Data on parents' place of birth to be gathered; register already has data of 119 crore residents

The Narendra Modi government proposes to update the National Population Register (NPR), which already has an electronic database of more than 119 crore residents, by verifying the details of all respondents through house-tohouse enumeration, according to an official manual for conducting the fresh NPR exercise.

The NPR exercise has become controversial because the Citizenship Rules, 2003, link the Population Register to the creation of a National Register of Indian Citizens (NRIC) or National Register of Citizens.

Coupled with the passage of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019, which excludes Muslims, fears about an NPR-NRC have brought lakhs of people on to the streets in protest. More than 20 people have been killed during the protests, most of them in Uttar Pradesh.

Army chief: leading crowds for arson is not leadership

Remark sparks outrage from political parties, leads to social media storm

Students leading crowds to carry out arson and violence is not leadership, the outgoing Army chief, General Bipin Rawat, said on Thursday, in an apparent reference to the protests across the country against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA).

It is unusual for a serving Army chief to comment on the country's civilian affairs, and the remarks drew sharp criticism on social media and from political parties.

"Leaders are not those people who lead people in inappropriate directions, as

we are witnessing in a large number of university and college students, the way they are leading masses of crowds to carry out arson and violence in our cities and towns. This is not leadership," Gen. Rawat said at an event in the national capital.

Leadership, he said, was all about leading, and the complex thing about it was "when you move forward, everybody follows". "Even amongst the crowd you find leaders... But leaders are those who lead people in the right direction.

Two injured from Firozabad die in Delhi hospitals

They had sustained bullet injuries on December 20 during protests against new citizenship law

Mohammed Haroon, 30, and Mohammed Shafeeq, 40, from Firozabad in Uttar Pradesh, who were shot during protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act on December 20, died of their injuries at hospitals in Delhi on Thursday.

Haroon's relatives were at the trauma centre of the All India Institute of Medical Sciences, where the body was kept. A few others were at the hospital police post completing the procedure.

His brother-in-law, Zaki Sheikh, said Haroon's four sisters were waiting for him to come back home in good health. "It was just bad luck that he went to that area on December 20. There was no plan," he said.

The family members said that they were in the buffalo trade. They used to go to the weekly market at Rasulpur for business. "On December 20, a Friday, the weekly market had been set up. None of us had any plan to go, but Ha-

roon went. We don't know why he decided to go," Mr. Sheikh said.

According to the family, Haroon had sold a buffalo for ₹33,000. Mr. Sheikh said they had the receipt to prove he was in the area for business. mobile phone could not be found, they said.

However, the money and his

'Shot in the face' "We don't know who shot

him – whether it was the police or someone in public. We got the information that he was shot when he was taken to a hospital in Agra. He was shot in the face. They referred him to AIIMS and we brought him here on Wednesday," Mr. Sheikh said, adding that doctors here tried their best to save him but "it was his destiny".

At Safdarjung Hospital, Shafeeq's family stood outside the mortuary. They had just submitted the documents required before con-

ducting the post-mortem. They haven't told Shafeeq's wife Rani about his

death. "She will lose her mind if we tell her straightaway. When we brought the body to the mortuary, we told her that he is being taken for operation. She will eventually get to know when we go to Firozabad," Shafeeq's brother Shaheed said.


Early on Thursday morning, Ms. Rani told *The Hindu* that her husband was still undergoing treatment. He had passed away at 2 a.m. The brother said doctors at Safdarjung told the family that he was brain-dead because of the gunshot wound in his head. He was brought here on Monday.

On December 20, several people sustained injuries. Haroon, Shafeeq and Mukeem, 20, were referred to the Delhi hospitals. Mukeem passed away on Tuesday morning.

Rights body releases report on police action at Jamia university

'Right to protest must be recognised inalienable; FIR should be filed against police'

The Peoples Union for Democratic Rights (PUDR) on Thursday released a factfinding report on the crackdown by Delhi Police at Jamia Millia Islamia and termed the police action "unjustified, excessive and unauthorised".

Demanding a Commission of Enquiry to be instituted, the PUDR, in its report, said: "The right of citizens to protest must be recognised as inalienable and the practice of routine refusal to grant permission must be stopped. An FIR should be registered against the police for brutal use of force inside the Jamia

The PUDR also said that police stations in the vicini-

ty need to be "sensitised" to counter "communal outlook and ensure civil behaviour'

"The police personnel and officers who were part of the attack on students need to be shunted out of the police station without delay. Whatever evidence remains at Jamia should be preserved and we appeal to

the Delhi High Court to take cognisance of the issue," said activist Harish Dhawan.

The report named 'Bloody Sunday: Police Brutalities at Jamia University 13-15 December, 2019' added that there was a "clear template" of crackdown by the police on protesters across the national capital.

"The patterns have been

similar - lathi-charge, tear gas firing followed by largescale detentions and denial of legal and medical aid to detainees. Targeted attacks on Muslim neighbourhoods were seen at Seelampur-Jaffrabad, Daryaganj and Seemapuri. The most brutal of these were in Daryaganj where 11-12 minors were detained till late in the night and without any medical or legal aid," the PUDR said.

The report by a six-member PUDR team added, "The residents of the area surrounding the Jamia campus have a high degree of distrust on the police. The police have, on its part, provided reason on past occasions to earn this distrust. The spiteful verbal abuse noted in this report is a reflection of the same."

213 detained from outside Uttar Pradesh Bhawan

The people were protesting without permission: police

The Delhi police on Thursday detained 213 protesters from outside the Uttar Pradesh Bhawan in Delhi. The people had gathered to stage a protest against alleged police atrocities in Uttar Pradesh during protests against the amended Citizenship

Scores of people from all walks of life had gathered outside the U.P. Bhawan to protest against the alleged "undemocratic onslaught on organisations and activists in the State".

A magisterial court had denied bail to the 15 accused on December 23, after which they approached the sessions court for relief.

They were arrested after a violence broke out in the area on December 20 as a group of agitating demonstrators resorted to stonepelting when police tried to forcefully evict them. One car was set on fire and several others were damaged.

All the accused are in judicial custody. One of those arrested had claimed he was a juvenile. However, the police said he had told them he was 23.

Protests on Friday

On Friday, a group of students will stage a protest outside the Uttar Pradesh Bhawan. Then other groups will march to 7, RCR, and people from Jama Masjid might march towards Jantar

held a meeting with local leaders and requested them to ask the youth not to get involved in any kind of rumour-mongering and ask them to avoid getting motivated by any rumour of violence. "We have got assurance from most of the locals and it will be a peaceful day," the officer added.

Senior police officers

Prohibitory orders in Nuh ahead of anti-CAA protests

Section 144 of CrPC has been imposed

Ahead of the scheduled protest marches across Nuh over the next fortnight igainst the amended Citizenship Act, the district administration on Thursday imposed prohibitory orders under Section 144 of the CrPC across the district, putting restrictions on the assembly of five or more persons.

