4,000 security forces sent to Ayodhya

Ministry of Home Affairs sends advisory to all States to maintain law and order ahead of SC verdict

Ahead of the long-awaited Supreme Court judgment on the Babri Masjid-Ram Janmabhoomi litigation, the Centre has sent around 4,000 personnel of the Central Armed Police Forces to

The Ministry of Home Affairs also issued an advisory to all States to maintain "law and order" with the verdict expected to be announced in a few days.

"We have sent an advisory to all States, asking them to keep a watch on law and order as the verdict is set to be announced," said a senior government official.

Title suits

The appeals against the 2010 Allahabad High Court's judgment on the title suits - filed by both Hindu and Muslim parties – were heard on a daily basis by a five-judge Bench of the Supreme Court

for 40 days. The court has reserved judgment, and a verdict is expected before November 17, when Chief Justice of India (CJI) Ranjan

The Railway Protection Force (RPF) has identified 80 sensitive stations and asked its personnel to keep a tight vigil.

The seven-page advisory

sent to all zonal head quarters asked RPF personnel to specially maintain security at places of worship inside or near the railway station's compound and asked the ca-

retakers to not leave them unattended.

The RPF cancelled leave of its staff and the personnel will be engaged in providing security cover to trains.

Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath held a videoconference with police officers in charge of all districts and reviewed the security preparedness to tackle any law and order situation.

'Riot control scheme'

The police have also been asked to prepare a "riot control scheme" for each area that will include measures for "access control" and "transportation plans" in emergency situations.

Police-lawyers meetings remain inconclusive

Two IPS officers transferred on HC direction; lower court lawyers to continue stir

Lawvers walked out of a coordination meeting called at the Delhi Police officers' mess in Civil Lines on Thursday over "communication gap" with the police. Five other meetings held between lawyers and policemen at the district courts in Dwarka, Saket, Karkardooma, Rohini and Patiala House – in the presence of district judges - also proved inconclusive, said a police officer.

The meetings were in line with a Delhi High Court suggestion for meetings to resolve issues amicably in the aftermath of the clash between lawyers and policemen at Tis Hazari last week.

Representatives of the Coordination Committee of All District Courts Bar Associations of Delhi turned up at the Civil Lines venue under the impression that they would be meeting the top brass of Delhi Police. It turned out that Joint Commissioner of Police (Central Range) Rajesh Khurana had called the meeting with representatives of the local bar association to discuss "admi-

nistrative issues" at Tis Haza-

ri. "We have told the police to call a proper meeting with senior officers in attendance," said a lawyer.

Separate meeting later

Regretting the misunderstanding, Delhi Police clarified that issues pertaining only to North District courts were to be discussed in order to resume normal functioning at Tis Hazari.

A separate meeting will be held at a higher level to address the larger issues, it

At the Dwarka meeting, the bar association conveved to the concerned DCP that any decision over calling off the strike will be taken by Bar Council of India. Representatives also said that they cannot guarantee the safety of policemen visiting courts. Lawyers at lower courts

will continue to abstain from proceedings on Friday in protest against the non-arrest of the policeman who had allegedly shot at a lawyer during the Tis Hazari violence. Sanjeev Nasiar, former president of Delhi Bar Association, said that the lawyers' coordination committee would not call off their agitation till the accused policeman was arrested.

Officials said on Thursday that two IPS officers have been transferred on the Delhi High Court's direction in the aftermath of the clashes. Special Commissioner of Police (Law and Order) North Sanjay Singh has been transferred to the licensing and transport department and Additional DCP (North) Harender Kumar Singh has been appointed DCP, Railways, they said.

On Thursday, Delhi Police Commissioner Amulya Patnaik met Home Secretary Ajay Kumar Bhalla and Intelligence Bureau Director Arvind Kumar at the Ministry of Home Affairs in North Block and briefed them about the Tis Hazari incident.

The IB has sought a report within a week on the protest staged outside Delhi Police Headquarters on Tuesday and about who fuelled it.

Mr. Patnaik also went to the house of a constable who was injured during the November 2 clash and assured him of all support.

Report: lack of transparency in High Courts is worrying

RTI rules of courts very inconvenient, says Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy

STAFF REPORTER NEW DELHI

A new study by Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy has found that there is a "yawning gap" between the judiciary's pronouncements on the Right to Information (RTI) Act and the manner in which the High Courts are implementing it.

The report Sunshine in the Courts has remarked that the RTI rules of several High Courts provide for a relatively inconvenient procedure when compared to the RTI rules of the Government of India.

"The lack of good quality proactive disclosures by several High Courts on their websites marks the failure of the High Courts to discharge a specific statutory obligation imposed under Section 4(1)(b) of the RTI Act," the report said.

It added that the lack of administrative transparency, especially financial transparency, within High Courts was a matter of grave concern.

"In particular, the lack of transparency in financial matters of the High Courts

is very worrying. Most High Courts do not proactively publish details about their budgets and expenditure. Even fewer High Courts are willing to provide copies of their budgets and audit reports under the RTI Act," the report said.

'Illegal clauses'

The report found that despite the law being crystal clear on the limits of delegated legislation, several High Courts have included patently illegal clauses in their RTI Rules. It pointed out that despite Section 8 of the RTI Act restricting the number of grounds for de-

nying information to citizens, the RTI rules of several High Courts have included additional grounds for rejecting requests for information.

"High Courts at Bombay, Delhi, Gauhati, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Kerala, Manipur, Meghalaya, Orissa, Punjab and Haryana, Rajasthan, Sikkim and Tripura have created additional grounds for non-disclosure of information," it said.

On the convenience index, the Vidhi report noted that while several High Courts did recognise convenient modes of payments like postal orders, the High Courts of Allahabad, Chhattisgarh, Gauhati, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Rajasthan and Sikkim, did not recognise it.

It said that the High Courts of Chhattisgarh and Jharkhand, prescribe only court fee stamps as relevant mode of payment. "Not only are court fee stamps different in each State, they are usually available at fewer locations than postal orders, which are available in all post offices across the country," it said.

Additionally, the report stated that the Gujarat High Court does not mention any mode of payment, which increases uncertainty for RTI applicants.

The report remarked that it should be a matter of concern to see the judiciary lagging behind the Centre when it comes to abiding by the letter and spirit of the RTI Act.

"The fact that the RTI rules of so many High Courts have provisions that run the risk of being declared ultra vires the RTI Act coupled with the fact that nine High Courts and most District Courts have not bothered to make any of the disclosures under Section 4(1)(b) of the RTI Act, is indicative of serious systemic issues within the administrative side of the judiciary," the report said.

"It is also telling that on our convenience index, not a single High Court was able to match the convenience offered by the Government of India's RTI Rules," it concluded.

Civic bodies told to maintain breastfeeding rooms

The Delhi High Court has asked the civic bodies to maintain their 100 breastfeeding rooms and set up more as early as possible.

A Bench of Chief Justice D.N. Patel and Justice C. Hari Shankar also asked the Delhi government to finalise its draft policy on setting up baby-care rooms for breastfeeding and changing diapers - in public places.

With these directions, the court disposed of a petition filed on behalf of a mother and her newborn seeking breastfeeding facilities in public places. It noted that since the draft policy was ready and feeding rooms had been set up across the Capital, with more on the way, there was no further need to monitor the issue.

The government had told the court that its draft policy on baby-care rooms has been placed in the public domain to invite suggestions.

It added that the draft policy was circulated to all landowning departments and other public-dealing departments comments.

The petition had sought breastfeeding facilities in public places away from "censuring and dishonourable looks". It had contended that not providing such facilities amounts to "hampering" women's right to privacy.

Light up dark spots, HC tells civic body, discom

They are crime hotspots, notes court

The Delhi High Court on Thursday directed the North Delhi Municipal Corporation and power discom TPDDL to identify "dark spots", or poorly lit areas, which are vulnerable to crimes, and ensure they are well illuminated.

A Bench of Justices G.S. Sistani and A.J. Bhambhani also issued a notice to the Energy Efficient Systems Ltd. after BSES said the company works in the field of conservation of power as well as lighting of streets.

The HC was hearing a petition initiated by it in 2012 gang-rape case. During the hearing, it

said crimes of snatching and assault were on the rise and "dark spots made victims more vulnerable". Advocate Meera Bhatia,

who is the amicus curiae in the case, said that the court had in 2017 directed the setting up of a panel to monitor and ensure women's safety and sought that the panel be asked to submit a report of the work it has done.

The Bench has asked the panel to file a report.

Meanwhile, the Delhi government told the court that all police stations, except two, have operational CCTV

53 stones removed from salivary duct

Elderly Iraqi woman undergoes two-hour procedure

Doctors at Sir Ganga Ram Hospital recently operated on a 66-year-old Iraqi woman and removed 53 stones from her salivary duct and gland.

Varun Rai, the hospital's ENT consultant, said the biggest challenge was to remove the stones without causing any injury to the gland or the 3 mm-wide duct.

The stones were painstakingly removed one by one using forceps in a procedure that lasted two hours. "After extensive review of worldwide literature, a single parotid gland having more than 25 stones within the parotid duct has not been previously

reported," said Dr. Rai.

The patient, who is from Baghdad, was suffering from recurrent attacks of pain and swelling of the right parotid gland whenever she ate something. "After consultation she was diagnosed as having multiple stones in her right

parotid duct... the largest stone was 8mm stuck midway in the duct," the hospital

Back home, the woman had been advised by doctors to undergo a radical procedure to remove the gland, which would have left a scar on her face and could have resulted in face paralysis.

Dr. Varun noted that the patient came to India after hearing a procedure called sialendoscopy, in which a small endoscope is inserted into the duct of the gland and the cause of obstruction is directly addressed. "She underwent the procedure in the last week of September," said Dr. Rai. The patient has now been discharged.

AQI worsens from 'poor' to 'very poor' due to light showers

Air quality expected to improve today if the Capital gets more rainfall

The Capital's air quality worsened from 'poor' to 'very poor' on Thursday mainly due to light showers witnessed during the day.

