
Xi voices firm support for Myanmar

33 deals signed during the final day of the visit by the Chinese President; leader also meets Suu Kyi

China's Xi Jinping doubled down on his support for fallen rights icon Aung San Suu Kyi on Saturday, signing dozens of infrastructure and trade deals and meeting with the Myanmar Army chief accused of overseeing a genocide against Rohingya Mus-The Chinese President's state visit to Myanmar's purpose-built capital came as Western investors give a wide berth to the country due to the Rohingya crisis.

A 2017 military crackdown on the minority, which UN investigators called genoforced around 7,40,000 people from western Rakhine state over the border into Bangladesh. Beijing has stood by the increasingly isolated nation and reaffirmed its position in a joint statement in Chinese state media as Mr. Xi's plane left the capital after two days, escorted by fighter jets. China "firmly supports

Myanmar's efforts to safeguard its legitimate rights and interests and national dignity in the international arena" and for it to advance "peace, stability and development in Rakhine State".

Largest investor

The Asian giant is now Myanmar's largest investor even as distrust of its ambitions lingers among the public.

More than 30 agreements were signed Saturday on Mr. Xi's final day of his visit with Ms. Suu Kyi and Mr. Xi seated across from each other on long tables alongside related Ministers.

Details were scant but among the 33 deals was a concession and shareholders agreement on the \$1.3 billion Kyaukhphyu deep-sea port and economic zone, located in a part of Rakhine State left largely unscathed by the 2017 violence.

There was also a letter of intent for "new urban development" in Myanmar's biggest city Yangon and feasibility studies for rail links.

China-Myanmar corridor

The aim is to carve out a socalled "China-Myanmar Economic Corridor" - a path of infrastructure from China's landlocked south to Myanmar's western Rakhine state which would serve as Beijing's long-awaited gateway to the Indian Ocean.

The signing ceremony came between sit-down meetings with Ms. Suu Kyi and powerful Army chief Min Aung Hlaing, who was put under sanctions by the U.S. after being accused of masterminding the Rohingya crackdown.

Myanmar says it was defending itself against attacks by militants.

FB apologises for name gaffe

Facebook apologised on Saturday for a distasteful mistranslation of Chinese President Xi Jinping's name from Burmese language posts during his muchtouted visit to Myanmar.

The automatic translation feature on Myanmar's Facebook rendered the visiting President name from Burmese into English as "Mr S***hole". The error most notably

appeared on the official Facebook page of Myanmar's civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi. "Mr S***hole, President of China arrives at 4 PM,"

said a translated announ-

cement posted earlier

Saturday. "We sincerely apologise for the offense this has caused," Facebook said in

an emailed statement.

China reports four new cases caused by coronavirus strain

Nearly 50 people have been infected across the world

China reported four more cases of pneumonia believed to be caused by a new coronavirus strain, causing rising concern globally that a disease health officials do not yet fully understand could spread during a key holiday period.

The new virus, which was discovered in the central Chinese city of Wuhan, belongs in the same large family of coronaviruses that includes Severe Respiratory Syndrome (SARS), which killed nearly 800 people globally during a 2002/03 outbreak that also started in China.

Though experts say the new virus does not appear to be as lethal as SARS, there is little known about its origins and how easily it can spread. Thailand and Japan have confirmed new cases of the virus earlier this week, stok-

ing worries globally as many of the 1.4 billion Chinese people will travel abroad during the Lunar New Year holidays that begin next week.

Authorities around the world including in the United States, Thailand and South Korea have stepped up monitoring of travellers from Wuhan as part of their efforts to prevent the disease from spreading.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has also warned that a wider outbreak is possible, though it has advised against any travel restrictions for China.

Commission Health (WMHC) said on Saturday the four new individuals diagnosed with the new virus are in stable condition, adding it has confirmed 45 cases in the city as of Thursday. A day earlier, the commission confirmed the death of a second patient.

Nearly 50 people are now known to have been infected globally, but all of them either live in Wuhan or have travelled to the city.

A report published by the London Imperial College's MRC Centre for Global Infectious Disease Analysis said there are likely "substantially more cases" of the new coronavirus than currently announced by Wuhan authorities: its base scenario estimate is that there would be 1.723 cases showing onset of related symptoms by Jan. 12.

4 killed in Shabaab bomb attack near Mogadishu

Four people were killed in a car bombing in Somalia on Saturday that apparently targeted Turkish engineers working on a road near the capital Mogadishu, police and witnesses said. The attack was claimed by the Al-Qaeda-linked Islamist militant group Al-Shabaab, which has stepped up its activities in Somalia and neighbouring Kenya in recent weeks.

