

# India's share of river water will no more go to Pakistan: Modi

This belongs to farmers of Haryana and Rajasthan and we will get it, says PM

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday said India would put to use its share of water from the rivers flowing to Pakistan and ensure that every single drop was used for the country's farmers. The work on this had started, he added.

Mr. Modi, who was addressing an election rally at Charkhi Dadri in Haryana, said the river water that rightfully belonged to India had been flowing to Pakistan for the last 70 years. It would not happen any more.

#### 'Gone for 70 years'

"For the last 70 years, the water that belonged to India and farmers of Haryana were going to Pakistan. Modi will stop it and bring it to your households," he said.

"This water belongs to farmers of Haryana, Rajasthan and the country and we will get it... Work towards realisation of this has been started, and I am committed to it. Modi will fight your battle," he asserted.

# Farooq's sister, daughter jailed

Police break up protest in Srinagar

At least 13 women protesters, including National Conference (NC) president Farooq Abdullah's sister and daughter, were arrested on Tuesday, immediately after their bid to hold a "peaceful sit-in" against the Centre's decision to revoke Jammu & Kashmir's semi-autonomous status and hive it into two Union Territories.

"Legal action has been initiated against them. They were produced before a magistrate, who sent them to the Central Jail," Deputy Inspector General V.K. Birdi

Police sources said the protesters were arrested for violating Section 144, barring assembly of more than four persons. They were booked under Section 107 for "breaching the peace."

The all-women protest was the first attempt to oppose the Centre's move since August 5. The women assembled at the centrally located Sri Pratap Park in Srinagar's Lal Chowk around noon.





### Stalemate over body of detained 'foreigner'

The family of a declared toreigner who died of illness after two years in an Assam detention centre has refused to accept his body for the third day on Tuesday. The refusal has put the Sonitpur district administration in a spot because of complications in last rites for a "non-Indian".

Dulal Paul died of diabetes and renal failure on October 13, two years after he was declared a foreigner and lodged at north-central Assam's Tezpur detention centre, one of six across the State within central jails.

The 65-year-old Paul died at the Guwahati Medical College Hospital, about 130 km south-west of his home in Sonitpur district.

#### Family's stand

His wife Renu Rani Paul and three sons are firm in their stand that they will accept the body only if the government declares him an Indian in writing.

"We have made it clear that if our father was a Bangladeshi, he cannot suddenly become an Indian after death unless the government gives it in writing. What if we take his body and cremate him and the government punishes us for performing the last rites of a Bangladeshi?" said Ashish Paul, one of the three sons.

The quasi-judicial FTs usually do not mention the country of origin of a person it declares a foreigner. But the reports submitted to the tribunals by the border wing of Assam police invariably find a person investigated against to have "come from Bangladesh via a secret route"

Sonitpur DC Manvendra Pratap Singh said he was not sure if there were any provisions preventing the authorities from cremating or burying an unclaimed body.
