311 MPs vote in favour while 80 vote against it; RS likely to take up CAB today | Owaisi tears up copy of bill; Shashi Tharoor says CAB 'partitions India's soul'

Amid intense debate over its legality and sparring between government and Opposition MPs over the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill (CAB) on Monday, the Lok Sabha passed the contentious Citizenship Amendment Bill (CAB) on Monday. During voting on the bill, 311 MPs voted in favour while 80 voted against it. The CAB seeks to provide citizenship to persecuted refugees from three countries — Hindus, Parsis, Sikhs, Jains, Christians and Buddhists — who live in the tribal areas of Assam, Meghalaya, Mizoram and Tripura and in areas covered under the Inner Line Permit (ILP). Currently, ILP is applicable in Arunachal, Nagaland and Mizoram. He has said, "We have to differentiate between intruders and Muslim refugees of three Islamic neighbouring countries, is expected to come up in Rajya Sabha on Tuesday for its nod. While the Opposition has criticised the CAB as regressive, discriminatory and divisive legislation that is against the basic character of the Constitution, and is a means to target Muslims by treating them as "second-class citizens," Union home minister Amit Shah, while tabling the bill in Lok Sabha, said the CAB will provide safety net of citizenship to persecuted persons and

denied that there is any political agenda behind it. The minister also made it clear that the government is determined to bring National Register of Citizens in the same way. "This will not do injustice to anyone but bring justice to people who have been waiting for 70 years. There is no hidden political agenda. We had declared CAB in our election manifesto based on which 130 crore people have voted us to power. Those who are opposing this bill have an agenda on minorities. With the introduction of CAB in Parliament, students of northeastern states have intensified their agitation with 16 Left leaning organisations calling a 12-hour Assam bandh from 5 am on Tuesday. They claim that CAB is nullifies the Assam Accord of 1985 and say that the legislation, which seeks to make it easier for non-Muslim refugees from Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan to gain Indian citizenship, is an "attempt to rob the Northeast of its identity". Amaraavati, Dec 9: Andhra Pradesh chief minister Nara Chandrababu Naidu on Monday lauded his Telangana counterpart, K. Chandrababbarao, and the state police over the four accused in the gang-rape and murder of a veterinarian being shot dead in an alleged encounter.

Hyderabad: A fine of ₹9,500 was slapped on a man for allegedly damaging a tree, planted as part of the Telangana government's green drive, near here on Monday after ramming his car into it. UP gives nod to fast-track courts

Mumbai: The Uttar Pradesh Cabinet on Monday cleared a proposal to set up 218 fast-track courts for hearing cases pertaining to crimes against children and rape. State law minister Brajesh Pathak told reporters that chief minister Yogi Adityanath has expressed concern over crimes against women. "The UP Cabinet has decided that for hearing of rapes and crimes committed on children, 218 fast-track courts will be set up. Of these, 144 courts will hear cases of rape, while 74 courts will hear cases in which POCSO Act has been slapped," he said. — PTI

Aurangabad: A civic official in Maharashtra's Aurangabad city, who went to greet the new municipal commissioner on taking charge on Monday, ended up receiving a ₹5,000 fine as his welcome bouquet had plastic wrapping. SC TO HEAR DMK PLEA AGAINST EC'S POLL ORDER

New Delhi: The Supreme Court will hear on Wednesday a plea by DMK challenging the latest notification for holding party poll in Tamil Nadu after top court had directed the State Election Commission to hold rural bodies elections excluding nine newly carved out districts. A top court bench headed by Chief Justice S. A. Bobde agreed to hear the plea also backed by the Congress, Marumalarchi Dravidia Munnetra Kazhagam and the Communist Party of India after a mentioning by senior counsel Abhinav Manu Singhvi. Mr Singhvi told the court that in the fresh notification the reservation of seats is based on 1991 population census ignoring the latest 2011 census. He said it appears as if for the SC the 2011 census had not taken place. He said that the new delimitation of constituencies in the State was completed in 2018 based on 2011 census. The top court had on December 6, 2019, directed that the chayat election in Tamil Nadu would take place at village, intermediate and district level in 27 districts while excluding nine recently reconstituted districts. The fresh notification issued on December 7 in the wake of top court direction of December 6 said that the reservation of wards in the SC/ST and women would be on the basis of an earlier notification. — PTI

Assam braces for mega bandh

16 Left-leaning outfits call for 12-hour agitation to protest CAB

With the introduction of the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill in Parliament, students of Northeastern states have intensified their agitation with 16-left leaning organisations also calling for a 12-hour Assam bandh on Tuesday to protest against the legislation. The North East Students' Organisation (NESO) has already called for an 11-hour Northeast bandh from 5 am on Tuesday on the same issue. Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti (KMSS) and its sister organisations have also extended their support to the bandh called by the NESO. However, a bandh called

by various tribal students' bodies such as Soota, Moran and Koch-Rajbongshi on Monday failed to make any major impact. The bandh was supported by the KMSS also. In a joint statement, 16 left-leaning organisations, including the SFI, DYFI, AIDWA, AISF, AISA and IPTA, demanded "scrapping of the bill" and called for "the 12-hour Assam bandh" from 5 am on Tuesday. The Assam State Jamiat Ulama Hind has also supported the North East bandh, called by the NESO on Tuesday. However, Nagaland has been exempted from the purview of the ongoing Hornbill Festival.

Gauhati University decided to postpone examinations in order to avoid untoward incidents
According to various places, the Assam Gana Parishad (AGP) on Monday decided to postpone its general council meeting, which was scheduled to take place on December 11. The regional AGP MP, Birendra Prasad Baisya, who was avoiding arrest before the media on Monday said, "I oppose the CAB as CAB. It violates the Assam

accord, which had assured a Constitutional safeguard and protection to indigenous people." Meanwhile, Assamese actor Ravi Sarma resigned from the BJP in protest of the CAB while the Gauhati University decided to postpone examinations in order to avoid any untoward incidents on campus as students have intensified their agitations. Protesters also pasted anti-CAB posters outside the residence of chief minister Sarbananda Sonowal and his Cabinet minister Himanta Biswa Sarma while others blocked trains at various places. Maulana Badrudin Ajmal on Monday staged a protest against the CAB at Jantar Mantar.

The Assam Jatiyatibadi Yuba Chatra Parishad (AJYCP) has also extended its support to the Assam bandh called by the NESO and its youth body will stage a protest at Dispur on December 12. The All India United Democratic Front (AIUDF) led by A delegation of the Assam Pradesh Congress Committee, as part of its outreach programme on the issue, on Sunday met former Assam police chief DGP Harekrishna Deka, educationist Udayaditya Bharali and senior journalist Manoj Kumar Goswami. The Assam Nagarik Samaj also took out a rally from Lakhidhar Bora Kshetra to Chhaygaon in Kamrup district to sensitise the public about its harmful impact of the Bill.

