A champion show by European champions

Salah scores an inch-perfect goal to help Klopp's men beat Salzburg 2-0; Ajax ousted after home defeat to Valencia

THE ENGLISH are on the march again in the Champions League.

Liverpool and Chelsea completed a sweep of Premier League clubs into the knockout stage of the Champions League on Tuesday, a season after England had two of its representatives in the final.

Liverpool, who beat Tottenham in the title match in June to become European champions for the sixth time, toughed out a 2-0 victory at Salzburg to advance as the winners of Group E and stay on course in their defence of the trophy.

It's shaping up to be a huge second half of the season for the Reds, who are also eight points clear in the Premier League in their pursuit of a first English championship in 30 years.

Chelsea was one of the teams to qualify from Group H after a 2-1 home victory over Lille under Frank Lampard, a Champions League winner with the London team in 2012 and in his first season as its manager.

Manchester City and Tottenham, the other English clubs competing in the Champions League, advanced last month with a game to spare.

It is the third straight season where England has provided four of the 16 representatives in the knockout stage, as teams in the lucrative Premier League start to show the benefit of having the biggest broadcasting revenues in football and some of the world's most highly rated coaches.

Napoli was one of four other teams to advance on Tuesday - but it wasn't enough to keep Carlo Ancelotti in a job. He was fired by the Italian team a few hours after its 4-0 win over Genk which sealed second place in the group containing Liverpool.

Borussia Dortmund, Valencia and Lyon also reached the last 16.

Ancelotti's final stand

Arkadiusz Milik did his best to save Ancelotti, scoring a first-half hat-trick for Napoli before Dries Mertens added the fourth against a Genk team which fielded Maarten Vandevoordt - the youngest goalkeeper ever in the competition at 17 years, nine months and 10 days.

That secured the team second place behind Liverpool, who denied Napoli a place in

the last 16 in the final group game of last season's competition. But it wasn't enough for Ancelotti, who had previously failed to lead Napoli to victory in any of its last nine games in his second season as its coach.

Like Napoli, Liverpool knew a win would see them progress but found things much tougher against Salzburg. Jurgen Klopp's team survived some early scares before scoring two goals in as many minutes from the 57th, through Naby Keita who played for Salzburg from 2014-16 and Mohamed Salah.

Ajax's regression

Ajax came within a last-gasp Tottenham goal of reaching the final last season. It won't even be playing in the knockout stage this time around. The Dutch club lost 1-0 at home to Valencia to drop from first place to third in Group H and fall into the Europa League.

Rodrigo scored the 24th-minute winner for Valencia, who are through to the last 16 for the first time since 2012-13.

Tammy Abraham, with a deft backheeled flick, and Cesar Azpilicueta scored Chelsea's first-half goals against alreadyeliminated Lille, who pulled one back late on through Loic Remy - a former Chelsea player.

Inter heartbreak

For the second straight season, Inter Milan was eliminated after failing to pick up a home win in the final round of the group stage. A year after only drawing 1-1 to PSV Eindhoven to exit the competition, Inter lost 2-1 to an already-qualified Barcelona - who were without Lionel Messi and a number of other rested players. Ansu Fati scored Barca's winner and became, at 17, the youngest scorer in Champions League history.

Borussia Dortmund capitalised, eking out a 2-1 win over Slavia Prague to qualify ahead of Inter. Jadon Sancho scored one goal and set up another for Dortmund, who had Julian Weigl sent off in the 77th minute and were thankful to goalkeeper Roman Burki for a string of saves. Meanwhile, Lyon came from two goals down at home to Leipzig to draw 2-2 and win a threeway fight with Zenit St. Petersburg and Benfica to advance from Group G.

Memphis Depay's equaliser saw Lyon climb above Zenit, who lost 3-0 at Benfica and slipped to fourth - not even getting the consolation prize of a Europa League berth. Leipzig had already qualified.

Interim Arsenal boss Freddie Ljungberg will look to lead the Gunners into the last 32 after Unai Emery was sacked following last month's 2-1 home loss to Eintracht Frankfurt. Monday's 3-1 victory at West Ham ended

CAPTAIN TIGER Woods will lead from the front when the United States begin their Presidents Cup defence after Wednesday picking himself and Justin Thomas for the opening fourball match at Royal Melbourne.

The 43-year-old Woods and world number four Thomas will tee off first on Thursday against Australian Marc Leishman and Chilean rookie Joaquin Niemann for Ernie Els' International team. "I think from our side, we had a game

They will be followed by veteran Australian Adam Scott, like Woods in his ninth Presidents Cup, joining South Korea's debutant An Byeong-hun against Bryson DeChambeau and Tony Finau.

The final match pits another newcomer in Mexico's Abraham Ancer and experienced partner Louis Oosthuizen of South Africa against the big-hitting duo of US Open champion Gary Woodland and former world number one Dustin Johnson,

FIFA panel wants to recover cash from Platini

THE FIFA governance committee has told the football body's leadership to pursue legal action against Michel Platini to recover the 2 million Swiss francs (\$2 million) that led to the former UEFA president being banned from the sport. The payment was exposed in 2015 as having been approved by Sepp Blatter, which led to the Swiss official being ousted as FIFA president. FIFA governance committee chairman Mukul Mudgal wrote to FIFA deputy secretary general Alasdair Bell saying the body had passed a resolution over the wrongful payment.

"The FIFA administration (should) take the necessary steps before the relevant authorities in Switzerland against both Mr. Blatter and Mr. Platini with a view to ensuring that the CHF2 million unduly paid by Mr. Blatter to Mr. Platini is returned to FIFA (together with interest, at the appropriate rate) and the disciplinary fines and costs imposed are recovered," Mudgal wrote in a November 25 letter.

Platini can work again in football because his four-year ban expired in October. But any comeback into a senior role would likely force him to first pay FIFA a fine of 60,000 Swiss francs (\$60,300) that is three years overdue. Legal action would also seek that fine to be paid up.

Platini was the heir apparent to Blatter as FIFA president in 2015 until they were both toppled from power.

Blatter is still serving a six-year ban, upheld by the Court of Arbitration for Sport after being imposed in 2015, for authorising the payment to Platini in 2011 as backdated salary for work as his adviser a decade earlier. Blatter also approved extending his former protege's FIFA pension plan. Last month, a lawyer for Platini said the former France great was going to court to receive payments allegedly due in his UEFA employment contract worth 3 million Swiss francs (\$3 million) in annual salary and bonus.

Lawyer Vincent Solari said UEFA paid Platini for only one year after he was suspended - in October 2015 - and began challenging a ban by the FIFA ethics committee. Platini's contract called for two years of pay "in case of incapacity to perform his tasks," Solari said.