The city's Air Quality Index (AQI) on Thursday was 309, up from 214 (poor) on Wednesday, according to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB).

The air quality is expected to improve on Friday if the Capital gets more rainfall as predicted.

"It only drizzled in Delhi on Thursday and this increased the humidity. Due to free water molecules in the air, chemical reactions took place leading to the formation of secondary aerosols, which increased the PM2.5 [deadly respirable particles] level in the air," said an official of the government-run monitoring agency SAFAR (System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting and Research).

"If there had been good rainfall, then it would have washed away the pollutants. But the drizzling increased the pollution," he added.


Stubble burning

Meanwhile, the contribution of stubble burning in neighbouring States to the

will change, bringing in smoke from stubble burning, it said, adding: "The effective biomass fire counts observed [in Haryana and Punjab] on November 6 were high [3,534] but the wind direction was not favourable for any stubble fire plume intrusion [into Delhi]."

Farm fires

The monitoring agency said PM2.5 level in Delhi does not increase just because the number of farm fires increases in neighbouring States, as it depends on other factors too.

On November 3, the PM2.5 level in the city hit 625 ug/m3 - the highest this season, though the number of farm fires was around 3,000.

On November 6, the PM2.5 level hovered around 100 ug/m3 even though the number of farm fires increased to 3,534, said SAFAR. The safe limit for PM2.5 is 60 ug/m3.

JMI student attacked by 'snatchers' inside bus

His brother Ansar said: "Asad recognised the men as those being involved in incidents of snatching. One of them had snatched his phone a couple of months ago and

my brother had recognised the accused man in the bus." Asad alerted his friend about the presence of the accused men in the bus. After this, the duo tried to nab the accused when they attacked him with a surgical blade and deboarded the bus, his brother said. Asad is undergoing treatment while his friend was discharged after first-aid. DCP

(South-East) Chinmoy Biswal said the accused were waving the blade when the bus stopped and the impact was such that the weapon caused injury to the victims. A case has been registered and investigation is under way. The university proctor said the SHO of New Friends Colony has assured him of a thorough probe.

Ex-officers urge L-G, CP not to take 'coercive action' till probe is over

Letter says police top brass should assure subordinates of complete support

Concerned over the clash between Delhi police personnel and lawyers at the Tis Hazari Courts, an association of retired police officers on Thursday wrote to Lieutenant-Governor Anil Baijal and Commissioner of Police Amulya Patnaik, terming the incident "demoralising" and urged them not to take any "coercive" action till the completion of the judicial inquiry.

The Delhi Police Retired Gazetted Officers Association (DPRGOA) said the police top brass should "adequately assure" the personnel of their complete support.

"Senior officers of the organisation may boost the morale of the force by extending their complete support and adequately assuring them that the rule of law will prevail," DPRGOA president Karnal Singh said in a statement.

Mr. Singh is a retired IPS officer who headed the Enforcement Directorate and had several stints in the Delhi Police. The letter comes two days after thousands of Delhi Police personnel laid siege to the Delhi Police Headquarters on Tuesday.

The police protest was launched over two alleged attacks on their colleagues by lawyers, first on November 2 (last Saturday) at the Tis Hazari Court Complex over a parking dispute, and the second on November 4 (Monday) outside the Saket Courts. At least 20 police personnel and several advocates were injured in the first clash.

Ordering a judicial inquiry into the November 2 incident by one of its retired judges, the Delhi High Court, at a special sitting on November 3. directed Commissioner Patnaik to transfer two senior officers - Special Commissioner Sanjay Singh and Additional DCP Harender Kumar Singh – during pendency of the investigation. An ASI was suspended and departmental action was initiated against a constable. The court also ordered that no coercive action be taken against any lawyer on the basis of FIRs lodged by police officers.

"The direction of no coercive action against lawvers requires to be amended to no coercive action against anyone till the completion of the [judicial] inquiry. The suspension and transfer of police officers should be challenged as no action has been ordered against erring lawyers," the letter said.

'Demoralising effect'

"Initially, no case was registered on these incidents against the erring lawyers and the whole episode had a demoralising effect on the police force throughout the country," Mr. Singh said.

He also urged Mr. Baijal and Mr. Patnaik not to take departmental action against those officers who had gathered outside the police headquarters for "silent protest with their families to apprise the senior officers of their grievances". "It needs sympathetic consideration," Mr. Singh said.

The letter also requested for compensation and proper medical aid to be provided to the injured police officers. The Delhi Police and the L-G had on Tuesday assured compensation for the injured police personnel.

During the protest most of the police personnel complained of ill-treatment by superiors, claiming that they refuse to listen to their grievances and punish them for no reason," said the officer.

"We are a disciplined force. Tuesday's incident showed that there is perhaps a disconnect between higher and lower ranks. We have to bridge that gap because we are a family. All district DCPs have been in-

structed to overhaul their grievance redressal cell and send a report to the police headquarters," the officer added.

The officer said no action has been ordered against any protester and nor will it be done in future. "We have to introspect and analyse where the fault is. We already have a lot of channels through which any policeman can approach any senior police officer but they need review and update," he said.

'Woman officer was thrashed during clash'

A woman officer and two other senior officers were allegedly thrashed during the Tis Hazari Court Complex clashes and a loaded pistol of a male constable has been missing since the violence last week, sources said on Thursday.

In two separate CCTV footage, North district DCP Monika Bhardwaj is seen being thrashed by a mob inside the Tis Hazari Courts. In another footage, additional DCP Harinder Singh and ACP Civil Lines Ram Meher Singh is seen being thrashed by a mob on November 2.

In one of the many videos that surfaced following the incident, lawyers are seen purportedly harassing the woman officer, who is flanked by other police personnel and trying to control a group of lawyers.

Later, she can be seen running, with some lawyers trying to catch hold of her while some policemen try to shield her.

Woman gets one year in jail for cheque fraud

Told to pay ₹6 lakh to complainant

A Sessions court here has upheld a one-year jail sentence for a woman in a cheque bounce case. It also directed her to pay ₹6 lakh to complainant compensation.

The accused had challenged a Metropolitan Magistrate court judgment holding her guilty and sentencing her to one year in jail and ₹6 lakh fine, submitting that she had issued the cheque to the complainant as a security for a ₹50,000 loan.

According to the complaint, the accused had taken an interest-free loan of ₹6 lakh from the complainant with the promise that she would repay it within three months.

However, when the complainant submitted the cheque issued by the acment of the loan amount, the bank refused to honour it citing that the account did not

have sufficient money. The accused did not pay back the money even after being served a legal notice by the complainant following the bounce of the cheque.

The accused took contradictory stands in the trial. At the time of framing of charges, she admitted to taking a loan of ₹50,000 from the complainant, but kept mum on the purpose for which she had issued the cheque. But in her statement under Section 313 of the CrPC she said that the cheque was issued as a security for the ₹50,000loan, noted Special Judge Neelam Singh.

The complainant duly discharged his liability in showing that the cheque was issued by the accused for discharge of her loan liabili-

The vegetable vendors in the city reported on Thursday a dip in the price of onions due to the availability of fresh crop in the markets.

The vendors said red onions from Rajasthan had entered the market, which had helped stabilise the price. "The prices had shot up as old produce was being sold due to the nonavailability of new supply," said Ramkishan, a vegetable vendor.

A medical board examined the dead birds but failed to reach a conclusion.

Dhankhar bats for Ayushman Bharat scheme in Bengal

Governor says health matters should be 'above politics'

West Bengal Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar on Thursday batted for implementation of Central government's Ayushman Bharat scheme in the State saying "matters of health should be kept above politics".

Bru refugees end road blockade

State govt. assures of ration supply to relief camps

Protesting Mizoram Bru refugees in north Tripura withdrew their indefinite road blockade on Thursday after the State government announced its decision to restore ration in relief camps.

A group of Ministers headed by Deputy Chief Minister Jishnu Dev Varma held a meeting with the refugee leaders at the

protest site in Kanchanpur, 180 km north of here. "The issue is not so big that we cannot settle here. You will be getting ration materials from tomorrow [Friday]," Mr. Dev Varma said addressing hundreds of protesters.

The blockade entered eighth day on Thursday. The police and the administration initially threatened to use force to

break it, but relented after instructions from the State government.

Mr. Dev Varma said the State government would provide ration on its own and the Ministry of Home Affairs-funded relief operation remained suspended. The MHA adopted the harsh decision after its latest arrangements to repatriate the refugees to Mizoram failed to make headway.



Congress MLA Vishwajeet Kadam hurt in car accident

Congress legislator Vishwajeet Kadam had a narrow escape when the car he was in met with an accident in Pune late on Wednesday.

Dr. Kadam, an MLA from Sangli's Palus-Kadegaon constituency, suffered minor injuries after his car rammed into a tree, injuring him and his driver while severely mangling the vehicle.

In a statement issued on Thursday, Dr. Kadam said: "While en route from Mumbai to Pune, I met with a minor accident last night after my car hit a tree. I have sustained minor injuries on my left shoulder. Fortunately, nothing untoward happened and both the driver and I are safe. All requisite medical tests have been done and there is no cause for alarm."

Dr. Kadam was elected unopposed from the Palus-Kadegaon Assembly seat in the bypoll held on May 28 last year. The election had been necessitated following the death of Dr. Kadam's father, former minister and senior Congressman Dr. Patangrao Kadam.

Don't link RSS chief to government formation in State, says Gadkari

'Devendra Fadnavis will head the new government'

Union minister Nitin Gadkari on Thursday said RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat should not be linked to the government formation moves in Maharashtra.

He also said a decision will soon be taken on government formation in the State, and since the BJP won more number of seats than the Sena, the Chief Minister will be from his party.

Speaking to reporters here, the Lok Sabha member from Nagpur also ruled out his return to his home State to assume the top job.