CAB, NRC two sides of same coin: Didi

Equating the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill (C-AB) with the National Register of Citizens (NRC), Rabj Chowdhury described them as "two sides of the same coin" on the day Union home minister Amit Shah pitched for the CAB after introducing it in Parliament. The Trinamul Congress supremo also suggested the Centre to offer "deemed citizenship" by issuing a "green card" to the immigrants in an oblique reference to the US model while reiterating the fierce opposition by her party and government against the CAB and NRC in the state. Exuding confidence, she affirmed that no would be able to enforce the CAB and NRC on the people of the state while her party is in power. Ms Banerjee was addressing her "thanksgiving" rally which she kicked started from Kharagpur in West Midnapore on Monday as the Trinamul has snatched the assembly constituency from the BJP in the recent by-elections. "All of us are equal. Come, let us stay united. Not a single person would be allowed to be thrown out. No NRC, no CAB, no division. No divide and rule. Nothing can be greater than the country irrespective of political slogans of any party. Be it the CAB or the NRC, they are the two sides of the same coin," she said. Sending a stern message to the Centre, Ms Banerjee elaborated, "All of us are citizens because we cast our votes. Everyone has ration cards or school certificates or something else. So where does the question of the citizenship issue arise then?"

There's no slump in employment: Labour minister

The government on Monday denied that demonetisation had anything to do with the loss of jobs in the country and claimed that, on the contrary, several steps had been taken to generate employment. Responding to queries from members in Lok Sabha during the Question Hour, Union labour minister Santosh Gangwar mentioned government schemes such as Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojana and Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana in this regard. He said under the mudra scheme, people have received more loans than the target and under the rural skill development plan, several youth from rural areas have found jobs. "There is no reason that employment has come down (*aisa koi karan nahi hai ki rogar kam hua hai*)," the minister said. During the Question Hour, members had raised the issue of job losses and increasing

unemployment particularly due to demonetisation. Trinamul Congress MP Kalyan Banerjee said thousands of labourers in his constituency, who make gold jewellery have lost their jobs due to demonetisation. "Since November 2016, industries have been collapsing and many labourers have been out of employment. In my constituency, a place called Domjur, there were 50,000 workers, 45,000 have gone out of employment and only 5,000 remain employed... By the reason of demonetisation, industries have collapsed," Mr Banerjee said.

BJP sees red in Nath's temple plan

In an interesting development, the Kamal Nath government has set in motion a move to appoint 'qualified' priests in temples in Madhya Pradesh, raising many eyebrows here. The state government has the most given final shape to its proposal to fix a criteria for people desirous of serving as priests in Hindu temples and head of math (religious institution) in MP. A priest needs to be strictly a vegetarian, well versed in Hindu religious scriptures and should have a minimum educational qualification of

class eight pass, according to the criteria set for the appointment of priests in the temples. "The move will pave the way for government-controlled temples and religious institutions in the state to become litigation free, besides serving the purpose of protecting the Sanatan Dharma in the long run," a senior officer of the state spiritual department said. According to him, many temples in the state have been found to be illegal legal battles over its properties. The move will help the government phase out the unwanted elements serving as priests of the temples and appoint qualified priests in the interest

of the particular places of worship. "The state government is going to bring the plan into force shortly, he said. The Opposition to BJP, however, saw a political motive in the move. "The state government eyes wealth of the temples by appointing 'its men' in the management of the temples. Besides, the move

will facilitate rehabilitation of Congress workers. It will politicise the temples. It amounts to encroaching in religious affairs of Hindus," BJP spokesman Rajnesh Agrawal said. Incidentally, the state government has recently invited the honarium for the priests of government controlled temples to worship. There are around 25,000 priests in government-managed temples in MP. The BJP has been pushing for 'de-saffroning' temples in MP to ensure the influence of the BJP over the temples as well as institutions in the state is waned," another BJP leader said.

'Peeved' Khadse hints he may look for other options



Don't look for me. I won't make it home", a stoic Imran told his desperate father over the phone, waiting him up at 5 am on Sunday. A short-circuit triggered a fire in the building he was in. There were over 100 workers in the dingy four-storey structure that had a makeshift bag factory, a clothes workshop, a printing press and a jacket-making unit.

The building's neighbours on Rami Jhansi Road were sad but unsurprised. Small accidents, small fires, a sickle-cutting accident across the road and Delhi, infamous for its overhanging cables and narrow lanes. Half of Delhi is vulnerable, a fireman shockingly said. Anaj Mandi has nearly 1,000 illegal factories, most of whom without fire permits or safety equipment. Incredibly, even heritage buildings in Lutyens' Delhi and Central government property like North Block, South Block, the Niti Aayog and Udyog Bhavan don't go by fire safety regulations.

However, the loss of 43 young lives — many of them breadwinners — has not come as a rude lesson to those in authority. The blame games continue. The Centre accused the Delhi government of not moving the workshops to a different location while the Arvind Kejriwal government held the BJP-run municipal corporation responsible for not shutting them down.

On Monday, another fire, this time "minor", was reported from the same building in the morning. It reminds us of the adage: History repeats itself, first as tragedy, then as farce!

As climate crisis grows, all of us should act now

Few Indians would be aware that the deliberations of a motley group of little-known experts in an European capital, thousands of miles away could directly impact their future. But that is precisely what is happening now.

The world is already 1.1°C warmer than it was at the onset of the Industrial Revolution. If that trend persists, then global temperatures can be expected to rise by 3.2 to 3.9°C this century, which would bring wide-ranging and destructive climate impacts.

The United Nations Conference on Climate Change, or COP 25 as it is being called, is being held in Santiago, Chile, on December 7-18, 2019. The conference, which stretches from December 2 to 13, is being attended by 29,000 delegates and visitors from 200 countries, proving just how important people across the globe think the climate change issue is.

The urgency of the situation was emphasised by UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, who warned that "the point of no return was no longer over the horizon".

Sadly, the world as a whole still lacks political will to do the needful. The efforts of governments, corporations and individuals are just not enough to slow down, let alone reverse, the trends in global warming.

The problem is how to meet greenhouse gas emission and related targets, which would bring wide-ranging and destructive climate impacts. The world's top three emitters — the United States, China and the EU contribute more than 50 per cent of greenhouse gas emissions. India is in the list of the top 10 emitters, based its per capita emission levels are amongst the lowest in the world.

The 25th UN Climate Change Conference will help address some of these issues and share ideas, experiences and expertise. This exercise alone is expected to generate ideas and give fresh impetus to governments and corporates in their slow path towards zero net emissions.

India is among the countries that have taken the environmental challenge seriously despite its economic problems. Newspapers and headlines in recent times have highlighted how vulnerable India's huge and relatively backward population is to extreme weather events.

Unprecedented rainfall this year in parts of the country have not just wrecked infrastructure and crops but also killed hundreds. Air and water pollution news grabs headlines every day. And now we are told that this November has been the third hottest since the year 1901.

Most worrying is the possibility of climate tipping points and feedback patterns over the Indian subcontinent — a change that could possibly return us to hunger, famines and an economic dead end.

Fortunately, India's political leadership is very aware of the threats from climate change and has pledged to keep their part of the bargain. Before the Madrid Conference, Prime Minister Narendra Modi convened a Cabinet meeting to discuss the COP25 decision taken at what stand India should take.

The most important meeting was the need to compel the developed world to move instead of just talking and blaming poorer countries such as India for not doing their part.

The World Resource Institute (WRI) has estimated that the world's top three emitters — the United States, China and the EU contribute more than 50 per cent of greenhouse gas emissions. India is in the list of the top 10 emitters, based its per capita emission levels are amongst the lowest in the world.

