Scottish leader steps up battle forindependence

London: Scotland's nationalist leader Nicola Sturgeon will consider "all reasonable options" if Prime Minister Boris Johnson tries to stop her from holding a referendum on Scottish independence, she said on Thursday. Sturgeon's pro-independence, anti-Brexit Scottish National Party (SNP) won 48 of Scotland's 59 parliamentary seats in last week's UK-wide election, which she said showed overwhelming support for her agenda to hold such a referendum. As things stand, a referendum cannot take place without UK government consent.

ALGERIA New President sworn in

Algiers: Algeria swore in Abdelmadjid Tebboune as president on Thursday as the Hirak protest movement debated its response to his offer of dialogue to end a months-long political crisis. Hirak has mobilised huge street protests since February demanding a full clear-out of a shadowy, long entrenched ruling elite that it sees as corrupt and undemocratic, and the army's withdrawal from politics. Mounted guards lined the way into the Palais des Nations as Tebboune entered, Algeria's flag fluttering overhead.

Stabbing at Oregon shopping centre kills 1

Beaverton: An attacker carried out a series of stabbings and carjackings at a suburban Portland shopping centre and in nearby town Wednesday, killing one person and wounding three others before being arrested, authorities said. Police in the city of Beaverton said two people were stabbed inside a Wells Fargo bank and a man was stabbed at a gym next door. After the stabbings, the assailant stole the man's car and drove into the suburb of Tigard, where he stole another woman's car and stabbed her. He eventually got out of the car and ran from officers before being caught, police said.

THE HOUSE of Representatives on Wednesday impeached President Donald Trump for obstruction of Congress and abuse of power, making him the third president in history to be charged with committing high crimes and misdemeanors and face removal by the Senate.

The votes on the two articles of impeachment fell largely along party lines, after a bitter debate that reflected the deep polarisation gripping American politics in the Trump era.

All but two Democrats supported the article on abuse of power, which accused Trump of corruptly using the levers of government to solicit election assistance from Ukraine in the form of investigations to discredit his political rivals. Republicans were united in opposition. It passed 230-197, with Speaker Nancy Pelosi gaveling the vote to a close from the House rostrum.

struction of Congress, a third Democrat joined Republicans in opposition. The vote was 229-198.

The vote set the stage for a historic trial beginning early next year in the Senate, which will have final say — 10 months before Trump faces reelection — on whether to acquit the President or convict and remove him from office. Acquittal in the Republican-controlled chamber is likely, but the proceeding is certain to aggravate the political and cultural fault lines in the country that Trump's presidency has brought into dramatic relief.

On Wednesday, Democrats characterized his impeachment as an urgent action to stop a corrupt president whose misdeeds had unfolded in plain view from damaging the country any further.

"Over the course of the last three months, we have found incontrovertible evidence that President Trump abused his power by pressuring the newly elected president of Ukraine to announce an investigation into President Trump's political rival," said Rep. Adam Schiff, Intelligence Committee chairman, who led the impeachment inquiry. NYT

A PAKISTAN special court issued a bizarre but apparently symbolic order for former military ruler Pervez Musharraf on Thursday, saying his corpse should be dragged to Parliament and hang for three days if he dies before his execution.

The court sentenced Musharraf to death on Tuesday after finding him guilty of high treason for subverting the constitution in 2007. Thursday's announcement

came after the government said it had found fault with the sentence, apparently taking sides in a split between the military and the judiciary, and the general's lawyers said he plans to appeal. The court directed law en-

forcers to apprehend Musharraf, currently receiving medical treatment in Dubai, to ensure the death sentence is carried out. But if found dead before-

hand, "his corpse (should) be dragged to D-Chowk, Islamabad, Pakistan, and be hanged for three days", it said.

The chowk, or roundabout, is just outside parliament.

Legal experts termed the instructions unconstitutional, even if symbolic.

There is only one precedent — a court sentenced a serial killer to hanging at a public place and his body to be cut into 100 pieces in front of the families of the victims. The sentence was never carried out.



PAK GOVT WANTS 'MENTALLY UNFIT' JUDGE REMOVED

Islamabad: Furious over a special court's verdict to drag General (retd) Pervez Musharraf's corpse to the Parliament and hang it for three days, the Pakistan government on Thursday said that it would move the Supreme Judicial Council to unseat the "mentally unfit" head of the tribunal. "The federal government has decided to go to the Supreme Judicial Council as the government believes that such a person cannot be a judge of any High and Supreme Court. If a judge gives such a judgment then such a judge is mentally unfit and incompetent," Law Minister Farogh Naseem said. PTI

Information Minister Firdous Ashiq Awan said on Wednesday the government's legal team had found "gaps and weaknesses" in the original death sentence after lawyers briefed PM Imran Khan about the case. **REUTERS**

UK confirms fast-track visa for doctors from countries such as India

WEDNESDAY'S IMPEACHMENT vote against President Donald Trump posed a political test for 31 House Democrats who represent districts that backed Trump in the 2016 presidential election, as Republicans warned that those lawmakers could face a backlash if they supported the effort to remove the president from office.

In the end, only three of the 31 voted against one or both of the articles of impeachment that accuse Trump of abuse of power and obstruction of Congress.

Representative Tulsi Gabbard, who represents a safely Democratic district in Hawaii, voted "present" on both charges.

The three who voted "no" said they were not convinced of the case against Trump. The two articles of impeachment allege the president abused his power in dealings with Ukraine and obstructed Congress' attempts to investigate.

Trump "has not committed a crime", Representative Collin Peterson of Minnesota, one of

Senate trial in limbo as Pelosi holds out for assurances

Speedy trial and acquittal at Republican-controlled Senate could boost Trump ahead of 2020 presidential election

SPEAKER NANCY Pelosi indicated Wednesday night that the House could indefinitely delay sending the articles of impeachment against President Donald Trump to the Senate, leaving ambiguous the timing of a trial to decide whether to acquit him or convict and remove him from office.

After a historic nearly partyline vote to impeach Trump for two articles, abuse of power and obstruction of Congress, Pelosi said she would hold the articles back until it was clearer that the upper chamber would give the case a fair hearing. The strategy suggested she was keeping the charges as leverage in a coming negotiation

over the terms of a Senate trial. But it could leave the matter in limbo until early January, delaying the start of a trial for an

unknown period. "We will make our decision as to when we are going to send it when we see what they are doing on the Senate side," Pelosi

said. "So far, we have not seen anything that looks fair to us."