"Devendra Fadnavis will head the new government," Mr. Gadkari said.

To another query, he said, "RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat or the Sangh have no relation with all this. It won't be appropriate to link the RSS chief to the goings on (over government formation)."

Amid the impasse over government formation, farm activist Kishore Tiwari, who joined the Shiv Sena ahead of the Assembly polls, recently said Mr. Bhagwat should depute Mr. Gadkari to resolve the power-tussle between the BIP and the Sena.

He said people were worried over the Sangh's "silence" on the issue.

Mr. Gadkari said the BJP and Shiv Sena have got people's mandate to form the

new government and very soon a decision will be taken.
"The BID has won 105

"The BJP has won 105 seats, obviously the chief minister will be of the BJP. The party that has won more seats in Assembly polls will have the chief minister's post," he said.

However, Mr. Gadkari said he was hopeful that the deadlock between the BJP and Shiv Sena will get resolved.

"Maharashtra will have the BJP-Sena government under the leadership of Devendra Fadnavis. The mandate is for 'yuti' (grand alliance), so there will be some solution to the deadlock," he said. "Mr. Fadnavis has been appointed leader of the BJP's legislature wing. The government should be formed under his leadership," Mr. Gadkari said.

He also said that talks with the Sena were on and there will be a solution "for sure", he said.

He also ruled out his return to the State to take up the top post. "There is no question of me coming to Maharashtra. I am working in Delhi," he said.

The BJP and Shiv Sena are locked in a tussle over the issue of the Chief Minister's post, resulting in a stalemate in government formation despite results of the October 24 Assembly polls giving the alliance a combined seat strength of 161.

Pune court to rule on Navlakha's anticipatory bail plea on Nov. 12

'Don't take any coercive action against accused till then'

The Pune Sessions court on Thursday reserved orders on the anticipatory bail plea of Delhi-based author and civil rights activist Gautam Navlakha for November 12.

Mr. Navlakha is named as an accused by the Pune City police in the Elgaar Parishad case and is probing him, along with 21 other prominent lawyers, academics, Dalit and human rights activists, for alleged links with the outlawed Communist Party of India (Maoist).

Additional Sessions Judge S.R. Navandar heard the arguments of both the prosecution and the defence on Mr. Navlakha's plea.

Opposing the bail, district government pleader Ujjwala Pawar dubbed Mr. Navlakha an "anti-national" who she alleged was trying to unite the banned CPI (Maoist) with the outlawed Hizb-ul-Mujahideen terror

Ms. Pawar sought Mr. Navlakha's custody to enable the authorities to ascertain the 'damage' caused by the accused's alleged links with the Maoists and the Hizb-ul-Mujahideen.

"As the material seized from his [Mr. Navlakha's] possession shows him to be an active member of the banned Maoist organisation, we need his custody to determine how many youths were recruited by the accused as well as the nature of funding given to the outlawed group," the government pleader asserted.

She also submitted some of the 'material evidence' to the court in a sealed envelope.

Taking objection to this, defence counsel Ragini Ahuja said that if the material was indeed recovered from Mr. Navlakha's possession, it must be shared with the defence in order to gauge its veracity.

Ms. Ahuja further submitted that there was no incriminating evidence to prove Mr. Navlakha's involvement in any illicit or antinational activity as alleged by the authorities and the prosecution.

"Despite the authorities"

claim of Mr. Navlakha's name being mentioned in the so-called Maoist communiqués, there is no evidence to prove he was complicit in any 'terrorist' activity. His work as part of fact-finding missions in strife-torn areas is completely legal," Ms. Ahuja argued.

After hearing both sides, Judge Navandar said that he would pass an order on Mr. Navlakha's plea on November 12 and asked police not to take any coercive action against the accused till then

The Bombay High Court had on Monday directed Mr. Navlakha to approach the Pune court for anticipatory bail.

The activist had accordingly withdrawn his anticipatory bail plea in the High Court and filed a plea before the Pune court the next day.

In September, the Bombay High Court had refused to quash the Pune police's case against Mr. Navlakha. The case is registered under sections of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UA-PA) and various sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC), which include charges of 'sedition'.

However, the high court

court had extended Mr. Navlakha's protection from arrest till October 15. It later extended by four

weeks the interim protection while granting him permission to approach an appropriate court to seek anticipatory bail.

This interim relief period

expires on November 11.

On August 28 last year, the Pune City police had carried out a second countrywide crackdown in connection with the Elgaar Parishad and Bhima Koregaon violence case by searching residences of seven other academics and activists known for their dissenting views and work among the dispossessed.

The houses of Mr. Navlakha along with those of prominent activists Sudha Bharadwaj, P. Varavara Rao, Vernon Gonsalves, Arun Ferreira, Anand Teltumbde and Father Stan Swamy were searched at the time.

Ms. Bharadwaj, Mr. Rao, Mr. Gonsalves and Mr. Ferreira are presently in Pune's Yerwada jail along with advocate Surendra Gadling, Shoma Sen, Rona Wilson, Mahesh Raut and Sudhir Dhawale.

The Pune City police's case rests on an FIR registered at the city's Vishrambaug police station (in January 2018) under sections 153 (a) [Promoting enmity between different groups on ground of religion, race, etc] and 505 1 (b) among others in connection with the 'Elgaar Parishad' held at Pune's Shaniwarwada Fort on December 31, 2017, as part of the bicentenary celebrations of the Bhima Koregaon battle.

The FIR, based on a complaint by one Tushar Damgude in the immediate aftermath of the Bhima Koregaon clashes of January 1, 2018, was initially lodged against six participants including Mr. Dhawale.

Those named in the FIR

were members of the Kabir Kala Manch – a radical Dalit cultural troupe. The complainant had ac-

The complainant had accused the KKM activists of making a number of "inflammatory" speeches and delivering "socially divisive" presentations during the course of the troupe's performance and recitals at the 'Elgaar Parishad', which lasted almost eight hours and witnessed the participation of thousands of persons from more than 250 progressive social outfits including several left-leaning and Ambedkarite groups.

The matter came to light

on Wednesday after some Goa-based activists took to social media to highlight that Parra panchayat had been levying tax on clicking pictures or shooting videos in its jurisdiction.

A sign board put up prominently on the main road of the village reads: "Swachhta Tax/Mission Clean Parra Tax will be levied on all film shoots and photo shoots. Tax will vary for individuals and commercials."

Mr. Ajgaonkar on Thursday disapproved of the move, saying it does not have government sanction.

The committee, comprising officials and experts, has been asked to submit a report within a fortnight, but experts have sought a month's time.


The meeting was convened after Madikeri MLA Appachu Ranjan of the BJP wrote to the Karnataka government demanding that the lessons on Tipu be removed, alleging that the ruler was a "fanatic". At the meeting, Mr. Rajan made a presentation and urged the officials of the Karnataka Textbook Society and subject experts to remove the lessons.

An official of the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) said the committee would scrutinise the documents presented by Mr. Ranjan and then give their opinion.

As many as 10 members were present at the meeting, which included officials of the Karnataka Text-Society, subject experts who were part of the textbook revision committee, and Mr. Ranjan and his lawyer.

Mr. Ranjan maintained that all lessons pertaining to Tipu should be removed and said he had submitted all documents that showed Tipu was a "cruel ruler."

However, a source, who was at the meeting, felt that Mr. Ranjan's claims were not backed by adequate documents.

Nellore reservoirs have good storage

Chennai city, which grappled with severe drinking water shortage, can be assured of its full quota of Krishna water from Andhra Pradesh this season, as major reservoirs in Nellore dishave comfortable storage.

The Kandaleru reservoir, which augments drinking water supply to the metropolis, has built up a healthy storage of over 40.82 tmcft water with the Krishna in spate in several spells.

"There will be no hitch in ensuring Chennai's quota of 12 tmcft water in two spells ahead of the 2020 summer," said sources in the Telugu Ganga project.

Cities and towns dependent on the reservoirs in Nellore district for drinking water supply, which included Nellore and Tirupati, Srikalahasti, Venkatagiri and Kavali, will have no problem in ensuring the precious liquid, as the Somasila reservoir, which replenishes water to Kandaleru, is now full to its capacity.

Combined storage The district has a combined storage of 119.56 tmcft including 74.62 tmcft in Somasila, which gets replenishment from the Kundu and the Krishna rivers, said Nellore Circle Superintending

"We will have no problem in ensuring water to grow two crops under the Penna, Somasila, Kandaleru irrigation systems," he told The

Engineer.

Hindu. With the release of more than 1 tmcft each day from the Somasila to the Kandeleru reservoirs, the latter could be expected to reach surplus in a month or so, he

said. The discharge from Kandaleru, which still had a flood cushion of 27.21 tmcft, was maintained at 3,566 cusecs of water.

Farmers happy

Farm activity picked up briskly in 8 lakh acres in the district after a long gap.

The farmers are a happier lot as they will also be able to go for a second crop during summer.

Maharashtra tops in justice delivery

Report brings to light key issues across four pillars: police, judiciary, prisons and legal aid

Maharashtra has topped the list of 18 large-medium States in the overall first-ever ranking of Indian States on justice delivery, followed by Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Punjab and Ha-

In this category, Jharkhand, Bihar and Uttar Pradesh are at the bottom, while among seven smaller States, Goa leads the group.

This is according to the India Justice Report 2019, released on Thursday by the Tata Trusts in collaboration with Centre for Social Justice, Common Cause, and Commonwealth Rights Initiative, among others.

Public data

The report is based on publicly available data from different government entities on the four pillars of justice **Justice**

While Maharashtra emerged as the overall topper among large/medium States in justice delivery, Tamil Nadu and Kerala fared better in individual categories

Releasing the report, Justice (Retd.) Madan B. Lokur called it a pioneering study and said: "The findings establish beyond doubt very serious lacunae in our justice delivery system. It is an excellent effort to mainstream the issues concerning our

justice system, which in fact affect every aspect of society, governance and economy."

