### **BCCI** to grant accreditation to former office-bearers for matches

IN A departure from the practice followed by the now-defunct Committee of Administrators (CoA), BCCI president Sourav Ganguly and his team has decided to grant central accreditation cards to former BCCI office-bearers, presidents and secretaries of all state associations which will allow them free access for any games held in India.

The CoA had decided to cut the prescribed tickets quota of past office-bearers for international matches. Vinod Rai & Co. had given the authority to BCCI chief executive officer Rahul Johri in distribution of complimentary tickets, a decision which is also likely to be reversed.

The new BCCI constitution restricts the distribution of complimentary tickets to 10 per cent, making public sale of the other 90 per cent mandatory. The new body is going to visit this stipulation in the coming days. Last year, many state association had objected to this clause and Madhya Pradesh Cricket Association even turned down a India vs West Indies ODI.

Having central accreditation for former office-bearers and state unit office-bearer will ensure that members are treated well during a game. Often, BCCI has its own corporate box for international games and with this accreditation card, they will have hassle-free entry into the stadium.

Another decision taken by the new BCCI regime was to sent an email to all state units asking them to nominate 'match observers' for international games. This is another practice discontinued by the CoA. "Till now, BCCI staff used to hand over complimentary tickets of sponsors, stakeholders and government officials but now the board has asked state units to send names of their people whom they want as match observers. Each state unit will have to send one representative and they will be nominated as match observer. The current regime wants to ensure members that the new board is like the old BCCI," sources said.

#### Kumble backs Kohli

PTI adds: Former India captain and coach Anil Kumble has supported Virat Kohli's view of having five centres for Test matches in order to bring the spectators back to the stadium. Kumble, in fact, wants the BCCI to go back to the old tradition of the 80s and 90s where Test matches at specific centres were held during festivities. During the 80s and 90s the BCCI calender used to have Tests on New Year in Kolkata and in Chennai at the time of Pongal. "I think that has certainly been one of the ways of promoting Test cricket. By restricting it to few centres and not just that it is also important to choose the time of the Test match," Kumble was quoted as saying by CricketNext. "We all remember that in the festival time, during the festival of Pongal, the Test match used to happen in Chennai."

# Dada listened to everyone but did what he thought was right, this is great leadership'

n the days ahead, I expect the BCCI to be led aggressively. I say this because Sourav Ganguly is in charge now. Back in 2000, when Dada became our captain, he taught us to win abroad, and more importantly, showed us how to put up a fight on the cricket field. Now, I think he will show the same passion in his new role and push BCCI's case forcefully at the international level.

It was really heartening to hear that Ganguly wants to start from home. One of his opening statements was about improving India's domestic cricket. He is the best man to do the job. Ganguly knows the problems at the grassroots. When he was dropped from the Indian team, he spent a lot of time travelling around the country. I still remember that when he returned to the Indian team, he used to talk about what was lacking in the domestic circuit.

Seeing Dada in this new leadership avatar, my mind goes back to the days when he was with us in the dressing room. My conviction about Ganguly doing well in his second innings is based on his excellent leadership approach. He leads from the front and backs his players. In case he feels you are a match-winner, Dada will back you to the hilt. Me, Yuvraj Singh, Harbhajan Singh, Zaheer Khan, Ashish Nehra, Mohammad Kaif, we all realised this.

We didn't need to bother about our last innings, we were told we would be given ample chances to do well. You just go out and play, was the only instruction he gave us. Trust me, this made all the difference.

He gave a player the kind of confidence that makes him forget that he has actually flopped in the last eight to 10 innings. By some strange miracle, the player would think that he was actually performing well. And with that confidence, he would give his 100 per cent all the time and win matches. That I think was Dada's biggest strength as a

I often get asked this question: How did I become an opener from a middle-order batsman? Dada had a big role to play in my shift to the top of the order. It all started with him asking me to open. My reaction was simple: "Why aren't you opening, even you open, even Sachin opens?"

He explained to me that the opening slot was vacant, so if I take it, my place in the side will be guaranteed. But in case I was against

He said, "I will give you three to four innings as an opener. Even if you fail, you will continue to play. And before I drop you, I will again give you a chance in the middle (order)".

the idea and wanted to stick to the middle order, he explained, I would have to wait for

someone to get injured. But what convinced me was his very practical suggestion that he was to give me later.

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It was a very fair treatment. It's this clarity that makes a player trust his captain. That gave me a lot of confidence. I thought, Dada is backing me so much, so let me try. Whatever I am today, it is because of him.