The two chief problem countries are the United States and China, where increases in emission levels continue to rise instead of declining over time as is happening in large parts of the world.

Is this way to a healthy future? 'Fake' meat, made in a lab

Meat is killing the planet, or so we are told. Well not meat per se, but rather the production of meat is increasingly being said to be untenable given dwindling resources and out-of-control climate change and environmental degradation.

There is some truth to this: considering that out of the total arable land available to us, about 30 per cent is used to provide for the cattle and chickens, etc., that we consume. Going further, we find that producing a pound of beef takes about 1,799 gallons of water which is arguably not exactly very efficient.

While corporate livestock farming in the West gets a bad rap — of an issue due to the overuse of antibiotics and the resulting spillover into the environment — it remains more efficient than its

counterpart in the developing world because the high nutritional value of feed in the developed world means that livestock consumes less than livestock in the developing world.

There are some myths though, and one is that livestock are responsible for rising greenhouse gas emissions, an assertion that is based on a 2006 FAO report that claimed that livestock produced 18 per cent of the world's greenhouse gas emissions. Though this was later corrected by the author of the report, the figure is still out there adding to all the hot air floating around. Nevertheless, the search for meat substitutes is speeding up.

and environmental impact. But since most of the world isn't quite ready for that, our chitinous friends are looking for meat substitutes that still look and (hopefully) taste like meat.

Enter the "impossible burger" and its ilk. These burgers are made of plant-based proteins and, if you look at the way the vitamins and proteins of these companies making them have risen, seem to be taking the (Western) world by storm. So much so that even major fast food joints are getting into the act, with McDonalds launching its PLT (plant, lettuce, tomato) burger and Burger King following suit with its Impossible Whopper.

But are they actually good for you and good for the environment? Certainly the widespread adoption of these will reduce the environmental impact of the factory farming of meat, and will also help people avoid the risks (cancer and more) associated with the excessive use of antibiotics. We are also critical to the effect that these burgers are too highly processed, and we already know that processed foods are not good for us.

It is also important to note that while this may be a new idea in the West, it is not new in the East, particularly in China. Way back in the 10th century, monks during the Song dynasty ate a dish called fanghuan cai, which literally translates as "imitation meat dish". Closely linked with the adoption of Burger King in China are the small art of imitation meat has been perfected leading to vegetarian meals that are indistinguishable from duck, chicken or even shark's fins.

But the march to the future is relentless, and soon we will see meats that are not made from cows or vegetable substitutes, but instead grown in a lab. These frankenmeats first debuted in August 2013 when Dr Mark Post from the Maastricht University cooked and ate the world's first lab-grown burger at a press conference. Now the race is on to bring this product to market, with a Dutch startup called Meatable scoring ten million dollars in funding to produce lab-cultured pork and an Israeli company, Future Meat Technologies, is about to set up its first plant.

What is left of India's Left and what lies ahead for it?

A time of tumult in Indian politics, questions abound as to what is left of the Left and what lies ahead for it. Be it the sordid drama to snatch power in Maharashtra or the ongoing national buildup against the compulsory citizens' register, the Left camp, with a mere five MPs in the Lok Sabha, is a pale version of the 62-MP contingent that qualitatively influenced the governance agenda during UPA-1.

The Left's failure to accept the fact that class has been synonymous with caste in the Indian context, its centralised model of class struggle as opposed to democratic non-class movements and the CPI(M)'s use of democracy merely as a passage towards the ultimate goal of proletarian dictatorship have been cited as some of the reasons for the Left being confined to three out of the 28 states.

Socialists have advised the CPI(M) to dump its dictatorship fixation and even drop "Communist" from its name if it wants to rally the Left in the time of its worst electoral drubbing. "To the 21st-century mind, the word 'Communist' is indelibly associated with tyranny and authoritarianism. On the other hand, the word 'socialist' is more benign," says historian Ramachandra Guha.

The CPI was more realistic, dropping proletarian dictatorship from its party programme. It accords pri-

ority to the unity of the Left and democratic forces rather than insisting on its own leadership of such a combination. But, for the CPI(M), proletarian dictatorship still remains its USP in the party programme. All along, the parliamentary Left have been hamstrung by their so-called democratic centralisation model of struggle. They shunned participating in any democratic model of struggle, restricting themselves to a narrow class struggle approach.

This centralised model of class struggle has neither the depth of class struggle nor the breadth of mass movements incorporating non-class movements.

Late rights activist K. Balagopal, who had broken off with the Maoists in Andhra Pradesh, used to say Marxism never treated democracy as the foundation of modern society. It uses democracy as a means to achieve its goals in class struggle. Its goals are towards the dictatorship of the proletariat.

"One of the goals of proletarian dictatorship is to enable workers to participate in decisions affecting their lives in factories and public life in civil society. Barring these goals which are worth cherishing, everything else such as the 'persuasion of state power' or overthrow of the State machinery by the working class is redundant. An ideological correction is necessary here", says Prof. Arun Patnaik, head of the depart-

ment of political science at the University of Hyderabad.

For Indian Communists, US Senator Bernie Sanders, who calls himself a democratic socialist, or British Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn are undesirable manifestations because they are revisionists or reformists, who have lost sight of the ultimate revolution and are in compromise with neo-liberals.

Such blind interpretations have hindered the metamorphosis of Indian Communist parties into modern democratic socialist formations, allowing their cadre to join in mass equity struggles without losing sight of the ultimate objective of revolution.

Prof. Prabhat Patnaik has commented that "the current problem with the Indian Left, and in this term I include all sections of the Left, from the so-called 'parliamentary Left' to the so-called 'revolutionary Left', is in my view, its lack of appreciation of the dialectics between 'reform' and 'revolution'".

"By the dialectics of reform and revolution I mean the following: revolution is the *dénoûement* of a persistent demand for reform on the part of the people, which the system cannot accommodate. Therefore pressing for reform and mobilising people around a demand for

reform is not 'reformism'; it is itself a revolutionary task. The problem with social democracy which is avowedly 'reformist' is not that it asks for 'reform' instead of 'revolution' but that, being avowedly 'reformist', it tailors and limits its demand for reform only to whatever the system can agree to. It does not ask for reforms that push the boundaries of the system".

But there is a growing realisation that no matter what happens to Communist parties in the country, there will still be the Left in different avatars, fighting neoliberal policies. Even in the right-of-centre BJP, there are Left-minded individuals and groups. Note the resistance mounted by the pro-Sangh Parivar Swadeshi Jagran Manch against the Centre's haste to join the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership.

Ayushman Bharat, a major BJP initiative, a health insurance plan for almost half the population, and Congress-led UPA's Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee programme are examples of equity-oriented welfare initiatives promoted by parties that pursue free market policies.

The Left's ideas survive and flicker through many forums; regional parties in India through their populist programmes. N.T. Rama Rao and M.G. Ramachandran were classic examples. Though bereft of any Leftist theoretical underpinnings, their pro-poor agenda was discernible. Ram Manohar Lohia and Jayaprakash Narayan too were proponents of the Leftist stand. Caste-based parties too have a certain tinge of leftism in them as they fight the social pyramidal structure. Socialism and Leftism are too vast to be contained in a

warp. They flow through different political parties.

