New Delhi, Jan. 22: Stating that he is not anxious but angry about the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA), actor Naseeruddin Shah says he cannot produce a birth certificate, like many other Indians, and asks why 70 years of living here is not proof enough of

him being a citizen.
The actor, who stressed that he was speaking as a concerned citizen and not a Muslim, said that he has contributed to the country in the social and educational spheres and five generations of his family are buried in this land.

Shah, one of Hindi cinema's best known actors, joins others from the industry such as Anurag Kashyap, Vishal Bhardwaj and Richa Chadha to speak on the intense debate over CAA.

"I don't have a birth certificate. I cannot produce one. Does that mean we are all going to be excluded? I do not need any reassurances that Muslims don't need to worry. I am not worried," Shah said in

an interview.

"If living here for 70 years does not prove me to be an Indian, I don't know what does. I am not afraid, I am not anxious, I am angry that such a law has been imposed on us, he added. Referring to the protests across the country, he said the youth has risen and suddenly realised they are being trampled upon.

COMPLAINT AGAINST SONI RAZDAN

A police complaint has been filled in Delhi on Wednesday against actor Soni Razdan for her controversial remark on Afzal Guru.

Advocate Rajeev Kumar Shrivastav, practicing at Supreme Court, filed a com-plaint at Tilak Marg police station in Delhi against Razdan's "provocative" tweet that the executed Kashmiri terrorist Mohammad Afzal Guru was made a "scapegoat" for the attack on Parliament.

"Soni Razdan has been play ing with the sentiments of Indian citizens for cheap publicity and it is really condemnable," Kumar said in his letter to the police seeking her apol-

"This is a travesty of justice. Who is going to bring back a man from the dead if he is innocent? This is why the death penalty is not to be used lightly. And this is why there also needs to be a solid enquiry into why Afzal Guru was made the scapegoat, Razdan had tweeted.

Afzal Guru was given capital punishment for his role in the attack on Parliament.

Five armed terrorists belonging to Jaish-e-Mohammad and Lashkar-e-Taiba tried to gain access to the Parliament House and gunned down nine security personnel in December 2001.

The terrorists were also shot down by security personnel.

POLICE USE FORCE ON PROTESTERS

Etawah (UP), Jan. 22: People protesting against the CAA were allegedly lathicharged by the police in a Muslim-domi-nated area in Uttar Pradesh's Etawah district.

A video of the incident, where policemen can be seen using batons and chasing away protesters in the area on late Tuesday night, has also gone viral.

Violence broke out when police tried to disperse the protesters who were on a sit-in since Tuesday morning in Pachraha area, defying pro-

hibitory orders imposed there. "The police indulged in force against us while we were hold ing a peaceful protest. Our brothers and cousins were beaten up and we were abused. We were physically tortured, one of the women protesters said. Responding to the allega-tions, the police said the protesters staged dharna defying prohibitory order imposed in the area and were pelting stones. Police said they had to use mild force to chase the protesters. In the video, police can be seen entering the houses. The sit-in was organised in solidarity with women protesting at Shaheen Bagh.

Kishor dares Shah to implement CAA

Controversy the govt's focus, not the economy

n 2015, India was ecstatic over then IMF chief Christine Lagarde's description of India as "a bright spot on a cloudy global horizon". This remark was a rare validation of India's prowess by none other than one of the Bretton Woods institutions that treated it with contempt in the past. It would have been great if India had managed to sustain the aura. But in less than five years, India fettered away the opportunity and ended up as a drag on the global economy.

Following a series of missteps and a misplaced focus of the government,

Indian economic growth has lost its momentum and is forecast to slow down by 1.3 percentage points in the current financial year. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has lowered India's economic growth to 4.8 per cent from the earlier 6.1 per cent, citing more than expected decline in consumer demand, stress in the non-banking finance sector and low credit off-take. The IMF has also indicted the Indian economic slowdown for slowing down global economic growth by 50 basis points from $3.3\,$

Though the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has been lowering India's economic growth projection for every two months, the IMF's statement is accorded more seriousness by foreign investors than local warnings. But none of ministers or officials of the Narendra Modi government have reacted to the IMF forecast. This is not responsible behaviour, especially when one wants the global community to treat India with the respect that it deserves. If one reads statements issued by the ministers of the Narendra Modi government, it seems as if they are more focused on furthering controversial issues like the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, etc. Days ahead of the presentation of the crucial Union Budget, finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman is interacting with people on the CAA rather than focusing all her attention on Budget preparation — leading to speculation in industry circles that Budget-making has been outsourced to the Prime Minister's Office along with finance ministry officials. Internal strife is the enemy of prosperity. But home minister Amit Shah continues to remain in confrontation mode.

