# Dimitrov rallies to script an epic win over Federer

Serena routs Wang in the quarterfinals to claim her 100th Open win; Medvedev has the measure of Wawrinka

Grigor Dimitrov stepped out of Roger Federer's shadow on Tuesday to claim a spot in the U.S. Open semifinals with a shock 3-6, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4, 6-2 win over the wounded Swiss.

Dimitrov will now face Daniil Medvedev on Friday for a place in final, the Russian advancing to the last four with a 7-6(6), 6-3, 3-6, 6-1 win over another Swiss Stan Wawrinka.

#### Blistering and clinical

Williams claimed her 100th win at the Open in style, dismantling her quarterfinal opponent Wang Qiang 6-1, 6-0 in a blistering 44-minute performance that ended any questions over a twisted ankle from the previous round.

Ukrainian fifth seed Elina Svitolina produced a clinical display to overcome British No.1 Johanna Konta 6-4, 6-4 to set up a clash with Serena for a place in the final.

Coming into the Open, the

78th ranked Dimitrov, dubbed "Baby Fed" because of the similarities between his game and Federer's, did not look much of a threat, posting just one win from his last eight matches.

But the Bulgarian, who had been ranked as high as No. 3, has found some form on the New York hardcourts and claimed his first win in eight meetings with the 20-times Grand Slam winner.

"Even if I would have gone two sets to love down, I wouldn't have give up," assured Dimitrov. "I would still stay on the court and just try to do as much as possible to make sure that whether I rattle him or put him off balance. I kept on pushing, I kept on believing."

#### Razor sharp, but...

Federer looked razor sharp to start the match but was not able to maintain his usual high level against the gritty Bulgarian.

The turning point came in the fourth set, Dimitrov fighting off five break points to win the set and level match at 2-2.

"I was trying to stay in that game and make him stay on the court as much as possible," said Dimitrov. "After that he started slowing

down. It's a best of five sets. Anything can happen."

**Fitness concern**And something unexpected

did. Before the start of the fifth set Federer called for the trainer, who, after a brief conversation with the 38-year-old, escorted him off

the court for a medical time out to deal with a back problem.

breaking Federer to open the fifth and then a second time with the Swiss unable to mount any defence as the Bulgarian went on to claim the biggest win of his career.

"I just needed some treatment on my upper – what is it – back, neck," said Federer. "Just needed to try to loosen it up, crack it and see if it was going to be better."

The 37-year-old Serena was dominant from the start, firing off 25 winners, compared to zero from 18th-seed Wang, and winning 90% of her first serve points. "I never thought that I would get to 100," said Serena.

## Smith and Labuschagne steady the ship

Duo bails Australia out on rain-marred day, after another failure for the openers

Steve Smith continued his outstanding Ashes form, striking an unbeaten 60, as Australia recovered from another failure by its openers to reach 170 for three at the close of the rain-affected first day of the fourth Test against England at Old Trafford on Wednesday.

Rain caused a delay of over two hours after lunch but plans to extend play to regain that lost time were abandoned after rain came in again during the break for tea.

The afternoon delay did little to disrupt Smith, returning from missing the last Test due to concussion, making his eighth straight Ashes half-century.

Smith and Marnus Labuschagne put on 116 for the third wicket before the latter was bowled by Craig Overton for 67.

It was a much-needed stand after England had made a great start, bringing

High on confidence after being the lead performer with the bat in the just-concluded Test series in West Indies, Hanuma Vihari said it was important for him to come up with substantial contributions to cement his place in the Indian team.

"It was definitely a crucial tour for me and the first objective was to seize the opportunities that came my way," Vihari said in an exclusive chat with *The Hindu*.

"The 93 in the second innings of the first Test gave me lot of confidence. Though I was disappointed at missing the century, I was glad that I could contribute my bit to a winning cause on a difficult wicket to bat," he said.

#### Simple advice pays

"But, I must say one simple advice by Ravi (Shastri) sir – to correct my stance as he felt I was standing more upright, and let the knees be more flexible – made a lot of difference on this West Indies tour," the 25-year-old Vihari said.

"I was waiting for the big

"I was waiting for the big day – to score my maiden Test century. I felt it was an important knock," he said.

According to Vihari, the conditions in West Indies were a mix of England (seam and swing) and Australia (bounce). "If you have noticed, most of them were 250-plus wickets and I think we did really well to score 400-plus in the series," he said.

Vihari hopes to do well again in the forthcoming South Africa Test series at home. "It is always good to take any tournament or series match by match. Hope to do well again," he added.

On his captain Virat Kohli's comment that that dressing room feels calm when Vihari bats, a smiling Vihari hoped it was a sign of bigger responsibility in the days to come. "To be honest, to be given a chance ahead of others itself meant the kind of confidence the team management had in me. So, the onus is on me to keep doing well," Vihari said.

#### Delayed start

In the morning, wet outfield delayed the start by more than an hour and the match was reduced to 43 overs.

Put in to bat, the South Africans enjoyed their best start of the series. Matthew Breetzke, opening for the first time, and Reeza Hendricks attacked the mediumpacers and picked up boundaries. The duo raised a 50-run partnership in quick time. However, the introduction of spin through Rahul Chahar brought an end to the promising stand as Breetzke (25) swept Chahar