The report highlights the fact that even the best performing States scored less than 60% in their performance on capacity across the police, judiciary, prisons and legal aid.

The country has about 18,200 judges with about 23% sanctioned posts vacant, notes the report, adding that women are poorly represented in these pillars, constituting just 7% of the

"Prisons are over-occupied at 114%, where 68% are undertrials awaiting investigation, inquiry or trial. Regarding budgets, most States are not able to fully utilise the funds given to them by the Centre, while the increase in spending on the police, prisons and judiciary does not keep pace with the overall increase in State expenditure," the report said.

Budget constraints

The report added that some pillars also remain affected by low budgets.

For instance, India's per capita expenditure on free legal aid is 75 paise per annum, it said.

The report looked at data indicators from the four pillars, covering themes like infrastructure, human resources, diversity (gender, Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe/Other Backward Class), budgets, workload and trends over the last five

Kerala on its way to achieve 100% Internet penetration

It has the second highest coverage, report shows

Kerala's Finance Minister Thomas Isaac tweeted on Thursday that the Kerala Fibre Optic Network project, pegged at ₹1,548 crore, would provide Internet to every household in the State. "For 20 lakh BPL households it will be free," the tweet read.

The project is slated for completion by December

However, going by data in a recent report by the Internet And Mobile Association of India (IAMAI), Kerala is already halfway to its goal of 100% coverage.

According to the report, titled 'India Internet 2019,' the State's Internet penetration rate is the second highest in the country (54%), next only to Delhi NCR with 69% penetration.

The Internet penetration rate (defined as number of individuals aged above 12 per 100 population who accessed the Internet in the last month; survey period Ja-

The data also show that Kerala has about 70 Internet subscriptions per 100 population across service areas.

While Bihar has the lowest number with 29 subscriptions per 100 popula-Uttar Pradesh's number stands at 34.

It is to be noted that Kerala is among the States with a huge gap between the number of rural and urban Internet connections. This is also the case in Delhi and Himachal Pradesh.

Real estate shelter

The Alternative Investment Fund could help revive the stressed sector

rom first looks, the long-awaited package to support the real estate sector, cleared by the Cabinet on Wednesday, appears well-designed. The ₹25,000 crore Alternative Investment Fund (AIF) announced by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has expanded in both size and scope from the earlier one announced in September. And the variables are clear such as the unit sizes that will be supported. The AIF will provide funds to bail out stalled real estate projects with unit size of less than ₹2 crore a unit in metros and ₹1 crore in other places. The Centre will contribute ₹10,000 crore, with the State Bank of India and Life Insurance Corporation of India providing the balance. The fund, to be managed by SBICAP Ventures, will offer support to viable projects with a positive net worth and registered with the Real Estate Regulatory Authority. What makes the scheme good is that it will also apply to projects that have been declared as non-performing assets by banks and to those lined up before the insolvency court. Apart from real estate promoters, this will also aid lenders, mainly finance companies and banks, whose funds are locked up in these projects. According to Ms. Sitharaman, over 1.600 projects involving some 4.58 lakh housing units are stalled for want of funds. There are also unsold units across the country with one market estimate putting their value at over ₹4 lakh crore. Most of the stalled projects are solvent but stuck for liquidity and with support from the AIF, can be completed, unlocking value not just for buyers but also precious cash for the project promoters and their lenders.

The real estate sector is not only one of the biggest provider of jobs but also has a huge multiplier effect in the economy. Industries ranging from cement and steel to paints and sanitaryware stand to reap the benefits of a healthy real estate sector. This is apart from banks and financial institutions. While the AIF is a good idea, it is important that it is implemented without glitches. Too many good ideas have suffered due to bad implementation. The critical part will be identifying the genuine projects in need of support and ensuring that biases do not creep in. Also important will be attracting more investors into the AIF. The Finance Minister said that sovereign funds and other private investors have shown interest. These need to be followed upon quickly and money should be released from the AIF right away so that the trickle-down effect is felt before the end of this financial year. Along with private money in the AIF will also come return expectations that need to be managed. The government, through its latest move, and the Reserve Bank of India with successive rate cuts and liquidity infusion, have set the stage. The real estate industry now has to do its part.

Junking fast food

Enforcement is key in preventing school children from accessing unhealthy food

n a welcome step, the Food Safety and Standards uthority of India (FSSAI) has notified a draft regu **⊥** tion aimed at prohibiting the sale and advertisement of food rich in fat, sugar and salt to schoolchildren inside the school premises and within 50 m around it. It comes in response to the 2015 order from the Delhi High Court directing the central agency to frame norms to promote healthy diets in schools. Besides prohibiting the sale of junk food, the FSSAI requires schools to simultaneously encourage and promote a safe and balanced diet. In a bid to shield the children from consuming unhealthy food items and snacks, the FSSAI prohibits food companies that manufacture such items from advertising or offering for free such foods in school premises and within 50 m of the campus. To thwart food companies from luring children to consume foods rich in fat, sugar and salt, the companies are prohibited from using their logos, brand names and product names on books and other educational materials, as well as on school property such as buildings, buses, and athletic fields. As a general guidance to provide wholesome food, the agency recommends the use of a combination of whole grains, milk, eggs, and millets; it also listed a set of general guidelines for selection of food products that can be offered in schools.

Even as malnutrition accounted for over seven lakh (68%) deaths in children under the age of five years in 2017 in India, there is rising obesity in schoolchildren in many States. According to a July 2017 study, India, with 14.4 million, had the second most number of obese children among 195 countries. A recent study found 23 States to have child overweight prevalence more than the national average, with six States having a prevalence of over 20%. Several studies have shown how a western diet affects the composition and diversity of gut bacteria and sets the stage for many metabolic diseases. Hence, any attempt to reduce and discourage the intake of unhealthy foods, which is a major cause of unhealthy weight gain in children, should be welcomed. The challenge will be in enforcement, particularly in preventing the sale and promotion of unhealthy food near schools. For instance, despite the sale and advertisement of tobacco products within 100 yards of a school being prohibited, violation is more the norm than the exception. Shops that sell tobacco products very often also sell many of the packaged unhealthy foods that the FSSAI now wants to ban. The onus of inculcating healthy eating habits also starts at home. Besides taking steps to reduce the intake of unhealthy food, both schools and parents should ensure children get adequate physical activity, which is increasingly being neglected for various reasons. It is a combination of healthy food and regular physical activity that will go a long way in bringing up healthier children.

The theory of the Islamic State

The IS will be defeated only when its ideology is overcome in a region free of interventions — a tall ask for the moment

bu Bakr al-Baghdadi is dead. But the Islamic State (IS) is $m{\Gamma}$ ****not. The death of its "Caliph" is certainly a blow to the terrorist group. But the IS is ideologically stronger to survive the fall of its leader, and the geopolitical conditions that led to the rise of the group remain more or less intact. Much has been discussed about these conditions. Geopolitical tensions, civil conflicts and foreign interventions have been a source of power for jihadist groups such as the al-Qaeda and the IS. Remember, Osama bin Laden was a nobody before the Americans and their allies started bankrolling and training the Afghan mujahideen against the Soviet Red Army. The Taliban, which rose to power from the civil war-stricken Afghanistan was hosting the al-Qaeda when it carried out the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks in New York and Virginia. The al-Qaeda in Iraq (AQI) rose from the ruins of the Iraq that was destroyed by the American invasion. And the AQI morphed into today's IS, exploiting the chaos Syria fell into in the wake of the civil war. While these are the objective conditions behind the rise of terrorist-jihadism, what is its subjectivity? Do these groups have an agency?

Brothers with arms

Though the al-Qaeda and the IS are cut from the same cloth, there are tactical and strategic differences in their operations. The al-Qae-

da was basically a hit-and-run organisation until the IS changed the landscape of terrorism. The group would carry out attacks and then retreat to the deserts, caves or mountains where it was hiding. It did not expose itself to the conventional military might of its enemies. Barring certain pockets that al-Qaeda-affiliated groups now control, such as Syria's Idlib, the group largely remains a hit-andrun organisation. The IS, however, took insurgency a step further. It started holding on to territories it captured, established a protostate in those territories and called it the Islamic State. While the al-Qaeda also wants to create a global emirate, the IS took steps to implement its world-view. It declared a Caliphate, trying to revive an Islamic institution that ceased to exist following the disintegration of the Ottoman Empire at the end of the First World War. And by doing so, Baghdadi tried to place himself in the long list of Islamic Caliphs, the rightful leaders of the ummah (the global Muslim community).

Violent jihadism is inherently anti-modern and very unpopular among Muslims across the world. It is because of their unpopularity that these groups are involved in extreme violence. With their asymmetrical barbarity, jihadist groups have sought to overcome not just the shortcomings in their military capabilities but also the lack of their political capital. For Baghdadi's group, violence was both a means and an end in itself. The puritanical interpretation of Islam by the IS has echoes from Salafi Islam. The Salafis follow the "pious forefathers" of Islam. For them, man cannot interpret the holy book or the Hadith. But Salafism itself is not a monolith. It can be a spiritual way of life. There are



Salafi organisations whose members dedicate themselves to a "pure" Islamic way of life and have nothing to do with violence. But for groups such as the al-Qaeda and the IS, Salafism is a political ideology to attain power. And since they cannot attain power through mass movements, popular elections or revolutions, they turn to violent jihadism as a vehicle to reach that goal, which makes them Salafi-Jihadists.

'Pure' Islamic State Unlike the al-Qaeda, the IS's operations were not confined to carrying out suicide attacks in the West or West-backed countries. It wanted to create a "pure" Islamic State where the "true" believers can come and live. These "true believers", for the IS, were Sunni Muslims alone and who followed the IS's diktats. The Shias are in this worldview, considered "rafidha" (rejectionists, who "reject" the first three Caliphs of the Sunni Islam), and therefore merit second class status. In areas under their control, the minority communities had to pay minority tax to the state for protection. They could not publicly practise their religion. In the IS worldview, homosexuals were to be thrown off high-rises, the fingers of smokers had to be chopped off, slavery permitted and music and films forbidden. The concept of "nation-states" is also alien to the IS world-view, for whom the world is the Caliphate and where the ummah should be living under the leadership of their rightful Calliph.