Says Prof. Arun Patnaik: "In my dialogue with Ram Madhav in 1984, I discovered him as an anti-caste Hindu intellectual like Veer Savarkar. But unlike Savarkar, he is not anti-Muslim. I told him that Muslims too have caste. He was plainly surprised."

"In my view, thus, dialogues across intellectuals of this sort are necessary. Ram Madhav told me that he was fighting within the RSS to recognise caste realities all along. He says it has not been easy for him to convince other members. In 2014, recently the RSS brought out an anti-caste special issue of *Organiser* dedicated to Ambedkar. Today Ram Madhav may say that his persistence with caste brought some results in the organisation now. But somebody will have to convince the RSS to recognise caste among non-Hindus."

"However, a secular recognition of caste across religions is necessary for all ideological convictions. A communication with left-wing intellectuals across all ideologies is possible on several issues, not just caste-related issues. Pro-people elements across the political spectrum are available. A communication is necessary across them to construct a bridge."

Late Prof. Praful Bidwai used to argue for a new Left by re-interpreting Marxism in the post-Marxist situation and reformulate strategy and tactics by the Left to fight the twin enemies of the neo-liberal economic order and Hindu religious fundamentalism, based on what he called a "People's Charter".

Pratul Bidwai's People's Charter perhaps anticipated future alternatives that are resonating around India today.

Rajaji had sounded the first warning on a 'planned' economy

India's first Indian governor-general (1948-50) Chakravarti Rajagopalachari (December 10, 1878-December 25, 1972) was a man who is today more remembered for his elegant and simple rendering in English of the *Mahabharata* (1951) and *Ramayana* (1957). But Rajagopalachari, popularly known as Rajaji, should be known today as the first one to sound the warning against a bureaucratically controlled State and centrally planned economy, and political prescriptions for India. India consequently came to be governed by a combination of protectionist, import substitution, Fabian socialism and social democratic inspired policies. In 1959, Rajaji outlined the goals of the Swatantra Party through 21 "fundamental principles" in the foundation document.

The party stood for equality and opposed government control over the private sector. Rajagopalachari sharply criticised the bureaucracy and coined the term 'licence-permit raj' to describe Nehru's elaborate system of permissions and licences required for an individual to set up a private enterprise.

The bureaucratic labyrinth sometimes involved approval by as many as 80 agencies, before a licence could be granted to produce, with the State deciding what to produce, how to produce and how much to produce using State-prescribed sources of capital and often even the selling price. Profits leading to capital formation and investment were never a concern. It was set up in 1952 and was ended in 1991 when P.V. Narasimha Rao tentatively embarked on his "reforms".

Prime Minister Nehru once told industrialist J.R.D. Tata, who stressed the need for India's public sector to be profitable to begot surpluses for investment: "Never talk to me about profit, Jeh, it is a dirty word."

Consequently, the rate of growth of the Indian economy in the first three decades after Independence was derisively referred to as the "Hindu rate of growth" by economists, because of the unfavourable comparison with growth rates in other Asian countries.

The "licence-permit raj" rather than creating a more equitable society actually created a hugely corrupt and inefficient system that created oligarchies and huge inequalities, not just between people but also between regions. This blight still persists, though with a much less pernicious virulence.

Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao took the first steps to dismantle the "licence-permit raj" in 1991 when his government effectively dismantled the Industrial Licensing

Policy 1956 and ushered in what generally come to be known as "economic reforms". This is still a work in progress. For State control over industry persists with its list of 14 public sector banks and the IDBI and IFCI, perpetuating a newer form of the statist policies of allocation by making industry and business vulnerable to the caprices of politicians and bureaucrats.

Rajaji may not have been entirely satisfied with Narasimha Rao's and Manmohan Singh's hesitant steps in dismantling the State's overarching control over the national economy, but he would have encouraged them to go further and with more daring. He would have done so with Narendra Modi and Arun Jaitley too.

All major economies that have grown rapidly have a high level of fixed investment. There are no examples of major economies that have grown rapidly with low rates of investment. Only 21 countries have achieved eight per cent growth a year sustained over a 20-year period since World War II. The first eight are Asian economies - China, Japan, Singapore, South Korea, North Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, and Hong Kong. Their systems varied, but they had one essential commonality: all of them had, during their periods of rapid growth, very high percentages of Gross Domestic Fixed Capital Formation in GDP, between 30-50 per cent.

India's capital formation languished in the lower two digit numbers for the first three decades after independence. It began to increase from 17.9 per cent of GDP in 1991 to 22.7 per cent of GDP in 2000 and to 28.9 per cent of GDP in 2008, due to the loosening of constricting State controls. India's GDP growth kept pace with this and rose from 5.2 per cent in the decade 1980-90, to over 6.0 per cent during 1990-2000 and to 7.8 per cent during 2000-10.

Clearly, a high percentage of fixed investment in GDP is an indispensable precondition for a rapid rate of growth - there are no countries with rapid GDP growth and low percentages of GDP deployed to fixed investment. But we have countries with high savings rates and less than commensurate growth rates because public spending is less on investment and more on social spending including subsidies. If Rajaji's rejection of Fabian socialist notions of economic and social development were official policy in the late 1950s, it would have given India a head start in capital formation, industrialisation and faster economic growth. But better late than never.

Data sharing to curb unfair biz

Global body looks to save interests of banks

London, Dec. 9: Google, Alibaba and other "Big Tech" companies could be forced to share data on financial services customers with banks and financial technology firms to prevent unfair competition.

At the FSB's plan for its Libra 'stablecoin' faces scrutiny, a global body of regulators from the world's main financial centres said that Big Tech's growing tentacles raised questions for financial stability, competition and data privacy.

The Financial Stability Board (FSB) called in a report released on Sunday for "vigilant monitoring" of Big Tech's shift into financial services, which it said could crimp the ability of banks to generate capital through retained profits.

While still only "nascent" in most countries, Big Tech's main financial centres like China has brought financial services within reach of under-served communities, the FSB said, which is chaired by federal reserve governor, Randall Quarles, said in the report.

The FSB said players including Microsoft, Amazon, eBay, Baidu, Apple, Facebook and

Huawei plans to promote new OS

Chinese tech giant Huawei Technologies plans to equip more of its products with its Harmony operating system (OS) next year, and will promote them at home and abroad, a Huawei spokesman said on Monday.

But there are no plans currently to roll out the OS to its phones, tablets and computers, among Huawei's most popular products, the spokesman added.

The plans were first reported in the government-backed Shenzhen Special Zone Daily newspaper which cited comments made by Wang Chenglu, president of the Huawei consumer business group's software division at a store event held in the city of Shenzhen, where the firm has its headquarters.

Huawei unveiled its proprietary OS in August as a possible alternative to Google's Android as it copes with trade restrictions by the US that threatens to cut its access to technology made by US firms.

A "smart screen," or connected television product was its first product to use Harmony, but it said at the time that it would stick to Android for smartphones and gradually roll out Harmony to other devices such as smartwatches, speakers and virtual reality goggles. Wang reiterated that stance at the store event and noted the company would still prefer to use Android on its phones.