Dada was a very sharp and instinctive captain. He liked to involve everyone in decision-making. A lot of times, he used to listen to everyone but do what he thought was right. He would ask the senior players - me, Harbhajan, Zaheer - about the opposition and also the conditions. Once we had given our inputs, he would have six to seven views. After that he would either follow one view or come up with his own view that was different from everyone, which he thought was good for him. This, I think, is a great leadership approach.

This meant we had a very 'open' and 'inclusive' dressing room where people could speak their minds, give suggestions, even have arguments. Not just joke with him

freely, we could tell him anything. Even now when we do commentary together, one can see that I joke a lot. I have seen a lot of captains but Dada was a rare leader with whom you can say anything or joke about anything. There was a great comfort level between him

and the players he backed and over a period of time, the bond only grew stronger.

If someone unfamiliar with cricket got in the dressing room, he could have never guessed that Ganguly was the captain. He was like one of the boys. I learnt a lot from him. When I became captain — be it for Delhi, in the Challenger Trophy or IPL, I tried to keep the same atmosphere in the dressing room. It was very important, especially in IPL where there are players who haven't even played for their states. It is important to talk to them, make them comfortable. I made myself available to them, improved my "tuning" with them. This went a long way in us reaching the IPL semifinals.

It's because when I was a young player, Dada would speak to me, we would have dinner together. As BCCI president, he will do the same, I expect he will take everyone along with him. I have no doubt that he would play a big role in turning the clock back to the time when BCCI had a big say in

Because of the bond he had with his team mates, Dada always had backers.

Even when he was dropped, the players were behind him. See, he was out of the team not because he was a bad player. So even when he was not in the team, we used to talk about him, talk to him. Jab hamara kharab time tha tab unhone hum se baat ki thi, to phir iab unka time kharab tha hum bhi unse baat karte the, unke baare mein baat karte hain. (During our bad times, he used to talk to us, so when he was going through bad times, we used to talk to him and about him.) We all felt that Dada deserved a good farewell. He should retire while he was playing. So we all felt great when he retired. We were so happy when he got his last match.

But even in his tough times, Dada never looked shattered. That's his greatness, that's what we learned from him. There will be ups and downs but dukhi nahi hona, confidence rakhna hai, self-belief nahin khona. (Don't feel sad, maintain confidence, don't lose self-be-

Actually, when I first heard about Dada becoming president, I recalled an incident during the 2007 South Africa tour. It was a Test in Cape Town where me and Wasim Jaffer were out early. Tendulkar was to bat No.4 but couldn't take the field. Out of the blue, Ganguly was asked to go out and bat. This was a comeback series and there was pressure. This time it was a 51-shot rally and the stadium was buzzing, the crowd loving a pairing they've only watched playing thrillers, while knocking down reputations.

The Indians might be in Top 10 range, but they've needed a week like this last one to really be counted amongst the biggies. That 50-shot rally saw Indians match the higherranked pair in poise and plunder. And finally, they would close out the match at 25-23; now firmly a bonafide top pair, also an exciting one. So, many anxious moments later and with a good helping of some solid poise, hardened in a foundry that's Parisian, India have Super 750 finalists.

Expect fireworks on Sunday from Indian badminton's best entertainers.

### Shakib could pay price for ambush advertisement deal

BANGLADESH'S DOMESTIC cricketers might be reaping benefits from the players' protest but their national captain Shakib al Hasan has been caught off-guard, with the board mulling legal action for violation of central contract. With Bangladesh set to leave for the all-important India series in the next few days, the BCB's strong stance could certainly affect the morale of the team.

According to a report in *Cricbuzz*, Shakib has signed a deal with noted telecom company 'Grameenphone', which is in violation of the central contract clause. "He cannot make this agreement (with a telecom company) and why he cannot make this agreement is clearly stated in our contract paper," BCB president Nazmul Hasan was quoted as saying by the Bengali daily Kaler Kantho on Saturday.

"Robi [Telecom] was our title sponsor and Grameenphone did not bid and instead they grabbed few cricketers by paying them TK

One or Two Crores. What happened in the end? The board lost TK 90 Crores in three years," he said. "We are going into legal action. We cannot spare anyone in this regard. We will ask for compensation. We will seek compensation from the company as well as from the player," Hasan said.

"I heard about it on (October 23) and asked to sent legal notice to Grameenphone to claim compensation. I asked to send a letter to Shakib for explanation. We must give him a chance to show he didn't break the rule. To us it seemed that it was something like 'give a damn to the board' and if that is the case we will take tough action," he added.

