising the right to internet access and digital literacy will also make it easier to demand accountability from the state, as well as encourage the legislature and the executive to take a more proactive role in furthering this right. The courts have always interpreted Article 21 as a broad spectrum of rights considered incidental and/or integral to the right to life.

A right to Internet access would also further provisions given under Articles 38(2) and 39 of the Constitution. It has now become settled judicial practice to read fundamental rights along with directive principles with a view to defining the scope and ambit of the former. We are living in an 'information society'. Unequal access to the Internet creates and reproduces socio-economic exclusions. It is important to recognise the right to Internet access and digital literacy to alleviate this situation, and allow citizens increased access to information, services, and the creation of better livelihood opportunities.

Why seek Western validation?

For many Western film critics, Indian cinema is often synonymous with Hindi cinema

Recently, The Guardian released its list of 100 best films of the 21st century. The only Indian (read Hindi) film in the list is Anurag Kashyap's *Gangs* of Wasseypur. This mention attracted considerable attention in the Indian media. While some sections of the media praised the film, a few wondered if it is really that good.

Individual preferences

It should be noted that most lists are arbitrary and often reflect the preferences of the individuals who prepare them. We concur with some choices and disagree with others. But the veneration of the

film because of its mention in the list points to a larger, deep-seated malaise in India: the need for Western validation.

There is also another problem with such lists. It is that for many

Western film critics, Indian cinema doesn't exist beyond Hindi cinema. Hindi cinema has a wider reach, clout and visibility. Hindi mainstream actors also have a pan-Indian presence. Some of them regularly act in non-Hindi films. Hindi cinema is also widely written about in popular media and academia. Other film cultures and industries in India do not enjoy this exposure. And so, in the larger Western imagination, Hindi cinema is synonymous with Indian cinema or representative of it. I wonder if parts of the West even know about the other film cultures that thrive in India and the brilliant films that have been made in non-Hindi film industries of India, which are as good as, if not better than, Gangs of

This is not to say that Gangs of Wasseypur is not a good film. It is not a mainstream Bollywood film. Kashyap decentres the gangster-mafia conversation beyond Mumbai and throws us into a world of characters who don't look, feel, or talk like their counterparts in other Hindi mafiagangster films. I would say that Kashyap retains many formulaic Bollywood conventions of the genre with

his use of music, violence, sex, and a love story, but situates these conventions in a milieu that is foreign to mainstream Hindi cinema audiences. He uses local sounds, actors and dialects. The lead characters are as vulnerable as their opponents. There are no hero characters in the film. He also exposes the unholy nexus between politics and unorganised crime and highlights issues of caste. Kashyap renders formula in a non-formulaic way. The first part of Gangs of *Wasseypur* is captivating indeed, but the second part falters in some ways.

Other contenders


Having said that, is it really the best Indian film of the 21st century? I don't think so. For that spot, there are many contenders from non-Hindi film cultures of India. Lijo Jose Pellissery's Malayalam crime drama, Angamaly Diaries, is a re-

markable film. It shows

how local youth are drawn to crime and eventually form a gang. It is also a commentary on the aspirations and needs of a social class. Rajeev Ravi's Kammatipaadam explores similar territory. Vetrimaaran's films in Tamil are no less. Karthik Subbaraj made Jigarthanda, an ode to gangsters. Ameer Sultan's Paruthiveeran gave me the chills. What about Gurvinder Singh's Punjabi films Anhe Ghore Da Daan and the intensely lyrical *Chauthi Koot*? Raam Reddy made the genre-bending Kannada film, Thithi. In Marathi, Nagraj Manjule made Fandry, Chaitanya Tamhane made Court, Avinash Arun made Killa. Even within the Hindi film fold, Nandita Das debuted with a searing commentary on the 2002 Gujarat riots, Firaaq. There are others like Masaan and Newton with inventive storytelling. Rajat Kapoor made the perplexing Ankhon Dekhi which deserved more discussion.

