Saying RCEP will hurt farmers, India walks out

PM says his conscience does not permit him to sign the FTA

Seven years after India joined negotiations for the 16-nation ASEAN (Association for South East Asian Nations)-led RCEP (Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership) or Free Trade Agreement, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced on Monday that India was dropping out of the agreement, citing its negative effects on "farmers, MSMEs and the dairy sector".

"The present form of the RCEP agreement does not fully reflect the basic spirit and the agreed guiding principles of RCEP. It also does not address satisfactorily India's outstanding issues and concerns," Mr. Modi told leaders of the other 15 nations at the RCEP summit in Bangkok. "In such a situation, it is not possible for India to join the RCEP agree-

ment," he said. The summit included China, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, South Korea, and the 10-nation ASEAN group-

End stubble burning immediately, orders SC

Will hold State administration responsible, the court warned

In a bid to save Delhi from air pollution, the Supreme Court on Monday said it would hold the entire State administrative and police mechanisms of Punjab, Harvana and Uttar Pradesh from the Chief Secretary to the local policeman - responsible if even one instance of stubble burning occurred in the future.

"Who is responsible for stubble burning? State governments are responsible! They are only interested in electioneering. They have to be made liable in tort. We are making a mockery of everything," a visibly anguished Justice Arun Mishra

Penal action

"We will haul up the State administration from bottom to top. People are dying, this just cannot happen in a civilised country. The sad thing in this country is that people in power are only interested in gimmicks...," he stated.

The court said any instance of stubble burning

from now on would be penalised.

"There cannot be a mass exodus from Delhi... People have to live in Delhi, which is the national capital. People cannot be just evacuated from here... No room inside a house is safe in Delhi. How long can we survive on air purifiers? We are losing precious years of our lives... It is writ large that various State governments, civic bodies have failed to discharge their liabilities. It is time to fix liability...," an exasperated Bench of Justices Arun Mishra and Deepak Gupta said.

The Supreme Court made the local and civic bodies as "personally responsible" as the errant farmer who puts fire to his crop residue.

The court ordered the Chief Secretaries of the three neighbouring States of Delhi to be present in court on Wednesday to explain why the governments and civic bodies should not be punished under tort law and be made to pay a hefty penalty for stubble fires seen so far this season. The court said the 'Polluter Pays Principle' does apply to the State and the local bodies.

Opposition to meet Kovind on snooping

Leaders of 13 Opposition parties, including the Congress, on Monday signed a memorandum, expressing concerns over allegations of 'snooping' after the WhatsApp revelations. The parties sought an appointment from President Ram Nath Kovind to hand over the memorandum to him.

The Opposition parties have argued that the revelations made by the Facebookowned WhatsApp point to the violation of the right to privacy as pronounced by the Supreme Court. Opposition leaders have also planned to raise the issue at the winter session of Parliament that begins from November 18.

Opposition leaders expressed concern that their messages and photos could be 'misused'.

The issue of snooping came up at a meeting of Opposition leaders convened by the Congress ahead of its 10-day agitation programme to protest against the economic slowdown, unemployment, agrarian distress and bank frauds.

Mr. Fadnavis also met the BJP's election in charge for the State, Bhupendra Yadav, after meeting Mr. Shah. According to top sources in the party, it has decided to adopt a wait and watch policy with regard to government formation, and ruled out a swear-

The Assembly poll results were announced on October 24, with the BJP getting 105 seats and the Sena 56, both less than in 2014. 'Compensate us, don't treat us as criminals' Farmers in parts of Haryana deny burning stubble, suggest monetising field clearing

On a hazy Monday morning, Jitender, 42, is doing the rounds of his five-acre field at Sonipat's Barona village off the Kundli-Manesar-Palwal Expressway, bordering the national capital. He hopes his crop, the 'Pusa 1121' variety of basmati rice, would be ready for harvest in the next couple of days.

Farmers in and around his village mostly grew basmati rice and harvested the crop manually, he said. "The grain of basmati is damaged during mechanised harvesting and fetches a lower price. We therefore harvest using labour, though it costs a little extra," said Mr. Jitender. Farmers, he said, make up for it by selling parali (the upper part of paddy cut during harvest). He claimed that incidents of paddy stubble burning in and around his

village have virtually stopped over the past two years because of the growing demand for parali as fodder. The parali usually fetches a farmer ₹2,000-₹3,000 per acre. "The stubble is mixed in the field while preparing the land for the next crop," said Mr. Jitender.

Bengal's cities yield new species of tree frog

Specimens of the Brown Blotched Bengal Tree Frog were found in residential areas

It took six herpetologists working across States and countries to determine that a tree frog found commonly in urban habitats of West Bengal was a brand new species.

"Specimens were not discovered from deep jungles but from residential areas in two districts of West Bengal," Guwahati-based herpetologist Jayaditya Purkayastha, who runs Help Earth, an NGO, told The

Mr. Purkayastha is one of the six authors of the study published in the latest edition of Zootaxa, a peerreviewed scientific journal for animal taxonomists. The other researchers are Madhurima Das from

Assam, Kingshuk Mondal, Shibajee Mitra, and Anirban Chaudhuri from West Bengal and professor at Universiti Malaysia Sarawak Indraneil Das.

photograph shared on social media that triggered the study. Mr. Mitra sent Mr. Purkayastha a photograph of a tree frog from a

residential area in Badu, North 24 Parganas district, West Bengal, in the winter of 2016 and asked if he could identify it. 'Through an initial

literature review, it became evident that this interesting find may be new to science," Mr. Purkayastha said. However, the frog was forgotten until Mr. Mondal found more specimens, this time from Khordanahala in South 24 Parganas district in mid-2018.

Mr. Chaudhuri coordinated the initiative to study the new species in Kolkata. After the required measurements and other data collection was done. the herpetologists concluded that the frog belonged to the genus Polypedates.

investigation by Ms. Das established the frog as a new species in this genus, while the Malaysia-based Prof. Das, an authority on herpetofauna in Asia, took care of the team's data limitations. Their study finally established the midsized tree frog as the 26th species under the genus Polypedates, found throughout south and

southeast Asia.

The new species has been named Brown Blotched Bengal Tree Frog (Polypedates bengalensis) from the series of six to nine dark brown blotches that extend laterally from behind the frog's eye to the vent. The frog's body colour is yellowish-brown to greenish-brown.

Odd-even Day 1: 'many violators let off with just a warning'

Civil defence officials say several motorists claimed to be unaware of the scheme

Nearly 2,500 civil defence officials were deployed across the Capital to sensitise motorists about the odd-even car rationing scheme implemented from Monday.

The officials, holding a placard reading "Odd-even ka palan karein. Pollution dur karein (abide by oddeven rule. Get rid of pollution)", said many violators were let off with a warning because it was the first day of the scheme. "When people came driving odd-numbered cars, we stopped them and told them that they had violated the rule. We requested them to cooperate and comply with the rule because their own health was at stake," said a 28-year-old official on duty at National Highway-24.

'Rowdy' violators

The officials said they often come face-to-face with "rowdy" violators who argue with them and make excuses. "They, at times, become extremely aggressive. If they become violent, we seek the help of traffic policemen who are always around," said another official.

The officials shared that it's tough to stop violators at many points, especially highways and roads with no barricades. It's risky to run to the middle of the road to

stop the cars, they said.

Those posted near Minto Road said most motorists who were stopped for violation were cordial and admitted to their mistake.

"Violations are high. At least 30-40 motorists were stopped in the last two hours. Most of them claimed to be unaware of the rule. What do you say to that," asked an official.

The officials said they work in two shifts - 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 2p.m. to 8 p.m. after which the rule is not applicable. They were trained and briefed about the duties on Sunday and given a kit, including a yellow jacket, a cap, an anti-pollution mask and a water bottle.

Long wait for app cabs

People struggled to book cabs to reach their destinations on Monday as the waiting time to find a vehicle increased due to the implementation of the odd-even road rationing scheme in the Capital.

Some commuters also complained that despite booking rides, the cabs did not turn up.

A spokesperson of Uber said it is doing everything possible to ensure that movement around the city

is easy during this time. "We have initiated a proactive driver partner campaign in Delhi-NCR urging them to offer pledges of support and come out on the roads to ensure maximum rider convenience. Uber has already received more than 14,000 pledges from our driver partners".

Earlier in the day, Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said that Ola and Uber have assured the government of not resorting to surge-pricing.

Pollution levels register dip due to wind

Approaching western disturbance to have positive influence on AQI, says SAFAR

High wind speed on Monday helped bring down pollution levels in the city even as the Air Quality Index (AQI) clocked in at 407, which falls in the 'severe' category. The AQI on Sunday was 494, as per the Central Pollution Control Board

The air quality is expected be in the 'very poor' category on Tuesday and may further improve from November 8, according to government-run monitoring agency SAFAR (System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting and Research). The AQI of Delhi was 370, 'very poor', at 8.30 p.m. on Monday, as per CPCB.

On Monday, the share of pollution in the city due to stubble burning in neighbouring States was 14%, down from 25% on Sunday, stated SAFAR.

"High surface and boundary-layer wind is expected on Tuesday, which will improve air quality to 'very poor' level by the morning. A fresh western disturbance is approaching north India, scattered rainfall and change in wind direction is expected by November 8 in Delhi region, which is likely to positively influence AQI,' said the monitoring agency

CPCB data. On Sunday, PM2.5 was over 10 times (625.1 ug/m3) the safe limit the highest recorded so far this season.

'Severe' air quality can cause respiratory problems in healthy people and has serious impact on those with lung or heart diseases, according to a Supreme Court-appointed pollution control body EPCA.

The EPCA on Monday extended a ban on coal-based industries, hot mix plants, and stone crushers in NCR till November 8.


Cricketers move out

Green panel summons senior officials

The National Green Tribunal (NGT) on Monday took suo motu cognisance of the high pollution levels in Delhi and has summoned the Delhi Chief Secretary to the Tribunal, among other officials.

A Bench headed by NGT chairperson Justice Adarsh Kumar Goel, in a chamber meeting, asked officials of the Central Pollution Control Board, Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change and Delhi Pollution Control Committee to be present before the Bench on Tuesday.

'Continuous negligence' Taking note of several media reports on the high levels of pollution in the Capital, published on Monday, the Bench said, "The air pollution is a source of diseases and threat to life. As per studies, statistics of death and health hazards have been given. Today's situation is not creation of one day. It is continuous negligence and apathy of statutory authorities in enforcing the law."

"There is need to ascertain why there is failure and



what should be the preven tive strategies and remedial measures to ensure that present situation does not recur in future," the Bench added.

'Planning needed' While observing that the

"problem is well acknowledged," it said, "While remedial action may continue to be taken in the best possible manner, there is urgent need to have proper planning to address the gaps in existing enforcement strategies and undesirable situation. After interaction with the Chairman and Member Secretary of CPCB, we find it necessary to further examine the matter after looking into the status of implementation of GRAP and other measures, including preventive strategies currently adopted."