Chinese government organisations are required to replace their foreign hardware and software in their respective inventories. Meanwhile, Chinese officials have ordered all government offices and public institutions to replace their foreign hardware and software with Chinese alternatives within the next three years.

The mass replacement process was detailed in a government directive issued to public institutions earlier this spring. The directive is internally known as "9-5-2" based on the percentage targets the Chinese Communist Party intended for government organisations.

In 2020, the first year covered by the directive, government organisations are required to replace 30 per cent of their foreign hardware and software in their respective inventories. For 2021, the target is 50 per cent and then 20 per cent in 2022.

The stance remained consistent with the past week when its existence leaked to the Financial Times. The news agency said it confirmed the new directive with employees of a private cyber-security firm, who were also aware of the new policy after interacting with their respective government clients.

The new 3-5-2 policy is expected to severely impact companies like HP, Dell and Microsoft, known suppliers for the Chinese government.

SBI, Bol lower MCLR-based lending rates

State Bank of India reduced its marginal cost of fund based lending rate (MCLR) by 10 basis points across all one-year products, effective Tuesday. The new one-year MCLR has been cut to 7.50 per cent from 8 per cent. Bank of India too revised its one-year MCLR-based lending rates by up to 20 basis points for overnight rates and by 10 bps for all other tenors.

Former US Fed chief Paul Volcker dies



Former US Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker, who tackled American inflation in the 1970s and '80s and later lent his name to landmark Wall Street reforms, died on Sunday, media reports said. Volcker, who headed the US central bank from 1979 to 1987, was 92. In his long career, Volcker advised US leaders from Richard Nixon to Barack Obama.

Stock limit on onion retailers tightened to 2 t

The Centre further reduced the stock holding limit for onion to 2 tonnes from 5 tonnes for retail traders as part of efforts to check hoarding and boost supplies. Last week, the ministry had reduced the stock holding limit for retailers to 5 tonnes from 10 tonnes while that to wholesalers to 25 tonnes from 50 tonnes as onion prices were ruling high.

Parliament approves ship recycling bill

Parliament approved a legislation to regulate recycling of ships with a view to make India an attractive ship-breaking destination. The Recycling of Ships Bill, 2019 was passed in the Rajya Sabha by a voice vote on Monday. The Lok Sabha had cleared the bill last week. Replying to a debate, Shipping Minister Mansukh L. Mandavkar said the bill would protect the interest of labourers.

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Karvy Fallout: Lenders may cut exposure to brokers Banks begin fact check on pledged securities

As a fallout of the Karvy episode, banks have started sending out letters to brokers to verify whether pledged securities belonged to them or to clients.

According to sources, many banks have started relooking at the documentation and other risk management measures required to ensure that the loan against pledged shares is not misused, like in the case of Karvy. Some banks are even considering reducing exposure to smaller brokers.

Lenders have turned cautious after Sebi banned Karvy for misusing client securities. Sebi is also considering tightening the rules to prevent misuse of client funds and securities by brokers. During a study of such market practices, the Sebi had found that clients were compelled to issue irrevocable power of attorneys (PoAs), which



gave broker's the right to open and close accounts and trade on client's accounts without consent. In most cases, brokers were not even offering services unless clients gave PoAs. Karvy is accused of misusing client securities worth Rs 2,800 crore to secure loan facilities from lenders towards working capital by abusing PoAs. The brokerage also sold off client securities and transferred the proceeds to its real estate group company. Following the Sebi directive to transfer securities only to beneficial owners,

the National Securities Depository Ltd on December 2 transferred shares worth Rs 2,013 crore into the accounts of 83,862 Karvy clients, which is almost 90 per cent of the affected clients. Four lenders had approached the Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT) saying the shares were pledged with them and therefore they had the right over these shares. On December 4, the SAT ruled that reversing these transfers was untenable, leaving the lenders with no securities to invoke the pledge.

Gold bonds gather less than 1% of total spend in four years

The Centre's ambitious sovereign gold bond (SGB) scheme, rolled out in 2015 with great expectations to cut the demand for physical gold and shift part of the imported gold into financial savings, is almost a failure by investors.

After 33 tranches in four years, just about 28.6 tonnes of gold has been bought by investors through the SGB scheme. This is not even one per cent of the gold demand of these four years.

The Centre had introduced SGB scheme in November 2015 in order to provide an alternative investment avenue for gold investors. Prime Minister Narendra Modi had launched the scheme, along with two other gold related schemes; the gold monetisation scheme

aimed at unlocking 20,000 tonnes, or \$800 billion worth of gold lying idle in households and temples; and the national gold coin minted in India with the Ashok Chakra engraved on one side and Mahatma Gandhi on the other side. There have been 33 tranches of SGB since, with three to six tranches issued every year. However, in 2017-18, 14 tranches were issued. Across all the tranches a total of 28.64 tonnes of gold has been purchased. When compared with the annual consumption of around 750 tonnes, SGBs account for just 0.9 per cent of the total consumption in these four years. From a returns' standpoint, sovereign gold bond is the best instrument to invest in gold, as it provides an interest of 2.5 per cent over and above the price appreciation of the metal. The interest portion of the returns is taxed, but the capital gains are not taxable. The bonds have a tenure of eight years, with an exit option in the fifth year. According to Anil Rego, CEO, Right Horizons, SGB is an instrument for the long-term investor. However, for an investor who wants to take advantage of the price apprecia-

tion and exit in between, SGBs have not been offering much help. "There are liquidity issues and finding a buyer is difficult if the investor wants to exit the bond in between," he says. He also allowed the trading of the bonds in the exchanges. But that has not helped much, he said. He finds that the awareness about the bonds itself is very limited among gold buyers. "SGBs were introduced at a time when the gold price was subdued and investors were not quite keen on betting on the metal," he said. However, compared to gold exchange traded funds (ETFs), which have a total asset under management (AUM) of about 13 tonnes in India, SGBs are placed better. Gold ETFs had seen the total AUM grow to Rs 12,000 crore in 2011-12.

LIC mops up over ₹1,380 cr in a day

The numbers are amazing, but true. The country's largest insurer, Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC), has made a record mop-up, collecting premium on over eight-and-a-half lakh policies, worth more than Rs 1,380 crore in a single day from all its zones, on November 30.

The hefty collection came to the insurer for a reason. Just a day before, on November 29, the insurance regulator, Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India (IRDAI), asked all the insurers, including LIC, to close all those products and riders that were non-compliant with the new product guidelines by the November 30 deadline.

"You may call it magic of the fear factor, but it proved to be a red-letter day for the 1,180 lakh-odd policies with central zone got only Rs 72.89 crore premium for the sale of 56,929 policies (see table)."

Director Vipin Anand, said, "It has demonstrated the strength and reach of our field force as well as commitment of our agents and development officers to ensuring that the message of life insurance reaches to all segments of the Indian society."

Earlier, the IRDAI had asked insurers to withdraw products by November 30 and to come up with the revised products from December 1. But this deadline has now been extended to January 31, 2020.

Keeping the earlier order of the regulator, all the agents of LIC, however, were on the toes to meet their targets, and successfully wooed its customers to hurry up and buy LIC products before the close, claiming that the redesigned products would be costlier for them.

Finally, this resulted in the mad rush among the people for cover and they came forward in big numbers to buy expiring LIC products.

