Last year, the senior India selector Jatin Paranjpe travelled to Mysuru for a Ranji Trophy game despite a bad back, because he wanted to watch a certain young Karnataka batsman in action. It is fair to presume Paranjpe walked away from the Gangotri Glades duly impressed. For Devdutt Padikkal offered a glimpse of his bountiful talent on debut, stroking his way to an attractive 77 in the second innings.

If that was a sample of his potential, the 19-year-old has delivered a full batch this season, topping the run charts in both the Vijay Hazare Trophy (609 runs, 67.66 avg.) and the Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy (580 runs, 64.44

away, I am looking to concentrate more and get back to the game," he told reporters. "It is just about batting long."

Delightful freedom

In the Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy, Padikkal played with a delightful freedom, attacking from the outset, and finishing with a strike-rate in excess of 175. The tall left-hander hits sixes with what seems like minimum effort; he struck 33 of them during the tournament, 11 more than anyone else.

The former Karnataka captain R. Vinay Kumar, who handed Padikkal his Ranji Trophy debut in Mysuru, was never in any doubt about his ability. "The way he was tim-

ing the ball in that second innings in Mysuru, he never looked like a youngster to me," Vinay told *The Hindu*. "That day I felt, 'This guy will make it very big.' He looked ready for the next level. He is fearless. He is totally dominating the bowling. It won't be long before we see another Karnataka player in the Indian team."

Bergamasco betting big on young talent

Says a star like Mary comes only once in about a 100 years

She is the biggest name in boxing but she's 36 and may not hang around for long. The search is now on for girls who could step into M.C. Mary Kom's shoes.

Raffaele Bergamasco, the High Performance Director for Indian women's boxing, feels that there are plenty of talented girls in the country but it will not be easy to take over from 'Magnificent Mary', the six-time World

"Mary is a very big name, something like Maradona in football. Talent like that comes only once in about a hundred years. We may not have a girl who could be another Mary but we have a very talented bunch of young boxers," said Bergamasco in a chat with *The Hindu* on the sidelines of the Elite National women's championship here on Monday evening.

Before taking over as the

HPD early last year, Bergamasco had worked wonders as India's national youth coach, a role which now offers him a chance to pick out the ones who could do well in fature.

"There are a number of talented girls among the youth bunch. Nitu and S. Kalaivani (48kg), Nikhat Zareen, Jyoti (Gulia) in 51kg, Manisha and Sakshi (57kg) are all good.

"And then we have Simranjit Kaur, though she is not a young girl she is performing very well now, Lovlina (Borgohain) and Pooja Rani," said the Italian who hails from Napoli.

Bergamasco has been travelling around the country hunting for young talent. "I went to Rohtak for their youth and junior championships, there are some girls who are very promising," he said.

"Also, the mentality of the girls towards sport has changed. Earlier they thought that boxing was a way to find jobs and support their families. And once they joined Railways or Police, they finished their career but now step by step, they have changed that mentality, they want to win gold in big competitions like the Olympics."

A former multiple Italian national champion, Bergamasco mixes the European and Asian style of boxing for Indians.

"Asia is very strong in women's boxing and Indian boxers have a very strong heart, they are very strong in their boxing but they have to work on their footwork. They understand this because when you combine speed with strong punches, the mix will carry you far."

Neeraj provisionally suspended

Neeraj, an India Open champion in women's 57kg, has been provisionally suspended for testing positive for anabolic agent LGD-4033 (ligandrol).

As part of its pre-Olympic testing drive, the National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA) collected Neeraj's sample during an out-of-competition test at the Indira Gandhi Stadium in Delhi on September 24. The adverse analytical finding report, dated November 3, was received from the anti-doping

laboratory of Qatar.

"Neeraj was notified by NADA about the violation of anti-doping rules 2015 of NADA and suspended provisionally with effect from November 13," said a NADA Facebook post on Monday.

"Neeraj presented herself on November 27 in NADA office and submitted a letter, wherein she accepted the Asample result and requested not to conduct B-sample testing at the laboratory. As requested by her, the case is referred to the anti-doping disciplinary panel for expe-

dited hearing."
Twenty-four-year-old

Neeraj, who secured a bronze in the prestigious Strandja memorial event in Bulgaria in February and participated in the World championships in Ulan-Ude, Russia, in October, was among the core probables for the Tokyo Olympics.

"NADA intends to conduct pre-Olympic dope testing of all core probables so that only clean athletes are deputed for Olympic Games," said the statement.

India had earlier opened its medal account with one gold, two silver and a

Adarsha M.N. Sinimol gave India the first gold by winning the men's individual triathlon while Bishworjit Srikhom took the silver in a 1-2 finish for the country.

Thoudam Sorojini Devi and Mohan Pragnya added a silver and a bronze in the women's individual event.

The individual triathlon event consists of continuous three legs of 750m swim, 20km bike race and a 5km run.

Sinimol clocked 01:02.51 to win the gold in the men's event while Bishworjit was second in 01:02:59.

In the women's individual event, Sorojini timed 01:14:00 to finish second behind Sony Gurung of Nepal.

Rifle and pistol Nationals from Dec. 7

The men's air pistol is set to run for nine days

The 63rd National shooting championship for rifle and pistol is scheduled to be held at the Madhya Pradesh Shooting Academy in Goregaon, Bhopal, from December 7 to Jan. 4, 2020.

With the overall entries scheduled to break all record and touch around 10,000, and with limited firing points, some of the events are slated to run from six to nine days.

The men's air rifle final is set for Dec. 13, after the event starts with the official training on Dec. 7. It will be followed by mixed air rifle on Dec. 14. The men's rifle 3-position final will be on Dec. 18,

the same as 25m sports pistol for women.

The women's air rifle final will be on Dec. 19. The men's and women's finals in air events will also be followed by the finals in the junior and youth sections on the same day. The women's air pistol final will be on Dec. 24, along with the men's 25m rapid fire pistol. On Christmas, the mixed air pistol final will be staged as also the women's rifle 3-position final.

The non-Olympic events like rifle prone for men and women, apart from free pistol, will be held from Dec. 12 to 29. The men's air pistol is expected to beat all records as it is set to run for nine days from Dec. 27 for the qualifica-

tion process, and the final will be held on Jan. 4.

The standard pistol and centre fire pistol events will be held from Dec. 28 to Jan. 1. Considering the examination for students, the National Rifle Association of India (NRAI) has announced that it would adjust the qualification dates for shooters, provided they apply for the same with their examination schedule and admit card, latest by Dec. 5.

The shooters would also be allowed to exchange their positions with same State shooters in different batches of the same event if they are able to justify their request with supporting documents by Dec. 5.