Lawyers at all district courts boycott work

Lawyers in the Delhi High Court and all district courts in the Capital boycotted judicial work in protest against the clash between lawyers and the police in the Tis Hazari court complex on November 2.

The lawyers at six district courts here – Tis Hazari, Karkardooma, Saket, Dwarka, Rohini and Patiala House – did not participate in court proceedings, but took dates for their cases through proxy counsels.

Meanwhile, the Bar Council of India (BCI) on Monday appealed to the members of the legal fraternity to maintain peace and harmony in the courts and resume their work from Tuesday.

As per the demand of all the Bar Associations, a judicial enquiry has already been ordered by the High Court and the enquiry has to be positively concluded within a period of six weeks.

"We should not forget that six weeks time is not very long, rather for a judicial enquiry, it is quite short," the BCI said.

The council further asked lawyers to be cautious of leaked CCTVs footage and clips that are doing the rounds on TV channels and on the socials media.

"We know that all these are being made in order to malign the image of the Bar. Overwhelming majority of members of the Bar are peace loving and law abiding citizens," the BCI said

It also urged lawyers "not to resort to any action that would tarnish our image and which could ultimately lead to losing the sympathy of the courts and the common people".

Security beefed up at all district courts

Delhi police request officers to ensure safety of undertrials and policemen

Delhi Police beefed up security at all six district courts in the city following cases of violence during a protest called by lawyers

on Monday.

"Following the orders, adequate police arrangements have been put in place on and around the court premises for the policemen who will visit the court to depose evidence

or accompany undertrials. Security of police lock-ups located inside the court premises will be tight-ened," said a police officer.

The communication unit of the Delhi police, in an advisory, requested Special CP (Law and Order) and other district DCPs to take steps to ensure the safety of undertrials and policemen.

The advisory says that undertrial prisoners should not be allowed to be taken to the court till the situation becomes normal. It said that arrangement should be made for videoconferencing with the undertrials and in urgent cas-

es, judges may be requested to hold courts in the respective jails. The advisory also said that undertrials should be provided required medical treatment in hospitals located inside jail premises.

Meanwhile, the lawyers

are not participating and appearing in proceedings and only proxy counsels are taking dates.

In view of the inputs received from authorities concerned and as directed by the district and session judge, it has been ordered that duty metropolitan magistrate of district courts will conduct remand proceedings of undertrials at Central Jail (Tihar), Rohini Jail and Mandoli Jail.

Tis Hazari incident: IPS officers vent ire on Twitter

Senior IPS officers took to Twitter to express their dismay and anger following the incident outside Saket District Courts on Monday when a policeman riding a motorcycle was beaten up by men who appeared to be lawyers. The immediate reason of the attack was not known.

On November 2, violence erupted at the Tis Hazari Courts in north Delhi between the police and lawyers following a parking row in which 21 police personnel and eight lawyers were injured. As many as 14 motorcycles and a police car were burnt and eight prison vans were damaged.

In a special hearing on Sunday, the Delhi High Court ordered a judicial inquiry by a retired High Court judge into the clash and directed that "no coercive action should be taken against any lawyer on the basis of the FIRs lodged at the behest of police officers".

Sharing a video of the Tis Hazari incident where a policeman is seen being dragged and beaten by over 50 lawyers on the court premises, senior IPS officer Aslam Khan posted on Twitter, "Any opinion? This was starting point of tussle what I could guess. For how long police will be at receiving end just because they have no support and leadership."

Abhinav Kumar who is posted in Jammu & Kashmir, wrote on Twitter, "As a proud policeman serving in Kashmir, recent HC order in the clash of lawyers & police is demoralizing for police all over India..."

Man held for opening fire outside BJP MP's office

Accused is a wrestling coach in a college

A 51-year-old man was arrested for allegedly opening fire outside the office of BJP MP Hans Raj Hans in Delhi's Rohini on Monday evening, the police said.

The man has been identified as Rameshwar Pehalwan, a resident of Bawana. He has been working as a wrestling coach in a Delhi University college since 23 years, they said. The police said they were informed about the incident around 5.40 p.m.

The police said that the man had fired two shots outside the office of Mr. Hans.

In the CCTV footage of the incident, the man, who was wearing a saffron kurta and white pyjamas, can be seen firing in the air outside the lawmaker's office, a senior police officer said.

The office was locked and nobody was inside. He created a ruckus and hurled abuses before opening fire. The man was under the influence of alcohol at the time of incident, the officer added.

He had come in a "blackish grey or black car" and left the spot in the vehicle after the incident.

ter the incident.

A case was registered and the man was arrested, said Deputy Commissioner of Police (Rohini) S.D. Mishra.

A personal grouse appears to be the motive behind the incident, the officer said, adding that further investigation into the matter is under way.

The vehicle and the weapon have been seized, the police said, adding that the weapon is .32 bore and is licenced.

Mr. Hans, meanwhile, called the act a cowardly one and demanded a thorough probe by the State police.

"I have no perconal comi-

"I have no personal enmity with anyone. But I have been consistently exposing anti-people policies of the ruling party in Delhi. So someone may have been annoyed with this," a Delhi BJP statement quoted Mr. Hans.

No immediate reaction was available from the ruling party in Delhi over the issue.

Architect molested in Sainik Farms, case filed

EC to debut 'booth app' for Delhi polls

The upcoming Delhi Assembly elections will debut the Election Commission's 'Booth app', which will automate real-time collection and display of booth-wise voter data, Chief Election Officer Ranbir Singh said on Monday

Using the mobile application, once a voter enters a particular booth, their identification will be scanned by officials and their details will be automatically verified, Mr. Singh said. Following this, the voter will be "logged out" once they have cast their ballot, he added.

Full usage

While pilot versions of the app had been deployed at by-elections in Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra and Harvana, the Delhi Assembly elections will see the full implementation of the app, Mr. Singh said. Details of the app were shared at a meeting of the officials of the Election Commission of India with the State election officials and others to review poll preparedness and gear up for the polls.

According to officials, the app will allow for different types of information, such as demographic data and voter turnout, to be collected and updated in real time. Through the app, voters can also check queues at their polling booths and time their visit accordingly.

Despite repeated attempts, the university administration did not respond to allegations that paramilitary personnel had entered the campus.

The university, however, called for a meeting of provosts and hostel presidents to discuss issues that the students have been facing.

"It is due to the student community's continuing efforts that a meeting of provosts has been called with all the hostel presidents, ostensibly to discuss the fee hike. The administration is clearly running scared of students. We invite the administration not to fear but address the issues at hand and revoke the unacceptable Hostel Manual Draft and fee hike," the JNU-SU stated.

The students' union said that the hiked fee would force several students currently studying at the university to drop out as they would not be in a position to

Responding to the protests, JNU V-C released a statement to the press, which read: "The provosts have invited the hostel presidents for a meeting on November 6. We request the hostel presidents to meet their provosts along with the wardens and discuss their issues. We appeal to the students to resume their academic activities. Issues can be resolved through dialogue with the officials of Inter Hall Administration.'

Student's assault at police station: SHO challenges constitution of PCA

'PCA not in consonance with Supreme Court's 2006 order'

A police officer has approached the Delhi High Court challenging the constitution of the Police Complaint Authority (PCA) and the proceedings initiated by it against him for allegedly torturing and beating up a Scheduled Caste student inside the premises of a police station.

Mahaveer Prasad Saini, who is the Station House Officer at Adarsh Nagar police station, has contended that the PCA set up by the Delhi government in 2017 was not in consonance with the Supreme Court's 2006 direction to set up such a body each at the State and district levels.

The petition said that



the apex court had directed that the state-level PCA would deal with complaints against officers of the rank of superintendent of police and above, while the district-level body would address complaints against officers up to the rank of deputy superintendent of police.

He has also sought quashing of the proceedings initiated against him by the PCA which had on September 2 taken suo motu cognisance of news reports regarding the alleged assault of a law student by policemen inside the police station premises.

He has said that an FIR was registered on October 1 on the student's complaint and is being investigated by the police while the National Commission for Scheduled Caste is also looking into the matter, and therefore, there was no need for the PCA to suo motu initiate proceedings against

High Court allows Akali leader to visit Pakistan

He wanted to go to Nankana Sahib

The Delhi High Court on Monday permitted Shiromani Akali Dal (Delhi) president Paramjit Singh Sarna, who was stopped at the Attari border, to go to Pakistan to visit Nankana Sahib.

The HC suspended the Look Out Circular (LOC) issued against Mr. Sarna but ordered him to return on or before November 16. It also sought responses from the ministries of home and external affairs, as well as the Economic Offence Wing (EOW) of the Delhi Police, on Mr. Sarna's plea seeking quashing of the LOC.

On October 31, Mr. Sarna, who was leading a religious procession, was not allowed by immigration authorities to enter Pakistan on the

ground that he was facing a cheating case registered in Delhi in 2012.

Mr. Sarna was going to Pakistan via the Attari border to visit Nankana Sahib on the 550th anniversary of Sikhism founder Guru Nanak Dev. In his petition, Mr Sarna has sought to quash the authorities action in restraining him from travelling abroad. The HC has listed the case for further hearing on January 22, 2020.

NGT notice over STP in Gurugram

Pollution: U.P. farmers seek govt. support

'Government could buy stubble... it could be a source of biomass energy'

With pollution rising in cities of western Uttar Pradesh, farmers are seeking government support to get over the environmental crisis. It is not just Ghaziabad or Noida anymore, the Air Quality Index has crossed 'severe' category in Baghpat, Meerut,

Hapur, and Bulandshar. "Farmers are being made to feel responsible for the rising pollution levels, when the main cause is the increase in the number of vehicles in Delhi-NCR," said Nishant Chaudhary, a postgraduate who does farming for a living in Achheja village of Bulandshahr.

"Stubble burning is just one of the many causes of pollution. It is being 'marketed' by governments of different States to pass the buck on the ordinary farmer who is grappling with an increase in input costs. It gets highlighted because its impact could be 'seen' because of the change in season," he

Admitting pollution was affecting their children, Mr. Chaudhary said farmers prevent stubble burning. "At this time, every day is important for the farmer, as he is preparing for the wheat crop. He can't wait for the subsidised mulcher to reach him. The government could buy stubble. It could be a source of biomass energy."

Gopal Singh, who has a farm in Hastinapur and agricultural land in Jewar, said farmers used the stubble to

feed the cattle after mixing it with sugarcane leaves.

Mr. Singh cautioned that the presence of combine harvester could be felt in the region as well and "perhaps that's why the number of cases of stubble burning has increased in the last couple of years".

"We have so much unemployment, and agriculture could provide jobs to so many people. The government should think," said Mr. Chaudhary.

