'We have to listen to supporters'

Gilchrist says South Africa seems to be slowly slipping and lacking consistency

MUMBAI

Former Australia wicketkeeper-batsman Adam Gilchrist said the intent of day/ night Tests is to keep the game current and engage with the fans.

"We have got to listen to the public and what the supporters are saying. I did not see any reason for India not to play a day/ night Test in Australia last year, especially with the fast bowling attack they had," said Gilchrist.

He is travelling with Western Australia (WA) Premier Mark McGowan to promote WA and Perth, in particular.

Gilchrist talked to The *Hindu* about the World Cup next year, state of Australian cricket and concerns about the decline in South African cricket. Excerpts:

Who would you pick as the likely semifinalists of the T20 World Cup?

Australia has lagged behind in international T20s, generally it had not picked its best team in bilateral series. The fast bowlers had been rested and recently Steve Smith played his first T20 series in three-and-a-half years.

And now suddenly we are picking our best team for matches in our backyard. We looked like having a well balanced line-up in the series against Sri Lanka and in the first two matches against Pakistan, especially in Australian conditions.

But a lot can change in the next 12 months. So you have the usual suspects - Australia, England, India and New

Australian cricket seems to have settled down after the return of Steve Smith and David Warner?

Clearly much more settled down than this time around last year when we had our two best batsmen, Smith and Warner, out. We are 12 months further away from the sandpaper incident in South Africa. Well, time heals things.

South Africa was outplayed by India in the recent series

That's a concern. I think South African cricket is in a delicate situation. They seem to be slowly slipping and lacking in consistency. They have had seen Hashim Amla, A.B. de Villiers and Dale Steyn leaving the scene.

They have also been decimated by Kolpak, which is the players going away to

I hope South African cricket would be the main agenda at the ICC level as to how they are going to maintain interest for the game in that country, because we cannot afford to have more high profile nations dropping away and the enthusiasm for the game disap-

Ravi Kumar to appeal for reduction in suspension

Commonwealth Games gold medal-winning weightlifter K. Ravi Kumar, who has been suspended for four years for a doping violation, will appeal against the National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA) disciplinary panel decision seeking a reduction in the sanction.

Ravi, who had bagged a gold and a silver in 2010 Delhi and 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games respectively, had tested positive for

ostarine (enobosarm), selective androgen receptor modulators (SARM) and dihydroxy-LGD-4033 SARM at the National weightlifting championships in Visakhapatnam in February last.

"He submitted that he started training in November 2018 after a gap and consumed various food supplements to increase his strength. He also consumed a new food supplement called SARM.

"He admitted that he did not bother enquiring about whether it contained any prohibited substance and

therefore was deeply regretful of his lapse in judgement," said a Facebook post from NADA "This falls under Article

10.6.3 which provides for benefit on account of 'prompt admission,' and so as per Article 10.11.2 the period of ineligibility shall start running from the date of sample collection (February 26, 2019)."

Confident

Ravi, who was among the 14 weightlifters to have tested positive in-competition for banned substances, was confident about getting some relief from the appeal panel. "There are certain

grounds which I had brought to the notice of the NADA panel. I will highlight these points (before the appeal panel) and am sure of getting a reduction in the period of suspension," Ravi said on Wednesday.

"I hope to make a comeback again and sign off with a good performance in an international event," he said.

Ravi has paid a 'fine' of ₹50,000 imposed by the Indian Weightlifting Federation (IWLF) for the anti-dop-

Though junior World champion Vijayveer Sidhu shot 586 in the MQS section, which was better than the 578 by Anish, it was no consolation for the Indian squad which missed two quota berths.

In women's trap, Shreyasi Singh missed a berth in the final after a tie shoot at 114.