As per the schedule for the demonstrations under the aegis of Mewat Vikas Sabha, a protest march is to be held from Rangala village to Ferozepur Jhirka on Friday; Mandikhera village to Badkali Chowk on December 29; Uttawar Mor to Roopraka Shaheed Minar on December 31; Shahidi Park to Mini Secretariat on January 3; Chharora to Tauru on January 5 and Khanpur Ghati to Pinangwan on January 7. The decision regarding the march to Delhi is to be made at a meeting on Ianuary 9.

The orders issued by Ad-

ditional District Magistrate Vivek Padam Singh stated that there appeared to be a likelihood of tension, annovance or obstruction. The prohibition will remain in place for two months or till the time the situation became peaceful.

Mewat RTI Manch president Rajuddin Meo said the administration's decision to impose the restrictions was unfortunate since the protests here were peaceful.

All-India Mewati Samaj national president Ramzan Chaudhary said the prohibitory orders were politically motivated and an attempt to muzzle the voice of the people. He said that still a method would be devised to register the protest.

Mewat Vikas Sabha president Salamuddin said the administration's decision to invoke prohibitory orders was unwarranted and illegal. "We will devise some Ghandhian way to register our protest," said Mr. Salamuddin.

City gets 100 new buses

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Thursday flagged off 100 new buses to be operated under the Cluster

525 buses

The addition of 100 buses, equipped with features, including CTTVs, panic buttons on every seat, hydraulic lifts for differently abled passengers and GPS tracking systems, brings the total number of such vehicles to be inducted under the scheme to 525 since August this year, the government

"Hundreds of new buses will be added within the next 5-6 months. The shortage of buses for many years is now being addressed with these new additional buses," said Mr. Kejriwal, adding: "It is my dream to modernise Delhi's public transport infrastructure so that it becomes a comfortable option for every citizen. One thousand electric buses will also be inducted very soon."

The first lot of such vehicles to be inducted, which consisted of 25 buses, became operational in August following which 100 buses have been inducted every

Respond to plea of cancer patient: HC to AIIMS, Centre

'Hospital denied treatment saying cannot take outside cases'

STAFF REPORTER

The Delhi High Court has asked the Centre and All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) to respond to a plea by a woman suffering from fourth stage of esophageal cancer seeking direction to the hospital to her provide medical treatment.

Justice Navin Chawla, in an interim order, asked AI-IMS to examine and render full treatment to the woman if she goes there till January

"Till the next day of hearing, in case the petitioner [woman] produces herself for examination/ treatment before the respondent no. 2 [AIIMS], it shall examine and render full treatment to the petitioner," the court said and listed the matter for hearing on January 16.

Fifty two-year-old Shashi Bala, in her petition, sought



direction to the AIIMS to provide her treatment according to her present medical condition and after considering her previous reports and tests conducted in two different hospitals.

The counsel appearing for Bala also sought direction to the Centre to frame guidelines to be followed by government hospitals wherein no patient should be denied medical treatment if he/she is earlier treated at some other hospital.

"Denial to admit or treat

the woman, who is suffering from fourth stage of cancer, is violation of her fundamental rights... The condition of the woman is weak and fragile and if she is not treated by AIIMS, she might lose her life. Failure by AIIMS to provide timely medical treatment to a needy person abrogates his/ her right to life guaranteed under Article 21," the plea said.

It said the woman was earlier being treated at Batra Hospital and thereafter at Rajiv Gandhi Cancer Institute and Research Centre but treatment was not satisfactory.

Subsequently, the woman's son had visited AIIMS but the doctors refused treatment saying that they would not "entertain or take outside cases," the plea alleged. It claimed that the doctors said they only take those cases where the patient directly comes to them.

Four-storey building goes up in flames, 40 rescued

Most of the occupants managed to reach rooftop, which made the rescue operation easy: DFS director

A major tragedy was averted and 40 people were rescued from a building in east Delhi after a fire broke out in the early hours of Thursday.

Delhi Fire Service Director Atul Garg said that plastic waste and scarp were stored on the ground floor of the four-storey building in Krishna Nagar, while people lived on the upper floors. The building had only one staircase for entry and exit.

The officer said that they received a call at 2.10 a.m. and five fire tenders were rushed to the spot. As the caller gave correct information, they could act swiftly. All the residents went to the terrace after the fire broke out and hence, the rescue operation was easy compared to other such incidents, he said.

Forty people were rescued from the building and the fire was doused by 4 a.m.

"We heard people screaming for help from the terrace. During the operation, the team was split into two with one trying to control the fire and the other rushing to the upper floors to rescue those trapped inside," said Santosh

it, who headed the operation.

The fire had started from the scrap on the ground floor. When those on upper floors sensed smoke, they ran towards the terrace. Most of them managed to reach the rooftop, though some couldn't. But all of them were rescued.

U.P. Minister refuses to meet Muslim families

An Uttar Pradesh Minister on a visit here on Thursday refused to meet the families of the two Muslim men who died in the recent protests against the new citizenship law, terming them "upadravi" (vandals).

"Why should I go to vandals' place? How can those who are involved in vandalism and put the entire country and State in arson be social," Minister Kapil Dev Agarwal posed, defending his decision to not visit the homes of the two Muslim families.

"Why should I visit those who want to put Nahtaur/Bijnor in flames?" the Minister in-charge of the district shot back when asked by reporters to justify his decision.

Mr. Agarwal, the Vocational Education Minister in the Yogi Adityanath government, did meet Om Raj Saini, who was injured in the violence that hit the district's Nehtaur area, and his family.

During Friday's violence 20-year-old Suleman, an IAS aspirant, and 25-yearold Anas lost their lives.

U.P. police put death toll at 19 in anti-CAA protests

Total of 327 FIRs, 1,113 arrests and 5,558 detentions so far

OMAR RASHID

Nineteen persons have died in Uttar Pradesh since December 10 during the violence in the protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, the State police

said on Thursday.

The police have also arrested 1,113 persons and detained another 5,558 others under preventive custody over the protests. A total of 327 FIRs have been lodged so far.

Issuing an official state-

ment, Uttar Pradesh Police, which had maintained silence on the rising death toll over the past few days, also said that 288 policemen were injured in the violence, arson and vandalism. Out of these, 61 received firearm injuries.

The U.P. police also claim to have found 647 shells of .315 bore and .12 bore weapons, 69 live cartridges, and 35 illegal country pistols from the protest sites.

A police pistol was

snatched by protesters in Sambhal on December 20, the police said.

dered an SIT to be headed by the SP (Crime) or an Additional SP-rank officer to probe the cases.

'Situation under control' "The law and order situation in the entire State is under control," the police said.

The police have also arrested 124 persons and lodged 93 FIRs for "objectionable posts, rumours and messages" posted on social media related to the CAA.

The State police also said that it had initiated the legal process to identify vandals and confiscate their property as compensation for damage to public and private property.

This comes in the background of Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath promising to take "revenge" against those who damaged property during the protests by seizing their property and auctioning it.