Perhaps Opposition parties and people themselves also should be blamed for the government losing its focus on the economy. Opposition parties, especially the Congress, confine themselves to a tweet or a state-ment whenever reports of bad economic numbers emerge and thereafter they go into deep slumber. At the most, they organise protests and shut-downs, which further maul the economy. But they would never seriously try to engage youngsters, who have more at stake in a poor economy. People are also responsible for the government's misplaced priorities because most Indians — especially Hindus — seem to believe that their penury is a result of their past life's karma rather than the acts of the government are result of the government. ernment. So until we, the people, want economic progress in our lives, nothing will change and we will get what we had sown.

A crisis of healthcare plagues India's jails

he ongoing polarising batnarratives in the country and detention of many people has brought to the fore an important but hugely neglected issue — India's jail healthcare crisis. The Supreme Court has upheld the "right to healthcare" as an essenrial ingredient under Article 21 of the Constitution in its judge-ment Pt. Parmanand Katara vs Union of India & Ors (1989) 4 SCC 286.

But it is no secret that this "right" is routinely violated in our overcrowded jails.

The recent public protests against the citizenship law and related matters bring to the fore the issue of a prisoner's right to adequate medical care.

including political prisoners, be forced to go to media's assistance to get the medical treatment they need?

A case in point is that of Bhim Army chief Chandrashekhar Azad, arrested in a case relating to alleged incitement of violence during anti-Citizenship (Amendment) Act 2019 (CAA) protests at Jama Masjid. A Delhi court has finally waived off conditions from an earlier bail order directing Azad to not visit Delhi.

The latest court order says that Azad should provide the schedule of his visit to the city to the concerned DCP whenever he visits for medical treatment.

But none of this happened automatically. It took a huge effort by his Mehmood Pracha, and his personal physician, Harjit Singh Bhatti, to make Azad's medical condition a pub-

Bhatti, Azad's personal physician, says the Bhim Army chief suffers from polycythaemia, a blood-related disease, has been under treatment H a e m a t o l o g y Department, All India Institute of Medical Sciences, and requires regular monitoring

including a procedure called phlebotomy. Bhatti says Azad was not allowed to access the necessary follow-up treatment and investigations initially when he was held in custody.

Azad had to wait for

more than two weeks in Tihar Jail and finally was taken for a medical check-up after Bhatti requested concerned authorities multiple Twitter. times on Strangely, he was taken to Deen Dayal Upadhyay Hospital in West Delhi, and not AIIMS, where he was undergoing treatment. The permission to go to AIIMS was given only after a court order. "I was in Tihar Jail.

worms. I was told no permission can be given to me to go out for medical treatment though I told several doctors in the jail about my medical condition, my specific needs, and that I am being treated by doctors at AIIMS. There was no real treatment at Tihar. Once, when I was late to see a jail doctor because I had fever, I was ticked off. The doctors treated me very casually. I did not see any real interest in my medical condition..." Azad told this columnist at a recent press conference in New Delhi just before leaving

Medical clinics are usually run by compounders who keep only basic medicines such as Paracetamol and some B-Complex vitamins... There is a severe shortage of medical staff in prison. The procedure of sending inmates for medical check-ups or treatment to a district hospital is extremely lengthy. The lengthy procedure coupled with severe understaffing causes unusual delays leading to loss of the golden period of treatment for an inmate," noted Chakraburtty in

her report. She also pointed out that often, medical procedures are delayed due to non-availability of guards, that prisons often have no ambu-lance, and these too cause delays.

"By the time the inmate reaches the hospital, there is little or no chance of recovery... some inmates — those who can afford it — get treated in private, i.e. family members get es for the inmate," the report noted.

This means that proper medical care can be availed only by a few inmates in each prison those who have the resources.

The lengthy procedure involved in sending inmates to a district hospital for the required treatment, the severe understaffing in prisons lead to prison staff ignoring medical complaints of prisoners and also avoiding the mechanism of transfer of the inmate to a district hospital to avoid the burden of official paperwork, Chakraburtty points out in her report.

This is serious medical negligence and does not make a country that talks about "health for all" look good.

Fanning the foreigners

The first thing that the British realised about India was that it was hot. Arriving from their cold wet island, the relentless humidity or the unwavering sunshine of the plains was not only

foreign, it was maddening.

They tried many tricks to address this encumbrance, a change in clothing and an abandonment of the stiff serge and wool for the pleasant cotton that breathed. Others tried to change their diets, avoiding hot foods and turning to lighter fare so that their own sweat, occasioned not by hard work but simply by the frustration,

poured down their backs.
The story of the solution they did find appeared in an essay written by historian Arunima Datta for *History Today*. In "Keeping India Cool", she notes the surge in the demand for punkhawallas as the numbers of British arriving to the subcontinent increased. The first surge came early when most of the

British colonialists were men, who basically hired whoever was available to do the odious and constant job of fanning their masters through the day and night.