These show that we ought to celebrate and recognise India's best cinema for reasons that are entirely our own, not because some of these films are appreciated by the West.





The Shiv Sena, along with the Shiromani Akali Dal in Punjab, is one of the oldest alliances of the BJP. The Sena had, under its founder, Balasaheb Thackeray, held the position of "big brother" in the alliance in Maharashtra. and it had fought the larger number of the seats of the two parties in the Assembly elections since 1995.

The scene changed after

The Supreme Court on Monday issued a general repri-"interfeagainst in iudicial appointments and transfers, saying such intrusions did not "augur well" for the The admonishment from

a Bench led by Chief Justice of India (CJI) Ranjan Gogoi came in a petition filed by the Gujarat High Court Advocates Association regarding a proposed appointment of Justice A.A. Kureshi.

The CJI recorded in an order that matters of judicial appointments, postings and transfers went to the "root of the administration of justice". Judicial review was limited, says the order. "Interference affects the system of administration of justice and, therefore, does not augur well for the institution," the CJI dictated the

The Supreme Court Collegium has come under intense public criticism with its September 5 recommendation to modify its May 10, 2019 proposal to transfer Justice Kureshi to the Madhva Pradesh High Court as Chief Justice and instead shift him to the Tripura High Court. The Collegium had changed its mind after the government expressed its displeasure in two back-toback letters on August 23 and 27, following several months of silence, about Justice Kureshi taking charge of the Madhya Pradesh High Court.

Recently, Justice V.K. Tahilramani chose to resign as the Madras High Court Chief Justice when the Collegium

proposed her transfer to the Meghalaya High Court. Many senior lawyers from the Madras High Court Bar opposed the transfer, calling it

The Supreme Court was finally compelled to issue a statement that Justice Tahilramani's proposed transfer was in the best interests of administration of justice. It offered to reveal the reasons for it, if necessary.

It is in the background of this roller-coaster flow of events that Chief Justice Gogoi Bench made the observation in the judicial order.

Senior advocate Arvind Datar, for the Gujarat lawyers' association, urged the Bench to keep the petition on Justice Kureshi's appointment pending.

He said the petition should be kept alive till the government approved the September 5 recommendation of the Collegium and notified the appointment of Justice Kureshi to the Tripura High Court. The court agreed to the suggestion.

"The modified recommendation of the Collegium has been put out in website. Proposal has been sent to the government... We accept the submission by Mr. Datar," the CJI recorded.

40 Afghan civilians killed in raid near wedding party

At least 40 civilians attending a wedding party were killed by explosions and gunfire during a raid by U.S.backed Afghan government forces on an Islamist militant hideout, officials in Helmand province said on Monday.

The raid, days after a U.S. drone strike aimed at militants hiding among farmers killed 32 pine nut harvesters, showed how civilians have borne the brunt of a war that has re-intensified since U.S.-Taliban peace talks collapsed two weeks ago.

Afghan officials said a house being used by the Taliban to train suicide bombers was located adjacent to the bride's home that came under fire during Sunday night's commando assault in the Musa Qala area of Helmand province.

HBO's Game of Thrones made television history at the 71st Primetime Emmy Awards on Sunday, winning for best drama series. The sprawling fantasy series, which had its finale in May after eight seasons of blood and intrigue, won 12 Emmys for its swan-song season, adding to its record total for the most wins of any television drama ever.

The night was also huge for Amazon, which won the best comedy award, thanks to Fleabag, a series that grew out of a 2014 one-woman show by its creator, Phoebe Waller-Bridge.

Ms. Waller-Bridge won three Emmys on the night, including for best actress in a





While Pillai Lokachariar briefly mentions the episode, Manavala Mamunigal, in his commentary, elaborated on the story. The story is about a lady named Sandili who was devoted to Vishnu. Her story is found in the Mahabharata.