'Vengeance' of U.P. govt. condemned

In an open letter to Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, Magsaysay awardee Sandeep Pandey on Thursday condemned the "vengeance" with which the State government was acting in response to the violence during the protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act.

While stating that the violence was carried out by "anarchist elements", Mr. Pandey said more "maturity and restraint" was expected of any government and administration.

He referred to the arrests of several social activists and students in Lucksaid, "If you'll send social activists, who have faith in the Constitution, to jail because your police in unable to identify the anarchist elements then the space for peaceful means of expressing dissent with the government in a democracy will be eliminated and anarchist elements will be easily able to mislead the common people".

Anti-CAA protests continue in Assam

Students' groups lead largest gathering

Protests against the contentious Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019, continued unabated across Assam on Thursday, primarily under the aegis of student bodies AASU and AJYCP, with agitators vowing not to relent till the law is scrapped.

The Opposition Congress, which has kick-started an 800-km 'padyatra' from Sadiya in eastern Assam to Dhubri in the western end of the State, reached Demow in Sivasagar district with thousands of participants.

The largest anti-CAA gathering took place at Tangla in Udalguri district under the banner of the All Assam Students' Union.

"[Prime Minister] Narendra Modi, [Union Home Minister] Amit Shah and their puppets [Chief Minister] Sarbananda [Sonowal] and [State Minister] Himanta [Biswa Sarma] are planning to snatch our food, but we will not tolerate that.

"Assam has to be for Assamese always. A conspiracy is being hatched to finish the identity, language and culture of the Assamese people," AASU general secretary Lurinjyoti Gogoi said while addressing the huge crowd.

Popular singers Zubeen Garg and Manas Robin and theatre artiste Pabitra Rabha also participated in the protest.

After singing a protest song that he has penned, Robin said, "The BJP government had promised to give two lakh jobs a year and seal the border with Bangladesh. Both did not materialise. Today, we are on the streets because we do not accept CAA as it will destroy us."

Mamata warns against attack on students

Leading a march against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act in the city for the fourth time since December 16, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee asserted on Thursday that peaceful protests will continue as long as the law is not withdrawn.

Before leading the march from Rajabazar to Mullick Bazar, the Trinamool Congress chairperson warned the BJP-led governments not to use force against students protesting against the CAA. She also appealed to the students to continue their movement on the issue without bowing down to threats and repression.

"We express our solidarity with the students of Jamia Millia, IIT-Kanpur and other universities who are protesting against the CAA and the NRC [National Register of Citizens]," she said. The protesting students are adults and voters, Ms. Banerjee said. "So if they stage any protest, where is the harm in it? They have a role to play," she said, suggesting they use the social media to unite the people.

"In BJP-ruled States such as Uttar Pradesh, force is be-

Yediyurappa spoke to the family members of the victims at the Circuit House in the city on December 22 and announced the compensation [of ₹10 lakh each to the kin of the duo] the next day. However, on Wednesday, he said the compensation could not be paid until an investigation proved



"Now, he should make it clear who were all behind his decision to go back on his promise," Mr. Khader said, and demanded that the Chief Minister apologise for backtracking on compensation. "The decision has pained all. The government playing politics with deaths and tragedy," the MLA alleged.

The former Dakshina Kannada district in-charge Minister said funds would be collected from a cross-section of society. "The public will give more money than the government," he said.

Kerala plans detention centre for foreigners; set for headcount

Kerala will count the foreign-

ers detained in its prisons, so that it can identify a suitable building to set up a Foreigners' Detention Centre, and move them there. This comes amid the raging nationwide controversy over such centres.

The Department of Social Justice (DSJ), Kerala, which has been entrusted with the task of setting up the facility,

has been awaiting the data on foreigners, who have been either convicted here or waiting to be extradited for various offences, for setting up the facility.

The department can scout for a building for the facility only after getting an idea of the requirement said a senior government official.

The department has been unsuccessfully writing to the State Crime Records Bureau (SCRB) since June this year asking for the number of foreigners for identifying suitable buildings to house them. It was on November 26 that the latest reminder was sent to the SCRB, government sources said.

The setting up of the detention centres in Assam and some other States had invited severe criticism during the protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act and the National Register of Citizens (NRC).

Nambi Narayanan to get ₹1.3 crore

Govt. to give money to ex-ISRO scientist to settle case filed by him against State

The Kerala Cabinet has decided in principle to give ₹1.3 crore to former Indian Space Research Organisation (IS-RO) scientist Nambi Narayanan of the infamous ISRO spy scandal case to settle the case filed by him against the State in the sub-court in Thiruvananthapuram.

The amount is in addition to the ₹50 lakh provided by the State on the basis of a Su-

preme Court order and the ₹10 lakh recommended by the National Human Rights Commission to Mr. Naraya-

Acting on a report submitted by former Chief Secretary K. Jayakumar, the Cabinet on Thursday decided to submit the documents to be prepared in consultation with legal experts to the subcourt to settle the case and to act as per the directive from the court.

In September 2018, a three-judge Bench of the Supreme Court led by the then Chief Justice of India Dipak Misra had found him to be a victim of trumped-up allegations of espionage by the Kerala police. The court ordered the State to pay him ₹50 lakh as compensation for loss of his fundamental right to live with dignity and self-respect for all these years since his arrest on November 30, 1994.

A team of rationalists, including Shrishail Ghooli, Ravindra Shahabadi and Sarangdhar Deshikendra Swami of Sarang Mutt in Srisailam reached the spot and told the parents that such practices would only cause further health problems.

Endless wait

A prolonged election process will do little to end political instability in Afghanistan

The announcement of preliminary results for the Afghanistan Presidential election is a significant step for India's war-torn neighbour. The fourth Presidential poll since the Taliban's fall in 2001, it consolidates the country's democratic process in the face of odds, including continuing violence and terrorism there. According to the Independent Election Commission, President Ashraf Ghani has won 50.64% of the votes counted, which, if ratified, will obviate the need for a second round of polling. A second round – probably only after winter – would prolong the uncertainty around the polls, given that even these results took more than three months to announce. That these polls were held was a miracle, having been delayed for months, and almost cancelled after progress in reconciliation talks with Taliban leaders, who do not recognise the electoral process. The U.S.'s decision to cancel the talks in September - now resumed - gave the necessary breather for the September 28 polls and counting to be carried out. But questions remain. Voter turnout was a record low, with only about a quarter of 9.6 million registered voters voting. Thousands of votes were also disqualified after biometric match failures and other irregularities, setting off allegations of voter fraud. As a result, Afghanistan's former Chief Executive Officer and Mr. Ghani's chief rival, Dr. Abdullah Abdullah, has rejected the preliminary results. Mr. Ghani's vote margin over Mr. Abdullah is only about 214,769, and if more votes are disqualified during the review process, the men may have to fight the second round. This will possibly be more divisive for Afghanistan given that Mr. Ghani, a Pashtun leader, has drawn much of his support from the Pashtun-majority south and Mr. Abdullah has won mainly in the Northern areas with Tajik presence. The U.S.-Taliban talks also cast a shadow over whether the results will be respected if the Taliban negotiates its way into a power-sharing arrangement in Kabul.