Shakib along with senior cricketers Mushfigur Rahim and Mahmudullah Riyadh led the players protests 11-point demand, ranging from increase in domestic match fees, daily allowances, players' transfers in both national league and BPL. According to leading Bengali daily, Prathom Aalo reported that in the first division League, players will be getting taka 70,000 instead of the earlier taka 35,000.

### Ahead of WWE debut in Saudi Arabia, Fury sets sights on MMA

THE ONLY thing surprising about lineal world heavyweight champion boxer Tyson Fury competing in the WWE was it took this long for it to happen. After all, no individual in combat sports is as natural a fit to the fantastical world of professional wrestling as the

fast-talking 'Gypsy King' from Manchester. During an international media conference call on Friday, Fury sold an "ankle injury" suffered during a skit to build up his upcoming wrestling match — "It is going to be fine by the time the fight comes up, won't affect my performance" — as seriously as the actual gnarly cut, courtesy opponent Otto Wallin in last month's bout.

"Definitely fearful of the cut opening up again," Fury said of the 47-stitch eye injury. Not allowed to compete or train for three months, the restless 31-year-old chose to fulfill a longtime wish, for a reported \$12m payday. Fury — who faces former competitive strongman Braun Strowman at WWE's

Crown Jewel event next Thursday — is the last true remaining showman in boxing, a sport searching for larger-than-life names post Floyd Mayweather Jr's (apparent) exit. There's Filipino veteran Pacquiao, technical wizard Lomachenko, ferocious middleweights Canelo and GGG. Also fellow heavyweights, big-hitting Wilder and the enviable pedigree of Joshua. But nobody comes close to fitting the bill like Fury.

Fury has dressed up as Batman to annoy former champion Wladimir Klitschko, strutted down to James Brown's 'Living in America' a la Apollo Creed from Rocky IV, and donned a luchador mask in the build-up to the Wallin fight.

In 2015, Fury ended Klitscho's decadelong reign as the top dog, after the technically-correct Ukrainian had put the division and the numbers to sleep. Fury then went on a cocaine-fuelled exile during which he ballooned to 180kg and battled suicidal thoughts. He returned to the spotlight with an entertaining draw against Wilder, dominating the bout and shrugging off two vicious knockdowns.

### Student of the game

Boxing and pro-wrestling have a storied history of cross-promotion and huge paydays. Muhammad Ali went to Japan, Mike Tyson was instrumental in the rise of 'Stone Cold' Steve Austin and Mayweather competed at Wrestlemania. Fury, a long-time

Austin fan who has also studied the Ali-Inoki showdown, is taking his one-night gig seriously.

"Coming into this I didn't know what to expect. Now I really know it's one of the hardest things I have ever had to do," Fury told Ariel Helwani's MMA Show. "People say 'it's fake'. I say please come here and see how fake it is. I am getting thrown around the ring, it's hard. The ropes are like barbed wire, my back is in bits, I am sore in places I didn't think I could be sore in."

According to Fury, promoter Frank Warren "was mad" at him for putting the potential Wilder rematch in February at risk on account of the aforementioned cut.

"He said 'I think this is a really bad idea". Frank along with everyone else in my team was like 'concentrate on your job, you are not a showman or a movie star'," Fury told Helwani. "He said you could get injured and what happens if the cut re-opens or if you get injured shoulders. If we lived our lives on 'what if' we would never do anything."

Along with Fury, yesteryear superstars Hulk Hogan and Ric Flair will also be present at the Crown Jewel event in Riyadh. It is the third show WWE has put on in Saudi Arabia as part of a big-money deal, which has been criticised due the country's human rights record. Saudi Arabia's crown prince Mohammed bin Salman has used cinema, concerts and sporting events in a bid to change the nation's conservative image. Fury's rival Anthony Joshua will look to avenge his knockout loss to Andy Ruiz in December, a bout which is reported to make

the Brit richer by \$75 million. Fury believes his involvement in the

Saudi show is simply as "a prizefighter". "As for the Saudi Arabia thing, I'm just a fighter. But if you want to be involved in change in a country, you should go there, said Fury. "That's why I go there and want to deliver a great fight."

The boxer also knows what cookie-cutter responses and buzzwords will make headlines, and dealt with questions about amateur boxing's troubles and Vijender Singh's prospects as pro-boxer accordingly. And if Frank Warren thought WWE was a bad idea, here's what Fury wants to do next.

"I'm looking to have an MMA match before Christmas this year," said Fury, who has also indicated that he might retire after next year. "I am willing to fight in the UFC very soon, hopefully."