Galava was the sishya of Viswamitra. When the period of study was over, Galava asked the sage what he wanted as guru dakshina. Viswamitra said that he wanted nothing, but when Galava insisted, the sage lost his temper and said, "Get me 800 white horses. Every one of them must have one black ear." Garuda offered to help Galava find such horses. He carried Galava and they went to all the worlds looking for such horses. But they did not find any.

Then they rested in the Rishabha hills. In those hills lived a devotee of the Lord, named Sandili. Garuda was very impressed with her knowledge and thought to himself that he should take Sandili to a sacred pilgrim centre. That was the proper place for her, not a remote hill, he thought. At once Garuda's wings fell off. Garuda realised what his sin was. He had felt that the place where Sandili resided was not good enough for her. He had forgotten that a place where a devotee lives becomes a sacred place. Because he had forgotten this, his wings had dropped off. He then asks Sandili to forgive him and she does. And Garuda regained his wings.

BSE gains 1,075 points on Monday; foreign investors turn significant buyers

The strong surge in equities, that started on Friday on the back of a cut in corporate tax rates and other incentives for India Inc., continued on Monday with the benchmark indices registering their bestever two-day rally.

The 30-share Sensex gained 1,075.41 points, or 2.83%, to close above the psychological 39,000-mark at 39,090.03. The index has gained almost 3,000 points - 2,996.56 to be precise - in just two trading sessions.

Index constituents like L&T, ITC, Axis Bank, Kotak Mahindra Bank, ICICI Bank, Asian Paints and Indusind Bank all gained more than 6% each. Index heavyweights like HDFC and HDFC Bank also gained 5.22% and 4.86%, respectively.

Meanwhile, the broader Nifty closed at 11,600.20, up 326 points or 2.89%.

Petronet tanks 5% after firm signs Tellurian deal

'Pact exposes Indian importer to risks'

Shares of Petronet LNG Limited (PLL) tanked 5.28% on Monday to ₹252.75 on the back of signing an MOU with U.S. based Tellurian Inc. to to buy up to 5 million tonnes per annum (MTPA) of LNG from the Driftwood project, concurrent with equity investment.

PLL will invest \$2.5 billion for 18% in Tellurian Inc.'s \$28-billion Driftwood project in Louisiana to negotiate the purchase of 5 mtpa of LNG for 40 years.

Analysts see this move as a significant shift from the firm's current utility model company to gas price and project execution risk.

"Prices will rise by 2025 with significant upcoming liquefaction capacity in the U.S. We would have preferred PLL to enter into a purchase agreement with Driftwood, linked to Asian spot LNG prices which would have insulated PLL from price... risks," said Edelweiss Research in a re-

PLL's board had only six months ago disfavoured such a deal with Tellurian, as the gas was available in plenty and no longer required equity investments, sources said.

ZEEL drops 9.6% on share sale

Some lenders sell shares days before standstill pact ends

Some lenders of Zee Entertainment Enterprises Ltd. (ZEEL), who had entered into a standstill agreement over repayment of debt till September 30, sold shares days before the deadline ended.

Last week, the media and entertainment company had secured from some of the lenders another six-month extension to repay debt. Lenders who did not agree to give more time sold the

Bulk deal

According to NSE data, Catalyst Trusteeship sold 72.5 lakh shares of ZEEL at ₹281.75 per share, thereby pegging the bulk deal value at ₹204.23 crore.

While it could not be independently confirmed, the buzz in the market was that the lender sold shares on behalf of Kotak Mutual Fund. A spokesperson for Kotak Mutual Fund declined to comment.

While Kotak Mutual Fund had an exposure of around ₹400 crore towards Essel Group, the company had repaid about ₹200 crore early this month.

"Essel Group confirms that the lenders who had not agreed to grant the extension, have exited by selling the pledged shares of ZEEL. The other lenders, who value the assets, have, in-principle, agreed to grant more time to the group," a company spokesperson said.