Setting aside the concerns, Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated Mr. Ghani for winning the elections, a gesture which will be noted by Mr. Ghani and Vice President-elect Amrullah Saleh. Mr. Modi reaffirmed India's close and strategic partnership with Afghanistan since 2010. The move came in sharp contrast to the rest of world that has chosen to be more cautious at present; the U.S. Ambassador has reminded all that "many steps remain" before the final results are certified and declared, and the UN has called for all candidates to "safeguard and complete the election". It will be in everyone's interests, particularly the Afghans who braved violent attacks to go out and vote, if the remaining steps of the electoral process are completed at the earliest, and democracy is reaffirmed in Afghanistan.

Cracks in the relic

The downturn in Turkey's relations with the U.S. holds implications for the future of NATO

ising tensions in U.S.-Turkey relations are threa-Ltion (NATO) unity. In the latest of a series of incidents, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan has threatened to shut down two U.S. bases in retaliation for the proposed American sanctions on Ankara over purchasing Russian weapons. The U.S. and Turkey are the largest and second largest standing armies of NATO, respectively. There are U.S. nuclear warheads in the Incirlik airbase, a critical facility for American operations in West Asia. Mr. Erdoğan has warned that Incirlik and the Kurecik radar base would be shut if there are sanctions. U.S.-Turkey ties began slumping in recent years after Washington's refusal to extradite Fethullah Gülen, a U.S.-based Turkish Islamic preacher who is accused by Ankara of orchestrating the failed 2016 coup against Mr. Erdoğan. The U.S. decision to arm and assist Kurdish rebels in Syria against the Islamic State was another blow. Ankara sees the People's Protection Units, the main Syrian Kurdish militia that became an American ally in the anti-IS war, as an affiliate of the Kurdistan Workers Party, the Kurdish militia on the Turkish side. In return, Turkey moved closer towards Russia, now trying to raise its regional profile, and invaded Kurdishheld towns in northern Syria earlier this year. Turkey's decision to purchase the Russian S-400 missile system despite U.S.-NATO opposition, was the tipping point.

After the disintegration of the Soviet Union, NATO founded as a Soviet counterweight – remained as a vehicle of western military might and continued to expand to Russia's borders, creating tensions between Russia and the West in the recent past. But with the resurgence of populist, nationalist leaders in several western countries, the NATO's relevance has been called into question several times; U.S. President Donald Trump and French President Emmanuel Macron have used the words "obsolete" and "brain death", respectively. Fastdeteriorating ties between the U.S. and Turkey is adding to the crisis. The Trump administration has already suspended Turkey from the F-35 programme, citing concerns over Russia spying on the fighter jet's capabilities using the S-400 system's radar. Earlier this month, the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved a Bill seeking sanctions on Turkey over the S-400 purchase and the Syria offensive. But Ankara seems determined to go ahead with the S-400 deal and even buy advanced Russian aircraft if the U.S. does not deliver the F-35s. And with threats to shut down Incirlik and Kurecik bases, it is now clear that the cracks are wide open. The question the Atlantic alliance faces in this hour of crisis is not just whether the U.S. and Turkey would manage to resolve their differences, but also whether NATO, a Cold War relic, could stay relevant in a post-Cold War era where bilateral ties are fast-changing.

The Data Protection Bill only weakens user rights

A culmination of flawed policy proposals, this piece of legislation will refine, store and trade personal information



n the continuing social churn and widespread citizen prot-Lests, it would seem out of place to direct thought towards issues such as data protection. The Personal Data Protection Bill, 2019, which was introduced in the Lok Sabha this month, is a revolutionary piece of legislation that promises to return power and control to people in our digital society. Pending deliberation before a Joint Parliamentary Committee, it is intimately connected to the very same fundamental rights and constitutional principles that are being defended today on the streets

and in the fields. The Bill has seen serpentine movement, passing expert committees, central ministries and then the Lok Sabha in the winter session. Before focusing on the nuances and finer details which merit deliberation we must take a step back to look at the broader politics of personal data protection. This would help contextualise the legislative proposal and understand the degree of protection which is limited by overboard exceptions in favour of security and revenue interests.

Securitisation and revenue

The rise of the national security narrative has not been gone unnoticed by seasoned political observers. What is novel is its intersection with technology. This is central to several policy and political pronouncements by the present government. In many ways, it is a continuation of the politics of

securitisation of the government from its previous term. For instance, the Bharatiya Janata Party's manifesto (sankalp patra) released before the general election 2019 provides useful insight where it states appropriate technological interventions centred around Aadhaar. This shrugs off any recognition of its contested legality before the Supreme Court which ruled on the fundamental right to privacy. Privacy is mentioned just once in this voluminous document - 49 mentions of 'security' and 56 mentions of 'technology'.

This is a trend which continues. The President of India's address to Joint Sitting of Parliament on June 20, 2019 – fresh from the results of the general election - proclaimed that "my government is committed to that very idea of nationbuilding, the foundation for which was laid in 2014". The priorities of the government are clearly charted out with zero mention of privacy or data protection; there are 18 mentions of 'security' and eight of 'technology'. This familiar template is again found in the Prime Minister's Independence day speech on August 15, 2019 which focussed on dramatic social change. He noted: "I believe that there should be change in the system, but at the same time there should be a change in the social fabric." There is zero mention of 'privacy' or 'data protection'; however there are seven mentions of 'security', six on 'technology' and five for 'digital'. There may be government policy documents that may emphasise or contradict these assertions. However these statements made by high public officials at historic times when they may be widely viewed by large number of Indians are deserving of primacy. They reveal, at the very least, a pecking order in terms of viewing both technology and se-



curity as high priorities in governance objectives.

As Edward Snowden explains in his Permanent Record, there is a symbiotic relationship between the financial model of large online platforms and security interest. They both feed off personal data and the attention economy, where platforms gather this data and the government then seeks access to it. In India this is being taken a step further. The government is seeking to not only access data but also collect it and then exploit it – making it an active data trader for the generation of revenue to meet its fiscal goals.

Principles in conflict First, the scale of data collection is ambitious and broadly contained in the 'Digital India' programme; on its website it says: "to transform the entire ecosystem of public services through the use of information technology...". Here, all elements of a citizen-state interaction are being data-fied. In the view of some technologists, this also fulfils geostrategic goals when personal data is viewed as strategic state resource. However, this poses grave risks to the right to privacy. These become evident from a casual reading of the national Economic Survey of 2019, which in Chapter 4 devotes an entire chapter on the fiscal approach towards personal data. In a "Chapter at a glance" it says: "In thinking about data as a public good, care must also be taken to not impose

the elite's preference of privacy on the poor, who care for a better quality of living the most."

