Tamil orator booked over 'provocative remarks'





Pune: Many rose in protest against Citizen (Amendment) Act (CAA), National Register of Citizens (NRC) and National Population Register (NPR) in the last two weeks, students in their early twenties stood out as they took the lead with the help of different social organisations and groups. Afroz Mulla, a 23-year-old final year law student of Abdul Kadir Khan New Law Academy, said, "We organised these protests

With 9 rallies in 2 weeks, Mamata seeks to emerge as pivot of protest

IN HER bid to checkmate the BJP in West Bengal on the new citizenship law and proposed NRC (National Register of Citizens), TMC chief Mamata Banerjee, who has hit the streets nine times in the last fortnight, is also trying to emerge as the central political pivot of the anti-CAA, NRC protest on the national level.

Besides promising to give Rs 5 lakh to the families of the two men killed in the protests in Mangaluru after the BIP government in Karnataka, withheld the announced compensation, her party leaders also met the families of those arrested in Lucknow in connection with the violent protests there and expressed full support to them.

Banerjee's protest marches and rallies, which have become a recurrent event in the state, in their sights and sounds highlight Bengali cultural traits with a message of secularism and unity. Even choices of starting points and endpoints of her street marches are strategically chosen — like Swami Vivekananda's ancestral house. Rabindranath Tagore's Jorasanko Thakurbari among others.

In the protest marches or padavatra, besides "intellectuals". representatives of religious bodies — Hindus, Muslims, Sikhs, Buddhists — walk with her. Symbols of Bengali culture, such as women in sarees blowing

Meerut police announce reward for info on 'shooters'

MEERUT POLICE have announced a reward of Rs 20,000 to anyone giving information about the three men, who, they said, fired at policemen during the protests against the new citizenship law and proposed NRC on December 20.

At least five persons were killed with firearm wounds during the protest. The police had earlier said that while they had fired in the air but no one was killed in police firing. Several policemen were also injured in the protest.

According to police, three men have been spotted in CCTV footages with their faces covered firing on police with countrymade guns. Police said that one of them have been identified as Faizal, a resident of Kareem Nagar in Nauchandi area of Meerut, while the identity of the remaining two has not been disclosed. Police also raided Faizal's home late Monday evening.

Police have so far registered 14 FIRs at four police stations — Nauchandi, Kotwali, Brahmpuri and Lisadi Gate — and around 180 people have been named in them. At least 15 people have been arrested so far.

NRC office prepares status report, all eyes on SC hearing

AUTHORITIES AT the National Register of Citizens (NRC) in Assam are preparing a status report of the work done so far to be submitted to the Registrar General of India (RGI) even as all eyes are on the Supreme Court hearing on January 6 to decide the future course of action.

Assam's new NRC coordinator Hitesh Dev Sarma said, "The priority right now is to prepare a status report for the RGI on the work that has been done till now. In less than a week from now, it will be prepared."

The final NRC published on August 31 excluded 19 lakh people but the rejection order has not been issued for five months now. Those excluded will be able to file appeals against their exclusion at the Foreigners' Tribunals only with the rejection order specifying the cause of re-

Without specifying the date for issuance of rejection orders, Sarma said that work will proceed according to directions of the Supreme Court in the next hearing.

The fate of the Assam NRC has been in limbo after Home Minister Amit Shah told Parliament in November that a fresh NRC for Assam would be conducted along with a nationwide NRC. But Prime Minister Narendra Modi has distanced his government from pan-India NRC following massive protests across India against the new citizenship law and the proposed nationwide NRC.

However, the Assam government has said that if a pan-India NRC does not happen then the

state will approach the Supreme Court and the NRC in its present will not be accepted under any circumstance.

On December 23, Assam Finance Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said that the Assam government's plea for re-verification of the names included in NRC is still with the Supreme Court along with several petitions filed by organisations such as All Assam Students' Union (AASU) and Assam Public Works (APW).

"The next hearing of the case is on January 6. Whatever the SC says on that day, we will work according to that," NRC coordinator Sarma said.

Sarma's appointment followed the departure of his predecessor Prateek Hajela, a 1995batch IAS officer of the Assam-Meghalaya cadre, who led the NRC preparation exercise as the state coordinator since 2013. On October 18, the Supreme Court ordered an intercadre transfer of Hajela to Madhya Pradesh after his relationship with the state government deteriorated.

But Sarma's appointment led to a political controversy, primarily due to his political views expressed on social media. "That in pursuant to the various controversial posts as shared by Mr Dev Sarma in social media against a particular community, it is not desirable to appoint such a biased person to handle a highly sensitive position," Congress's Barpeta MP Abdul Khaleque wrote to the Governor of Assam "If Dev Sarma is at the helm of affair there is every likelihood that the process of such re-verification and other incidental activities would be done in a biased manner.'