The share sale triggered a 9.63% fall in ZEEL stocks to ₹272.10 on the BSE on a day when the broader indices rose close to 3%. Earlier this month, Essel Group completed the first tranche of stake sale of ZEEL, its flagship entity, to Invesco Oppenheimer Developing Markets Fund and partially repaid the borrowers.

Essel Group had entered into an agreement to sell up to 11% promoter stake in Zee Entertainmentto the Fund. In the first tranche, the group sold 8.7% stake in

Following the stake sale, lenders received 45-60% of the total outstanding from Zee Entertainment.

India has committed to fly 10 crore passengers on biofuel-propelled planes by 2030, SpiceJet's chairman and managing director, Ajay Singh said at UN's SDG Climate Summit in New York.

"While we flew just one flight out of the 1.5 lakh flown on biofuels so far, we have committed that by 2030, India will fly 100 million of its passengers, the same number of total passengers we flew in 2015, using safe fuels," he said.

Last year, SpiceJet operated its first-ever flight propelled by a blend of jatropha seeds and aviation turbine fuel for a technological demonstration. He emphasised on the need for all staincluding keholders,



refineries, passengers, airports and governments, to work together to turn India's commitment into reality. He said there was a need to not only find new ways to burn less fossil fuels, but also to find an alternative to fuel-guzzling planes by pursuing the development of electric aircraft for flying needs of the future.

minisces. Soon, young girls began to approach her to teach them how to drape a sari perfectly. "I held my first workshop for a finishing school in Raipur with 86 participants. That's when I decided to give my talent a professional platform."

Her family was initially apprehensive, but she credits her father for believing in her. "He told me I had six months to prove myself," says Jain, who invested in a mannequin and began documenting every sari drape.

"Initially, I did 50 styles. I then progressed to 80 styles, then 125, 225 and now my count is 325." "Today, cameras are everywhere documenting the occasion. You can't go wrong with even a single pleat, and the pins should never show," she explains, adding

 Who says you can't have fun with a sari? Jain recommends pairing up a sari or dupatta with a long jacket and even denims

Go hands-free when socialising in a sari by investing in a smart fanny pack or waist pouch. "You can place your phone in it and wear it over the sari. Opt for a bejewelled and dressier one for formal dos," savs Jain

that the comfort of the client is paramount.

Ask her about her dream client, and she says, "I would love to drape Rekhaji. She is the true brand ambassador for Indian saris. I want to try a different drape on her that would go with her personality, yet be very different."

Jain is now working on a photo shoot of five different ways to drape a Bengali sari for Durga Puja. She will also be showcasing how to do different drapes for Dandiya ensembles.

The meal to Chettinad

Chefs from The Bangala, a luxury Chettinad property in Karaikudi, are in NCR for a series of pop-ups



It was once a colonial-era men-only club. But 20 years ago, entrepreneur Meenakshi Meyyapan revamped the property, which was in her family for over a century, into a heritage

hotel. The Bangala (colloquial Tamil for 'bungalow') which opened in 1999 in Karaikudi, branded itself as Chettinad's first small luxury hotel.

Today, not only is the property nationally recognised by the lifestyle and F&B industry, but its authenticity of food is also a much storied affair. The Bangala Table: Flavors and Recipes from Chettinad, a 2014 book written by Suneet Nair and co-authored by Meyappan herself, has documented 150 traditional vegetarian and non-vegetarian recipes that

the restaurant has curated for the menu at the property. The idea, for Meyappan, was to conserve and promote the culture and cuisine of her land, going beyond Chettinad chicken. In line with this, the restaurant's team of chefs is now in Delhi for a series of pop-ups: they started with private sit-down meals at various properties around NCR, including in Gurugram.

Today and tomorrow, they will be hosting open-for-all lunches and dinners at The Lodhi. The meal will be served old school, on a banana leaf, with The Bangala's trademark checked table linen, as well as specific ingredients, all brought in from Karaikudi.