Two tangible examples show the operation of this policy framework. The first is with respect to the recent sale of vehicular registration data and driving licences by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways. Here, quite often, the principles of a data protection law would conflict with these uses as it would break the fundamental premise of purpose limitation. This principle broadly holds that personal data which is gathered for a specific purpose cannot be put to any other distinct use without consent of the person from whom it was acquired. The second is an expert committee (headed by Kris Gopalakrishnan, Chairperson, Infosys) on what is termed "community data". While the definition of such, "community data" is contested, as per the note it is plainly obvious this is again to serve fiscal interests of the state and technology businesses when it states that such data "is critical for economic advantage".

Muddled formulation

The existing draft of the Data Protection Bill is reflective of a political economy that is motivated towards ensuring minimal levels of protection for personal data. It has a muddled formulation in terms of its aims and objectives, contains broad exemptions in favour of security and fiscal interests, including elements of data nationalism by requiring the compulsory storage of personal data on servers located within India.

From its very preamble it seeks to place the privacy interests of individuals on the same footing as those of businesses and the state. Here, by placing competing interests on the same plane, two natural consequences visit the drafting

losing its official status in the State.

choices within it. First, the principle of data protection to actualise the fundamental right to privacy is not fulfilled as a primary goal but is conditioned from the very outset. Second, by placing competing goals - which contradict each other – any balancing is clumsy, since no primary objectives are set. This results in a muddy articulation that would ultimately ensure a weak data protection law.

This present draft of the Bill comes as a disappointment especially after the emphatic judgment by the nine-judge Bench of the Supreme Court on the Right to Privacy. The judgment contains categorical language that the Bill is a measure to actualise the fundamental right. However, this draft serves a political economy which at first blush appears attractive in its promise of taking us away from the dull maxims of constitutionalism and delivering us a digital utopia. Again, this was best phrased by the Prime Minister when he stated at the Digital India dinner on September 26, 2015, at San Jose, California: "... technology is advancing citizen empowerment and democracy that once drew their strength from Constitutions."

Hence, on a broader read, the Data Protection Bill is not a leaky oil barrel with large exceptions, but it is a perfect one. It will refine, store and then trade the personal information of Indians without their control; open for sale or open for appropriation to the interests of securitisation or revenue maximisation, with minimal levels of protection. For this to change, we have to not only focus on redlining the finer text of this draft but also reframing large parts of its intents and objectives.

Assam's identity fears face up to divisive politics

Protests in the State have been brought about by the BJP's failure to gauge the popular mood

Then Assam was first rocked by anti-Citizenship (Amendment) Bill protests in 2018, the argument put forward against the Bill was that granting of citizenship to Bengali Hindu immigrants up to December 2014 would eventually reduce the indigenous people to a minority in their homeland.

It was said that the Bill was blatantly unconstitutional because citizenship could never be given on the basis of religion. Not many outside Assam and the Northeast were then taken in by this argument because the common perception in the rest of the country was that the protests were chiefly motivated by the ever-present xenophobic fear of the outsider. The assertion that Assam was not prepared to accept any more foreigners, be they Hindu or Muslim, did not get enough attention at the national level.

The Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016 after being referred to a Joint Parliamentary Committee, was reintroduced in the Lok Sabha in January 2019 and passed, but it lapsed with the dissolution of the 16th Lok Sabha because the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) did not have the requisite numbers in the Rajya

Sabha. Subsequently, the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2019 was introduced in the Lok Sabha in December 2019. This revised version was bulldozed through, promptly receiving the President of India's assent, but this time the protests were not limited to the Northeast

Threat to indigenous people

The dangerous divisive nature of the move to create second-class citizens of the country's largest minority population has become evident to all those who nourish the idea of India as enshrined in the Constitution of India. However, for the people of Assam, the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019, or the CAA, goes beyond re-defining citizenship on religious lines; it poses a threat to the identity of the many small indigenous communities that make up the composite Assamese nationality while at the same time fomenting a linguisticreligious divide. Hence, there has been a massive upsurge cemented by a strengthened sense of Assamese identity. Some youth have already been killed in police firing and scores injured.

How does one describe the laceration of the soul of a people? This is exactly what has happened with the Central government's dictatorial move to impose the CAA on the people of Assam. What defies rationale is that the CAA applies selectively to only the Brahmaputra and Barak valleys of Assam and some areas of Tripura and Meghalaya while all the States,

which have Inner Line Permit regulations and all areas which fall under the Sixth Schedule, have been kept outside its purview. Vet unlike Manipur, Nagaland and Mizoram which do not share a border with Bangladesh, Assam, Meghalaya and Tripura have extensive land borders with that country and have been facing continuous immigration from East Bengal/East Pakistan/Bangladesh resulting in a swift demographic

Immigration, land and identity have long been core issues for Assamese indigenes who, through the Assam Accord of 1985, accepted all Bengali-speaking Muslim and Hindu immigrants from 1951 to March 1971. The National Register of Citizens, all its shortcomings notwithstanding, was seen as a closure of sorts. Now that the cutoff date for illegal Bengali Hindu immigrants has been extended till December 2014. Assamese apprehensions about their language and culture being jeopardised have increased tenfold. Census figures over the years have shown a steady decline in Assamese speakers, prompting fears of the language

The marked feature of the current protests is that people in their thousands have taken to the streets defying curfew and other restrictions. Though 30-odd ethnic organisations, including the Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti, the All-Assam Students' Union and the Asom Jatiyatabadi Yuva Chatra Parishad have been at the forefront of the protests, yet, this time, the protests seem to have gained an even wider base. Not only have Opposition parties and several emplovees' unions extended support, but minority student organisations as well as tea tribes bodies have also joined in the demonstrations.

Not even during the heyday of the Assam Movement (1979-1985) were tea garden workers drawn into the protests. What is most striking is the fact that there is a sense of unison throughout the Brahmaputra Valley brought about by the arrogance of a party in power which has utterly failed to gauge the feelings of the masses. It is significant that attempts to divide the movement along linguistic and religious lines have met with stiff resistance. For, every struggle in Assam and the Northeast has, in some way or other, been linked to the rights of the small nationalities. The BJP will never be able to appreciate this, for in its scheme of a mono-cultural Hindu India there is obviously no space for a multinationality country.

Initially, the State BJP leadership tried to dismiss the rumblings against the CAA as an aberration. But the party has been caught offguard, as people's anger is targeted at BJP legislators. The Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS), which thought it was emerging as the determining political force under the Sarbananda Sonowal government, suddenly finds its offices being attacked, with most of its functionaries having disappeared from public view. The Akhil Bharatiya Vidvarthi Parishad, which had ear lier brought out a procession or two in support of the CAA, faces an existential crisis, with many of its leaders having left the organisation. The BJP-RSS agenda of polarising the State on religious lines seems to have hit a major roadblock, with organisers and participants of the present upsurge insisting that they are against all post-1971 illegal immigrants, both Hindus and Muslims.