'Government's job'

Mojpal Singh, retired professor of agriculture, Janta Vedic College, Baraut, said it was the government's job to think long term, not farmers. "Farmers indulge in stubble burning because they are left with no choice. This is not the case with those who burn crackers or drive cars,"

well marked low pressure area over the next 12 hours and move west-northwestwards. It is very likely to concentrate into a depression over east central Bay of Bengal during the subsequent 48 hours and intensify further with northwestwards movements," he said.

Mr. Biswas, however, said dry weather would prevail over the districts of Odisha over the next four days (till November 7). The bulletin said light to moderate rain or thundershower are very likely to occur at one or two places over

coastal Odisha.

"Squally weather with gusty surface wind speed reaching 40-50 kmph is likely to prevail over east central Bay of Bengal from November 5 and over west central Bay of Bengal from November 7. Sea condition is likely to be rough to very rough. Fishermen are advised not to venture into deep sea areas of east central Bay of Bengal from November 5," the bulletin warns.

Experts, however, said weather model has indicated about the formation of a cyclone, which would become clearer by November 10.

The atmospheric system would move in north-west direction which means Odisha and north Andhra Pradesh could be hit, they said.

'Cyclone Maha may weaken before landfall'

Cyclone Maha is expected to weaken as a cyclonic storm before its landfall on the Gujarat coast between Devbhumi-Dwarka district and Union Territory of Diu in the early hours of Thursday, India Meteorological Department (IMD) officials said on Monday.

The State government has requisitioned 15 additional teams of the National Disaster Response Force while Naval units have been put on standby. Chief Minister Vijay Rupani on Monday held a review meeting of preparations, while the Union Cabinet Secretary took stock of administrative preparedness through a video conferencing, the IMD officials said.

Earlier, it was predicted that Cyclone Maha would hit the coast as a severe cyclonic storm. Additional Chief Secretary, Revenue, Pankai Kumar said, "Out of the 12,600 fishing boats which had ventured into the sea, only 600 are left to return. We are making efforts to bring them back as the sea would be rough in the coming days." There will be widespread rains in most parts of Gujarat over the next two days.

Farmers suffering due to delay in forming govt.: Supriya Sule

NCP's Baramati MP presents 'bouquet' of rotting crops, fruits to BJP State chief

The Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) MP from Baramati, Supriya Sule, on Monday said the absence of a government was delaying much-needed relief to farmers hit hard by unseasonal rain. She said there was widespread anger among farmers and accused the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Shiv Sena of being irresponsible in not forming the government in the State.

'Unfulfilled promises'

Ms. Sule, after surveying ravaged fields in Purandar in her Lok Sabha constituency, said the outgoing BIP-Sena government has not yet fulfilled its promise to waive farm loans. She said it is doubtful that the Chief Minister's announcement of a ₹10,000-crore relief package will reach the distressed farmers. Ms. Sule said, "There is tremendous anger among farmers here [in Purandar]. No political machinery is in place even nearly 12 days after the declaration of results. Authorities and ruling party leaders are rarely to be seen on the field." On

The BIP State chief said the crisis was unprecedented and unseasonal showers had destroyed rice, maize, soybean crops and several fruit fields.

Earlier, Pune Divisional Commissioner Dr. Deepak Mhaisekar said unseasonal rain had ruined over 1.36 lakh hectares of cropland in Pune, Satara, Sangli and Solapur districts, affecting farmers across 51 taluks in the Pune division.

Sena says save farmers at all costs, demands more aid

Party terms inadequate govt.'s ₹10,000-crore relief package

The Shiv Sena on Monday said the intricacies of go vernment formation in Maharashtra should not push rain-hit farmers towards existential crisis and demanded that they be provided a relief package of around ₹30,000 crore.

"Farmers in the State need to be saved at all costs,' an editorial in party mouthpiece Saamana said on Monday. It termed inadequate the ₹10,000-crore aid announced by the State government for crop damage due to unseasonal rain. The country is also facing an economic slowdown, resulting in lakhs of people being deprived of employment, the editorial pointed out.

'Bitter tussle for power'

The party's comments have come at a time when it is locked in a bitter tussle with the BJP over government formation in the State. The editorial said, "Farmers should not be pushed to face the existential crisis due to the untimely showers in Maharashtra, which is also going through political intricacy.' It added that the govern-

ment's priority should be to extend assistance to cultivators and "farmers should be saved, whatever may be the cost for it". The editorial said, "The announced amount of ₹10,000 crore is inadequate. Farmers should have been provided an assistance of of ₹25,000 crore to ₹30,000 crore."

As per an initial evaluation, crops on 54.22 lakh hectares across 325 talukas in the State have been damaged. "The woes of cultivators should be addressed. Whatever may be the form of the current government in the State, it should offer ₹25,000 per hectare to the affected farmers," the Saamana editorial said.

Farmers have nowhere to go as their major crops like

soybean, grapes, cotton and sugarcane have been severely affected, the editorial noted, adding that horticulture and floriculture have suffered a setback due to untimely showers last month. The Sena cited the case of 50-year-old farmer Dharma Iadhay, who recently committed suicide after being depressed as unseasonal rain flooded his paddy field in Palghar district.

Warning to insurers

The editorial said, "He was not debt-ridden, but his crop was damaged due to heavy rain following which he ended his life. The government's priority should be to extend assistance to farmers. It should not waste time in technicalities of damage assessment, but ensure that farmers are the direct beneficiaries of aid."

The Sena said around 50 lakh farmers have taken crop insurance, and it requested the insurers not to create any hurdles in clearance of the claims. "If the crop insurance companies create trouble for farmers, they should understand that they will have to face the Sena," the editorial warned.

SC to hear today petition on purported clip of Yediyurappa

It proves that defection of MLAs was at the behest of the BJP, says Congress

The Supreme Court will on Tuesday hear an application filed by the Karnataka unit of the Congress to take on record a compact disc and transcripts of a speech allegedly made by Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa about the BJP backing the disqualified Congress-Janata Dal (Secular) legislators to topple the Kumaraswamy government.

The application was orally mentioned before a Bench led by Justice N.V. Ramana by senior advocate Kapil Sibal and advocate Sunil Fernandes on Monday for urgent listing.

This development comes shortly after the Bench extensively heard the petitions filed by the disqualified legislators challenging their ouster from the Assembly under



the anti-defection law. On October 25, the Bench reserved the case for judgment. In the four-page application, the Congress said the "annexed transcript which contains the speech of Shri Yeddurappa unequivocally establishes the fact that the entire defection of the petitioners was at the behest, supervision and directions of the leaders of the BJP".

It said: "A perusal of the transcript would clearly re-



veal that the motive of the petitioners was to defect and bring down the Kumaraswamy government, thereby attracting provisions of the Tenth Schedule of Constitution of India, 1950."

The application said the Congress had sent a letter on November 2 through the Karnataka Governor to the President of India seeking the dismissal of Yediyurappa government and Union Home Minister Amit Shah.

⁺ Fishermen from Kerala, T.N. stranded in Lakshadweep

50 of them were fleeing from Cyclone Maha last week

Around 50 fishermen from Kerala and Tamil Nadu are stranded at Kalpeni in the Lakshadweep Islands where they, fleeing from Cyclone Maha, sought refuge in the last week of October.

Seeking help from the government to return home, the men said they were running low on food and fuel. The authorities in Kalpeni were not being cooperative, they alleged.

"All of us are forced to remain on the boat. There is no other place to stay. We are low on food and the catch has begun to rot in the boats," said Selvaraj, whose boat with 10 men entered Kalpeni on the morning of October 26, the last of the five boats to do so.

Four of the boats, all from

Tamil Nadu, reached the inhabited atoll on October 23.

The fishermen in the boats hail from Kanyakumari district of Tamil Nadu and from three villages in Thiruvananthapuram district, Kerala.

Alert on wireless

Selavaraj's boat was in the middle of the sea on October 24 when a wireless message warned them about the impending cyclone. They were asked to make for the nearest land. The deep depression in the Maldives-Lakshadweep region, which later intensified into Cyclone Ma ha, had the Lakshadweep Islands directly in its path.

But Kalpeni being the nearest, Selvaraj and his companions had decided to make for the island. "We approached Kalpeni by 8.30 p.m. on October 25, but were warned not to close in as rough seas and strong winds were reported near the shore. We spent the night in the boat and made for the land on October 26 morning," he said.

Speaking on the issue, Fisheries Minister J. Mercykutty Amma's office said. "We understand that 12-14 boats are stranded in the islands. The Lakshadweep administration has been contacted. Arrangements have been made to provide them with food and accommodation," an official said.

A Bench led by Justice N.V. Ramana issued notice to the Centre on a petition filed by G.V. Harsha Kumar, represented by advocates Sravan Kumar and Hitendranath Rath, that many unauthorised boats are plying in the rivers, especially in Andhra Pradesh, with little regard for the safety of people. The petition said neither the Centre nor the States had done anything to strictly implement the laws on boat services.

The immediate trigger for the petition was the boat accident in the Godavari river in Andhra Pradesh on September 15.

When the neighbour's mixie is too loud

Inane complaints leave staff at police control rooms and civic helplines stumped

Last month, a staff member of the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) helpline received a call late at night from an elderly woman complaining about dogs in her neighbourhood. "I was worried thinking the lady wanted to complain about a dog bite. After 15 minutes of narration, she said the dogs were barking too loudly and contributing to the noise pollution in her neighbourhood. It took me a few moments to explain to her that we could not

intervene in any way.' Personnel manning some helplines in the city, including those of the police and civic agencies, have

been stumped by such calls, which range from prank calls to complaints about the neighbour's mixie or pressure cooker being too For example, the police

control room received a call three months ago from a teenager who wanted to complain about his girlfriend befriending another boy. When the helpline officials said they could not help him, he told them that it was a kidnap case. Police personnel swung into action, only to realise that the girl was out on her own will.

Some prank calls too have caused anxious moments. Last month, a person called the BBMP helpline and



claimed that the Nayandahalli flyover had collapsed. The helpline staff alerted the jurisdictional officials and asked them to rush to the spot, but later realised that it had been a prank call. The police helpline also often gets bomb hoax calls.

To tackle this, the BBMP, which receives an average of 200 calls a day, now asks the complainant to first give

their mobile number. It has also begun recording all

K. Ajay Kumar, in-charge Deputy Commissioner of Police (city control room), said such calls increase late at night. "People make drunk calls to the helpline and also say they are lonely and ask our staff to come and meet them. Some try to settle scores with people they are having a dispute with and say that they are peddling drugs or are involved in a kidnap case," he said.

However, the staff at the police helpline, which receives 8,000 calls daily, say they cannot ignore any call and have to get all of them verified.


A Bench comprising Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi and Justice Surya Kant did not allow the plea of Vikas who had sought parole for four weeks on the grounds that it was his constitutional right and he had spent around seventeen-and-half years of total 25 years jail term awarded to him in the case.

