Mumbai to get back mounted police

Mumbai will get a mounted police unit for traffic and crowd control after 88 years, said Maharashtra Home Minister Anil Deshmukh. The unit will be taking part in this year's Republic Day parade at Shivaji Park and if needed, similar units will be brought in for Pune and Nagpur.

The mounted unit was disbanded in 1932 due to growing vehicular traffic. "Today, Mumbai police has modern jeeps and motorcycles. However, it was felt a mounted police unit would be useful for crime patrol in crowded areas," said the State Home Minister, while addressing a press conference.

The average speed of a patrolling rider will be more than 7 to 10 km than the one on feet," he said.

The government at present has approved 30 horses, a sub-inspector, one assistant PSI, four havildars and 32 constables for the unit, which will be successively set up in next six months. A total of 61 trainers from racecourse, riding clubs and the Army's horse unit will be training the Mumbai police for this. "A stable will be built on a 2.5 acre plot at Marol area of Andheri. A riding school, swimming pool for horses, sand bath, raider room, trainer room, feed stock room will be set up there," said Mumbai Police Commissioner Sanjay Barve.

The officers part of this unit will also be trained in show-jumping, tent-pegging and polo.

Apart from walkie-talkies, riders would also be supplied with body-mounted cameras for video recording.

The Mumbai police headquarter will also be hoisting a regimental flag which was given to it in 1954 by the then Chief Minister of Bombay state Morarji Desai.

Trekker trampled to death by elephant in Tamil Nadu

Victim's husband and friends escape unhurt from the forest

A 40-year-old woman, who allegedly went trekking along with her husband and friends into a reserve forest area near Periyanaickenpalayam in Coimbatore without the permission of the Forest Department, was trampled to death by a wild elephant morning.

While P. Bhuwaneshwari, a resident of Ganapathy Managar in Coimbatore, was killed, the others managed to escape.

A Forest Department official said the group went into a forest area which comes under the Tholampalayam east beat of Periyanaickenpalayam forest range.

They reportedly planned to trek from Palamalai downhill to a tribal settlement at Manguzhi.

They parked their vehicles on a roadside at Palamalai and trekked to the Ranganathar temple, a hill shrine, through the forest, avoiding the designated road route. They then descended the hill and walked towards the Manguzhi tribal settlement. Around 7.30 a.m., they

encountered a tusker, which trampled the woman. The group had trekked nearly five km before they came face to face with the elephant, the official added. According to District For-

est Officer D. Venkatesh, "The group ventured into the forest illegally ignoring the risks involved in such activities. We conduct regular patrol to prevent people from halting vehicles, getting outside or taking photographs in forest areas of main roads like the Coimbatore-Anaikatti road and the Coimbatore-Udhagamandalam road," he said.

tiste Faby to recreate her "three favourite looks" from her films. Faby recreated the actor's looks from her 2007 debut Om Shanti Om and 2015's Piku. However, her attempt at recreating the actor's "look" from Chhapaak, in which Ms. Padukone plays Malti, an acid attack survivor, was criticised on social media.

AI reinstates pilot found guilty of harassment

Airline said it had imposed a penalty

A senior Air India pilot who was suspended in May last year after being accused of sexual harassment by a woman colleague and was found guilty by an internal committee of the airline has been reinstated recently, senior officials said.

The committee had imposed a "major penalty" on Captain Sachin Gupta, who has now appealed to a higher authority against the punishment, they said.

According P.S. Negi, Regional Director (Northern Region), Air India, "The Internal Complaints Committee [ICC] of Air India con-

PF benefits should extend to contractual employees: SC

Judgment came on a petition filed by a govt. company

The benefits of the provident fund should be extended to contractual employees, the Supreme Court has held in a recent judgment.

A Bench of Justices U.U. Lalit and Indu Malhotra has held that employees who draw wages or salaries directly or indirectly from a company are entitled to provident fund benefits under the Employees Provident Fund (EPF) Act.

The judgment came on the basis of a petition filed by M/s Pawan Hans Limited,

which provides helicopter support services to the oil sector for its offshore exploration operations, services in remote and hilly areas, and charter services for the promotion of tourism.

Company versus union The company had filed the petition against its employees' union, the Aviation Karmachari Sanghatana, which sought uniformity in service conditions among employees.

Of a total workforce of 840 employees, the company had engaged 570 em-

a government company ployees on regular basis, while 270 employees were engaged on "contractual"

The company implemented the PF Trust Regulations only with respect to the regular employees, even though the term "employee" had been defined to include "any person" employed "directly or indirectly" under the PF Trust Regulations.

The contractual employees have been seeking parity with the regular employees, who are covered under the Pawan Hans Employees Provident Fund Trust Regulations.

146 endangered Irrawaddy dolphins sighted in Chilika

The lake is home to their highest single lagoon population

BHUBANESWAR Odisha Forest Department officials, wildlife experts and researchers on Sunday sighted 146 endangered Irrawaddy dolphins in Chilika Lake, which boasts of the highest single lagoon population of the aquatic mammal in the

The dolphin census was simultaneously taken up in Chilika and off Odisha coast. The Chilika Development Authority (CDA) is elated as the direct sighting of 146 dolphins meant that its population in the lake would stabilwell above 150. According to last year's census, the Irrawaddy dolphin population in Chilika was

"The direct sighting of 146 dolphins only corroborates the estimate of the CDA, which does counting of dol-

phins round the year using hydrophones. Our estimated population range is 133-172," said Susanta Nanda, Chief Executive Officer, CDA.

His confidence stemmed from the fact that dolphins were colonising new areas, which had been freed from encroachments by prawn farming gherries.

"We have noticed dolphin movements in new areas in the central and southern sectors, more specifically in the areas near Kalijai and Rambha. These areas were made free from encroachments," said Mr. Nanda. He expressed hopes that that the population is likely to increase in the next couple of years as there are enough signs of dolphins migrating from the Satpada side to other areas.

According to hydrophone monitoring carried out round the year in Chilika, the highest number of Irrawaddy dolphins (20-25) was moving around Rajhans, followed by the Magarmukh and Malatikuda areas.