The bomb struck near the town of Afgoye about 30 km west of the capital, killing four people and wounding several others including several Turkish nationals, said local police officer Abdirahman Adan.

"The blast was huge, it destroyed a container used by the Turkish engineers who work on the Afgoye road construction," said witness Muhidin Yusuf.

"There were police who were guarding the Turkish engineers and several other people gathering near the checkpoint where the temporary shelter is located," said another witness Ahmed

Iran to send black boxes to Ukraine

Tehran to take assistance from experts in France, Canada and the U.S.

Iran is sending to Ukraine the black boxes of the Ukrainian passenger plane that its military accidentally shot down this month, Tasnim news agency reported on Saturday. The Iranian authorities are also prepared for experts from France, Canada and the United States to examine the data from the boxes, the semi-official news agency said.

All 176 people aboard the plane were killed when the Ukrainian International Air-

lines flight was shot down on January 8 shortly after takeoff from Tehran en route to the Ukrainian capital Kiev.

"With the use of the ex-

pertise of the countries of France, Canada and America we will try to read the (flight data recorder) in Kiev," Hassan Rezaifar, a director in charge of accident investigations at Iran's Civil Aviation Organisation was quoted as saying by Tasnim. "If this effort is unsuccessful then the black box will be sent to France." The black boxes will not be read in Iran, Mr.

Rezaifar said, according to Tasnim.

Fifty seven of the dead were Canadian. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, who has been pressing for a full inves-

tigation into the plane downing, said on Friday that Iran should send the black boxes to France for analysis. France was one of the few countries with the ability to read the flight and cockpit data recorders from the jet, which he said were badly damaged, Mr. Trudeau told a news conference in Ottawa.

Iran has faced a deepening crisis abroad and at home over the plane disaster, with authorities taking several days to announce that its military had accidentally shot the plane down.

Taliban aims to sign deal with U.S. by month-end

The Taliban is aiming to reach a withdrawal agreement with the U.S. by the end of January and is prepared to "scale down" military operations ahead of signing the deal, according to their chief spokesman.

The statement by Suhail Shaheen to Pakistani daily Dawn comes as the group and the U.S. held discussions in Doha this week, after insurgent sources said they had offered to initiate a brief ceasefire.

"We have agreed to scale down military operations in days leading up to the signing of the peace agreement with the United States," Mr. Shaheen told *Dawn* in a report that was published on Saturday.

He added that the Taliban was "optimistic" a deal with Washington could be signed before the end of the month and that the reduction in fighting across the country would also include the targeting of Afghan forces. "It's now a matter of days," said the spokesman.

This comes 2 years after racism claims marred the show

Actor Hank Azaria will no longer voice the Indian character Apu in The Simpsons, U.S. media reported, more than two years after accusations of racism marred the long-running animated series. Apu Nahasapeemapetilon is the manager of the show's Kwik-E-Mart convenience store and a mainstay of the TV comedy, which recently celebrated its 30th vear on air.

He is voiced by white actor Mr. Azaria, whose marked accent for the role has been criticised by viewers, who have also accused writers of using Indian stereotypes in their treatment of

the character. "What they're going to do with the character is their call," Mr. Azaria told U.S. film news website SlashFilm on Friday. "It's up to them and they haven"t sorted it out yet. All we've agreed on is I won't do the voice anymore." Creators of The Simpsons found themselves under fire in late 2017 with the release of a docu-

mentary by comedian Hari Kondabolu, who interviewed fellow entertainers of Indian and South Asian origin to document their feelings about the character. Both Mr. Azaria and Simpsons creator Matt Groening refused to appear in the documentary to answer questions. But Mr. Azaria later told a reporter from the TMZ celebrity website that Kondabolu "made some really interesting points" and "gave us a lot at The Simpsons to think about."

Rain and thunderstorms doused long-burning bushfires across much of eastern Australia on Saturday, but they also brought a new threat of flooding in some areas. Major bushfires continued to rage in regions of the south and southeast of the country that have so far missed out on the rain, including in wildlife-rich forests on Kangaroo Island off the southern coast. The fire service in New

South Wales (NSW) State, the country's most populous and the hardest hit by the crisis, said 75 fires continued to burn on Saturday, down from well over 100 a few days earlier. "Rain continues to fall across a number of fire grounds," the State's rural fire service said, adding that "benign conditions" of rain and cooler temperatures were helping efforts to contain the remaining blazes.