When the British had entrenched themselves more deeply in India, made sure that all the largesse was available for loot and that a permanent life in India was required to obtain it, a second surge occurred. Now the punkhawallas were required not just for the sahib, but also for the memsahibs and the baby sahibs.

Mastery over a subjugated population, the British soon learnt, is not at all an easy task. Some of these lessons were delivered by none other than the punkhawallas themselves. As the British grabbed more and more and still more power, they began - like all illegitimate rulers — to lose this power.

One way they estimated this could happen was by successful acts of espionage by the natives. Punkhawallas were always there

and always everywhere, capable at all times of listening to everything that was said, everything that was planned or discussed. Such was the paranoia, Dutta notes in her essay, that a new trend began that emphasised that only the deaf or the elderly and hard of hearing should be hired for the job.

Others didn't care, used as they had become to flinging slippers and yelling and cursing and even in some cases actually striking and killing punkhawallas that may have fallen asleep on the job. In cases where the poor punkhawalla was killed, the white man who killed him had to pay a fine of ₹100.

Dredging up this particular morsel of the history of servitude and abuse that British colonialism imposed on the subcontinent is important for one reason. The punkhawallas who served their masters and were regularly abused by them represented in literal terms the seizure of human dignity from a human being. A punkhawal-

la's humanity was subordinate, if existent at all, against the colonial masters who hired them. In turn the colonial masters became comfortable in their entitlement to comfort against the invisible and mute labour of another.

The British took most of India's wealth with them, but they left their sense of entitlement to germinate and grow. In today's Pakistan, there are no punkhawallas but there is much servitude and tons of entitlement. Couples with babies can be seen eating at fancy restaurants while a young, nameless and invisible woman servant tends to their baby. Errant servants who forget to cook a dish a certain way or wash the car or sweep the large compounds of the wealthy are often met with the same violence perpetrated by the colonialists of old. At the centre is the idea that servants exist in a single dimension, which is to please their masters and mistresses and their children.

For all of these reasons, reading

about the punkhawallas is a grim exercise. The catalogue of com-plaints the British had against their punkhawallas, these men who had the power to make life very hot and uncomfortable, is no different from what one hears pouring out of pampered mouths regarding the servants of today. Some of it per-haps is because for the elite and almost-elite of the country, the adoption of the pretensions and perversions of the British appears essential and non-negotiable.

If in the past it was foreigners

who required fanning and fawning over, now it is the natives who have donned the discarded garb of conquerors past. To render the imitation authentic the evils of conquerors past must be acted out with even greater zeal. Pakistan thus lives the irony of having both electricity and fans but also an invisible and abused army of suffering and silent punkhawallas.

The Spotify stories are only available on the iOS and Android apps at the moment and there is no desktop ver-




AMAZON FLEX LAUNCHED IN AUSTRALIA

NETFLIX HOLDS GROUND IN STREAMING WAR

San Fransisco, Jan. 22: Netflix is holding its ground in the streaming wars, passing its first big test since Apple and Disney launched rival services. The company added 8.8 million worldwide subscribers during its fourth quarter, surpassing expectations at a time when it faces heated competition.

Netflix had said it expected to add 7.6 million subscribers, and analysts thought the service would fare even better. The increase pales slightly next to the 8.9 million subscribers the service added in the fourth quarter of 2018.

The stock dropped about 2.5 per cent immediately in afterhours trading, likely due to a cautious forecast for the first quarter. But shares rebounded and later traded up more than 2 per cent.

The company now boasts more than 167 million subscribers worldwide, bolstered by a list of well-received movies and shows released late last year.

San Fransisco, Jan. 22: General Motors' self-driving car unit, Cruise, on Wednesday unveiled a prototype electric vehicle with no steering wheel or pedals for use in its planned autonomous ride-

sharing service.

The vehicle, named "Cruise Origin," was developed with Honda Motor Co. Ltd., which took a minority stake in Cruise in 2018 in an effort to catch up with rivals in developing a technology with enormous costs and risk and no market-ready prod-

Cruise's chief executive officer, Dan Ammann, said the boxy vehicle about the size of a large SUV with sliding doors on each side will be used for the company's own ride-hailing service, but did not say when the new competitor to Lyft and Uber would

Cruise was valued at \$19 billion in May. In July, it

FB asked major banks to study digital currencies

Tokyo, Jan. 22: The challenge posed by Facebook's likely prodded major central banks to set up a new group to study the poten-tial for issuing their own digital currencies, a former Bank of Japan (BOJ) executive

Wednesday.
The central banks of Britain, the euro zone, Japan, Canada, Sweden and Switzerland on Tuesday announced a plan to share experiences to look at the case for issuing digital currencies, amid a growing debate over the future of money.