CGST short of estimate by 40%

New Delhi, Dec. 9: The Central GST collection fell short of the budgeted estimate by nearly 40 per cent during the April-November period of 2019-20, according to the data presented in Parliament on Monday.

The actual CGST collection during April-November stood at Rs 3,28,365 crore while the budgeted estimate is Rs 5,29,000 crore for these months. Minister of State for Finance Anurag Singh Thakur said in a written reply in the Lok Sabha.

The minister added that the data was provisional. In 2018-19, the actual CGST collection stood at Rs 4,57,534 crore as against the provisional estimate of Rs 6,03,900 crore for the year, he said. In 2017-18, the CGST collection was Rs 2,02,261 crore. The minister said 999 cases were registered till October for GST evasion. —PTI

Coffee Day's tech park sale stalls over Yes Bank nod

Investors consider betting on small, mid-sized companies Costly bluechips force investors eye midcaps

Mumbai, Dec. 9: Investors are starting to weigh the merits of rotating into small- and mid-sized Indian stocks after a few large companies drove a record-breaking rally in the main equity index.

"Leadership in India's rally has been very narrow," Tim Moe, chief Asia Pacific equity strategist for Goldman Sachs Group Inc., said last week in Mumbai. "Valuations are at the high end of the range, both in historical terms and relative valuation compared with the region as a whole."

The S&P BSE Sensex has risen about 12 per cent from a low in September, with three members — Reliance Industries Ltd, ICI Bank Ltd, and HDFC Bank Ltd. — accounting for 61 per cent of all the gains.

The broader market has lagged behind, leaving the valuation gap between smaller firms and the gauge at close to its widest in a decade.

"Many of India's large cap stocks are trading at a premium," said Sunil Singhania, founder of Mumbai-based Abakus Asset Manager LLP. "Most of them are likely to grow at the rate expected of them." Abakus has about 75 per cent of its \$300 million in assets invested in



small and medium-sized stocks. The firm earlier this year said some quality stocks are likely in a "bubble zone."

Investors have taken shelter in some of the South Asian nation's biggest companies amid a credit crunch and the slowest economic growth in six years. That's added to an extended underperformance by small stocks that goes back to 2017.

Yet, the bet has paid off for Axis, with the money manager's largest equity fund beating 90 per cent of peers in the last five years. For market breadth to widen, economic outlook needs to improve. Centre hikes MSP for toria oilseeds

"The MSP has been fixed for the toria crop grown in 2019-20 rabi season, which is under way and to be harvested in 2020-21," the agriculture ministry said.

"The government has taken this decision to provide relief to the farmers following heavy rains and floods in their kharif crops. Toria being a rabi crop, we have seen its sowing slow as any other crop," said an official. "As this crucial rabi oilseed is sown during September-October and harvested from February to March, the farmers will get better price then."

Fighting coal pollution may increase greenhouse effect

Mumbai, Dec. 9: India's fight against deadly air pollution may come with an unintended consequence: increased emissions of greenhouse gases.

Government-mandated pollution control devices for coal-fired power plants, which reduce deadly sulfur dioxide pollution, could also boost carbon dioxide emissions at individual plants, according to a report by the US Environmental Protection Agency. "That may impede India's ability to meet international commitments to reduce carbon-emissions intensity. "It'll come down to a trade-off between local

health impacts versus global warming," said Deepak Krishnan, a Bengaluru-based associate director with World Resources Institute India.

24 feared dead in NZ volcano

100 tourists were on White Island, a scenic hotspot, when volcano erupted, says New Zealand PM

Wellington, Dec. 9: New Zealand police have said no more survivors were expected to be rescued from an island volcano that erupted suddenly on Monday, suggesting as many as two dozen people could have died. Police said some 50 people were visiting White Island when it exploded in the early afternoon — hurling ash and rock high into the air. Some 23 people made it off the island, five of whom have since died, the rest were being treated for injuries, including severe burns. "I've got to consider

the number still on the island was in double digits. Police said that despite several aerial reconnaissance flights to try and find those trapped "no signs of life have been seen at any point." Based on the information we have, we do not believe there are any survivors on the island. Police is working urgently to confirm the exact number of those who have died. "As night fell, the deputy commissioner John Tims said volcanic activity made rescue attempts by land too dangerous. "It is very much an evolving situation and of course our thoughts are with those affected."

Guillaume Calmelet, the co-director of Skydive Tauranga, saw the eruption from above as he took a customer on a tandem skydive from a plane 12,000 feet above the Bay of Plenty. Meanwhile, PM Jacinda Arden said about 100 tourists were "on or around" White Island volcano when it erupted on Monday. — AFP

MARYAM ASKED TO CONTACT INTERIOR MIN

Peaceful Hong Kong march marred by fire outside court

Hong Kong, Dec. 9: Hong Kong protesters set fire outside court buildings, threw petrol bombs and spray-painted graffiti on government buildings, marred what was otherwise a "generally peaceful" march at the weekend, police said. The comments came as protesters called for strikes across the city on Monday. Most railway and transport links ran smoothly during the morning rush hour and there were no initial reports of widespread disruptions. Reuters at the march on Sunday saw graffiti and protesters setting up barricades, but were not in the vicinity of the other incidents. — Reuters

US hold wanes under Trump

Washington, Dec. 9: It's whispered in Nato meeting rooms and celebrated in China's halls of power. It's lamented in the capital cities of key US allies and welcomed in the Kremlin. Three years into Donald Trump's presidency, America's global influence is waning. In interviews, diplomats, foreign officials and scholars from numerous countries describe a changing world order in which the US has less of a central role. And in many ways, that's just fine with the White House. Trump campaigned on an America First foreign policy and says a strong US will mean a stronger world. "The future doesn't belong to globalists," Trump told the UN General Assembly in September. "The future belongs to patriots." Trump insists he's abandoning globalism for bilateral ties more beneficial to the US. But there's little sign of that. Instead, once-close allies — France, Egypt, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Mexico, Turkey, Germany and more — have quietly edged away from Washington over the past three years. Sometimes a TV camera caught a cluster of European leaders grinning as Canadian PM Justin Trudeau appeared to mock Trump. — AP

Climate scientists struggling to cut their carbon footprints

Madrid, Dec. 9: For years, Kim Cobb was the Indiana Jones of climate science. The Georgia Tech professor flew to the caves of Borneo to study ancient and current climate conditions. She jetted to a remote South Pacific island to see the effects of warming on coral. Now she is about to ground herself, and she is not alone. Some climate scientists and activists are limiting their flying, their consumption of meat and their overall carbon footprints to avoid adding to the global warming they study. Cobb will fly just once next year, to attend a massive international science meeting in Chile.

because she keeps flying. Hayhoe and other still-flying scientists note that aviation is only 3% of global carbon emissions. Jonathan Foley, executive director of the climate solutions think-tank Project Drawdown, limits his airplane trips but will not stop flying because, he says, he must meet with donors to keep his organization alive. He calls flight shaming "the climate movement eating its own." Over the next couple of weeks, climate scientists and environmental advocates will fly across the globe. Some will be jetting to Madrid for United Nations climate negotiations. Others, including

Cobb, will fly to San Francisco for a major earth sciences conference, her last for a while. "I feel real torn about that," said Indiana University's Shabnam Attari, who studies human behavior and climate change. She calls Cobb an important climate communicator. "I don't want to clip her wings. I want to help her fly." But Cobb and Hayhoe are judged by their audiences on how much energy they use themselves, she said. Attari's research shows that audiences are turned off by scientists who use lots of energy at home. Listeners are more likely to respond to experts who use less electricity. — AP

No clarity on seating restrictions inside eateries

Riyadh: Restaurants and cafes in Saudi Arabia are no longer required to have gender-segregated entrances, officials said, in a further easing of social restrictions in the ultra-conservative Islamic kingdom.