"You have been sentenced for 25 years of imprisonment, complete it," the Bench said, dismissing his parole plea. The Bench also dismissed another plea of



Vikas in which he had challenged the constitutional validity of the Delhi High court order awarding him the jail term without any remission.

The plea had said that courts are not permitted under the statute to specify the time limit of the imprisonment and put a condition that the jail term will operate without any grant of remission. "The petitions are dismissed," the court said.

String of deaths

There are laws preventing the use of synthetic kite strings, but enforcement is lacking

The perilous use of *manja*, a synthetic kite string coated with powdered glass, remains pervasive, endangering human lives and making a mockery of the multiple bans on its manufacture and sale. Threeyear-old Abhinayu of Chennai, who died on Sunday after a dangling manja slit his neck while he was seated on a motorcycle his father rode, is the latest victim. Only in August, a man in Delhi bled to death after being entangled by a manja. Actually, the earliest recorded instance of a death caused by a kite string in Chennai was in October 1975 in the wake of which 197 people were arrested. Kite flying is not just a pastime but also an organised festival in States such as Gujarat and Rajasthan. During this year's Makar Sankranti, three persons were killed in Gujarat and over a 100 injured in different States. Birds, including the White Rumped Vulture, get frequently entangled in manja strings as well. An estimate cited by the Animal Welfare Board of India said that at least 2,000 birds are injured at the annual kite flying event in Ahmedabad of which 500 eventually die.

What has turned the once-harmless activity of kite flying into a bloody societal menace is the substitution of the traditional cotton thread with the nylon or single plastic fiber string made of monofilament fishing line coated with powdered glass. Dubbed Chinese manja (though locally manufactured), the transparent and light-coloured string is not easily visible. While the cotton thread too is coated with finely powdered glass, its sharpness is blunted when mixed with boiled rice, flour, egg white and tree gum. The factory-scale manufacture of Chinese manja and its pricing at just onethird of the rate of a cotton spool, coupled with the thrill of cutting off another kite, has led to its widespread use. The nylon string is also non-biodegradable, making it an environmental hazard. When dangling from high-tension overhead electricity cables, it has also led to electrical accidents. Taking these into account, in July 2017, the National Green Tribunal banned synthetic manja across India. It directed the authorities to book violators not only under the provisions of the Indian Penal Code but also invoke the Environment (Protection) Act, Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, and Wildlife (Protection) Act as the case would warrant. Multiple State governments have banned the manja. But what is lacking is enforcement. The police seize spools of manja and arrest a few persons each time a human life is lost. There is no sustained endeavour to end the menace. Also, cases of people being convicted for manufacturing, selling or using manja are rare. Unless the authorities get their act together, the list of casualties could only get bigger with another Makar Sankranti around in two months' time.

Clearing the air

Tackling Delhi's pollution needs tough, unpopular measures well ahead of winter

elhi is once again in the grip of its annual, winter pollution crisis. The city's tryst with air pollution crises isn't new. The rising prominence of particulate matter (PM) from various sources has long been a public health scourge. What differentiates the prevalent PM crisis from earlier ones is the public's ability to monitor pollution levels for themselves. The measurement of pollution, which used to be the domain of weather agencies or pollution control boards, can now be done with consumer appliances. However, increased public awareness and social media angst haven't translated into meaningful public action. The Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) in Delhi, which provides for a ratcheting slew of measures – from stopping construction work to halting private vehicles isn't effective when air quality reaches its nadir. It recommends action only after pollutants soar. A Task Force – which comprises top officials of Delhi and the Centre – advises the Environmental Pollution Control Authority, which is in charge of enforcing the GRAP. Rarely does it recommend tough pre-emptive action and when it does, there's no real pressure on municipal

bodies and police to ensure that polluters are punished. There is a sense of resignation among both the Centre and the Delhi government about tackling the crisis. Meteorology and Delhi's geography render the city vulnerable to a certain amount of winter pollution, particularly when wind speeds drop to less than 10 kmph. But, preventing local sources of pollution from worsening air quality will require both the State and the Centre to implement unpopular decisions. This would include an outright ban on two wheelers, three wheelers and cars when air quality starts to deteriorate, a halt on construction, shutting down power plants in the vicinity of Delhi and a substantial spike in parking rates. And, of course, getting the farmers of Punjab and Haryana to not burn stubble at all. Even if this confluence of miracles were to occur, it wouldn't guarantee blue skies on a windless day and, therefore, political brownie points. This makes it convenient for governments to engage in theatre such as having Ministers bicycle to work and blaming farmers for burning rice chaff. The Delhi government and the Centre routinely cite pollution figures averaged for the entire year to claim success of some piecemeal measure or the other but hide the lows of October and November. Tackling Delhi's winter air requires tough steps that need to be in place at least a couple of months before the plummet. At the very least, it requires an empowered, independent agency that can implement measures while negotiating the tricky relationship between the Centre and Delhi. Else, beyond the momentary outrage, the battle against pol-

A rights-based framework to theorise poverty

Debates on deprivation need to be grounded in the language of equality, opportunity and justice

rather interesting debate has followed the awarding of the Nobel Prize in Economics to Esther Duflo, Abhijit Banerjee and Michael Kerner. Critics have argued that the method followed by the three avoids big questions about income inequality and redistribution. The question from the perspective of political theory is, perhaps, bigger – what is the moral status of the global poor in poverty reduction schemes? Do the poor have names, faces, aspirations, dreams, projects and sensibilities? Or are they destined to be anonymous and faceless?

About thirty years ago, prominent philosophers based in Western universities sparked off what came to be known as the 'global justice debate'. The argument caught imaginations across the world. Seldom had people seen such missionary zeal ignited in young minds studying in philosophy departments. Everyone wanted to do something about global poverty and the global poor.

An exclusionary debate

Ironically, the global justice debate was extremely exclusionary - it divided the world into the 'distant needy' in the global south; and the affluent people living in the West who owed the global poor for various reasons, ranging from compassion, guilt, charity and philanthropy to injustice wreaked by global institutions, like the World Trade Organization, dominated by Western powers.

Nowhere did we find a mention

of colonialism as a factor that was responsible for poverty. Unlike the 1970s dependency debate, scholars of the 'third world' were excluded by definitional fiat from a debate pitched as 'universal' and 'global'. The West owed 'our poor', but we had no obligation to the poor of the first world. In these philosophically complex theories, the global poor continued to be 'anonymous'; they were inert, mere recipients of concern and, sometimes, charity doled out by the West. Poverty was cause for some anxiety, the moral status of the global poor was not of interest.

Recollect the 2005 campaign organised by global civil society: 'Make Poverty History'. The campaign harnessed celebrities like Bob Geldof, Bono, and Brad Pitt to add glamour to the agenda. The media was deployed to tell a tale of how 'we' could change 'their' lives through symbolic gestures, such as wearing white bands, signifying solidarity. Sceptics remarked that the campaign showcased less of poverty and more of those who wanted to make a difference. The poor remained on the margins. 'Third world' activists were outraged; the campaign had staged the pornography of poverty.

In other circles, these campaigns caught on because they did not offend anyone. There was no demand for economic redistribution, creative use of political power or progressive taxation. They conformed to 'sufficientarian' philosophy: give the poor enough to eat. How does it matter whether they are given an opportunity to be equal to the rest or not?

But poverty cannot be abstracted from society; it is a product of and a signifier of a deeply unjust and unequal society. P is poor because she does not have the resources to go to school, read, in-



dulge in hobbies, watch a movie, go out with her friends and plan a career like other girls. P, note, is not only *poor*, she is *unequal* to others because she is unable to do the things they do.

The poor are not only deprived of access to material benefits, they are socially marginalised, reduced to vote banks by political parties, humiliated and subjected to intense disrespect. To be poor is to be robbed of the opportunity to participate in social, economic and cultural transactions from a plane of equality. Poverty is not only about *poverty*; it is also about inequality. Researchers and policymakers have to take this aspect of poverty head on. Can we do something about poverty without taking on an oppressive society? If we cannot do so, poverty will continue to be produced and reproduced by an exploitative society, as an integral part of this society.

Rising up in revolt

More significantly, how can we ignore that on momentous occasions, the poor have acted not as passive, inert subjects but as agents? We would do well to remember that the debate on global poverty accelerated in the 1990s. By then, the first phase of the globalisation project propelled by

doctrines of free trade and unregulated markets had run into trouble in countries like Mexico, Thailand, Japan, Russia and Brazil; impoverished thousands; and generated rage and discontent. Since the 1980s, countries in South America and in Sub-Saharan Africa had been rocked by what came to be known as 'anti-IMF riots'. Now, activists proceeded to target multilateral institutions identified as responsible for the generalised misery of the global south.

A major shift in the rhetoric and strategy of global institutions was in response to aggressive and sustained campaigns like the '50 years [of the World Bank] is enough' in the concrete and virtual spaces of global civil society. In many cases, the global poor fought alongside activists against terrible outcomes of globalisation.

Across the global south, grassroots organisations have struggled to implement 'social protection' schemes, and give the poor rights to the land upon which they have constructed rude shanty towns. The poor have standing as political agents because they have struggled for some social provisioning, bargained with political parties, and shown solidarity with other

"The heart of the capital", wrote Graham Greene in The Comedians, "is a shanty town". Note how the shanty town defines the modern city; how, for instance, in Mumbai, multi-storied shacks interrogate planning and architecture, how they subvert the notion of the planned city, and how they transform urban landscapes. We do not have to romanticise the shanty town like Raj Kapoor did in Shree 420. The shanty town has a dark culture best exemplified by Amitabh Bachchan's character in *Deewaar*. But we should be able to appreciate the grit of the inhabitants. They construct the city but the heartless city has no place for them. They make their own place through struggle. They know that justice has to be wrested from imperfectly just states.

People with rights

How can we, then, theorise the moral status of the poor? One way this can be done is by imagining human beings as bearers of the right to a fair share in the collective resources of society. If these resources have been disproportionately monopolised by upperclass groups, and if others have been historically subjected to injustice, disadvantaged persons have the right to demand that they be granted their rightful share. There is a difference between people approaching the system as victims and people fighting for their rights. A fair share in the resources of the society can be conceptualised as ownership of enough resources to allow human beings a reasonable chance of living decent lives. The wider objective of redistributive justice is that persons should participate in society, politics, and the market as equals.

Finally, at some point, we have to ask whether our task as democrats ends with the proposition that people should not be poor. Should we disclaim any further responsibility for the historically disadvantaged after providing them with minimum material needs? Should we not move constantly towards a shared vision of an egalitarian democracy where people can live fulfilling lives, instead of remaining mired in notions of minimal reparation or remedies?