Hiromi Yamaoka, former head of the BOJ's division overseeing payment and settlement systems, said the decision was a sign of how Libra has triggered a global competition among central banks to make their currencies more appeal-

'The latest decision (by the six central banks) is not just about sharing information. It's also an effort to keep something like Libra in check," Yamaoka who, during his stint at the BOJ, was directly in charge of negotiations technology.

"Something like Libra would make transactions costs much cheaper. Major central banks need to appeal that they, too, are making efforts to make settlement more efficient with better use of digital technology," Reuters.

The BOJ has undertaken joint research project the European Central Bank, but has said it has no plan to issue CBDCs in the near-term horizon.

Yamaoka said the creation of the joint study group could speed up moves by the central banks to use blockchain technology for large-scale, wholesale settlement.

But the hurdle for central banks issuing digital currencies for small, retail settlement remains "very high," as doing so would stifle private-sector competition, he said.

Yamaoka also countered the view, held by some academics, that central banks could deepen negaeasily by issuing digital currencies.

"In the world of central bankers, the idea of using CBDCs to enhance the effect of monetary policy seems to have subsided somewhat," he said. "There are increasing

doubts about the effect of negative interest rates as a policy tool," Yamaoka said. "If so, do you want to issue CBDCs for the sake of deploying a policy with questionable effects?" The more imminent fac-

tor driving central banks into studying CBDCs is the need to boost their currencies' convenience so they survive in an age of diversifying settlement means, he said.

UBER MULLS NEW FARE-DECIDING PROCESS

San Fransisco, Jan. 22: Uber on Wednesday said it is testing a feature that allows some drivers in California to set their own fares, hop-ing the change will help it show that its drivers are independent con-tractors rather than employees under state

law.

Uber drivers ferrying passengers from airports in Santa Barbara, Palm Springs and Sacramento can now charge up to five times the fare set by the company, Uber said.

The company statement said it has made these and several other product changes to preserve flexible work for its drivers since California's new law designed to improve working conditions in the gig economy went into effect this year.

We are now doing an initial test of additional changes which would give drivers more control over the rates they charge riders," Uber said. Drivers at the three airports will be able to set a fare multiple of up to five times Uber's base rates. Starting next week, drivers will also be able to charge less than Uber's rates if the company surges prices

at times of high demand The initial tests are limited to the three airports and do not represent a final version of the feature, the company said, adding that drivers' control over their earnings will evolve in the coming weeks.

This is the latest in a series of changes the company has made in response to the new law.

The experiment involves sealing the phone in special paper envelopes which completely transform the functionality of the phone for the time it is sealed inside, leading to fewer distractions for a

One such envelope turns the phone into a very basic device which can only make and receive calls, while the other turns the phone into a photo and video camera with no screen, helping users focus on the real world.

Printed buttons which subtly light up allowing users to dial and take photographs, creating a magical 'Envelope User Interface.'

Activity Bubbles is another experiment helps users discover what the phone usage looks like in a day. Each unlock creates a new bubble on the longer the user stays on the phone the bigger the bubble grows. It feels like a virtual timer with live visuals. If the home screen is covered in bubbles, it might be a sign that the phone has been used for too long.



Google said it was inspired by a recent trend where people purchase a second, simpler phone for holidays and weekends, as a way of limiting their access to technology.
"We wanted to create a more accessible version of it, which would enable people to try a day without a phone without committing to purchasing a new device."

The experiments currently support only the Google Pixel 3a. The apps can be downloaded on the Play Store, and the code can be accessed on Github.

Russian air strikes in Syria kill 15

Beirut: Russian air strikes killed at least 15 civilians Tuesday in northwestern Svria, as renewed violence tightened the noose around the country's last major rebel-held bastion and deepened an already dire humanitari-an crisis. Retaliatory rocket attacks blamed on rebels and jihadists killed three more civilians in the government-held city of Aleppo in northern Syria, state news agency SANA said. The spike in violence in the neighbouring provinces of Aleppo and Idlib follow so far unsuccessful diplomatic attempts to reduce hostilities in the flashpoint region, with the latest truce in theory going into effect less than two weeks ago. Most of Idlib and parts of Aleppo province are still controlled by factions opposed to President Bashar Assad's regime, including a group that includes former Syria franchise.