Their trademark Badam Halwa and Vadu Mangai (mango) pickle for instance, were made at the restaurant and transported for the pop-up, since these are dishes that can be stored

But while here, the chefs will be preparing a menu that includes close to 20-odd dishes, vegetarian and nonvegetarian. You can expect a delicately perfumed Crab Rasam, tangy and sweet Pineapple Curry, a well done Masala Fried King Fish, crisp Banana Flower Vadai, and a flavourful Butter Beans (or Lima beans) Kurma.

Master of the road

Vinod Sehrawat uses his legs in more ways than one, to cover the distance

In his initial days of marathon training, Vinod Sehrawat lost 18 kg. His family got so worried they thought he had diabetes. "From a 38-inch waistline I dropped to 30 inches," says Vinod. The 43year-old drives trucks in and around Delhi, for a living.

Vinod started running three years ago because he was tired of his sedentary lifestyle. "I felt mentally stagnant," he says. He was putting on weight alarmingly and gradually he developed fatigue which led him to "hate" his body. Eventually

he started walking in Vasant Vatika Park after dropping his two children off at school. Gradually, he started running, and when a fellow runner stopped him and advised him to take the sport more seriously, he did. "I am so passionate about

running that it is now my life. No matter how tired I am after my day's hard work, I make sure that I run the next morning," he says, adding that it calms his body and mind ("Ek sukoon sa milta hai").

On the rare occasion he misses a run because of work, he'll practise in bet-



ween loading and unloading goods. Since he can't afford a gym membership, he does body-weight exercises (like push-ups) in the park. His 'guru' he says, is 35-year-old Abhishek Mishra, an Ironman and ultra runner (a run over 50 km).

Unfazed by the pollution and weather, Vinod is now training for his second full marathon (42 km), the Apollo Tyres Millennium City Marathon. The first time, he finished a full in 3 hours and 30 minutes (a well-above-average timing). His half marathon (21 km) timing is 1 hour and 30 minutes. "I earn my livelihood by driving in pollution so it does not deter me from practising. Only a Delhiite can tackle all kinds of weather because of our extremes in heat, cold, and humidity conditions," he says.

His family though, still cannot understand what he gets from the sport, except for his elder brother (Shri Bhagwan), who backs him when everyone else tries to discourage him from running. "I have stopped eating white sugar and I eat only

jaggery these days," he says. Vinod sticks to a simple diet of "home cooked food, salad and fruits."

Last year he completed the self-created 365 day running challenge. "I ran 10 km every day and 21 km on Sundays, along with my marathon training. I completed 5,555 km in the process. In the future, my aim is to run ultra marathons. I would like to compete in a triathlon someday, but I don't have the required funds."

Recognising his achievements, last year, Puma made a two-minute documentary on Vinod, highlighting his love of running.



How does the book title That Life's Importance sound? Absurd, isn't it? This is what Microsoft Translator's Tamil translation of the book cover of J Krishnamurti's Education and the Significance of Life reads like. It is a nice feature, but it doesn't work to the T. It even got the author's name wrong. This is no laughing matter, but what is, is Google Translate's Voice feature. When I asked in Tamil the direction to the nearest pharmacy, it said, 'Make your way to the drug store'. Not joking. And it is best that I do not mention what it came up with when I asked for help with buses to the railway station. Long story short,

don't use Google's Voice feature. Among Google Translate's positive aspects is its Instant mode, in which you can simply point at English words with your camera and get them translated into Tamil. But the app doesn't support Tamil to English. Microsoft works reasonably better for English to Tamil if you key in the words, though. Hi Translate comes across as a breath of fresh air. There are no gimmicks. No fancy features. Just basic typing simply type in Tamil or English and it works fussfree. On one occasion, it translated 'forest' in Tamil to 'wild' in English. But other than that, it mostly

Telugu

I found a Telugu copy of Robin Sharma's The Monk Who Sold His Ferrari. Impressively, Google Translate could interpret the book's title effortlessly. I proceeded to scan a brief news report in Telugu with PV Sindhu and Mary Kom's picture, and the translated text was quickly ready without any errors. However, it struggles to translate when the font is not similar to its database. For instance, the app couldn't translate a provision store's signboard. While translating the phrases, however, we learnt, short and well-structured sentences deliver the best results. Google and Hi Translate tend to translate word-forword. On two occasions, their results were exactly the same. Hi Translate's aggressive word-for-word translation engine falters when an English sentence has more than six words. On the other hand, Google handles long sentences well, but the translations are very formal. Despite minor tense-errors on three occasions out of five, Microsoft's output is more colloquial, often omitting a word.