Fusing traditional medicine with the modern

Taking cues from the Chinese experience, India can integrate the education, research and practice of both systems

evival of the Indian systems of medicine, which comprises Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha, and Homeopathy (AYUSH), served as one of the sub-themes of the cultural nationalistic reassertion in the early 20th century against the imperialistic British reign. Little wonder then that there are high hopes that the Narendra Modi government and its seeming nationalistic ardour will spell good times for the perennially neglected alternative medicine sector, especially Ayurveda. Much in line with the expectations, a number of initiatives to promote AYUSH have been recently announced. This includes: creating AYUSH wings in defence and railway hospitals; giving soft loans and subsidies for the establishment of private AYUSH hospitals and clinics; and building institutes of excellence in teaching and research in AYUSH. Also, 12,500 dedicated AYUSH health and wellness centres are planned to be set up under the Ayushman Bharat mission. Here, two important areas presenting significant policy concerns and implications can be identified.

One persistent tendency in our k ey strategies to mainstream AY-USH medicine has been to regard that the problem lies simply in there being 'less' of AYUSH. Hence, integration of AYUSH into the health-care system has been largely conflated with having more number of AYUSH facilities or having them in place where there

A fraught relationship

It is common knowledge that AY-USH's relationship with modern medicine has been fraught with multiple issues - including quackery by AYUSH practitioners; ridicule of AYUSH treatments and procedures by many; and mindless cosmeticisation and export promotion of AYUSH products. However, has little by way of a concrete harmonising strategy has been devised to address these concerns. These issues are reflective of a sharp status gap between modern medicine and AYUSH that is highly detrimental for the optimal deployment of AYUSH resources. Merely expanding AY-USH's framework will only expand the present list of problems.

True integration would require a concerted strategy for facilitating meaningful cross-learning and collaboration between the modern

and conceptual divergences betand traditional systems on equal terms. This is the only way to address the subservient status of AY-USH and to foster its legitimate inclusion into mainstream health care. The Chinese experience of

integrating Traditional Chinese Medicine with Western medicine makes for a good example. An Indian parallel could envision the integration of education, research, and practice of both systems at all levels. This can include training of AYUSH practitioners in modern medicine through curriculum changes and vice versa. However, this would entail substantial groundwork with respect to the prerequisites of such integration: namely, building a strong traditional medicine evidence corpus: delineating the relative strengths, weaknesses, and role of each system; negotiating the philosophical ween systems; standardising and regulating AYUSH practices and qualifications; and addressing the unique issues associated with research into AYUSH techniques.

It is interesting to note that while China embarked upon the path in the 1950s, a solid road map to address the above challenges still fails to transcend political rhetoric in India.

Recently, the National Medical Commission Act, 2019 was passed in the face of much opposition from the orthodox medical community, apparently signifying political will. While an earlier proposal for a bridge course for AYUSH graduates was shelved, there is no reason why the opposition to integration of traditional and modern systems cannot be nullified, particularly in view of the vast poten-

tial of AYUSH to contribute to universal health-care in India.

Historically, attempts at integration have been foiled by parties from both within and outside the AYUSH sector. In keeping with the recommendations of the Chopra Committee (1948), baby steps were taken to integrate the teaching of traditional and modern systems of medicines, proposals that were later scrapped. While the AY-USH lobby feared a loss of identity following such integration, the allopathic lobby alleged that standards of medical care would be

This kind of isolationist approach goes against the cherished ideal of modern medicine to embrace concepts that are backed by evidence. In the case of traditional medicine, an isolationist attitude could deter scientific scrutiny and block some potential value addition. An integrated framework should create a middle path - fusing the two systems, while still permitting some autonomy for each. Accordingly, a medium- and longterm plan for seamless integration should be developed expeditiously in view of the massive drive for achieving universal health care already under way in the country.

Kerala's modernity and its discontents

The State has lost its quest for freedom, equity and rationality



On November 1, Kerala completed 63 years as an economic-political entity. Kerala's transformative experience in education, health, social security, land reforms and decentralised governance has been widely acknowledged as a 'model' for other States. This article is an effort to evaluate Kerala's modernity in the context of the transformation that took place in Kerala society in the early part of the 20th century and the events that unfolded over the last six decades or so.

Process of renaissance

From a freedom perspective, Kerala's modernity may be said to epitomise the social actions of a community to fight successfully the caste, class iniquities and capability deprivations of the lower castes. It was a great process of renaissance that tried to discover human progress, exemplified in the teachings of Sree Naravana Guru and in the social demands of several community leaders of those times. The abolition of agrestic slavery and untouchability, the successful fighting for the right to worship in temples meant for the upper castes, the right to wear clothes of one's choice, the right to walk on roads exclusively meant for the upper castes, and so on were great achievements towards enhancing people's capabilities and freedom. Importantly these happened in a unique geographic environment of rich biodiversity, water bodies, mountain ranges, wetlands, and so on, which are rare natural endowments. Indeed, it is for the Kerala people and its governance system to carry forward the process of expanding freedoms, and development without

damage to its unique ecosystems. The ecological overkill that happened in recent decades cannot be seen independent of the political decision-making. The colonial rationality of exploiting natural resources cannot be the guiding principle of any socially responsible political party. However, that aggressively happened in Kerala. The majority of the State Legislative Committees on En-

vironment, except the 16th, which submitted its Report to the Assembly on July 4, 2019, were lukewarm to the issue of Kerala's unique environment. The 16th Report speaks of the "cruel and mean" interventions in Idukki and Wayanad districts, besides pointing out that the illegal quarries were "ten times" the legal ones. That even after the floods and landslides, more quarrying and crushing units were granted amidst protests shows that the concern for the future of the State is but rhetoric.

Despite the constraints of a State in India's quasi-federation, the quality of State and local politics is key to reducing corruption, conserving the environment, improving higher education and health care, and making policy choices that enhance freedom and social equity. That Keralites voted a Communist government to power in 1957, which initiated several progressive measures besides delivering an uncorrupt regime in the early years, cannot be forgotten. Kerala has come a long way from there.

Trajectory of development

In retrospect, the development trajectory over the last 62 years shows an early phase which sought to sustain the egalitarian project whereas the period between 1979 and 1988 witnessed a stagnation of the economy. This was followed by two events which radically altered the character of Kerala's polity, society and economy: (a) the growing outmigration of Keralites following the Gulf boom which resulted in a steady flow of remittances and (b) the introduction of Central government-led economic reforms towards liberalisation, privatisation and globalisation which not only accelerated the foreign remittance inflow, but also promoted the market-mediated growth process. These forces triggered an unprecedented increase in per capita consumption (resulting in generation of waste) and unleashed a construction boom that adversely impacted the environment, widened inequalities, and created a service-led growth process. In the absence of a strong and determined political leadership to steer the State towards a better tomorrow (which was contingent on the productive management of the inflow of foreign remittances), we see powerful real estate mafia, liquor mafia, forest mafia, sand mafia, quarry mafia, and so on hijacking the de-

crime, atrocities against women, increase in liquor consumption, increase in per day deaths caused by road accidents, and so on are disquieting signs. Can the political class ignore the writing on the wall?

Where is public action?

A moot question any concerned citizen may ask is: what has happened to Kerala's public action tradition? That public reasoning worked well in Kerala cannot be denied. Unseeability, untouchability and agrestic slavery that alienated the Dalits, and several rituals and superstitions among the Namboodiris, came to be accepted as irrational by the public. Of late, particularly after the emergence of innumerable political parties with the support of religious and community leaders, Kerala has become a virtual post-truth society. The TV debates of many Malayalam channels will bear this out. Civil society is fast slipping away from public rationality and public morality.

True, public action will affect different social groups with diverse initial endowments differently. The ethnographic study of Osella and Osella (2000) documents how the progress of the Ezhava community from a former untouchable class achieved tremendous social mobility and progress by making the best use of their exposure to modernity. On the other hand, the Dalits, the real tillers, got only homestead rights and many were confined to 'colonies of Harijans' which were certainly not uplifting choices for them. Similarly the Adivasis and fisherfolk were marginalised because they too were outside the political society and its discourse. That the marginalised communities remain as outliers is a conspicuous social failure.

The divided communities and multiplicity of political parties have fragmented the society and slackened the expansion of a reasoned public sphere. University and the higher education system have become a caricature of what they ought to be. Student, teacher and bureaucrats' politics dissipate the time and energy of universities whose primary purpose is the production and dissemination of knowledge. Has the stream of reason lost its way in Kerala?

Enhancing insurance coverage for bank deposits

Denying people the right over their hard-earned money is a colossal hazard for the financial system



When word got out about the Reserve Bank of India (RBI)'s capping of withdrawals from the Punjab and Maharashtra Cooperative (PMC) Bank at ₹1,000, it did not take long for tragic stories to start pouring in. The death count had risen to three by the time the HDIL angle was discovered. With the Non-Performing Assets (NPA) situation not improving in most banks, the advent of another major crisis brought into focus, once again, the deposit insurance cover provided by the Deposit Insurance and Credit Guarantee Corporation (DICGC), a subsidiary of the RBI.

Most people agree that the insurance limit of ₹1 lakh, set in 1993, needs to be raised to a higher amount, with some suggestions being made to raise it to ₹15 lakh, which will cover 90% of the accounts completely.

But the discussion around deposit insurance must extend beyond the amount of coverage. The lack of DICGC coverage for deposits at NBFCs (many of whom the RBI regulates) and primary cooperative societies is one such aspect. These entities often serve vulnerable sections and their depositors must not be left in the lurch in case of a crisis. Further, customers who want more coverage than the statutory cover on their deposits should be able to purchase this by paying additional premium. This option should be extended directly to banks that wish to increase the coverage of deposits to above the statutory requirements.

Freeze in withdrawal

Another deficiency in the current DICGC cover is that the ₹1 lakh insurance amount only needs to be released if a bank goes belly up. Without liquidation of the bank, no liability accrues on the insurance company to pay such a claim. The flaw in this scheme is obvious today - the 'freezes' in withdrawal directed by the RBI essentially cut the depositor's access to his money. Hence, during such periods, at least the statutory amount should be released. This will go a long way in preventing bank runs, which could be triggered when customers get alarmed about the ability of banks to repay their deposits.

Currently the DICGC charges a flat 0.1% insurance premium on the deposits of banks.

However, as suggested by an RBI panel in 2015, premium should be based on differential risk based on the lending practices of the bank, among other things. An SBI report states that 93% of the premium collected by the DICGC in 2018-19 came from commercial banks (public sector: 75%, private sector: 18%), but over 94% of the claims settled (ever since the inception of the DICGC) have been those of cooperative banks. Clearly, poor governance in cooperative banks has been cross-subsidised by the better-performing commercial banks. The DICGC must draw inspiration from standard insurance practices and charge higher premiums from banks with a past history of higher claims, so that public sector banks (PSBs) - which have made zero claims so far – need not foot the bill for someone else's mistake. This will also provide a level-playing field for PSBs which are often disadvantaged due to tight government control and inflexibility.