Israeli troops kill three Palestinians

Jerusalem/Gaza: Israeli troops on Tuesday shot and killed three Palestinians who threw an explosive towards them after attempting to cross the border from neighbouring Gaza, Israel's military said. The military said troops had cordoned off an area near the southern end of the Palestinian coastal enclave after spotting "three suspects" crossing the frontier. "(They) searched the area towards the suspects who hurled a grenade or explosive device at the troops," who then opened fire on the three Palestinians, the military said in a statement. A military spokes-woman confirmed they were killed. Two of the Palestinians killed were aged 18 and the third aged 17, a police source in Gaza said. The source said they were civilians without militant affiliations in Gaza. He questioned Israel's account that they threw explosives towards troops. There was no immediate comment from Gaza's Islamist rulers Hamas or other militant groups in the enclave. Israel and Hamas have fought three wars in the last decade, in addition to

Geneva: Washington called Tuesday on Beijing to join its nuclear arms talks with Moscow, warning that lack of transparen-cy around China's growing weapons stockpile posed a "serious threat". The United States and Russia have held two rounds of talks aimed at reducing misunderstandings about critical security issues since the collapse of a Cold War nuclear pact last year, which triggered fears of a new arms race. Washington has hinted previously it believes Beijing, with its growing nuclear arsenal, should join the discussions. President Donald Trump has insisted any new disarmament pact would need China to come on board. US Ambassador to the Conference on Disarmament in Geneva Robert Wood said Tuesday that Washington was intent on convincing China to join the discussions.

FIRST WOMAN JOINS JAPAN'S SUB ACADEMY

Tokvo. Jan. 22: The first female student was admitted to Japan's national naval submarine academy Wednesday after the end of a ban on women on the country's submarines.

Saki Takenouchi, 26, entered the academy in a western region of Hiroshima along with about 20 other men, after the Japan Maritime Self-Defence Force overturned previous restrictions vious restrictions.

"I hope not to put too much pressure on myself as the first woman," she told reporters.

"Instead I hope to work with my classmates and train to become a submarine crew member." The navy has long only allowed men to serve on submarines, citing the difficulty of accommodating gender privacy concerns.

But it changed the rules in late 2018, after assessing that gender-specific privacy needs can be met without major submarine remodelling, a navy spokesman told AFP

This is a part of our efforts for efficient use of human resources," he added.

Japan's military as a whole is attempting to expand the role of women in its ranks as the Self Defence Forces struggle to attract young talent, with local media saying the navy has had particular difficulty attracting candidates to serve on submarines.

Historic impeachment trial opens

In a 228-193 vote, House appoints 7 impeachment managers for removing Trump from office

Washington, Jan. 22: The US Senate has started the historic impeachment trial Trump amidst acrimonious scenes among the Senators from the ruling Republican party and the opposition Democrats over the rules of the game. The im-peachment trial began on Tuesday and comes nearly a week after the House of Representatives, where the Democrats enjoy a majority, voted to send articles of impeachment against President Trump to the Senate.

In a 228-193 vote, which was mainly on party lines, the House had appointed seven impeachment managers to argue Democrats' case for removing Trump from office. The managers

— Congressmen Adam Schiff, Jerrold Nadler, Zoe Lofgren, Hakeem Jeffries, Val Demings, Jason Crow, and Sylvia Garcia — were named by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi. The 435-member House on December 18 charged Trump with "high crimes and misde-meanors" and impeached him for pressuring Ukraine to investigate former Vice President Joe Biden, a potential Democratic rival for the current president in the 2020 elections.

President Trump's lawyers submitted a trial brief Monday calling his impeachment by the House "a dangerous perversion" of the US constitution and demanding his immediate acquittal by the Senate. On Tuesday, the Senate started the historic trial in "utter acrimony" as the debate was a technical one about the rules and procedures.

Trump's close-ally Mitch McConnell laid out ground rules that would block subpoenaing key witnesses or documents while each side makes its case — potentially crippling prosecutors' arguments. Flexing his solid 53-47 majority, the Republican leader also made clear he would summarily block any Democratic attempts to change his rules. "The basic structure we're proposing is just as eminently fair and evenhanded." he said.

San Juan, Puerto Rico: - Puerto Ricans dealing with the effects of almost non-stop earthquakes since last month have begun to receive emergency supplies, the National Guard said. But the supplies were originally meant for hurricane victims two years ago. The aid was found abandoned in warehouses in the US territory over the weekend, leading to protests and a judicial investigation. On Monday, 10 of the towns most affected by the series of tremors received nearly 900 boxes of diapers, almost 1,400 cots, about 880 tarps and hundreds of boxes of batteries, gas stoves and bed sheets, among other items, Puerto Rico National Guard chief Jose Reyes said. "The mission continues today," Reyes said, "and the supplies will also be sent to other areas" as a preventative measure.