Google's voice translation is far from perfect. In fact, it reminded me of how Google Translate was in the early 2000s: almost unusable. However, if you use simple sentences, it works well. Microsoft has a clever workaround to this problem with a robust phrasebook


Whether you are looking for directions or just an ice-breaker, here are apps that may help you communicate better in Telugu, Tamil, Kannada, Malayalam and Hindi

Few people have the ability to speak multiple languages, a highly underrated lifeskill. In the future, however, we might be able to get by, thanks to online translation tools (on cue: "there's an app for

Ahead of United Nations' International Translation Day (September 30) which recognises the role translation plays in bringing people together and strengthening verbal communication we tested if it is easy to translate English phrases (via text input) into Telugu, Kannada, Tamil, Malayalam, and Hindi.

While there's a whole host of such apps, Google Translate, Hi Translate by Fun and Hi Tool, Hi Translator for iOS, and Microsoft Translator are the few that support close to six Indian languages – a lot of the others do not list any at all.



Kannada

Three years ago, when I used Google Translate, the app gave me sentences that made no sense. Now, a lot has changed. I am surprised to see the app interchange sentences between English and Kannada with seemingly less effort and more accuracy. Similar is the case for Hi Translate, which is capable of precisely converting longer sentences with grammar in the right place. Though the apps seamlessly translate sentences, the extremely formal translations could make even a hardcore Kannada speaker go scurrying for a dictionary.

While in most of the cases the word-forword translations work fine, at times it changes the meaning of the sentence. For instance, Google translated a board that read 'Varsha Travels' in Kannada to 'Travel of the year'. ('Varsha' in Kannada means a year).

Google Translate does not support voice output in Kannada. However, it effortlessly translates Kannada sentences into English. The scan feature in Google Translate works like magic when the app is able to recognise the font. However, it struggles to translate hand-written sentences and gets them wrong most of the times.

Upon scanning a front-page sidebar on a Malayalam daily using Google Translate, I was surprised to see its accuracy and efficiency. But for some rough edges, the translation of the brief text was pretty much precise, though if you look for wordfor-word comparison, a phrase or two was slightly off target. However, the overall picture was clear. I then tried to translate

the blurb of a Malayalam version of RK Narayan's The Man-Eater of Malgudi that packed in some dense usages in a single, long sentence. The translation read like a summary of the text, nevertheless meaningful, as if the app applied its own brain to weed out some elements for the sake of simplification.

In terms of accuracy in interpretation, there were mixed responses. For one thing, some of the translations were quite formal, if not stilted, while both Google and Hi Translate often threw up similar results as if the same algorithm or intelligence

were at work behind the scenes. While shorter sentences were impressive with their correctness, longer ones raised some question marks. Google's voice translation feature came across as a hit-or-miss affair, but largely usable with

common sense. Similar story for voice translation from Malayalam to English too. Ranking: Google Translate, Hi Translate, (Microsoft Translator doesn't yet support Malayalam translations) (Harikumar IS)