In effect, the IS has stood opposed to everything modern liberalism offers - individual freedom, equality, liberty are all completely denied by the group. The IS also frowns upon and denies critical thinking, demanding only loyalty to its cause. At the same time, where the IS succeeded is in exploiting the contradictions within modern societies - the contradictions that were swept under the carpet by the roadroller of nationalism. The identity crisis of Muslims, especially young Muslims, in liberal societies, is what the IS tapped into using modern communication technologies. It offered a violent, alternative, vengeful vision to trap these people, while in Muslim-majority societies, western aggression was used as propaganda for recruitment. The IS managed to do this while holding on to territories that it captured within Iraq and Syria. It was for the first time in decades that a group claimed to have established a caliphate by erasing the borders of modern states (Iraq and Syria in this case) and by calling upon followers to migrate. The IS succeeded in attracting tens of thousands of people to its "Caliphate" - from Tunisia to India and the U.S. It was also opposed to the diversity of Islam terming Shias, Ismailis. Ahmedias and Alawites as non-Muslims. Syncretic traditions of Islam such as Sufism were branded anti-Islam by the IS. Even if Sunni Muslims did not buy into the IS version of Islam, they could be excommunicated (takfir) and

killed according to its worldview. It is no surprise that most of the IS's victims in the Arab world were Muslims.

Problems in the anti-IS fight

The IS' Caliphate has now been destroyed and its leader gone. But there are two problems in the fight against the IS. One, the objective conditions that led to the rise of the IS remain intact in West Asia and the larger Arab world. The group still has affiliates and arms in several parts of the world such as Afghanistan, Egypt and Nigeria. The recent Turkish incursion into northeastern Syria is threatening even the limited advances made in the fight against the IS. The Shia-Sunni sectarianism that the IS tried to exploit is still burning across West Asia. Two, the IS will be defeated only when its ideology will be defeated, which is a tall ask. The IS is not an organisation that was created by "western imperialism", but an organisation that used the chaos created by "impe rialism". It will continue to do so even after all these setbacks – this includes even the rump of the IS. The group does not need a standing army of thousands of soldiers to attack civilians through suicide blasts. For them, violence is linked to their survival. If the IS goes silent, it becomes irrelevant in the global jihadist landscape and all its talk of the expansionary Caliphate will come to an end. It is like Macbeth. The group will retain its need to kill in order to survive. To stop the group, its organisational and ideological apparatus has to be taken down in a region that is free of foreign interventions and repressions. For now, this looks a distant possibility.

'Unwriting' history, creating myths

Accounts from the past suggest that Sardar Patel played a key role in the incorporation of Article 370 in the Constitution

7hat I like about history is that if the event is sufficiently far back in time, and we no longer remember how it happened or who did it, we can spin any story and present it as fact and most people will not be any the wiser. However, if you do it too publicly or loudly there's still a danger you could get found out. Did that happen to the Prime Minister and Home Minister on October 31 when they extolled their de-operationalisation of Article 370? Let me place the facts before you and then judge for yourself.

Patel and Article 370

Speaking in Delhi, Amit Shah said "the unfulfilled dream of Patel was realised when 370 was repealed". Narendra Modi was even more explicit. He said Patel had inspired him to take the decision to dilute Article 370 and added, "I dedicate the decision to Sardar Sahab."

Even though neither explicitly said so, it was widely inferred the two men were suggesting Vallabhbhai Patel, first Home Minister and Deputy Prime Minister of independent India, was against Article 370 and wanted it repealed. This was his unfulfilled dream. This is why the Prime Minister dedicated its dilution to him. And remember they were speaking on October 31, Patel's anniversary.

Now, let's see how history records Patel's stand on Article 370. Srinath Raghavan, the author of War and Peace in Modern India: A Strategic History of the Nehru Years and a professor at Ashoka University, says the first meeting to draft Article 370 took place at Patel's home on May 15 and 16, 1949. More significantly, Mr. Raghavan says when N.G. Ayyangar, the minister responsible for negotiating with Jammu and Kashmir's Prime Minister (as he was then called) Sheikh Abdullah, prepared a draft letter for Nehru to send to Abdullah summarising the contours of the agreement - of which, incidentally, Article 370 was the core he first sent it to Patel with the following note: "Will you kindly let Iawaharlalii know direct as to your approval of it. He will issue the letter to Sheikh Abdullah only after

receiving your approval." Let's ponder over that letter. It says Nehru would only tell the Sheikh they had an agreement on the Kashmir clauses, including Article 370, after Patel wrote to him to say he was in agreement with them. In effect, this gave Patel a veto. If he had said he was not happy with it Nehru presumably would not have written to the Sheikh indicating his acceptance. I assume this is why Mr. Raghavan told *The* Telegraph (August 13, 2019) that Article 370 was "Sardar Patel's formulation through and through."

Equally importantly, Mr. Raghavan says it was Patel who con-



vinced the Congress Legislature Party to accept Article 370. Since in 1949 the CLP was the majority of the Constituent Assembly, this also means he convinced the As-

Special status for Kashmir

Let me now cite another source on Patel's attitude to Article 370. I shall quote from page 517 of Rajmohan Gandhi's seminal biography of Patel called Patel: A Life. After writing Patel "suppressed" his own opinions, it's important to focus on what Mr. Gandhi says of the decision taken by Patel "in October 1949, while Nehru was abroad, when the Constituent Assembly considered Kashmir." Read what follows carefully: "Patel, who was functioning as Acting Prime Minister, acquiesced in a special status for Kashmir, inclusive of concessions that went beyond what Jawaharlal had accepted before his departure". Mr. Gandhi writes that Abdullah pressed for these concessions "and the Sardar did not stand in the way". Patel presumed that these concessions "seemed to represent Nehru's wishes which (he) did not want to repudiate in Iawaharlal's absence".

Once again, this is very revealing. First, Patel "acquiesced in a special status for Kashmir... that went beyond what Jawaharlal had accepted." Second, he did so because he presumed this "seemed to represent Nehru's wishes which he did not want to repudiate." This clearly implies he did not strongly disagree with these concessions otherwise he would have refused to go along or, at least, done so after expressing strong dissent. But that didn't happen. So, even if he "suppressed" his own views he did not give them great importance --

certainly not priority To be honest, Rajmohan Gandhi also records that Patel "predicted trouble": "'Jawaharlal royega', he said." Perhaps Nehru came to rue Article 370 but Patel was the one who ensured it got placed in the Constitution. He did not wait to find out whether Nehru actually wanted this. He simply assumed

Does this account from history suggest repealing Article 370 was Patel's "unfulfilled dream"? And would Patel feel honoured that the repeal is being dedicated to his memory? As I said at the start, you must judge for yourself.

The case of Hari Singh Now, while I am revealing insights gleaned from history, let me share two others. Page 517 of Rajmohan Gandhi's biography reveals that it was Patel who told Maharaja Hari Singh to leave the State. "He had agreed, when Nehru pressed him, to ask the Maharaja of Kashmir to

the Maharaja's son, Karan Singh, in support of this. "The Sardar told my father gently but firmly... my father was stunned. He emerged from the meeting ashen-faced, while my mother was fighting back

The second insight is more telling. It comes from Pheroze Vincent's article for The Telegraph of August 13. It concerns Syama Prasad Mookerjee – the founder of the Bharatiya Jan Sangh, from which the BJP was born - and the decision to refer Kashmir to the United Nations, which Mr. Shah has roundly and repeatedly criticised. On August 7, 1952 this is what Mookerjee said in the Lok Sabha: "It has been said that I was a party when the decision was taken to refer the Kashmir issue to the UNO... that is an obvious fact."

So, doesn't it seem that Mookeriee, a member of Nehru's cabinet at the time, did not dissent? Otherwise in 1952, two years after he parted company with Nehru and a year after he formed the Jan Sangh, wouldn't he have said so? Instead, this is what he told the Lok Sabha: "I have no right and I do not want to disclose the extraordinary circumstances under

which that decision was taken." After all that, let me leave you with a bon mot. They say great men write history. One of the greatest, Napoleon, dismissed history as "a myth." Well, in India great men can also 'unwrite' history. Or, as Napoleon would have put it, they create myths.

Should online political advertising be regulated?

PARLEY

Micro-targeting could have potentially damaging results in the context of political advertising

On October 31, Twitter announced that it will no longer carry political advertisements as the power of Internet advertising "brings significant risks to politics, where it can be used to influence votes". On the other hand, Facebook has said it will not fact-check political advertisements as it does not want to stifle free speech. In a conversation moderated by P.J. George, Pranesh Prakash and Kiran Chandra discuss how platforms and constitutional authorities can deal with the challenges posed by online political advertising to democracies. Edited

We have always had political advertising. What is it that makes online political advertisements different or maybe even problematic?

Pranesh Prakash: There are two

things that make online political advertising different. One is targeting. Online advertising allows, especially on social networks, for a kind of targeting that wasn't possible at the same level before. Earlier, if you wanted to target a particular segment of people for your political messaging, you could find out what kind of magazines they subscribe to and put fliers in those magazines. But you couldn't engage in personalised targeting based on multiple attributes that is possible through platforms like Facebook and Twitter. The second is the invisibility of this kind of advertising. If there's a billboard in the real world, evervone gets to see it. However, if there's targeted advertising on a social media platform, not everyone gets to know of it.



two people connected to the Internet from the same source, using the same equipment, studying in the same school or college, working in the same workplace, and living in the same habitat to get two different advertisements. And micro-targeting has got potentially damaging results in the context of political advertising, particularly for elections. These platforms make it possible to go from manufacturing consent to manipulating consent. A person is continuously fed with information to vote for a particular party.