Eateries have long required one entrance for single men and another for women and families, in a country where the once-powerful religious police zealously enforced sex segregation in public places for decades. The ministry of municipalities and rural affairs said on Twitter Sunday it was eliminating several requirements for restaurants, including the need for "an entrance for bachelors and a separate entrance for families".

It was unclear whether a restriction on seating inside restaurants will also be removed. Restaurants are currently segregated into a "family" section for those accompanied by women and a "singles" area for men, though many have quietly taken down the barriers in recent years

Factory owner, manager sent to 14-day custody

SC partially lifts ban on construction activities

New Delhi, Dec. 9: The Supreme Court on Monday allowed construction activities in Delhi-NCR region between 6 am and 6 pm, partially lifting its complete ban on it. The apex court perused the report filed by the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), which said that construction activities should not be allowed between 6 pm to 6 am.

A bench, comprising justices Arun Mishra and Deepak Gupta, was informed by additional solicitor general A.N.S. Nadkarni that the Centre has constituted a high-level committee following the apex court's direction to examine the feasibility of using technology like smog eaters to combat air pollution. The bench also directed the governments of Uttar Pradesh, Punjab and Haryana to furnish before it the updated report on stubble burning up to December 11.

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The court had asked all the states to explain within six weeks as to why they should not be made liable to pay compensation to persons affected by their air quality, saying it is their bounden duty to provide basic civic amenities, clean air and drinking water to citizens. It had also issued notices to all states seeking various details, including air quality index (AQI), managing air quality and disposing of garbage. The court had asked the Centre and the Delhi government to sit together and take a decision within 10 days with regard to the installation of smog towers in Delhi-NCR, which would assist in combating air pollution. It had asked the Delhi government to apprise it of the steps taken with regard to anti-smog gun which sprays atomized water 50 metres in the air to bring down pollutants and had said CPCB should be associated on the issue

Lara also concurred to Kohli's decision of backing Pant to allow the young wicketkeeper batsman to mature. — PTI





Lanka begin first Pak Test tour since 2009

Islamabad, Dec. 9: Sri Lanka embarked on the first Test tour of Pakistan in 10 years on Monday following the deadly 2009 attack on their team that killed Pakistan into sporting isolation.

"Touchdown Islamabad," tweeted the Pakistan Cricket Board, along with video of the players at the airport, while Pakistan Cricket Board chief executive Waaseem Khan called their arrival a "historic occasion."

Sri Lanka will play two Tests under heavy security one in Rawalpindi — where Pakistan's army is headquartered — and the second in Karachi, ending a decade-long absence for cricket's five-day format since the attack.

Eight people were killed and several players and officials were wounded when militants opened fire on a convoy of buses travelling to a Test in Lahore in March 2009.

"This is my first tour to Pakistan," said Sri Lanka skipper Dimuth Karunaratne, who opted out of the team's recent limited-overs tour of Pakistan. "After the 2009 incidents players were scared to tour Pakistan but in the last two years or so Sri Lanka and other teams have toured Pakistan."

He added: "We want to play good cricket in Pakistan and hope they give us some good security." The 2009 attack slammed the door shut on international sporting fixtures in cricket-loving Pakistan as foreign teams refused to visit over security fears. — AFP

Lakers ride on Anthony heroics for fine win

Los Angeles, Dec. 9: Anthony Davis scored 50 points to power the Los Angeles Lakers to a 142-125 victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves on Sunday that gave the Western Conference leaders the best record in the NBA.

Davis unleashed his aggression to notch the fourth 50-point game of his career and his first with the Lakers. He connecting on 20 of 29 shots from the field — with 16 baskets in the paint and not a single three-pointer.

"One for the ages," Lakers coach Frank Vogel said. "The first thing that stands out to me was he had four steals, a block and great defense for all 39 minutes he was out there. To be able to perform on that end of the floor and anchor us and still go for 50 in what I feel is an old-school performance," he added.

"No threes, right? Twenty-two, living at the free throw line, post-ups, offensive rebounds, crashes, all those types of things... Just an old-school performance," he added. Davis, a perfect 10 of 10 from the free-throw line, also notched seven rebounds and handed out six assists.

"I just came out aggressive playing hard. My teammates did a good job of finding me," said Davis, who laid in a floater with 4:38 left to play to reach 50 points for the night.

LeBron James added 32 points with 13 assists despite finding himself in foul trouble with four in the first half. Alex Caruso chipped in 16 points as the Lakers improved to 21-3.

Three other starters scored in double figures.

In Miami, rookie Tyler Herro scored 27 points and made a go-ahead three-pointer with 38.2 seconds left in overtime to lift the Heat to a 110-105 victory over the Chicago Bulls.

Herro's heroics included a three-pointer with 7.1 seconds left in regulation, which ended with the score tied at 97-97.

He made three more from beyond the arc in the extra session — including one to tie the game and one to give the Heat the

lead for good as Miami improved to 10-4 on this season and 17-6 overall.

"My teammates trusted me with the ball. Every time I get a shot, I have confidence. The 19-year-old reserve guard said.

In Dallas, Luka Doncic scored 27 points with seven rebounds and eight assists for his 19th

straight game of at least 20 points, five rebounds and five assists.

With three teams qualifying for Europe's premier competition, Marseille are seven points ahead of their local rivals. Their local rivals Rennes and were in fine form on Sunday, failing to be fazed by Adli's stunning 31st-minute strike for Bordeaux.

BERLIN SPLASH COLOGNE IN GERMAN GAME

Berlin, Dec. 9: Sebastian Andersson struck twice as Union Berlin beat a hapless Cologne 2-0 on Sunday to continue their remarkable recent run and move towards the top half of the Bundesliga.

Swede Andersson hit goals either side of half-time to make it four league wins from their last five and take Union to 10th, only six points from the European places, an impressive effort in their first ever season in the German top flight.

Union's hot form has been mirrored by Borussia Dortmund's, with the 28-year-old scoring five in his last four Bundesliga games. Cologne started stronger, dominating possession and forcing two fine saves out of Rafal Gikiewicz, including one from Birger Verstraete's superbly taken free-kick in the 26th minute. However, Andersson drew first blood for the hosts four minutes later, heading in from a corner to score his seventh of the season.

Milan move into top half of Italy table

Milan, Dec. 9: Daniele Ragatzu struck late as Cagliari snatched a 2-2 draw at Sassuolo to reclaim fourth spot in the Italian league on Sunday, as AC Milan beat Bologna 3-2 to return to the top half of the table.

But Fiorentina fell to their fourth consecutive defeat, 1-2 at Torino, with coach Vincenzo Montella under increasing pressure with the Tuscan side just five points above the relegation zone.