Cape Town: A wedding venue in South Africa is refusing to host a ceremony for a lesbian couple because of its Christian beliefs, sparking a row in the only African country to permit gay marriage. South Africans Sasha Lee Heekes and Megan Watling said thev believed thev had found the perfect venue for their wedding planned for April 2021. But after enquiring, the owners of Beloftebos Wedding Venue told them they do not host same-sex weddings because of their Christian beliefs. After the rejection Heekes took to social media to express her shock. 'You may not understand the hurt I feel, and how disheartened I am that such prejudices go unchallenged," Heekes said in recent days.

Transgender soldier pleads to stay in army

It was the first time in South Korea that an active-duty member has been referred to a military panel to determine whether to end his or her service due to a sex change operation. South Korea prohibits transgender people from joining its military but has no specific laws on what to do with those who have sex change operations during their time in

The army said in a statement that it concluded that the soldier's sex change operation can be considered as a reason for discharge. The statement said the decision went through due process and was based on a related military law on personnel changes

Pandemic? China virus toll rises to 17

Health experts warn disease may spread in ongoing holiday season when millions travel abroad

death toll from the new coronavirus outbreak in China nearly doubled to 17 with the confirmed infection cases sharply rising to 543 on Wednesday, even as the cases of the deadly pneumonia were reported from the US, Hong Kong, Macao and Mexico.

Chinese authorities have warned that the disease could spread further in the ongoing holiday season during which millions travel at home and abroad amid official advisories to people of Wuhan, the epicentre of illness, not to leave the city.

Seventeen people have died due to the virus outbreak, state-run China Daily reported.

The coronavirus is a large family of viruses that causes illnesses ranging from the common cold to acute respiratory syndromes, but the virus that has killed people in China is a novel strain and not seen before.

Common symptoms of the novel coronavirus strain include respiratory symptoms such as fever, cough, shortness of breath and breathing difficulties, according to the

Chinese health authorities said that 543 confirmed cases of pneumonia caused by a novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) had been reported in 13 provincial-level regions in the country. Hubei Province alone reported 444 cases of coronavirus infections.

Considering its potential to spread to different countries, the World Organisation (WHO) is holding a rare emergency meeting Geneva on Wednesday to consider declaring Wuhan virus as an international public health emergency, as it did with swine flu and Ebola.

WOMEN'S OLY FOOTBALL QUALIFIERS MOVED FROM CHINA VIRUS EPICENTRE

Beijing, Jan. 22: Women's football qualifiers for the Tokyo Olympic Games will be moved from the Chinese city at the centre of a virus outbreak to another location in the country, Football Asian Confederation said Wednesday.

Wuhan was supposed to host China, Taiwan, Thailand and Australia for the Group B qualifiers February 3-9, but they will now be held on the same dates in the eastern city of Nanjing, AFC said. It said the change was proposed by the Chinese Football Association.

Nine people have died and at least 440 have been infected with the SARSlike coronavirus that has spread around the country, with the vast majority of cases reported in Wuhan. A seafood market is suspected to be the source of the outbreak. Taiwan's football association had warned earlier that it would withdraw from the qualifiers if they were held in Wuhan, saying "safety of players is our priority". The Xinhua news agency had reported that the Chinese Football Association had no plans to move the games out of

OLYMPIC BOXING QUALIFIER IN CHINA SCRAPPED

Tokyo, Jan. 22: A boxing qualifier for the Tokyo Olympics sched-uled for next month in China's Wuhan will be cancelled over the outbreak of a new virus, Japan's Kyodo news agency said Wednesday. Citing organisers,

Kyodo said the qualifiers would be rescheduled and moved from Wuhan, where the outbreak of the new strain of coronavirus is believed to have begun. There was no independent confirmation from the

organisers, and Japan's boxing federation said it was waiting to hear from International Olympic Committee on the reported cancellation. Kyodo said the IOC was

expected to announce a new host and schedule for the qualifiers. Boxing has struggled in the run-up to the 2020 Games, and was almost excluded from the Olympic programme after a series of scandals. The amateur boxing body AIBA was stripped of the right to organise the Olympic competition and replaced with a special taskforce. Other measures have been introduced to rebuild trust in the sport, including a more transparent judging system.

The reported cancellation comes as China said the new strain of coronavirus has killed nine people and infected at least 440 others in the

country. Cases have also been reported outside China, in countries including the Korea, Japan Thailand.

Three dates set for GSTR-3B filing

New Delhi, Jan. 22: The finance ministry on Wednesday staggered last dates of filling GSTR-3B, a monthly return form, and has provided three dates for different categories of taxpayers, to de-stress the system.

Currently, the last date for filing GSTR-3B is the 20th of every month. From now on, there

will three dates-20th, 22nd and 24th—of every month for different cate gories of tax payers.