Twitter said it will no longer carry political advertisements, considering the repercussions seen in the U.S. in the past elections. On the contrary, Facebook says political advertisements are necessary and that people should see if their politicians are lying. How culpable is a platform in the case of a problematic online political advertisement?

KC: Platforms, particularly Facebook, have been washing their hands of the issue saying they are intermediaries providing space; that the content is being generated by the people to be consumed by the people, and they have no role to play. But this is false. If you look at the complete business model of Facebook, Google, or any of the platforms, they clearly provide micro-targeting, or allow people to be manipulated for a particular purpose. So, these platforms can't just wash their hands of the issue. In the Maharashtra election, you saw a lot of advertisements coming out which are untraceable. How can this happen without the platform itself allowing for such a possibility? The Election Commission (EC) needs to step in on all these issues. These corporations need to be very transparent in the context of elections. They need to bring out all the ways in which advertisements are displayed and also the money associated with it.

When somebody publishes it [an ad] on a Facebook wall, it is as good as publishing it in a newspaper. So, all the legislation that apply now for reasonable restrictions and freecal advertisements or not, I don't

dom of speech and the freedom of press also apply to these platforms. These platforms are culpable when the very intent of their business model allows such subversion of the democratic process. They need to be brought in line to ensure that Indian democracy is safe.

PP: I completely disagree with Kiran on a number of points. For instance, those who are running a platform shouldn't automatically be liable for what people are seeing on those platforms. The people who are actually saying things should be liable, not necessarily those who are carrying it without knowing what they're carrying most of the time. Kiran also mentioned manipulation. The job of all advertising is to manipulate. The job of newspapers is to manipulate public opinion. And there's always money associated with this. Newspapers carry advertisements as well. You don't necessarily know who has paid for each ad in the newspaper. What online platforms are able to provide is actually greater transparency in this regard, at least based on what Facebook is attempting to do with its ad library. Calling this manipulation doesn't quite work. Because then you have to specify why certain categories of things you think of as manipulating, while other categories you think of as influencing.

Second, as far as I know, Facebook does not ask for your caste. Nor does it actually allow advertisers to use caste as a category for advertising. To address the larger question of whether to carry politicaste. For instance, Dalit topics, Iyengar topics, etc. So Facebook, in its design, allows such kind of sensitivities to be used for micro-targeting. And one should not confuse general advertising with political advertising. If the advertisement is just about manipulating for buying a particular product, that has something to do with the business houses; even if one agrees with it or not. But when you speak about political advertising, when people come to participate and engage in a democratic process, the EC and The Representation of the People Act (RPA) mandate that people should be allowed to take a very clear stand, to look at what has happened in the last five years, and decide how to vote, freely and fairly. That is why the RPA clearly lists a certain set of things for free and fair elections, where even the use of money and manipulation should not be allowed to happen. Yes, the U.S. has a different context. American democracy is different from Indian democracy. We have got our own statute. This methodology in which these platforms have got their business models and are engaging deeply in subverting the Indian democratic process is a serious cause of concern. The EC should come up with new methodologies, if the existing ones are not sufficient.

Can you elaborate on how the EC can play a role in this?

KC: We brought these issues to the notice of the EC prior to the 2019 general election. The EC said it does not have enough manpower to deal with this situation for now. The EC does not have power over the police or the administration; but once the elections are on, it has the capability to take in different departments and ensure that such subversion of the democratic process does not happen. A fundamental problem with the EC's method is that it said it was in discussion with the digital platforms to make more people vote in the election. And that itself is problematic. How is it going to be done? The EC should make public the way in which this advertising is being conducted, the money associated with it, and the people who are being reached with it. For instance, if

we look at TV channels for ads dur-

ing primetime, there is a mechanism, like TRP ratings, which allows them to understand and evaluate the target sections. If you look at the Maharashtra election, the advertiser itself is not known. Have people been sent communal messages? Have people been targeted based on caste, which can disqualify the contestant? The EC should reach out to the Government of India and look at the departments that are capable of handling this. If they don't exist, it should start creating infrastructure that will be able to look into all these aspects. Also, concrete guidelines should be given to these digital platforms. And whatever comes in contradiction, or comes in the way of implementing the RPA, the EC should stop the platforms from do-

PP: For me, it's not clear to what extent I would draw a distinction between advertising and other things which the EC has not been able to curtail, such as paid news and political ownership of media, which allow for very skewed viewpoints to be expressed. But insofar as what can be done about online platforms - and again, only online platforms which deal in advertising – the biggest source of online political messaging in India is WhatsApp. So, excluding the elephant in the room from this discussion, what the EC could do is bring the largest platforms together to get transparency commitments from them. Then this information needs to be made publicly available, so that the invisibility which happens with targeting gets countered. The second thing... Given that elections are geographical in nature in India, if you want to engage in advertising, you have to do it on the basis of geography, not on the basis of specific kinds of attributes of a person. And let's also be aware that most of these attributes or guesses about people that these platforms are making are based on what people post on social media platforms, what they click. So, the one thing that can be done on a global level is transparency and restrictions on various targeting but anything else such as limitations on, say, lying in political advertising, I don't think that can or should be sold on a global level. It's dependent far too much on each country and their models and how they interpret freedom of expression.

Changing the status quo

The Home Ministry's move to merge the Assam Rifles with the ITBP is a step in the right direction

The Ministry of Home Affairs has proposed that the Assam Rifles should be merged with the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) and serve under the operational control of the MHA. At present, the Assam Rifles, a Central paramilitary force, is under the administrative control of the MHA and operational control of the Army, i.e. the Ministry of Defence. The Army is opposed to this proposal.

History of Assam Rifles

Formed as Cachar Levy in 1835 to assist the British rulers in maintaining peace in the Northeast, the Assam Rifles, which had just about 750 men, proved its capability and efficiency. This necessitated its expansion. The unit was converted into the Assam Military Police Battalion with two additional battalions in 1870. They were known as the Lushai Hills Battalion, Lakhimpur Battalion and Naga Hills Battalion. Just before World War I, another battalion, the Darrang Battalion, was added. They all rendered great service by assisting the British in Europe and West Asia during the war. These battalions were then renamed Assam Rifles. They continued to be regular armed police battalions, but with the 'Rifles' tag, which was a matter of honour for their competence, on par with any regular Army battalion.

It was after the Chinese aggression in 1962 in Arunachal Pradesh that the Assam Rifles battalions were placed under the operational control of the Army. Assam Rifles personnel who were acclimatised to the region were better suited for operations then. It needs to be remembered that one of the major causes for India's defeat was the fact that the regular Army units were not used to the extreme weather. The decision taken then was in keeping with the require-

ments. This is not the case any more. All Central Armed Police Forces (CAPF) are acclimatised to almost every region of the country now due to country-wide deployment of all CAPF battalions. The operational role performed by the ITBP at 18,700 feet in Ladakh is testimony enough to its capability to guard the border in any part of the country. It needs to be

noted that back in 2001, the Group of Ministers had stated that the principle of 'One Border, One Force' should be strictly adhered to. If ITBP can guard the India-China border in Ladakh, there is no reason why it cannot guard the India-China border in Arunachal Pradesh and beyond.

The concept of having two masters for an organisation - one for administrative control and another for operational control – is not only absurd but also leads to problems of coordination. Therefore, the Home Ministry's move to merge all its 55,000strong Assam Rifles with the ITBP is a step in the right direction.

Opposed to the move

The Army argues that the Assam Rifles should be merged with it, to ensure national security. It requires no wisdom to conclude that the Army would lose its promotional avenues once this paramilitary force is merged with the ITBP, as it would be directly under the control of the Home Ministry. At present, nearly 80% of officers' ranks from Major upwards are held by Army officers on deputation. A Lieutenant General of the Army holds the post of Director General of Assam Rifles. It is natural for the Army to oppose the move.

For the time being, the Chief may be appointed from among IPS officers. But for the tussle between the IPS and the CAPF officers, consequent to the CAPF being brought under the fold of Organised Group 'A' Service this year, it would be the direct officers of Assam Rifles who will

eventually take up the top posts. The Home Ministry, under Rajnath Singh, took up the issue of merger with the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS). The matter is in the Delhi High Court now after retired personnel filed a petition saying they were facing difficulties in drawing pension because of dual control. The merger issue needs to be taken up on priority by the CCS so that doubts are cleared. The modalities of absorbing the officers should be worked out to stall any situation of a vacuum being created once the deputationists are repatriated to the Army.

The art of seeing while not looking

Journalists learn to expect stories in unlikely places and situations

A lot can happen when you aren't "looking". That can be the tag line for the business of news-gathering. Meaningful stories routinely happen off the field. Delays set you up for the unexpected moment. What seems a dead-end at first often opens into a rabbit hole of new discoveries.

So, in time, news-gatherers learn to expect stories in unlikely places and situations, and try to perfect the art of seeing while not looking. The antenna is up all the time, even during exasperating delays.

Many summers ago, while returning from a satisfactory assignment at a remote coastal area of Tamil Nadu, I realised the best had been reserved for

After what looked like an eon in getting a cab, I was well on my way back home, when, at Koovathur on East

Coast Road, I chanced upon a young sloth bear being led by a leash. Getting the cab driver to stop, I had a chat with the animal's "owner". Karunanidhi on split in Congress

A poor mother puts by money the hard way, saving a paisa here and a paisa there, so that she can buy an article her child covets. But the moment she gives the article to the baby it lets it slip into a gutter. The mother is sorry not because the article is gone but because all her efforts have gone to waste. If Mahatma Gandhi were alive to-day to see the Congress edifice built by him going to pieces, he would also have the same feeling of wasted effort. This analogy was drawn here [Madras] today [November 7] by Mr. M. Karunanidhi, Chief Minister, while speaking at a Gandhi centenary function organised by the Southern Indian Regional Council of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. He said Gandhiji had advocated the dissolution of the Congress Party as soon as Independence was achieved. Ironically enough, the very year of Gandhi centenary had been chosen by some people to liquidate that party. The Chief Minister said the best homage they could pay to the Mahatma was to follow his principles of peace, non-violence and truth in order to preserve freedom and democracy in the country.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO NOV. 8, 1919.