Bringing in private insurers

Another possibility that needs to be analysed is that of bringing private sector insurers and re-insurers into the deposit insurance segment, which could drive down premium prices. In FY19, the DICGC collected ₹12,043 crore as premium and settled ₹37 crore worth claims. Clearly, this is a lucrative area for private players who can bring in more accurate risk-based pricing of these policies. And since underwriting such policies entails significant risk-bearing on which the country's economy thrives, it needs to be reinsured by credible entities even beyond traditional re-insurers like Lloyd's of London.

Compared to other BRICS nations, India today has the lowest deposit insurance cover to per capita income ratio, at 0.9 times. Denying people the right over their hardearned money is a colossal hazard for the financial system, which runs on the trust of depositors. Already, trust in banks could be waning – in FY18, growth in bank deposits fell to a five-decade low. If the government is serious about formal financial inclusion, the stated objective of flagship schemes like the Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana, it must realise that an immediate availability of funds is as important as the insurance coverage of funds to increase the confidence of citizens in the banking system. Hence, it must take purposeful strides in expanding and rectifying the deposit insurance scheme as a safety net of the financial system.

Refusing to bite the bullet

Joining RCEP would have helped India integrate with Asian trade regionalism

On November 4, Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who was on the horns of an unenviable dilemma at the Leaders Summit in Bangkok, Thailand, finally decided to stay out of the 16-member Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP).

An unenviable dilemma

On the one hand, India registered a bilateral trade deficit with 11 of 15 RCEP participating countries in 2018-19. There was every reason to believe that these deficits would increase if India joined RCEP. An unmistakable pattern is evident in India's prior preferential trade agreements with East Asian countries. An uptick in overall exports is overshadowed by a larger rise in manufactured goods imports, which displaces many vulnerable domestic producers. The scale of deficit in electronic goods and related parts could have even tipped the economy towards a current account contingency. Economists will argue that plurilateral trade agreements, such as RCEP, are "welfare enhancing" for India. Be that as it may, without the politically challenging reform of India's factor markets, which would enable its small and medium enterprises to profitably slot themselves within East Asia's vibrant value chains, the likelihood of displacement and steep unemployment is high and cannot not be glazed over.

On the other hand, India desperately needs to sign-on to both an export-oriented growth model and a regional integration strategy if it is to ever stimulate its latent manufacturing prowess and overcome its steep development challenges. RCEP provided a gateway on both these fronts.

Export sophistication, i.e. the production of sophisticated tradable goods, has been shown to be the most important determinant of sustained growth in late-developing and industrialising economies. To the extent that the other standard determinants of growth raise an economy's growth potential, they do so insofar that they contribute to increasing the economy's production of sophisticated tradable goods. It is little wonder, then, that no major industrialising

economy has maintained a 7% plus growth rate without a sharp and sustained growth in manufactured goods exports. Investment and exports acting in concert must become a key foundation of India's growth. RCEP furnishes a concerted liberalisation framework which, if paired with domestic factor market reforms, could have propelled the country towards its 'Make in India' targets in ways that no amount of tinkering with the 'Ease of Doing Business' rankings will achieve.

Regional implications The implications of joining RCEP on the regional integration front and for Mr. Modi's 'Act East' policy were as acute. India does not participate in the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum, where best practices in trade and digital economy endeavours are formulated. It is not a member of the Chiang Mai Initiative, which has evolved from a currency swap arrangement into an embryonic form of Asian financial regionalism. It was excluded from the Comprehensive and Progressive Trans-Pacific Partnership negotiations, and is only marginally attached to the region by way of shallow economic partnership agreements with Japan, South Korea and the ASEAN countries. RCEP afforded a fleeting opportunity for New Delhi to hitch its wagon to the global epicentre of 'open regionalism' at a time when protectionism and populism are casting a pall over India's economic rise in the global system. Without an economic integration strategy in Asia, India will have no strategy in Asia and the sum total of its 'Act East' policy will amount to little more than becoming the naval doorman of the Indo-Pacific. By signing on to RCEP and instituting structural reforms at home, Mr. Modi had an opportunity to integrate India within Asian trade regionalism. To ensure that such an opportunity does not go abegging next time, he should pursue factor market reforms so that he will never have to face such a dilemma again.







Vagaries of a draft Constitution

The outlines of a three-unit federal-type internal constitution for Jammu and Kashmir, proposed in October last by the Steering Committee of the State People's Convention headed by Sheikh Abdullah, are being studied in different circles in the State. But in the absence of an "agreed solution" of the larger Kashmir question..., the outlines of the draft constitution have left everybody guessing. Curiously, when he was still the Prime Minister of the State, Sheikh Abdullah announced... on April 17, 1953, that it had been decided to give "autonomy" to different cultural units in Jammu and Kashmir so that no unit entertained the fear of being dominated by the other. The State Constituent Assembly was then functioning and it was assumed that appropriate provisions would be incorporated in the Constitution "to ensure voluntary co-operation among various cultural groups in the State." Apparently, Jammu and Kashmir State is a "museum" of languages, cultures and geographical conditions. The Sheikh's announcement was thus an admission that internal stresses ... existed in the border State. Keeping this in view, the outlines of a draft constitution were then reportedly prepared envisaging Jammu and Kashmir to be a federal and autonomous republic within the Indian Union.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO NOV. 5, 1919.

The Khalifat Question.

Delhi, November 1. – Mr. M.K. Gandhi has addressed the following letter to the press: -Several friends have enquired what should be the position regarding the forthcoming peace celebrations. At the Khalifat day I know that resolutions were passed at some meetings to the effect that Mahomedans could not participate in the celebrations if the Khalifat question was not satisfactorily settled. There can be no peace in Indian estimation so long as the great question remains unsolved and the Mahomedan sentiment is in danger of being lacerated and millions of Mahomedans remaining in suspense or grief, it is hardly possibly for the Hindus, Parsis, Christians, Jews and others for whom India is the land of their adoption or birth to take part in the forthcoming rejoicings. I venture to think that His Excellency the Viceroy can, if he will, tell his Majesty's Ministers that Indians cannot participate in the celebrations so long as the Khalilfat question remains unsettled.

India walks out of RCEP. says will hurt farmers

Later in the evening, a joint leaders' statement indicated that despite India's "unresolved" outstanding issues, other countries were prepared to go ahead with the RCEP agreement.

"We noted 15 (of 16) RCEP Participating Countries have concluded text-based negotiations for all 20 chapters and essentially all their market access issues; and tasked legal scrubbing by them to commence for signing in 2020," the statement issued at the end of the summit said. "India's final decision will depend on satisfactory resolution of these issues," the joint statement

No later entry

When asked whether India might consider joining RCEP at a later date, an MEA official said, "Not as the agreement stands today."

Sources said Indian officials, who had hoped for consensus on pushing the timelines on an agreement to next year, reacted angrily to the joint statement, and stormy scenes were witnessed over the wording. Officials present at the

meetings said India had tried to negotiate "in good faith" but felt that their views "were not being accommodated". They also accused the other nations of attempting to "gang up" in an attempt to force India to toe the line on issues like safeguards against flooding of Chinese goods, allowing Indian labour mobility to other countries for services, and agricultural and dairy tariffs.. Since 2012, there have been 28 rounds of negotiations that went right down to the wire over the weekend at the RCEP ministerial meeting, which ended inconclusively for India.

The note, circulated to the media shortly before Mr. Modi went up on stage to make his announcement, also said India was in the process of reviewing its Free trade Agreements with Japan, Korea and the ASEAN

End stubble burning immediately, says SC

The court ordered the respective high-level committees of the three States to meet on Monday (November 4) on the issue of extinguishing the existing stubble fires and report back to the court on November 6

Pak. skips opening session of SCO joint exercise

1,300 still under detention in Valley



Official blames confusion over EV policy for auto slowdown

Heavy Industries Secretary appeared before MPs' panel

One of the key reasons for the slowdown in the automobile sector is the confusion over the policy on electric cars, the government told a parliamentary panel on Monday.

A.R. Sihag, Secretary of the Department of Heavy Industries, made a presentation to the Standing Committee on Industry.

In August, the government think tank NITI Aayog got into a public spat with the automobile sector over the proposal to ban sale of three-wheelers with internal combustion engines by 2023 and two-wheelers with engine capacities less than 150 cc by 2025.

The 150-cc and below segment forms almost 90% of the two-wheeler market in the country.

The industry termed the proposed plan "unrealistic", while knocking on the Centre's door pitching for a EV roll-out road map over a "practical" time frame.

India, Russia to conclude mutual logistics agreement

It is likely to be signed during Rainath's visit

India and Russia are expected to conclude a mutual logistics agreement and review the setting up of joint ventures for manufacturing spares for Russian defence platforms in India during the visit of Defence Minister Rajnath Singh to Moscow from November 5 to 7, official sources said.

"The Agreement on Reciprocal Logistics Support (ARLS) is expected to be signed," diplomatic sources said, indicating that all issues have been resolved.

Year-long discussions

Moscow sent a draft ARLS early last year and discussions have been on since. Earlier, it was expected to be signed during the meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Vladimir Putin in September on the sidelines of the Eastern Economic Forum (EEF) in Vladivostok, but was held

Mr. Singh will co-chair the 19th India-Russia Inter-Governmental Commission on Military and Military Technical Cooperation with his

Russian counterpart, General Sergei Shoigu. Another major issue on the agenda will be the purchase of the S-400 air-defence missile systems, over which the U.S. is continuing a tough stance with respect to waiver from sanctions under the Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act. The deliveries are expected to begin by 2020-end, 24 months after the signing of the contract, and that is when the sanctions are expected to kick in.

A 50-member industry delegation is accompanying Mr. Singh to Russia, the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) said in a statement. "The objective of the delegation is to explore ways to jointly manufacture spares and components with Russian original equipment manufacturers (OEM) under 'Make in India'." The delegation to Russia

is a follow-up of the Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) signed on September 4 by India and Russia to "operationalize a mechanism for collaboration on joint manufacturing of spare parts, components, aggregates and other products for the maintenance of Russian-origin arms and defence equipment in India under the 'Make in India' programme through the transfer of technology and setting up of joint ventures."

High-level visits There have been a flurry of

high-level visits between the two countries surrounding the EEF in which energy cooperation in Russia's Far East was in focus. As a follow-up of the forum, Minister for Petroleum and Natural Gas and Steel Dharmendra Pradhan was in Russia and Japan from October 22 to 26, during which "possible areas of collaboration in other sectors like coking coal, and shipping routes" were discussed.

Maulana Fazlur Rehman says the protests will continue, and Imran Khan's government should go

As the two-day ultimatum he issued to Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan expired on Sunday night, Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam (JUI-F) leader Maulana Fazlur Rehman has said his supporters will continue the sit-in until their goals are met.