"From now on, the last date for filing of GSTR-3B for the taxpayers hav ing annual turnover of Rs 5 crore and above in the previous financial year would be 20th of the month. Thus, around 8 lakh regular taxpayers would have the last date of GSTR-3B filing as 20th of every month without late fees," the ministry said.

The taxpayers having annual turnover below Rs 5 crore in previous financial year will be divided further in two categories.

The tax filers from 15 states/UTs-Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh Gujarat, Daman and Diu, Dadra & Nagar Haveli, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Goa, Laksh adweep, Kerala, Tamil Puducherry, Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Telangana and Andhra Pradesh—will now be having the last date of filing GSTR-3B returns as 22nd of the month without late fees. This category would have around 49 lakh GSTR-3B filers.

For the remaining 46 lakh taxpayers from the 22 states/UTs—of J&K. Laddakh, HP, Punjab, Uttara-Chandigarh, khand, Harvana, Delhi Rajasthan, ŬP, Bihar, all North-eastern West Bengal, Jharkhand and Odisha-the last date for filing return will be 24th.

India may be experiencing the most glaring setback among emerging economies, but its double pain of slowing growth and surging inflation is

While a debate rages over whether the latest data from India points to 'stagflation," a sixth successive quarter of economic deceleration and fifth consecutive jump in price growth are threatening "buy India," one of the most popular emergingmarket trades of the last decade.

spreading far and wide.

They're also emblematic how developing nations, as a whole, may

be losing steam. An analysis of 30 major emerging economies, based on public data and Bloomberg surveys, shows half of them slowing or stagnating in 2020. Twothirds are set to experience a simultaneous acceleration in inflation. That's a potent source of minieconomic crises across the group. (see tables)

The diverging rates of growth and inflation point to the impact US-China trade tensions have had on emerging markets. Most of the countries on a "stagflationary" path are in Asia. India, however, is not a

victim of trade wars. Its slowdown is self-inflicted, caused by the evaporation of consumer demand, proliferation of bad loans and erosion in business confidence. The Reserve Bank of India's interest-rate cuts have failed to boost the economy, while the government has been distracted by social strife and its fiscal measures so far haven't done much to spur demand.

At the other end of the spectrum, Turkey is projected to post the biggest improvement in growth as private consumption and investment pick up. Yet the growth won't be strong enough to drive up infla tion, which is expected to fall back below 10 per cent. Russia has been a haven amid the trade war and it

How airlines & airports are dealing with China virus

Airports and airlines are taking steps to protect staff and passengers amid heightened concern over the outbreak of a new virus originating from the Chinese city of Wuhan. At least 17 people have died and hundreds more have been infected, including a

confirmed case in the US. The level of alarm is rising as the coronavirus spreads. China said it will conduct nationwide screening and improve monitoring of transportation links for the Lunar New Year holidays, which start at the end of this week. That complicates efforts to contain the virus as hundreds of millions of people travel during the period, the biggest annual migration of humans on the

planet. People found to have symptoms such as fever at travel checkpoints are being stopped from boarding planes.

Here's a look at how airports and airlines around the world

ASIA

Hong Kong: The city's Airport Authority said planes arriving from Wuhan-roughly a twohour flight away—will be parked at a designated area and that a cleaning contractor will disinfect the terminal where passengers are arriving from the city. Cleaning and disinfection in the airport will also be stepped up as a whole, it said. Flag carrier Cathay Pacific Airways Ltd on Wednesday said staff could wear protective face masks on flights to China if they wanted. South Korea: Korean Air



Lines Co is providing hazardous-materials suits for crew on planes and plans to disinfect aircraft flying to Wuhan daily, as opposed to monthly. The country confirmed its first infection on Monday.

Singapore: Changi Airport is increasing surveillance on all passengers from China, rather than just those arriving from Wuhan. Disinfectants, hand san-

itizers and surgical masks are being supplied on all China flights. Low-cost Scoot said it has an aircraft disinfection protocol in place for flights where suspected cases have been

Japan: Prime Minister Shinzo Abe said the country will step up quarantine and testing, while health minister Katsunobu Kato said on Tuesday that health questionnaires would be given to passengers arriving from Wuhan by plane and that people should inform authorities if they're not feeling well on

India: Mumbai's Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharak International Airport has increased surveillance measures. Delhi Airport staff is checking inbound passengers from affected areas, it said in a statement.

Australia: Health authorities will help staff monitor travellers returning from Wuhan.

Indonesia: Airports and airlines have been asked to take precautionary measures such as screening international passengers with thermal scanners.

EUROPE UK: Heathrow spokesman Weston Macklem said the airport was awaiting instructions from public health authorities. British Airways said it's monitoring the situation closely.