V-C regrets police action, assures students of safety

AMU VICE-CHANCELLOR Tariq

Mansoor on Tuesday regretted police action during the anti-CAA protest on campus on December 15 night and sought to assure students of their safety and right to protest peacefully. Prof Mansoor gave the assur-

ance to students and their parents in an open letter, written before the varsity reopens on January 6 after its winter break. "I want to tell you and your families that I regret what happened (on December 15)," the V-C wrote.

Referring to the decision to call in police on December 15, he said it was taken in "good faith and a

clear conscience" as it had become imperative to disperse protesters who had become charged up over a rumour that two student protesters at Jamia Millia Islamia in New Delhi had been killed. The V-C appealed to students

"to consider with an open mind" the circumstances that compelled him to take the unpleasant decision of inviting the police to enter the campus. Prof Mansoor wrote that he would "fully share" their concerns on any subject provided it is done "in a peaceful and democratic manner". The V-C also assured the stu-

dents of their "safety and wellbeing when the university reopens" and sought their support in completing the academic year smoothly.

Large turnout expected for 202nd anniversary of Battle of Bhima Koregaon, security in place

HEAVY SECURITY arrangements have been put in place near the Jaystambh in Perne village in Pune district, as lakhs of people are expected to gather at the war memorial to pay their respects on the 202nd anniversary of the Battle of Bhima Koregaon, on January 1.

People from different parts of the state have already started camping in the area.

As per the Dalit narrative, 500 Mahar soldiers, who were part of the British Army, defeated a 25,000-strong force of Peshwas (who were Brahmins), in the Battle of Bhima Koregaon. Lakhs of members of Mahar and other communities visit the Jaystambh on January 1 to pay their respects. They believe that Mahar soldiers in the British Army fought a "war for freedom"

against the alleged castiesm of the Peshwas.

Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar is known to have visited the Jaystambh on January 1, 1927, where he made a speech against a British policy enacted later, which banned the entry of Mahars into the British Army.

As the Jaystambh became a crucial site for the Ambedkarite movement, the number of people visiting the war memorial on January 1 every year went up significantly.

Two years earlier, on the 200th anniversary of the battle, violence had broken out in the area. Clashes between different communities left one person dead and several others injured. Multiple cases have been filed over the violence and the then state government, headed by Devendra Fadnavis, had set up a probe commission to ascertain the sequence of events that led to it.

A year after the violence, on the 201st battle anniversary on

January 1 this year, an estimated eight to ten lakh people from across the state and country visited the Jaystambh, said police sources. This included a signficant number of 'first-time visi-

tors', they said. Programmes to mark the anniversary, held amid intense police security, remained peaceful. This year, an equally large

number of visitors are expected at Jaystambh, and the administration has made several arrangements for them. "Various amenities, facilities and safety measures have been

put in place by the administration and the police. The ground deployment of over 5,000 policemen will be overseen by 10 additional superintendents, 30 deputy superintendents and 400 police officers.

An additional 12 companies of the State Reserve Police Force and nearly 2,000 volunteers will take the total deployment strength to 10,000," said Inspector General of Police, Kolhapur Range. Suhas Warke.

He added, "Fourteen parking spaces have been made available and the entire region is under CCTV surveillance. A close watch

is being kept on social media and phone messenger platforms ... the administration and police force are prepared for peaceful conduct of the event.

Several stalls and pandals belonging to various Dalit social and political organisations have been set up near the Jaystambh and surrounding areas, and programmes have been planned for the occasion.

Prominent Dalit leaders including Prakash Ambedkar of Vanchit Bahujan Aghadi, Anandraj Ambedkar of Republican Sena, Ramdas Athawale of Republican Party of India (A), Jogendra Kawade of People's Republican Party, MP Amar Sable of BJP, and local leaders of Bhim Army, BAMCEF and other outfits are expected to visit

the Jaystambh on January 1. Security has also been strengthened at the historic Vadhu Budruk village, located about five km from Koregaon Bhima.

Thrashed by BJP workers near JU campus, claims professor

A JADAVPUR University (JU) teacher has alleged that she was "roughed up" by a few women members of the BJP near the varsity campus for protesting against the disparaging remarks made against the institute and a particular community.

The BJP leadership, however, denied any involvement in the incident and said several "ultra-Left supporters" had staged agitation in the vicinity of a party meeting, near the campus, on Monday, but its workers maintained restraint.

Doyeeta Majumder also said that she has filed a complaint with police.

A senior police officer said barricades were put up between the members of two groups as they "engaged in sloganeering and counter-sloganeering".