If the present outrage of people in Assam is any indication, it is almost certain that it will be impossible for the BJP-RSS to regain its pre-CAB position in the State. And. with the 2021 Assembly elections not too far away, it is almost certain that the party will pay a heavy price, especially in the Brahmaputra Valley. This, however, depends on how the present protests are channelised to offer an alternative to the BJP in the State.

India should ensure a clear, non-discriminatory and inclusive refugee policy

Providing protection, and a home, to refugees facing persecution of any kind is a welcome idea but the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA) has faced more questions about the people it excludes than those it takes in its ambit. **Jayant Sriram** speaks

to Gautam Bhatia and Priya Pillai on what would the contours of a more humane law be. Edited excerpts: When it comes to the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA), what according to you would be a more humane way to address the question of the status of refugees from India's neighbouring countries? I

think we all agree that there are

parts of it that are good, but

how do we broaden this?

Gautam Bhatia (GB): I think the inclusive aspect of the Act is obviously good. It's the exclusionary part of it that creates a problem. So, look at the legal regime that existed before the CAA. There was a 2011 Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) issued by the Home Ministry, which is not yet in the public domain. And, according to that, anyone who could establish persecution of any form - not just religious, but also social persecution, caste-based and so on, would be entitled to a long-term visa in India. And, this would be examined on a case-to-case basis. So, that SOP actually provides you the base for what could be a decent legal regime. Of course, that also had a lot of discretion given to the Home Ministry. But something along those lines is what I think would be a good idea.

Priya, I want to ask you about the international law aspect. What does international law say on dealing with refugees? Does the CAA meet the tests?

Priya Pillai (PP): I want to preface this whole discussion by saying that some aspects of this in terms of the focus on refugees and refugee law are a bit of a red herring, in terms of looking at the larger context of what this is about, including the NRC [National Register of Citizensl. Having

said that, there are a few aspects to

this: one is that India has not signed the Refugee Convention [1951] and protocol. India has not signed on to the Statelessness Convention. But it is good to remember that the basic premise of a refugee law is that humanitarian concerns motivate the whole idea of having an inclusive regime. So, the fact is that India has not had any formal refugee policies; there are ad hoc provisions. If India is serious about ensuring that persecuted people are protected, there are few very simple things to do: sign and ratify the conventions; and ensure that you have a clear, nondiscriminatory, inclusive policy. And the fact that the 1951 Convention has 145 state parties but India has not signed up to it is highly problematic.

I'll just add one more thing as well, which is that there's a basic premise of refugee law, which is called non-refoulement, which is that you don't send people back if they are in fear of life or of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or opinion. The CAA does not cater to [this principle]. Non-refoulement is a customary international law norm, which means that even if you've not signed up to the treaty, it is something that still binds you.

Gautam, I want to draw you out a little bit on the religion test for granting citizenship and also for determining who is a persecuted minority. How can a better law actually broaden these definitions?

GB: I think it's problematic on two points. One is to elevate religion and religious persecution to a level that links it with citizenship and ignore other forms of persecution that are as severe and have as serious consequences. For example, persecution of Tibetans, political persecution, and so on. So, I think the very act of elevating religion above other forms of persecution and giving it this special link with citizenship affects the secular character of the Constitution. And, of course, the second issue is one that has been discussed multiple times, and is there in the

petitions challenging this law, which is that there is no rational connection between the countries and communities singled out and the goal of protecting people from religious persecution. So, even if you take the goal at face value, it leaves out Rohingya Muslims in Myanmar, it leaves out Tamil Hindus in Sri Lanka and so on. So even within the subset of 'religiously persecuted people' from neighbouring countries, the CAA is irrational and exclusionary.

And Priya, what can you tell us about cases from other countries where similar laws have used religion as a basis for framing citizenship laws?

PP: The Refugee Convention article talks about what it means to be persecuted and what it means to be a refugee. And, by that logic and definition, you can assert that you were persecuted on the basis of religion, race, or a combination of factors, but it is not for the state to discriminate on these bases. So, your cause of persecution may vary, and it might just be religion, but the whole idea of non-discrimination on the part of the state is that it doesn't have the ability and cannot cater to those categories. If you say you're being persecuted on whatever basis, then it's incumbent on the state to ensure that there's humanitarian protection and you are granted certain protections within the context of the refugee regime. That's really the fundamental point that I would emphasise, looking at the Rohingya case specifically.

I'd also like to draw attention to that because India has 40,000 Rohingya within the country. There have been statements made by the government of India that they are going to be deported. And, of course, this is a case that is pending before the Supreme Court right now. The persecution there is on the basis of ethnicity, of religion. And it's very, very problematic to have the government say that they are going to send them back, given that the UN fact-finding mission has clearly articulated that there is evidence of the possibility of genocide. So, the CAA is a very, very problematic terrain.

Gautam, even before this law was brought, and a few years back, when there was a discussion about clearing a path to citizenship for certain communities from certain countries, there was also a discussion about how India doesn't have a proper policy on refugees. Is there a sort of legal history to this? Has this been challenged in the courts? Have there been attempts to get this in legislation?

GB: The problem is that the courts have been even more strident on this issue, in fact much more strident than the executive. So you have this judgment in 2005, Sarbananda Sonowal v Union of India, which according to me was the worst judgment in our history. It refers to migrants as this 'horde of people' streaming in from outside who constitute an external aggression onto the territory of India. So, I think that the courts have proven to be even more hostile to this entire issue than the [government]. And that's saying something, you know.

There has been a lot of discussion about the state's power to frame citizenship laws. Is this an absolute right?

PP: Absolutely not. There's a myth that state sovereignty is everything and state sovereignty is sort of fundamentally what dictates all these issues; but there is such a thing in international law called 'state responsibility' as well and the ability of the state is not unfettered.

India has signed a number of other international treaties and this means that there are international legal obligations on the state to ensure that fundamental principles such as non-discrimination are included within whatever laws the government frames. So, the argument that this is unfettered, that is completely untrue.

There needs to be a recognition that the legal norms that emanate from the obligations that states signed up to are also enforceable. I mean, traditionally, international law has always been seen as quite weak in terms of implementation and enforcement. But I would emphasise that there are a number of other legal avenues now that are opening up now. And, there are various committees that monitor these international conventions, and those are now gaining strength.

Have there been examples of international legal bodies actually intervening to place checks and balances on states, other countries enacting citizenship laws?

PP: Yes. The one example that I will give you, of course, links again to the Rohingya crisis right now. In

1982, Myanmar actually enacted a very discriminatory Citizenship Law, which excluded the Rohingya from a lot of basic rights and services, essentially created a system of apartheid within the country, and marginalised the Rohingya to an extreme extent.

Two weeks ago, the International Court of Justice (ICJ) was seized of a case brought by Gambia against Myanmar on the basis of the persecution of the Rohingya and allegations of genocide. And, I think is important to trace the evolution of the mass atrocities, hate speech and the persecution or the Rohingya Muslims to this pivotal point of a really discriminatory citizenship law. There is also a case moving forward at the International Criminal Court (ICC). And, in terms of other treaty bodies, they are also looking at inter-state disputes. So, there are multiple legal avenues and fora.