Hindi




Hindi has its own little idiosyncrasies depending on where you use it - Hyderabad, Mumbai, and Delhi have obviously very different styles, and it doesn't take too much effort to pick up on these variations. If, in Delhi, I say "mahoday, kripya uchit kiraya vasoolein," instead of a variation of "bhaisaab sahi batao, mazaak mat karo" to an autorickshaw driver, I can kiss my hopes of getting a ride for a reasonable price goodbye. The problem with all three apps Google Translate, Microsoft Translator, and Hi Translator for iOS –

is that they gave more or less the same textbook-Hindi versions of most phrases I asked them to help me with. The text/photo-scan feature on Hi Translator is a pay-only feature, and Microsoft doesn't offer one at all. But the Google photo-scan feature is nifty, except when there's even a slight change in typeface. I tried to read a Priyadarshan book Naye Daur Ka Naya Cinema (Cinema of The New Era) published by Vani Prakashan. When I was pointing at the stylised text on the cover, it showed me garbled phrases like 'New Mouthful Baa Sibema'. However, it worked seamlessly well with the plain typeface (only, it was a direct translation, which read 'new era new cinema'). This will fail if you try to read a whole page through your phone camera, though.



South Africans confident of challenging the hosts despite missing three top stars

The men may have moved on from the India blues into white flannels, but India's women cricketers will commence their final phase of the World T20 preparation on Tuesday in a five-match T20I series against South Africa at the Lalbhai Contractor Stadium here.

Madhav Apte passes away

Former India cricketer Madhav Apte breathed his last at the Breach Candy Hospital here on Monday morning. He was 86 and had been ailing for a few months. He is survived by wife Sheela, son Vaman and two daughters, Radhika and Janhavi.

Apte was admitted to hospital last Saturday. "He lived a full life," said Vaman, an accomplished squash player. Apte's younger brother, Arvind, who played one Test against England at Headingley in 1959, passed away five years ago.

India's cricketing fraternity has always wondered why Madhav Apte had not worn the India cap more than seven times.

He made a decent Test debut against the Abdul Hafeez Kardar-led Pakistan at the Brabourne Stadium in 1952 -30 and 10 not out. He then made 42 against Pakistan at Chepauk, 64 and 52 in his first overseas Test against the West Indies at Port-of-Spain, 64 and 9 at Bridgetown, 0 and 163 not out at Port-of-Spain, 30 and 30 at Georgetown and 15 and 33 at

Despite this, the right-

handed opener never played for India again. He must have heard at least a thousand times the question why he was not chosen after that tour of the West Indies.

According to those who have watched him play, Apte was a solid and stylish opener. He scored 542 runs at 49.27 and most of his runs came against the likes of Frank King, Gerry Gomez, Frank Worrell, Alf Valentine and Sonny Ramadhin.

He played 67 First Class matches (46 Ranji Trophy for Bombay and three for Bengal) scored 3,336 runs, with six centuries and 16 half-centuries.

He was a true aficionado of our beloved game and just couldn't have enough of it. The cricketing gettogethers at his house were memorable evenings. I will miss those evenings, listening to him along with some of the greatest names

in Indian cricket

Apte was chairman of the Mumbai Cricket Association's Cricket Improvement Committee. He was also president of the Cricket Club of India in the early 1990s and president of the Legends Club.

Chandu Patankar, Vasu Paranjape, Sunil Gavaskar, Jatin Paranjpe and many cricketers were present at Shivaii crematorium.

"Madhavrao was a real friend," said a very emotional Patankar.

Apte got along well with different generations of cricketers and was a raconteur par excellence.

T10 is ideal for Olympics and CWG, says Morgan

Eoin Morgan, England's World Cup-winning captain, said the T10 format of cricket is ideally suited for the Olympic and Commonwealth Games.

While promoting the first Abu Dhabi T10 featuring 10 teams that will be broadcast by Sony Pictures Network from November 14 to 24, the 33-year-old Dublin-born attacking left-hander said that just as Twenty20 made an impact in international cricket, T10 will also entertain and popularise the

Morgan, who played his last Test in 2012 and began the journey of white-ball cricket, felt that a 60-ball game will cause as much buzz as the Twenty20 (120ball game) did.

"The role that T20 has played in growing and changing the game, I think T10 has a similar role to play. I say that for different reasons. T10 is one of the most entertaining formats for people to watch. It's a minute avenue in the same way as T20 and saying to people

that this is our sport and this is what it looks like. It's a great little advert for the game; one can host a tournament in such a short span of time, say 10 teams in 12 days.