"We have decided that we will not go to any tribunal or Election Commission or any court. The PTI's (Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf) foreign funding case is still lying around with the Election Commission after five years. This 'illegitimate' ruler's foreign funding case has not been decided, how will this Election Commission settle rigging cases?," he said while addressing Azadi March' in the capital on Sunday.

"This is a movement. After this march, we will not stop our journey... Today, we

have shut down Islamabad. Tomorrow we will shut down the entire country. Today, we have a huge rally here; tomorrow we will make the entire Pakistan a rally-ground," he said.

"Whenever there is an election, there is interference... Our Army, which is respectable for us, needs to ensure that next time, it will have nothing to do with the elections of Pakistan. Such interferences have made our institution controversial. We have to go back to the supremacy of the Constitution."

On Monday, Mr. Rehman convened an all-party conference (APC) in Islamabad to chart out their future strategy. Pakistan People's Party (PPP) chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari and Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) president Shehbaz Sharif did not attend the meeting.

A government delegation led by Defence Minister Pervez Khattak also met members of the JUI-F in Islamabad. Mr. Khattak said he hoped something good would come out of it.

Rallies mark the 40th anniversary of U.S. Embassy takeover

Iran announced on Monday its latest violations of the nuclear deal with world powers, saying that it now operates twice as many advanced centrifuges banned by the 2015 accord and is working on a prototype that's 50 times faster than those allowed by the deal.

The announcement came as the country marks the 40th anniversary of the 1979 U.S. Embassy takeover that started a 444-day hostage crisis.

By starting up these advanced centrifuges, Iran further cuts into the one year that experts estimate Tehran would need to have enough material for building a nuclear weapon if it chose to pursue one.

Ali Akbar Salehi, the head of the Atomic Energy Organiastion of Iran, said Tehran is now operating 60 IR-6 advanced centrifuges, twice as many as before. Such a centrifuge, an IR-6, can produce enriched uranium 10 times as fast as the first-generation IR-1s allowed under the ac-

The nuclear deal limited Iran to using only 5,060 firstgeneration IR-1 centrifuges to enrich uranium by rapidly spinning uranium hexafluoride gas.

Meanwhile, thousands of protesters rallied outside the former U.S. embassy in Tehran. Rallies also took place in several other cities.

U.S. sanctions

The U.S. is sanctioning members of Iranian supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei's inner circle.

Separately, the administration is issuing an up to \$20 million reward for information about missing former FBI agent Robert Levinson. He disappeared in Iran in 2007 but the Iranian government has never acknowledged arresting him.

5 protesters killed in Iraq

Despite crackdown, demonstrators continue to gather

At least five people were killed as Iraqi security forces opened fire on protesters in Baghdad on Monday as thousands continued to gather in the largest wave of anti-government protests for

A Reuters witness saw one man shot dead, his body carried away by fellow protesters, when security forces opened fire with live rounds on demonstrators near Baghdad's Ahrar bridge.

A Reuters cameraman saw at least four others get killed.

Lebanon in turmoil after demonstrators block key roads

Politicians fail to make progress on appointing a new govt.

Demonstrators in Lebanon blocked key roads on Monday after a weekend of mass rallies confirmed that political promises had failed to extinguish the unprecedented protest movement.

Nationwide cross-sectarian rallies have gripped Lebanon since October 17, demanding a complete overhaul of a political system deemed inefficient and corrupt.

The movement forced the government to resign last week and has spurred a raft

of promises from political leaders, who have vowed to enact serious reforms to combat corruption.

But on Monday demonstrators battled on, vowing to keep up their street movement until all their demands are met, including the formation of a technocratic government.

"The people in power are not serious" about forming a new government, said Aadi, a 30-year-old demonstrator. "They think we are playing".

In the capital Beirut, they sat cross-legged on a key flyover and gathered near the Central Bank, which protesters blame for fuelling Lebanon's economic crisis.

Lebanon's under-fire political class has repeatedly warned against the chaos a government would cause, but they have yet to make progress on appointing a replacement.

President Michel Aoun has asked the outgoing government to stay on in a caretaker capacity until a new one can be formed, but Lebanon has entered a phase of acute political uncertainty, even by its own dysfunc-

Hardcore demonstrators in the financial hub smashed the windows of the official Xinhua news agency's regional bureau on Saturday, capping another weekend of unrest that also saw scores of arrests and a gruesome attack on a prodemocracy lawmaker.

"Vandalising a news agency is as terroristic as challenging the bottom line of civilization," Communist Party mouthpiece People's Daily said in a Facebook

The post was accompanied by a video of a man being beaten and stripped of his clothing by people the publication called "rioters" in the Mong Kok area.

The nationalist tabloid Global Times called in an editorial on Sunday for "Hong Kong's law enforcement agencies to bring the mob to justice as soon as possible" for vandalising Xinhua's office.

'Saudi Prince's rise saw reforms, but repressions too deepened'

HRW says critics of the kingdom still face various sanctions

Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman has pursued landmark reforms since coming to power, but his rise has been accompanied by "deepening repression and abusive practices", Human Rights Watch said Monday.

Despite a perception that the outcry over the October 2018 murder of journalist Jamal Khashoggi had left the Saudis chastened, critics of the kingdom are still being vigorously pursued with measures such as arbitrary travel bans and harassment of their families, it said.

"Detaining citizens for peaceful criticism of the government's policies or human rights advocacy is not a new phenomenon in Saudi Arabia," the New York-based group said in a report.

"But what has made the oost-2017 arrest waves notable and different, however, is the sheer number and range of individuals targeted over a short period of time as well as the introduction of new repressive practices." Since becoming de facto

ruler two years ago, Prince Mohammed has been on a modernisation drive with reforms, including allowing women to drive, receive passports and travel abroad without permission from male relatives

However, HRW said those moves were a smokescreen for the ongoing detention of dozens of dissidents

Indian taken hostage in Myanmar dies

A 60-year-old Indian national has died in Myanmar after being taken hostage by an ethnic rebel group in the country's restive Rakhine province, media reports said on Monday.

Vinoo Gopal was among 10 people, including four Indians and U. Whei Tin a lawmaker from Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy, abducted on Sunday by the Arakan Army from two boats, *The* newspaper Irrawaddy reported.

The Indian workers were part of the ongoing construction on the Kaladan Multi-Modal Transit Transportation Project.

41 migrants found alive in a truck in Greece

Most of them are Afghans; none injured

Greek police found 41 migrants, mostly Afghans, hiding in a refrigerated truck at a motorway in northern Greece on Monday, officials

The discovery came 10 days after 39 bodies, all believed to be Vietnamese migrants, were discovered in the back of a refrigerated truck near London. Two people have been charged in Britain and eight in Vietnam over the deaths.

The refrigeration system in the truck had not been turned on, and none of the migrants were injured, though some asked for medical assistance, a Greek pol-

Police stopped the truck near Xanthi for a routine check, arresting the driver and taking him and the migrants to a police station for identification.



The audit committee of the company has retained the services of the law firm, Shardul Amarchand Mangaldas & Co. to investigate the

Before the appointment of the independent investigator, the audit committee began consultations with internal auditors Ernst & Young.

Processes reviewed

The internal auditors were given a mandate to review certain processes on the basis of the allegation in the anonymous complaints, the statement said.

"We will update the stock exchanges on the basis of key findings of the investigation reports once these are concluded," said company.

Sensex closes at new high, Nifty nears 12,000-mark

The benchmark equity indices rose for the seventh straight session on Monday, with the 30-share Sensex closing at a new all-time, high even as the broader Nifty again came close to breaching the 12,000-mark in intraday trading.

Pre-buy may buoy industry, says ALL chairman

'Seeing some improvement in LCV sales; prospective buyers making enquiries, there's some positivity'

The fourth quarter is always very strong in this industry and with the transition to BS VI happening, the pre-buy expected in Q2/Q3, might happen in the next few months, says Dheeraj Hinduja, chairman, Ashok Leyland, in a chat . Excerpts:

Are we seeing a structural shift in the industry with ICVs growing faster than heavy vehicles?

■ There is definitely change in heavy vehicles demand with efficiency gains from GST and with higher axle load norms. As a result, we are seeing decline in this seg-

The fall in ICVs (intermediate commercial vehicles) has not been as drastic as in the heavier segment. Our

market share in ICV is 21%. So we have quite a lot of headroom for growth.

How is the industry right now and when do you see a turnaround?

■ It is difficult to say because everyone had planned for this year to be a very strong pre-buy year.

But, due to a number of events, the markets have become negative, something which none of the original

equipment manufacturers expected.

But one issue was the availability of finance in the system. We have met quite a number of financiers and they are giving us the feeling that the worst is behind us and that they are willing to finance vehicles once again.

As soon as that changes and the people have the availability of funds to buy, things should start picking up. The fourth quarter is always a very strong quarter in this industry and with the transition to BS VI happening, the pre-buy that we were expecting in Q2/Q3 might happen in the next few months.

provement in LCV sales. A lot of people are making more enquiries with finance firms and that's increasing. If that's anything to go by, then

IOB Q2 loss widens on higher bad loans provision

Net NPAs dip to 9.84% in Sept. quarter

State-owned Indian Overseas Bank's (IOB) secondquarter net loss widened to ₹2,253.64 crore from ₹487.26 crore last year, due to higher provisions for bad

The Chennai-headquartered bank had made a provision of ₹2,600 crore for bad debts in the second quarter.

provisions in-Overall creased to ₹2.996.04 crore in the second quarter from ₹2,016.6 crore in the same quarter last year.

IOB, which is under RBI's Prompt Corrective Action (PCA) measure, said its gross non-performing assets (NPAs) stood at ₹28,673.95 crore at the end of the September quarter, compared to ₹37,109.96 crore in the same period last year.

The percentage of net NPAs came down to 9.84% in the second quarter from 11.04% in the June quarter," Karnam Sekar, Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer CEO, Indian Overseas Bank, said in a press conference.

PCA framework

He pointed out that the bank had to bring new NPAs down to 6% to meet one of the criteria to come out of PCA. This means the bank has to reduce the net NPA by ₹4.500 crore, which Mr. Sekar was confident of achieving in the next quarter through a slew of recovery measures.

He also said the other criterion of being profitable, to come out of PCA, would be achieved by March 2020.

RBI tightens norms for **NBFC** liquidity

Γhe Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has tightened the liquidity management framework for non-banking financial firms to strengthen their asset-liability management following the liquidity crisis faced by these firms in the past year.

As per the new norms – applicable to all non-deposit taking NBFCs with an asset size of ₹100 crore and above, systemically important Core Investment Companies and all deposit taking NBFCs irrespective of asset size - the net cumulative mismatches for 1-7 days, 8-14 days, and 15-30 days shall not exceed 10%, 10% and 20% of the cumulative cash outflows in the respective time buckets. The RBI also mandated liquidity coverage ratios.