Assuming that this law does go forward, if you were able to write in a few amendments, what are the things that you would include?

GB: One is to adopt a national standard. And that should be the standard that the law follows. And second, I think there is a dichotomy in that we either look at people as 'illegal immigrants' or as citizens [but] there are a range of statuses that exist between those two - temporary work visas, long-term visas and so

So, we need to expand the conversation on migration to beyond this binary of 'illegal immigrants' and citizens. I think under the new law, I would definitely have a number of provisions that deal with the reality of economic migration, other kinds of migration and the appropriate statuses that go with that.

PP: Honestly, I would just echo that. And, I would just add one more thing, given that this is about prosecution and engaging refugees and the norms around refugees. This is an opportunity for the government to actually sign up to the Refugee Convention as well as the protocol and the Statelessness Convention and, you know, show that it is serious about this issue beyond the narrow optics that are currently playing out right now.

Disrupting the gender-blind political discourse in India

Affirmative action can empower more women

India is believed to be resolutely moving forward as an economic entity. Not even the currently slowing growth takes away from this perception. Added to this is a celebration of the Constitution undergirding our democracy. So here, it would seem, is a country forging ahead economically while upholding freedoms for its people. Recent reports of gruesome assaults on women, involving rape and ending with murder, have jolted this narrative.

Democracy in India is directly impugned when the accused men allegedly receive protection from the ruling dispensation, as is the case in Uttar Pradesh, or when the police force fails to protect women, as was the case in Telangana. In a democracy where the political class deploys identity politics to capture power, it is striking that not only is the case of women left scrupulously untouched, their very existence is in-

creasingly under threat from misogyny in society. When a society adopts democracy as its form of

governance, it presumes

the beginning of a social transformation. It is acknowledged that this should entail the elimination of religiously endorsed privileges, the end-

ing of domination by some over others and a general ushering in of equality of opportunity. This process is abetted by economic growth and the emergence of markets, which enable people to shed the constraints that have held them back. This is a more or less universal trajectory, though it first occurred in Western democracies.

Emancipation movements

While this process took a long time, it gathered speed after the Second World War when an economic boom unleashed emancipation movements, particularly in the U.S., which had as their focus black rights, feminism and sexual liberation. Why has India not had anything even close, movements that constitute the social transformation that must accompany democracy if the latter is to achieve its ends? This is often answered by re-

course to the 'fatalistic attitude bred by Indian culture'. This we see to be false when we recognise the differentiation whereby not everyone is at the receiving end, most evident in the case of violence against women.

It is difficult to think of any part of the world where historic inequity has been removed entirely through the agency of the oppressed. An end to the most overt forms of domination of women in the U.S. came after at least half a century of education, which enabled women to imagine a life crafted by themselves. Education further enabled them to be economically independent, sloughing off the patriarchal norm that had bound

Role of the public sector

The greater part of the spread of education in the U.S. was through public school system. By comparison, in India, very little of the myriad public

policy interventions has been directed towards women's empowerment. stop attending school due to the absence of functioning toilets there and women drop out of the labour force as they do not feel

safe when travelling to work. This also restrains economic progress.

The empowerment of religion via 'Indian secularism' and a caste-laden political discourse has served to keep out a public discussion of the 'women's question' in India. It is not difficult to see that India's politics as 'honour among men' leaves patriarchy secure from challenge. The opposition of caste-based political parties to the Women's Reservation Bill only reflects this. They have no credible argument and rely solely on their numbers in a fractured polity. Affirmative action aimed at a far greater inclusion of women in India's institutions of governance, especially the police and the judiciary, is central to ending the violence against women. India's gender-blind political discourse needs disruption.

Total eclipse of the heart

When a spectacle in the skies left the spectators transformed

Fatehpur Sikri, Akbar's famed capital, added one more page to its rich history when it became the "observatory" for sky-gazers, scientists and photojournalists to watch a total solar eclipse.

On October 24, 1995, the date of one such eclipse, the weather-man had brought glad tidings: Chances of a stray rain were as slim as a quark. The winter fog was a few months away. Smog was not yet in our dictionary. There was little else to expect. Internet was in its nascency, restricted to chunky computers with tortoise-quick modems.

More significantly, there was no Google to quickly ferret out information and sound wiser before the event. My attitude towards the event lay somewhere between plain curiosity and nervous anticipation. It was a first for me, and I

did not have the luxury of being just a casual watcher. It was an assignment and I had to take images of the spectacle to my publication back in Delhi.

Being prepared

So, I treated it as I would any other assignment, making the necessary preparations. In this case, it meant hitting Fatehpur Sikri much before the crack of dawn, to get a sense of the trajectory of the sun before the drama unfolded.

Settling down with my equipment on a high platform within the ruins of Fatehpur Sikri complex, I could see Panch Mahal, over which the sun would sail. The eclipse would start a few seconds after 7.24 a.m. The tripodmounted camera with its telephoto had been primed for the occasion. It was the day of the 'film', when the option of sneak peeks to see if the images were com-

ing right was yet-unthinka-



ble. I had chosen to shoot

the eclipse on the then-revered Kodak Tri-X 400. A few minutes into the eclipse, I realised that I was being rudely thrust into the unknown. Suddenly, I was forced to be as conscious of what was happening on terra firma as I was of the spectacle in the skies. There was feathered anxiety around me, as panic-driven birds were rushing back to their nests in the trees around. Once the birds settled in, silence spread its wings across Fatehpur Sikri. The only sounds heard were the

whirs of cameras.

erately-lit sky. At 8.34 a.m., the sun vanished behind the moon, as it if were camera-shy, and the sky became ominously-dark, and not just for the birds. The whole of Fatehpur Sikri was enveloped in a quiet I was not prepared for. As I took it all in, my breathing

became shallow. Many seconds later, the famed diamond ring phenomenon took place. From down on the ground, it did look like a giant diamond ring. Very soon after this, there were a series of flashes in the sky. They were all rays of the sun escaping towards the earth from behind the moon, and then, a crescent of the sun began to become visible. That was when I saw something beautiful that perhaps only such a celestial event can trigger in humans – even strangers were making a preternatural connection by exchanging hugs, their differences eclipsed by a

rare sense of awe.

FIFTY YEARS AGO DECEMBER 27, 1969

Malayalam dialects

A survey recently completed by the Kerala University Department of Linguistics has helped identify 12 major dialect regions in Kerala in respect of Malayalam as spoken by a single community alone, the Ezhavas/Tiyyas. The report said that these dialect regions had at least 25 sub-dialects due to criss-crossing of "Isoglosses" and this number of major and minor dialect regions astonishingly tallied with the number of major and minor kingdoms in Kerala during the late medieval period. The complexity in dialects is attributed to the political heterogeneity. The three-year project was taken up in 1965 with aid from the University Grants Commission. Among the Indian languages, it is for Malayalam alone that such an exhaustive survey of dialects based on a single community has been completed. Among the major gains of the project are: The marking out precisely for the first time in the history of Malayalam studies the dialect boundaries and the sub dialect regions in each major dialect area; listing the isogloss terms distinguishing one dialect region from another; completion of six dialect grammars, four of which have been submitted as Ph.D. dissertations and the other two also to be presented likewise shortly; compilation of a dialect dictionary of over 3,000 items.