Selling point

"And that makes it such a selling point for the Olympic and Commonwealth Games. We don't know anything about the 100-ball tournament because we have not experienced it. I think it will be a success. I do believe that T10 could be ideal for the Olympics and CWG. A game only lasts 90 minutes. A lot of countries will prepare for the Games and financially back the sport."

Touching upon the evolution of the game from Test to 50-over, T20 and now T10, Morgan believes that the game is in a healthy state. 'Speaking on behalf of English cricket, it's in a healthy place. We had the summer of a lifetime, winning the World Cup, seeing the popularity of the game rise a lot, ticket sales go through the roof and more integration with grass roots.

"The Ashes is popular anyway, the level of speculation and talk was extraordinary. I have not seen anything like this since 2005. T20 compacted the most impactful overs of the game. The PowerPlay and last overs have become important. In T10, every over and every ball is important. The momentum changes in about six or seven overs in 50-over cricket and two or three overs in T20.

Morgan backs the "concussion substitute rule" in the game.

"The concussion rules are relevant for the game. Safety is paramount and in international cricket it always remains a priority."

TNCA misinterpreting SC order: CoA files petition

■ The CoA in its submission The Committee of Administrators (CoA) has filed a 20page petition in the Supreme Court seeking clarification as it feels that the apex court's September 20 order is being "mischievously" misinterpreted.

On September 20, the Supreme Court had passed an interim order allowing TNCA to conduct elections. The order also stated that disqualification from contesting State body elections on completion of nine years would only be confined to office-bearers.

The CoA, in its submission (a copy of which is with PTI), has stated that SC's order is being "erroneously construed in such a manner so as to override principal judgement dated July 18, 2016, and August 9, 2018." The SC judgement, ac-

cording to CoA, is being "erroneously and mischievously misinterpreted by certain persons" as they are trying to override the principal judgment as per the August 9, 2018, order in which clause 6 (5) states that even members of the governing


Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) president Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh said,

Better late than never, says Rahul Aware

Rahul Aware was overwhelmed with emotions after securing a bronze medal in men's 61kg freestyle at the World wrestling championships in Nur-Sultan.

The 29-year-old – who has won medals in Commonwealth Youth Games, Asian junior championships, Asian championships, Commonwealth championships and the 2018 Commonwealth Games (gold) in the last decade or so - regained his self-belief after earning India's fifth medal at the elite

"Maybe I lacked a bit of luck as I faltered at the last hurdle in several top events. Since I was capable, I won this medal. Better late than never," Aware told The Hindu on Monday.

Aware admitted that he

was under pressure after losing to Georgian Beko Lomtadze in the semifinals.

"I was really sad. I thought I missed yet another opportunity to get an important medal.

My earlier failures played on the mind. I was tense prior to the repechage bout as I had a tough fight with the USA opponent (Tyler Graff) on a previous occasion.

"I tried 'fitley' but it did not work. Finally, I was successful when I applied 'tangi' technique (using both legs to capture opponent's leg)."

Pedigree

Aware, who comes from a family of wrestlers in Patoda of Beed district in Maharashtra and learnt his first lessons from his father and Nationallevel wrestler Balasaheb Aware, fine-tuned his game under the late Harischandra Birajdar and then under famous grappler Kaka Pawar. Aware did not regret that

he could not get a medal in an Olympic weight division. "I will try for it in the next Olympics.

Nowadays wrestlers are stretching their career up 38-40 years. Sushil Kumar is a prime example. One has to stay away from injuries to have a long career."

Supports wrestlers

Aware, who supports five talented wrestlers from Maharashtra by giving them a monthly stipend of ₹5000 each, wants to re-establish his State as a wrestling powerhouse.

"We have the talent and the tradition. If I get some help from the Government, I can start an academy and produce some fine wrestlers," he said.