HDFC profit rises 61% on one-off gains

Gruh stake sale spurs bottomline

MUMBAI HDFC Ltd. reported a 61% increase in its standalone net profit to ₹3,961.53 crore for the second quarter of the current financial year, compared with the ₹2,467.08 crore reported during the year-earlier period.

I-T Dept., which cancelled trusts' registration, says reports of demand notice untrue

Tata Trusts, the dominant shareholders of Tata Sons, will see their tax liability shooting up significantly after the Income Tax (I-T) Department cancelled their registration.

The department has invoked Section 115 (TD) of the I-T Act, a special provision introduced in 2016 with respect to certain category of

Additional income tax

Under Section 115 (TD), a trust whose registration is

cancelled is required to pay tax on its "accreted" or past exempted income. The section deals with additional income tax if the

trust converts or merges into

a non-charitable trust, or if it gets dissolved and fails to transfer its assets/liabilities.

Surrendered registration Tata Trusts' contention is that they had in 2015 surrendered, on their own volition, their registration under the I-T Act and decided not to claim the associated tax exemptions.

A Tata Trusts' spokesperson in an e-mail response said, "The trusts have not received any demand notice from the Income Tax Department pursuant to the cancellation.

"We have already stated that the trusts are examining the order and will take necessary next steps in accordance with the law. The trusts have effective legal options to vindicate their grievances against the order both factually and legally." Anil Singhvi, chairman, I-

Can Investment Advisors, felt that the big question was why the Tata Trusts, being a public charitable trust, would give up exemptions when it was doing public good. "I don't understand why a public charitable trust will give up its exemptions when people seek exemptions for doing charity.

"The Charity Commissioner should be asking why the Trust is giving up exemptions that it enjoyed for over 30-40 years as they are not discretionary or private trusts. "What is the point of paying the highest rate of taxation of over 42% to the government by giving up the exemptions, when they are

doing a good job," Mr. Singh-

vi told The Hindu.

According to I-T officials, reports of sending a demand notice, amounting to several thousand crores, to the Tata Trusts are not true. The provision of a demand for tax on accumulated income is done only in the case of an assessment and not in the case of a cancellation of registration.

"There is no question of sending a demand notice and reports to this effect are untrue

"We are awaiting their response to the order, which could be in the nature of an appeal against what the trust thinks is contentious, whether it is do to with the freezing of assets or date from which the cancellation may take effect," said a person in the I-T Department.

Tata Global Beverages to change nomenclature

Firm eyes ₹10,000-crore in turnover

By March 2020, Tata Global Beverages Ltd. (TGBL) expects to become Tata Con-Products Ltd., emerging as an FMCG company with a portfolio of food products and marking a significant expansion beyond its present play in the beverage segment only.

It is now undergoing the process of a scheme of arrangement with Tata Chemicals Ltd. (TCL).

"We expect an expeditious closure (of the scheme)....before March 2020, but not everything is in our hands," Ajoy Misra, managing director and CEO, TGBL, told *The Hindu* after addressing shareholders at a meeting convened by the sumer products business will be demerged in favour of TGBL. This will enable TGBL, which now has major brands such as Tata Tea and Tetley, to add to its portfolio, the foods brands of TCL like Tata Salt and Tata Sampann. TGBL is a global company and there is an export market for all these products, he told shareholders. The results of the merger are expected to flow to the new company within 18 months post regulatory approvals. Efforts will be made to hit the ₹10,000-croremark in turnover [from about ₹7,251 crore for TGBL in 2018-19], executive director and group CFO L. Krishnakumar told The Hindu.

When I hear about any new "wonder ingredient", I regard it with a healthy amount of scepticism. Around Diwali, when winter was traditionally declared, chefs put out new menus in the city. Here, city chefs in hotels tell us what they keep in mind while building them.

Hotel bookings

Alfred Prasad, the mentor chef at Omya, The Oberoi New Delhi, says hotels take into account occupancy that goes up to 80% or higher, and the fact that the balance of in-house guests who eat in the hotel goes up, with many more people from abroad. This also means that hotels must keep in mind what's happening internationally. Right now, people prefer a relaxed dining experience. There's also the reflection of the financial times and a concern for the environment, so small plates are preferable to large servings, to cut down on wastage.

Nuts and seeds

Gravies are heavier and there's an acceptance for those that are nut-based, says Prasad. Omya has Badami Murgh chicken in almond-onion sauce with caramalised onion, for instance. Similarly, Arun Sundararaj, the Executive Chef at the Taj Mahal, New Delhi, talks of changing up room amenities as well - from chocolate to amla candy or the jaggery-sesame-seed rewari.

Full-flavoured ingredients


"We pick ingredients at their maximum flavour," says Sahil Arora, the Executive Chef at Shangri-La's Eros Hotel. "Take sweet potato: Their quality and taste are at their peak now." Expect seasonal produce, with more tubers, like turnip, baby spinach, peaches and plums. Because hotels have the advantage of global procurement networks and supply chains, there will also be ingredients harvested abroad at this time — white truffles, for instance. Shangri-La will have a truffle promotion at Sorrento, November 21 to 28.

Grills and smoked foods

"These give you the feeling of being out in the open, around a bonfire," says Sundararaj. His hotel would have opened out the al fresco dining area of contemporary Indian restaurant Varq, for snacks and drinks, but are waiting for the pollution levels to improve. People are open to a little more fat in the food as well and ask for comfort food, like sarson ka saag, says the chef, adding that they do takes on these, like the gajar ka halwa hot souffle. 



Mind your language

Tech-based education company EnglishHelper makes the language experience a breeze in Government schools across India

It is time for English period for students of Class VII in Chennai Middle School, MGR Nagar. Instead of pulling out their textbooks from their bags and waiting for the teacher to walk in, the students sit facing a projector screen. Their textbook plays out on the screen and they sit glued to it, as a recorded voice reads out the spelling of the word 'surrounded' slowly, pausing after every letter. The boys and girls, dressed in maroon and cream-coloured uniforms, repeat after the voice in gusto. They will probably never forget the word's spelling.

EnglishHelper, an education company, has made this possible. Its RightTo-Read initiative, launched in 2013, reads out English textbooks with the help of ReadToMe, powered by Artificial Intelligence. Says Sanjay Gupta, the company's global CEO, "We learn languages in a multi-sensory way. Even before we learn to speak, we listen to sounds, relate it to everyday objects; we then move on to exposure to the written aspect our software has been designed taking this multi-sensory aspect into account."

Sanjay, who is based in Gurugram and has worked for large corporations in India and around the globe, decided to take the plunge into education in 2010. "I met Venkat Srinivasan, a Boston-based entrepreneur and cognitive scientist of Indian origin in 2009, who was working on an interesting technology for learning English," he recalls. Venkat is the founder of EnglishHelper and when the two of them met again two years later, Sanjay decided to join the team full-time. "Our pilot programme, which launched in 2013, covered six states in India," he explains. The programme has grown multi-fold today, reaching more than 3.5 million students across 15,000 schools, according to data shared by the company. Given this datadriven mission, for 2017-18, the team did impact analyses - with 20 schools in South Delhi Municipal Corporation, 10 schools in Uttar Pradesh and 11 schools in Telangana – across various grades.

EnglishHelper has a simple goal: to make the teaching and learning of En-



glish easier in Government schools. To do so, Sanjay says that all the school requires is "one computer and a projector". He adds that the institution can have a dedicated room which students can take turns to make use of during their English class.

The company partners with various agencies to take its mission forward. These include the United States Agency for International Development. In Tamil Nadu, for instance, RightToRead was launched in partnership with American India Foundation. In certain districts

Sanjay hopes that by 2020, 20 million students in 100,000 schools use their RightToRead programme.

The software can be used offline and across multiple devices and systems, such as the PC, Linux, and Android.

Two years after the launch in 2013, the programme reached 5,000 schools in eight states, covering one million students.

In Maharashtra, RightToRead is being implemented in 65,000 schools, while the numbers stand at 300 in Tamil Nadu.



The back-end

So, how does it work? Once the school partners with EnglishHelper, it can send its prescribed English textbooks to be worked on by their software. Once this is done, the teacher can teach lessons by projecting the book onto a screen, and the ReadToMe software will read out every word, the speed of which can be altered according to students' needs. The control lies with teachers. "They can highlight words, change the pace of the recorded voice, translate words into

Tamil, and so on," Sanjay explains.

And all this happens during the class' English period. "Students can learn the language more easily and syllabus is covered as well," he points out. He adds that teachers have been supportive: "Teachers are all for technology-enabled solutions," he says, adding that the initiative has been able to do away with fear for the language among certain students.

The TicWatch Pro by Mobvoi is an apt smartwatch to gauge your lifestyle and fitness

It has become almost an existential question now: do you really need a smartwatch? The short answer is yes. The long answer is that even if you are not fartlek-ing (interval training) it is best to have an exercise routine, and a device helps you to get excited about, say, doing a 4k in 30 minutes. Now to the Tic-Watch Pro from Mobvoi, a smartwatch (launched last year abroad) that took me time to get used to its bulk. On the bright side, it has a large screen, so it is easily reada-

The strap is leather on the outside and silicone on the inside, so sweat doesn't ruin the leather. It has also got an IP68 rating i.e. the highest possible Ingress Protection, protecting against dust (the first number) and water (the second number). Drop the device into water up to 1.5 metres deep for half an hour and it should come out okay.

Powered by Wear OS by Google, it syncs easily with an Android device, so you get mobile notifications and can see messages and take calls. I didn't find I needed to take a call on the device, because I used it for fitness and to keep a track of my lifestyle: to measure steps (generally set to target 10,000), exercise (at least 30 minutes) and check heart rate (should be between 60 and 100 at rest). It is helpful that it has GPS, so on a walk or

run, you don't need to carry your phone. You can also download Spotify or Google Play Music.

One of the good things about the device is that even when the battery dies, it converts into a regular watch, so you can check on the time. There is also an essential mode which helps you save battery life. In this mode, it will only tell you the time and give you footsteps. On regular smartphone mode though, you will get a dayand-a-half of juice, especially if you are constantly waking up the phone with a flick of the wrist (yes, there is gesture control).

I enjoyed that the watch detects a workout, so begins recording a run without you having to programme it. It also has a walking, freestyle workout, and cycling mode, though it once recorded that I'd cycled 60 miles in 60 minutes, which made me think I was The Flash. Unfortunately, it doesn't have an interval workout mode, nor can you swim with it. But it will tell you what distance you've walked, your active hours and calories burnt.

The Find My Phone, Flashlight, TicSleep (that tracks sleep), and FitBreathe (you take a break and just breathe) options are useful. It's a useful device, but at something over ₹20k, I'd have hoped to be able to take it into the pool too.