Cagliari again left it late thanks to Ragatzu's 90th-minute equaliser. The Gardiniano side move fourth, four points behind third-placed Lazio, and level on 29 points with fifth-placed Roma. Inter Milan remain top after their goalless draw against Roma on Saturday, with champions Juventus two points behind after falling to their first defeat of the season 3-1 at Lazio on Saturday. Sassuolo, in 14th, had been two goals behind Domenico Berardi struck in the seventh minute before then being involved in Filip Djuricic's goal after 36 minutes. Joao Pedro's goal set the Sanmians back into the game after the break before Berardi missed from the spot and Jeremy Boga gave the Sassuolo defence allowed Ragatzu to finish to earn a point. Should the Croatian miss the trip to Austria, Joe Gomez will be Klopp's only fit partner for Virgil van Dijk in central defence. Salzburg have scored 87 goals in 24 games in all competitions this season, 28 of which have come from Norwegian wonderkid Haaland in just 21 appearances.

Four-year exile for Russia

Russia banned from Tokyo Olympics, 2022 Fifa World Cup over doping

Lausanne, Dec. 9: The World Anti-Doping Agency on Monday banned Russia for four years from major global sporting events including the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and the 2022 World Cup in Qatar over manipulated doping data. Wada's executive committee, meeting in Lausanne, handed Russia the four-year suspension after accusing Moscow of falsifying laboratory doping data handed over to investigators earlier this year. Not only will Russia be ruled out of the next Olympic cycle, but Russian government officials will be barred from attending any major events, while the country will lose the right to host, or even bid, for tournaments. Wada's executive committee approved unanimously to assert a non-compliance on the Russian anti-doping agency for a period of four years, Wada spokesman James Fitzgerald said. Under the sanctions, Russian sportswear and wovens will still be allowed to compete at the Olympics next year and the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics but only if they can demonstrate that they were not part of what Wada believes was a state-sponsored system of doping. It will be up to Fifa to stipulate how a team of Russian players can take part in the qualifying matches for the 2022 World Cup. Euro 2020, in which the Russian city of Saint Petersburg will host four matches, is not affected by the ban because it is not defined as a "major event" for anti-doping purposes. "They are going to have prove they had nothing to do with the non-compliance, (that) they were not involved in the doping schemes as described by the McLaren report, or they did not have their samples affected by the manipulation," Fitzgerald said. The independent report by sports lawyer Richard McLaren, released in 2016, revealed the significant extent of state-sponsored doping in Russia, notably between 2011 and 2015. How Russia will be affected

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- An official linked to the World Anti-Doping Agency said on Monday Russia can participate in qualifying for the 2022 World Cup despite receiving a four-year ban from major global sporting events.
- The sanctions against Russia, the host of last year's soccer World Cup, also bar it from hosting major sporting events for a four-year period or applying to host new events in that period.
- Russia's participation at Euro 2020, in which Saint Petersburg will host four matches, is not affected by the ban because it is not defined as a "major event" for anti-doping purposes.

'ANTI-RUSSIA HYSTERIA BEHIND DOPING BAN'

Moscow, Dec. 9: Russia reeled from a four-year ban from global sports on Monday, with athletes in shock and the government quick to blame "anti-Russian hysteria". While admitting there have been instances of doping, Russian officials say the country is no worse than any other. Some have accused other countries of pursuing the ban to remove Russian athletes from competition. Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev said on Monday that it was "impossible to deny" that doping had taken place but that those involved had already been punished. "This is the continuation of this anti-Russian hysteria that has already become chronic," Medvedev told Russian news agencies. Many in Russian sports agreed. "The decision that was taken today was political and not simply about sports," the head of Russia's Biathlon Union, Vladimir Drachev, told Russia-24 state television. The scandal has tainted Russia's sporting reputation since the revelation of large-scale state-sponsored doping aimed at improving its medal performance at the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi. Russian track and field athletes were barred from competing at the 2016 Rio Olympics although Russians competing in other events were allowed to take part. The ban was widened to include all events at the 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Olympics. Though Russian competitors who could prove they were above suspicion were able to compete at the Winter Olympic Games, the heads of several Russian sports federations said on Monday they were preparing to send athletes to the 2020 Olympics under a neutral flag. "The country's athletes must go to the Olympics whatever the situation," said the head of Russia's swimming federation, Vladimir Salnikow. "Of course we'd prefer that our athletes participate under the Russian flag and hear their national anthem. But the circumstances may be different... (and) no one has the right to deny the best athletes of their sports," he told state news agency RIA Novosti. — **AFP**

'A TRAGEDY' RUSADA chief Yuri Gansus told AFP Monday that his country had "no chance" of winning an appeal against the ban, dubbing it tragic for clean athletes. "There is no chance of winning this case in court," Gansus said, with RUSADA's supervisory board set to meet on December 19 to take a decision on whether to appeal the ban. "This is a tragedy," he added. "Clean athletes are seeing their rights limited." The WADA decision was widely predicted, with the body's president, Craig Reedie, having made a presentation Saturday to the Olympic Summit, participants of which strongly condemned those responsible for the manipulation of the data from the Moscow laboratory. "It was agreed that this was an attack on sports and these actions should lead to the toughest sanctions against those responsible," the IOC said, asking that the Russian authorities deliver the "fully authenticated raw data". — **AFP**

A TIMELINE OF CASES AND COVERUPS

- NOV 2015:** An independent WADA mission found "deeply rooted culture of cheating" in Russian athletics, with alleged collusion of Russian government. The commission recommended that Russia should be banned from international athletics.
- MAY 2016:** A New York Times report said that dozens of Russian athletes were part of a state-run doping program ahead of the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi.
- DEC 2017:** Following the New York Times report, an independent commission was set up to investigate the allegations. The commission reported evidence of widespread state-sponsored doping by Russian athletes at the Sochi Games.
- AUG 2017:** Although Russia was banned from international athletics, 19 Russian athletes were allowed to compete at the world championships in London under the IOC flag.
- DEC 2017:** The Russian Olympic Committee was suspended and banned by the IOC from the 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Games. But Russian athletes were allowed to compete as neutrals after satisfying anti-doping norms.
- FEB 2018:** Two Russians — medal-winning curler Alexander Krushelnitsky and bobsledder Nadezhda Sergeeva — tested positive at the 2018 Winter Games.

Kathmandu, Dec. 9: India clinched 42 medals, including 27 gold, on the penultimate day of competitions at the South Asian Games as the country is poised to finish on top for the 13th time on the trot in the South Asian Games. The Indian athletes also won 12 silver and 3 bronze to end Day 9 with 294 medals (159 gold, 91 silver and 44 gold) to further widen the gap with second-placed Nepal who have collected 195 medals (49 gold, 54 silver and 92 bronze). Sri Lanka are third with 236 medals (39 gold, 79 silver and 118 bronze). With just a few events — including seven boxing finals — left on the closing day on Tuesday, India is unlikely to cross the 309 total medals won in the last edition in 2016 but may go past the 300-mark. India has topped every edition of the South Asian Games since its inception in 1985. Boxers gave India the maximum medals on Monday with six gold and one silver. National champion Ankit Khatana (men's 75kg), Vinod Tanwar (men's