LONDON: In the House of Commons on the motion for adjournment, Mr. Wedgwood raised the Amritsar case. He denounced what had happened in the strongest terms and declared that it had destroyed our good reputation. He urged the necessity for having a perfectly independent enquiry. Mr. Wedgwood accused General Dyer of destroying Mr. Montagu's efforts to bring about complete co-operation between the people of England and India. Mr. Montagu interposed and condemned Mr. Wedgwood's action in dealing with matters which were subjudice. On the restructuring of the Railway Board, Mr. Yadav said it was a long-pending reform suggested by many

committees. Following Cabinet approval earlier this week, the new restructured Railway Board will consist of one CRB/CEO and four members on functional basis -Member Infrastructure, Member Rolling Stock & Traction, Member Operation & Business Develop ment and Member Finance.

"Independent Members will be inducted in Railway Board as non-executive Members who will be in advisory role. They will not be involved in day-to-day functioning of Railways...The idea to unify all eight services of the Indian Railways into one service namely the Indian Railways Management Service, is to break the departmentalism and make officers work in cohesion for the development of Railways," an official release said.

Mr Yadav said only officers of the Indian Railways will be considered for the post of CEO, "Secondly, career growth of Indian Railways officers is assured. No officer of Indian Railways shall be at disadvantage in this new restructured service," he said.

'Better coordination'

The Railway Board Chairman added that offering apex level to the General Managers is a step to empower them for a better coordination with State authorities to take decisions swiftly and independently.

"This will enable the Railway Board to concentrate on policy framing, strategic planning and coordination of Zonal Railways," he said.

Grand alliance in a flux in Bihar

Ahead of election in 2020, Manjhi-led HAM(S) has been keeping it on edge

More trouble over MVA Cabinet expansion

Cong. likely to demand Deputy CM post

The Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government's troubles over Cabinet expansion seem to be far from over.

With a possibility that the Home Ministry may go back to the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP), a section within the Congress is now reportedly staking claim to Deputy Chief Ministership saying the allotted portfolios to the party are not satisfactory.

Asked whether the party is unhappy over the allotted portfolios, Maharashtra Congress president and Revenue Minister Balasaheb Thorat said: "It is natural for every party to wish for important departments. At the same time it has to be taken into account that there are three parties in this government. It is possible that someone would feel different

about the portfolio distribution." The MVA government, he added, works as per the Common Minimum Program (CMP) and will continue to do so.

As per the initial understanding between the three parties, NCP would get to keep the deputy CM's post with Home going to Shiv Sena. However, recent reports have indicated that the Sena may also give Home to the NCP. This, a section within the Congress fears, would make the NCP too powerful.

"There is a thought within the Congress that if this change happens, then the party must demand a Deputy Chief Ministership for itself. This government survives only if three parties are happy and there is no point in making one of the three grumpy," said a senior Congress leader on condition of anonymity.

Officials of the National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Thursday raided the residence of Assam peasant leader Akhil Gogoi as well as the office of his organisation, Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti (KMSS), in Guwahati.

The three-hour raid preceded the production of Mr. Gogoi before the NIA's special court in Guwahati. It rejected the plea for further NIA custody and sent him to 14 days' judicial custody.

The police arrested Mr. Gogoi, who was leading an anti-Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA) movement, from eastern Assam's Jorhat on December 12. He was brought to Guwahati where the police registered a case against him the following

He was handed over to the NIA, which arrested him on December 16 and flew

him to Delhi. It brought him back to Guwahati on Wednesday for production in

An NIA team started the search operation at Mr. Gogoi's residence in the Nizarapar locality at 7 a.m. and another one raided the KMSS office in the Gandhihasti area

Files seized

The NIA teams reportedly seized files containing documents relating to the NHPC Mr Gogoi has been vocal against the 2000 MW Lower Subansiri Hydroelectric Project on the Assam-Arunachal Pradesh border - and other issues. His laptop, identification and bank documents were also seized, his wife Geetashree Tamuly

The NIA has charged Mr Gogoi, who has earlier been arrested on charges of sedition, under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act.

'UPA-era NPR's focus was residency, not citizenship'

Chidambaram says the key difference lies in proposed NRC

Former Union Home Minister and Congress MP P. Chidambaram has said that the emphasis of the National Population Register (NPR) in 2010 by the UPA government was on "residency" and not "citizenship". The BJP on Wednesday

released a video clip of the launch of the NPR in 2010, where Mr. Chidambaram says an exercise like this has not been attempted anywhere in the world.

In response, Mr. Chidambaram sought to highlight the differences in the UPAera NPR and the present version through a series of tweets.

"We were enumerating the 'usual residents' of the country. The emphasis is on residency not citizenship," The NPR was to aid the preparation of the 2011 census, he said. "Every usual resident was to be enumerated irrespective of his or her religion or place of birth."

The most important difference between the two was that there was no mention of the National Register of Citizens (NRC) in the UPAera exercise.

Pilot project

At a press conference held in the Congress headquarters, Ajay Maken, who was the Minister of State in Home Affairs in charge of the NPR, said the exercise was first started in 2003 by the first NDA government under Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee.

Twelve States and a Union Territory, with a total population of 31 lakh persons, were picked for a pilot project. When the UPA came to power, the pilot project was on. The idea

was finally shelved on the advice of a committee of secretaries, he said. Mr. Maken said the funda-

mental difference between the NPR and the NRC was that the population register was only to enumerate "usual residents", which was defined by the United Nations as anyone who had been living the majority of days, which was a little over six months, at the place of enumeration.

He said the UPA-era NPR would not have led to the NKC unlike what the present government wanted to do.

"I am saying again and again that following the NRC is a second step which we never intended to take," he said.

The 2003 amendment to the Citizenship Act said that the government "may" compulsorily register all citizens. "We never converted into 'shall' and we will never convert it into 'shall' because we know the complexities," he added.

Gujarat battles locust swarms with pesticides

Centre has rushed 11 teams to assist

As insects swarm farms in north Gujarat gobbling up crops, the State government has initiated an elaborate pesticide spraying operation in affected areas as it battles to counter the massive locust attack

The State administration, with the help of the central government, has constituted more than 30 teams to spray pesticides in villages in Banaskantha, which is the worst affected district, and neighbouring Patan and Sabarkantha.

"To tackle the menace, 11 central teams have arrived in Gujarat," a senior officer from the Ministry of Agriculture said. "They will take all necessary steps, including spraying of pesticides, to contain the attack. The teams will remain in the State until the problem is solved," the officer added.

On Thursday, Gujarat's Additional Chief Secretary (Agriculture) P.K. Parmar told mediapersons that the State had formed 30 teams