Italy: The health ministry said procedures are in force at Rome Fiumicino airport, which has direct flights to Wuhan, to check for symptomatic cases on flights arriving from the Chinese city. Surveillance of passengers is being strengthened and arrivals will be subject to body temperature checks at the airport.

AFRICA

Nigeria: The country's center for disease control advised travellers coming from Wuhan to report to a medical facility if they feel ill and said that surveillance has been intensified at all points of entry.

South Africa: The National Institute for Communicable Diseases recommended testing anyone who has recently visited Wuhan.

AMERICA

US: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention implemented health screening for arrivals at airports in San Francisco, New York and Los Angeles on Jan. 17, and is expanding that to Atlanta and Chicago this — Bloomberg



"I don't think any of the teammates is thinking about this gap because the only focus right now is to win matches for India, get the crowd coming in, get the revenue. That is the thing which we are aiming for and if that happens all other things are going to fall in place," she said.

"And for that, we need to perform. It is unfair on our part to say that we need same pay, it is not right. So I don't think I want to comment on that gap," she added.

India will play a tri-series before the World T20 begins in Australia and Mandhana feels that the tournament is important to finalise the team composition right for

the big event next month. "Most of them have played in Australia, so I think with India A touring Australia last month, that is also going to be a big help (as) four-five players were part of that team as well. "But the tri-series is going

Mandhana said the team has been planning for the World T20 in the last one year. "...it is quite exciting. Looking forward to playing this World Cup with this team as it is new team with mixture of experienced and new players," she said.

There was a phase in Mandhana's career when she was unable to convert starts and she said she has

worked on her shot-selection for better results. "Knowing that you can play vour cover drive, on-drive, play over covers... those things used to always be like, should I hit it here or there...I had to limit my shots in the ODI format and understand what the team needs," she said.

Gauff also beat Williams on her Grand Slam debut last year at Wimbledon, and in another quirk, she faced Osaka in the US Open third round, going down meekly in straight

Japan's Osaka, 22, beat China's Zheng Saisai 6-2, 6-4 but briefly lost her cool mid-match, hurling and kicking her racquet when she gave up a break in the second set.

Former world number one Wozniacki, playing her final tournament before retiring, came from behind in both sets for a 7-

5, 7-5 win over Dayana Yastremska of Ukraine. Serena Williams shouted at the top of her voice during a testing second set against 70th-ranked Tamara Zidansek, before seeing off break points to win 6-2, 6-3.

Earlier, Australia's number Ashleigh Barty raced through 6-1, 6-4 against Polona Hercog, buoying hopes of a first home winner since 1978.

Rowing body in deep waters

New Delhi, Jan. 22 RFI in four areas. Rowing Federation India (RFI) was on Wednesday de-recognised by the Sports Ministry for violating the Sports Code of 2011 during its elections held in December. In the RFI elections held

December Rajlaxmi M. V. Hyderabad, Singh Deo and M. Sriram were elected as president and secretarygeneral respectively.

But the Ministry, in a letter to the RFI president, said that the said elections were not in accordance with the Sports Code and hence the recognition of the national rowing body stands cancelled.

The Ministry also wrote to the Indian Olympic Association to constitute an ad hoc committee to discharge the functions of the RFI. "Upon examination of the matter (from the reports of the Returning Officer and government observer), it has been found that the said elections of the RFI are not in accordance with the Model Elections Guidelines prescribed in the National Sports Development Code of India, 2011," the letter

from the ministry said. it has been decided that the recognition of the RFI would cease w.e.f 01/02/2020 and not be renewed in view of the positions explained," it

The ministry found violations of the Sports Code by

"As per the website of RFI, there are 21 state/UT units out of which only 18 participated in the election process. RFI does not fulfil the 2/3 state/UT affiliation criteria as it must have had at least 25 state/UT as its affiliated members.

"M. V. Sriram had held the post of Secretary General for two terms till January 2016 and hence as per the cooling off provision of the NSDCI (Sports Code), 2011, he would have been eligible to contest elections only after 29.01.2020 (after the completion of cooling off period of four years)."
The RFI elections allowed

proxy voting while there was no such provision in the model election guidelines of the Sports Code. The RFI also allowed three votes per its affiliated unit while the Sports Code pre-

scribes only two. RFI's de-recognition by the Sports Ministry comes after the IOA president Narinder Batra asked Rajlaxmi to review the decision to ban Dattu Bhokanal for two years for stopping a race midway during the 2018 Asian Games, saying it was a harsh punishment for a first time offence. Batra had asked RFI to furnish him the relevant rules of the national federation as well as those of the international body under which Bhokanal was banned for

two years.