Indian Address.

London, November 1. - A Deputation of Indian Moslems presented an address to the Shah at Buckingham Palace this afternoon, in the course of which, they said that, though they came from India, they represented a great Moslem brotherhood which knew no barriers of nationality. They referred to Persian influence on Indian manners, dress, language, customs and poetry, and prayed to Allah to protect the Shah, that Persia might recover from the trials of the late dreadful years and resume her proper place among the great peoples of the world.

Replying, the Shah said that, if Persia had influences on India, it was no less true that Indian influences were felt in his country. Referring to Anglo-Persian relations, the Shah said that the unity of interests and mutual respects were daily increasing. Persia had in the past been a barrier against the invasion of western countries from the east. He now hoped that Persia would become a bridge by which commercial intercourse between western lands and the heart of Asia might be maintained in a like manner. Western ideas and culture could be passed on after they had been assimilated and fashioned to form suitable eastern mentality.

Karnataka cricketers held in betting scam

"They were involved in fixing a second match against Bengaluru Blasters. We have taken the accused into custody and further investigations are on to ascertain if more players are involved in the scam," Mr Patil said.

A senior officer, who is part of the investigation team, said the police have information on the involvement of more players with bookies.

On Tuesday, the police arrested cricketer Nishanth Singh Shekhawat, who last featured in a KPL match in 2018 for Shivamogga Lions.

According to the police, Shekhawat was the link between bookies and Vinu Prasad, a Bengaluru Blasters bowling coach, who was arrested in October along with batsman Vishwanathan, formerly with the same team.

Restrictions in J&K based on wrong assumptions: Sibal

He tells SC that the government has created a problem by its own hand

Senior advocate Kapil Sibal on Thursday submitted to the Supreme Court that seven million Kashmiris had lost their fundamental right to move freely on August 4 merely because the government had "assumed" that the entire populace of Jammu and Kashmir would be opposed to the abrogation of J&K's special status under 370 of Constitution.

[government] "They created the problem by their own hand," Mr. Sibal told a three-judge Bench led by Justice N.V. Ramana.

"Then should they [government] have waited for riots to take place," Justice B.R. Gavai asked.

"Now, why do you assume there would be riots? So, it is all in your mind, and seven million people lost their rights," Mr. Sibal replied. "If there is danger to pu-

blic tranquillity, can't the court have the power to exercise restrictions under Section 144 [of the Code of Criminal Procedure]," Jus-

tice Gavai asked Mr. Sibal.

"Why did you assume the entire population would be against you," Mr. Sibal responded. "How can you just assume that there would be trouble and abrogate the fundamental rights of seven million people? You need solid material facts to support your apprehension," he added.

Justice R. Subhash Reddy then asked Mr. Sibal what "material facts" would suffice to authorise restrictions. "If a situation of distur-

bance of public tranquillity actually happens, then impose [Section] 144," Mr. Sibal replied. "On August 4, there was no such situation except in the mind of the government. They assumed. Besides, what was the need for imposing curfew when you had thousands of police and

security personnel already stationed there?" wondered.

On Wednesday, senior lawyer Vrinda Grover, for Kashmir Times editor Anuradha Bhasin, had pointed out how the police authorities use the term 'anti-national elements" in their prohibitory orders without identifying anyone in particular. "So are they classifying the entire population of J&K as anti-national elements - a term which defies legal defi-

ment, while restricting the fundamental rights of the people, neglected to look after their basic needs, like livelihood or availability of adequate public transport to reach hospitals, banks, etc. The senior lawyer said it was the duty of the State to ensure that those in need were protected despite restrictions.

To this, Justice Reddy said that during curfews, in some circumstances, people do tend to suffer.

"So, what is the duty of the State? It is to protect the rights of the people like farmers, orchard growers, cancer patients," Mr. Sibal responded.

"Not allowing me to carry on my trade is an unreasonable restriction, not allowing me to go to the hospital is an unreasonable restriction, stopping me at the airport is an unreasonable restriction... How will information coming in from the rest of the country to Kashmir cause a riot? Restrictions without attendant performance of obligations by the State is not justified. You can restrict my life, but you have to facilitate it also," Mr. Sibal argued.

"Everything is odd [in J&K], there is no odd-even," Mr. Sibal quipped.

7 killed in heavy snowfall in Kashmir Valley

Normal life paralysed, traffic hit

Seven people were killed as 16 hours of incessant snowfall paralysed life in the Kashmir Valley on Thursday. Surface and air traffic was completely disrupted.

This season's first heavy snowfall started on Wednesday night and continued all day on Thursday, triggering avalanches in many places and turning the narrow tracks on the hill slopes dangerously slippery.

An official said two Army porters were swept away by avalanches during the night. The bodies were recovered on Thursday. They were identified as Mohammed Isaac and Manzoor Khan, residents of Zihama village in Kupwara.

Highways blocked

Traffic on all major highways connecting the Valley to the rest of the country, including the three linking Srinagar with Jammu, Poonch and Kargil, was disrupted. Nearly 2,000 vehicles were left stranded on these highways, officials said. No flight was able to land

or take off from the Srinagar airport due to snow on the

runway and low visibility, officials said.

The State capital recorded over one foot of snowfall and the upper reaches of Kupwara, Shopian, Ganderbal and Baramulla three to four feet.

Two soldiers were killed when their vehicle met with an accident in the Langate area of Kupwara due to poor visibility, officials added. "Around 90 houses were damaged due to snowfall in Kupwara," Deputy Commissioner Anshul Garg said.

Snow has inflicted major damage to electricity lines, both 35,000 kV and 11,000 kV, resulting in the disruption of power supply across

3 years since DeMo, cash is back

Also, digital payments, especially on the UPI platform, have seen robust growth

Three years since demonetisation, the level of cash with the public has grown faster than the GDP growth of the country, even as digital payments - especially those on the Unified Payments Interface (UPI) platform - have seen robust growth.


Reserve Bank of India data show that the public held ₹20.49 lakh crore in cash as of September 2019, the latest data available, which is 13.3% more than the figure the corresponding month of 2018. The data show that the cash held by the public made up 96% of the money in circulation. with most of the rest deposited in banks. In December 2016, one month after demonetisation and the enforced deposits in banks, this percentage stood at 83%.

'More convenient'

"Post-demonetisation, there was no option but to turn to digital modes of payments. That has changed now," Kunal Bajaj, head, wealth management, MobiKwik, told The Hindu. "However, what it did was help convert a lot of users... People realised

Cash is still king

Between November 2016 and September 2019, the "currency with the public" has grown 133%, while e-payment transactions like mobile banking have also seen a sharp rise



that it is much more convenient, secure and much more seamless especially for online purchase.

As a result, the value of transactions made through the four most popular modes - UPI, debit cards, mobile banking, and prepaid instruments - has seen robust growth over this threeyear period. Players in the digital payments space do acknowledge, however, that it will still take a few years to move most people away from cash transactions and onto digital platforms.

"We are seeing a very

strong customer adoption for digital payments, and this will need sustained efforts for a few years to get more and more customers on-board," Hemant Gala, head, payments, banking and financial services, PhonePe, said. "This is a journey of adoption... with focus on products and right use cases we will see a significant share of payments moving from cash to digital."

The best-performing of these instruments is clearly the UPI, which has overtaken debit cards in the volume of transactions and is swiftly catching up with them in terms of value of transactions as well.

According to the RBI's annual report, the number of UPI payments in 2018-19, at 535 crore, for the first time surpassed the number of debit card transactions (441

As of September 2019, there have been 496.5 crore UPI transactions in 2019-20 compared with 735.7 crore debit card transactions.

Catching up In terms of value, ₹9.03 lakh

crore worth of transactions were conducted on the UPI platform in the first six months of the financial year 2019-20. While this is still significantly lower than the ₹20.49 lakh crore worth of debit card transactions in this period, it still represents a huge catching up. In 2016-17, the year of demonetisation, the value of UPI transactions (₹6,947 crore) was only 0.25% of the value of debit card transactions.

To put the growth of UPI transactions in perspective, the first half of 2019-20 has already seen a higher value of transactions completed on the platform than in the entire year of 2018-19!

Anxious Ayodhya awaits Supreme Court verdict | Centre to revoke

While opinion is divided on the outcome, almost every resident says peace must prevail and the ruling will be accepted

OMAR RASHID

A sense of anxiety prevails in Avodhva as it awaits the Supreme Court verdict in the Babri Masjid-Ram Janmabhoomi dispute case. And this can be felt at the Tedhi Bazaar intersection close to the outer precincts of the disputed area, which is barricaded by yellow grille.

Haji Mehboob, one of the litigants in the case, lives opposite the Ram Janmabhoomi police station, barely 100 metres from the intersection, where two-wheelers and pedestrians are being checked before entry. There is a similar quiet inside the compound of his house, where he is seated on a chair conversing with two associates as two armed police guards look on attentively.

"What Allah will do is for the best," says Mr. Mehboob, 73, the second generation of his family involved in the case that first came about after the idols of Ram Lalla were placed "surreptitious-

Mr. Mehboob appeals to all residents, especially Muslims, to maintain calm and not give in to any kind of provocation, and repose faith in the court. "The administration has promised us nothing will happen, the security is tight and no Muslim need to migrate out of fear," he says.

Several Muslims in the area say that even if the verdict comes in their favour, any discussion on a mosque can wait, and it is peace first.

While the opinion on the issue is divided along communal and political lines, on the outside, almost every resident says the court verdict will be accepted. The most common opinion among the majority community is the belief that the disputed site will be awarded to them.

Boost for business

Amar Singh, who runs a ration shop, is confident that the verdict will come "in favour of Lord Ram" and transform the town. "If a Ram temple won't be built in *Ram* ki Nagri, where else will it be built," he asks.

