'NO CAUSE FOR FEAR... NO INDIAN CAN BE DENIED CITIZENSHIP WITH CAA'

Will consult states before NRC... may or may not use NPR data for it: Law Minister

SPEAKING ABOUT the contentious Citizenship (Amendment) Act and the National Register of Citizens (NRC) plan that have sparked protests across the country, Union Law Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad has said that a "proper legal process" will be followed for a nation-wide NRC, including consultation with state governments, and that "some" data collected for the National Population Register (NPR) "may or may not be used" for the NRC.

His remarks, in a detailed interview to The Sunday Express, assume significance as more than half-a-dozen state governments, including Bihar, led by BIP ally JD(U), have opposed implementation of a nation-wide NRC. At least two have also said they won't allow the NPR as it might lead to an NRC.

In an interview to ANI last week. Union Home Minister Amit Shah said the NPR and NRC were governed by different laws and NPR data would never be used for the NRC exercise. "There is no connection between the two processes, nor can they be used in each other's survey," he said.

Asked when the NRC would be implemented, Prasad told *The* Sunday Express, "A position has to be taken. There is a legal process. First a decision, second a notification, then the process, the verification, the objection,

the hearing of the objection, right of appeal. There will be a consultation with the state government, feedback will be taken. If anything is to be done, it will be done publicly. Nothing will be a secret on an NRC."

He also reiterated that the NRC conducted in Assam was on the Supreme Court's directives.

On documents that would be acceptable for a nation-wide NRC, Prasad said no decision had been taken on this. "This guestion is entirely academic. When the process will start under Rule 3 and Rule 4 of The Citizenship (Registration of Citizen and Issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003, then there will be a proper public declaration of that."

The Law Minister slammed the Congress and senior leader P Chidambaram for protesting against CAA and the NRC, saying that it was the former **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2**

A WAR of words erupted between the Congress and Uttar Pradesh government on Saturday as party general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, who was in Lucknow to participate in the Congress foundation day function, claimed she was roughed up by police in a bid to

stop her from meeting the family of a retired IPS officer who was arrested on December 19 during protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act.

Priyanka walked some distance and later rode pillion with a party leader on scooter to reach the home of SR Darapuri. While she said she was grabbed by the neck and fell down, police denied this.

The Congress lodged an offi-

cial complaint on the "breach" in the security of the party leader, and against Hazratgani Circle Officer Abhay Mishra and other police personnel over their "misconduct". The party also wrote a letter to the CRPF IG, Delhi.

Around 5 pm, soon after Priyanka had left the state party headquarters for Darapuri's residence, Deputy SP Archana Singh intercepted her cavalcade and CONTINUED ON PAGE 2

Govt soothes banks over harassment by to meet dairies to review milk CBI: 'Won't go after stocks, prices genuine decisions'

Notices will carry registration number, agency won't take up suo motu cases

IN AN attempt to allay concerns of harassment by investigative agencies, the government on Saturday assured that honest commercial decisions taken by bankers would be protected and said that a system would be put in place for handling fraud cases.

Announcing a mechanism whereby notices issued by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) to banks will carry a registration number to avoid any scope for unauthorised communication and consequent harassment, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said, "Banks have gone through a slightly worrying period wherein decision making was getting difficult because of fear of 3Cs (CBI, CVC, CAG). There was concern and bona fide decisions are not being made by banks because of what they would say undue harassment, uncalled for harassment happens because of these agencies

THE MOVE to build in more accountability while initiating investigative action against bankers follows up on an earlier step where the government had directed investigative agencies to carry out a preliminary examination to ascertain whether a case of bank loan turning into NPA was the result of a criminal conspiracy or a bonafide commercial decision. Over a dozen officials of commercial banks and the RBI are facing inquiries by the CBI and ED.

notices by tax officials and to ensure audit trail of all such communications. Till November 11 5.33 crore communications with DIN have been issued by the Income Tax Department.

It was also decided at the meeting that no case involving banks would go to the CBI without the banks themselves deciding to send it.

"Bharat mere desh ka naam, mein iska rakhwala. Hai koi aisa jo mere saamne aane wala (Bharat is my country, I am its guardian. Is there anyone who can face me)?" an elderly Mohammed Yunus recites, chewing betel nut, gathered around a fire with a group of men his age on a chilly evening in village Amheda in Bijnor district. When he stops, Nafis Ahmed breaks into a song, "Bharat ke Tirange par meri jaannisaar hai (I dedicate my life to the Tricolour)."

The choice of the songs or poem during the course of a discussion on the Citizenship (Amendment) Act and NRC is perhaps not incidental in a region where uncertainty runs high over the two, and where a police crackdown on protests has left the Muslim community on the edge.

Over 60 km from Amheda, at Ihal Chittoda village in Muzaffarnagar, where too a group is gathered around a fire,

FIR against SHO, five other cops for Bijnor death during protests

AN FIR has been lodged against six policemen, including the then Station House Officer of Nahtaur police station, Rajesh Singh Solanki, over the death of 20-year-old Mohammad Suleiman in UP's Bijnor district during the protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act.

Satya Prakash Singh, who replaced Solanki as SHO, told The Sunday Express that apart from Solanki, local outpost in-charge Ashish Tomar, constable Mohit Kumar and three other "unidentified" policemen have been named in the FIR filed by Suleiman's brother Shoaib.

Singh said the FIR has been registered under IPC Sections 302 (murder), 147 (rioting), 148 (rioting, armed with deadly weapon) and 149 (every member of unlawful assembly guilty of offence committed in prosecution of common object).

Singh said Solanki has now been transferred to the District Crime Record Bureau (DCRB).

is living his own dream — pro-

viding basic education for free to

slum dwellers. Last year, Aneeta cleared the Class 3 exam under the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) curriculum and is appearing for her Class 5 exam in four months. With her threeyear-old daughter and five-yearold son in tow, Aneeta attends classes for three hours, besides learning basic computer skills and typing at another class in Jindal's home in the evening.

"My father sells fish in the market near the slum. Though I always wanted to study, I could never do that. Now I want to study till Class 10 at least. If I can get a job in an office with my computer skills, my dream will fully come true," she says.

Jindal says his initiative got

going sometime in March 2014, when he noticed the slum children during his morning cycling

rounds. "Initially, I used to take ladoos and chocolates for them. After about six months, I started reading out to them — stories and the daily newspapers. In December that year, I started teaching them the alphabets and basic counting using pieces of debris and chalk for about an hour every day. Initially, only five of them came," says Jindal, who takes up civil and criminal cases in the district courts and the Punjab

and Haryana High Court. Today, six students from his

school, including Aneeta, have cleared their Class 3 exams with A and B grades. "In March 2020, 11 of my students will appear for their open school exams — six for Class 5 and five for Class 3. A senior secondary school 5 km away is the exam centre," says Jindal. From a strength of one, the

staff at the "slum school" now include three part-timers who teach from Monday to Saturday, and two computer instructors **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2**