However, as long as the land is not handed over to the Muslim side, he is willing even to accept status quo. "Even if the court says, let the site remain unused or build a hostel or a hospital, I am fine with that," he says.

Like several other traders and shopkeepers, Suphal Chand Maurya, who migrated from Purulia district of West Bengal 45 years ago, feels the construction of a Ram temple will usher in a new wave of business.

Raj Bahadur Yadav, who sells pan at Tedhi Bazar, while hoping for a permanent end to the dispute, fears that if a temple is constructed, his kiosk could be demolished in the name of beautification of the vicin-

Nanku Yadav, who runs a popular tea shop nearby, is concerned that a split or indecisive verdict could reignite the issue politically at the local level.

Taseer's OCI card

'He tried to conceal information'

The Union government on Thursday night announced that it would revoke the Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) card of author and journalist Aatish Taseer over what it said was his attempt to "conceal information" that his father, Salman Taseer, was of Pakistani ori-

In an official statement, the Home Ministry said he had "failed to dispute the notice" it had sent asking him to explain the lapse.

Given a chance

"Mr. Taseer was given the opportunity to submit his reply/objections regarding his PIO/OCI cards, but he failed to dispute the notice," the Ministry said.

In its August 13 notice, which The Hindu has accessed, the Ministry said Mr. Taseer had failed to disclose that his father, the former Governor of Pakistan's Punjab, was of Pakistani origin, and had only provided only details of his mother and veteran Indian journalist, Tayleen Singh. In his reply on September 6 to that notice and another dated September 3, Mr. Taseer said his parents had never been le-

gally married, and his mother was his sole legal guardian. "Their relationship occurred when they were both residents in the United Kingdom, and Salman Taseer stated (accurately) that he was a U.K. citizen and passport-holder," Mr. Taseer said in his reply sent to the Indian Consulate in New York, which was acknowledged by Deputy Consul-General Shatrughna Sinha.

Sources said Mr. Taseer was expected to challenge the government's move. He had come under criticism from members of the BIP for an essay in May 2019 for the Time magazine that accused the Modi government of following divisive policies.

The Ministry said its decision had nothing to do with the article.

Ministry clarifies after Pakistan Army contradicts Imran statement waiving passport requirement

Indian passports and Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) cards will be necessary for pilgrims visiting the Kartarpur Sahib shrine for the 550th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak, the External Affairs Ministry said on Thursday.

The statement sought to clarify the confusion that had arisen after the spokesperson of the Pakistan Armed Forces contradicted Prime Minister Imran Khan's statement waiving the need for passports for Indian Sikh pilgrims.

On November I, Mr. Khan declared in a social media message that he had waived the requirement of Indian passports for the Sikh pilgrims. "Just a valid ID," he

said, would be sufficient for day, Maj. Gen. Ghafoor said the Sikhs to visit Kartarpur the entry of Indian pilgrims Sahib. This was, however, contradicted by the spokesperson of Pakistan Armed Forces, Major General Asif Ghafoor, earlier this week. In a TV interview on Wednes-

"The reports from Pakistan are conflicting. Some saying [passports are] needed and

some saying the opposite. As of now, we have an MoU and that has not been changed and that MoU cannot be changed unilaterally by Pakistan. According to that document, there is a need for passports [for Indian citizens] and persons of Indian origin need to carry OCI cards," Ministry spokesperson Raveesh Kumar said. He said the same documents would be required for subsequent travels by pilgrims after the November festivities.

'India refused offer'

However, following the Indian statement, the spokesperson for Pakistan's Minisof Foreign Affairs Mohammad Faisal said in a social media post: "As a special gesture, Pakistan announced concessions on the auspicious occasion of 550th birth anniversary of Baba Guru Nanak to facilitate pilgrims. This has been refused by India."

'Sentiments disregarded' In a follow-up statement, Dr. Faisal said not availing the

passport-free travel offer from Pakistan was "India's choice" and he accused the Indian government of disregarding Sikh sentiments.

India and Pakistan signed an agreement on October 24 laying down the rules to be followed during the celebrations at Kartarpur that are expected to see thousands of pilgrims from all over the world. Mr. Kumar said Pakistan had maintained silence about the list of delegates that India had submitted under the agreement.

Pakistan targets soldiers with profiles of 'gurus' Army identifies 150 fake accounts

The Army has identified over 150 fake profiles on social media being run by Pakistan Intelligence Operatives (PIOs) to trap Indian soldiers for intelligence gathering, sources in the Army said on Thursday.

"Against the backdrop of virtual honey-trapping cases, the Army issued an advisory in mid-October on the modus operandi of PIOs as part of their attempts to gain intelligence through social media and other means," an Army source said.

No calls or messages

The advisory asked soldiers to refrain from taking calls or getting in contact with fake "babas" and "gurus"

who are in fact PIOs out to trap them.

The Army has also cautioned soldiers against taking calls or messages on so-

cial media from fake insurance agents or Military Nursing Service nurses who are in fact female PIOs, the source said.

Two arrested

On Wednesday, lance naik Ravi Verma and sepoy Vichitra Behera were arrested by the Rajasthan police for passing on sensitive information after they were virtually honey-trapped by PlOs on social media. Source es said the investigation revealed that the jawans were in touch with a Facebook ID with the name of 'Seerat'. posing as a woman.

The government is learnt to have cleared the Supreme Court Collegium's recommendation to appoint Justice A.A. Kureshi as the Chief Justice of the Tripura High

The Collegium had initially in May recommended Justice Kureshi for appointment as the Chief Justice of the Madhya Pradesh High Court. But the government, in back-to-back letters on August 23 and 27, had raised objections to the proposal. Following this, the Collegium recommended his appointment to the Tripura High Court in September.

A source said the recommendation had been cleared at the government level and sent to the President for the issuance of the warrant of appointment.

On Thursday, a petition filed by the Gujarat High Court Advocates Association came up for hearing before a Bench led by Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi. The case was adjourned to November 13. The Chief Justice said the case would come up next before a Bench led by Justice S.A. Bobde, Chief India-designate.

On September 23, while hearing the case filed by the advocates' association, the Supreme Court had passed an order issuing a general reprimand against "interference" by third parties in matters of judicial appointments and transfers. The order passed by a Bench led by Chief Justice

Gogoi said such intrusions would not "augur well" for the institu-

Chief Justice Gogoi had recorded in the order that matters of judicial appointments, postings and transfers go to the "root of the administration of justice".

Justice Bobde, in an interview to The Hindu, had dismissed questions about the perceived delays in governmental clearance of Collegium recommendations, saying "machineries operate at their own speed". The Collegium has also stopped giving reasons for its recommendations in its recent resolutions published on the Supreme Court website.

Recently, Justice V.K. Tahilramani chose to resign as the Madras High Court Chief Justice when the Collegium proposed her transfer to the Meghalaya High Court. The Supreme Court was compelled to issue a statement that her proposed transfer was in the best interests of administration of justice.

'We can't be complacent after IS leader's death'

Minister of State for Home G. Kishan Reddy has said that despite the elimination of Islamic State leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi, "...there is no room to assume that the caliphate would cease to survive". The leader of the terror outfit was killed in a U.S. raid on his Syrian safe house last month. The outfit seeks to establish an Islamic cali-

Mr. Reddy made the statement in Australia, where he is attending a 'No Money For Terror' conference, organised by the Australian government. Seventy other countries, including Pakistan, are taking part in it. Norway, Australia and New Zealand called for checking the flow of money to right-wing terror groups. A New Zealand Minister pointed to the murder of 51 worshippers at two Christchurch mosques in March.

Pakistan said it was aligning with the global community, especially the Financial Action Task Force(FATF), to redesign its anti-money laundering and counter-terror financing network, said an official who attended the conference.

"India, being a victim of cross-border terrorism, advocates zero-tolerance of terror... Despite the killing of Osama bin Laden in 2011, several active affiliates of Al Qaeda still exist in many parts of the world," Mr. Reddy said. He announced that India would host the next edition of the conference.

Iran resumes uranium enrichment at Fordow plant

This marks Tehran's fourth step away from the 2015 nuclear agreement

Iran resumed uranium enrichment at its underground Fordow plant south of Tehran on Thursday in a new step back from its commitments under a landmark 2015 nuclear deal, raising alarm from Western powers. Engineers began feeding uranium hexafluoride gas into the plant's mothballed enrichment centrifuges in "the first minutes of Thursday", the Iranian Atomic Energy Organisation said.

The suspension of uranium enrichment at the longsecret plant was one of the restrictions on its nuclear programme Iran had agreed to in return for the lifting of sanctions. Iran's announcement that it would resume enrichment at the Fordow plant from midnight (2030 GMT on Wednesday) had drawn a chorus of concern from the remaining parties to the troubled agreement.

A total of 16 million Sri Lankans will get to vote in the country biggest election in less than two weeks.

Documents show how FB harnessed user data

Partners like Amazon got special access

Leaked documents from a civil suit against Facebook show how the social network aimed to employ user data as a tool for bargaining and to manipulate competitors, NBC News reported on Wednesday. Some 7,000 pages of documents reveal how Facebook chief Mark Zuckerberg and his team harnessed users' personal information to reward partners by giving them preferential data, while depriving rivals of the same sort of

information, it reported. NBC said the emails, notes and other documents dated as far back as 2011 and were supposed to be kept out of the public eye pend-

ing the civil case in California. They show, for example, how Amazon received special data access after purchasing advertising on Face book, while an app called

MessageMe was denied data

after growing so large it be-

came a competitor. While acting out of self-Facebook motivation. planned to portray the moves as protective of user privacy, the documents showed. The lawsuit was filed by a now defunct start-





So, they send Kama, the God of love, to bring about their union. Kama shoots his arrows to make Siva romantic. But when His penance is disturbed, Lord Siva burns down Kama by opening His third eye.
