Parties across political lines on Saturday condemned Friday's attack on Gurdwara Nankana Sahib in Pakistan.

While the ruling BJP said the incident justified its decision to bring in the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA), Opposition leaders called on Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the government to take up the issue with Pakistan to ensure the safety of the shrine and pilgrims.

'Continuing persecution' At a press conference held at the BJP headquarters in New Delhi, party leader Meenakshi Lekhi said the attack on the gurdwara at the birthplace of the founder of Sikhism, Guru Nanak Devji, was symbolic of the continuing persecution of the minorities in Pakistan.

Congress president Sonia Gandhi urged the government "to immediately take up the issue with Pakistani authorities to ensure security for the pilgrims and for the holy shrine to prevent any future attacks".

"The government of India should also press for immediate registration of case, arrest and action against the

culprits," she said.

The Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), which manages the affairs of all gurdwaras, has asked the Pakistan government to take stern action against those responsible for the attack.

"Pakistan has proved that the CAA is a timely and right decision," Ms. Lekhi said.

"The attack in Nankana Sahib should make those sit-

ting in Shaheen Bagh and in the Kerala Assembly" understand the "importance of the CAA," she said, referring to the anti-CAA protests in Delhi's Shaheen Bagh and the resolution passed by the Kerala Assembly not to implement the law.

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee condemned the attack. She said, "We condemn the incident of violence at Gurdwara Nankana Sahib in Pakistan, This is unacceptable. Humanity comes above all else.'

India caught in crossfire as Trump invokes Delhi

But Iran's Ambassador to India Ali Chegeni denies allegation that Soleimani was behind terror attacks

India got caught in the crossfire between the United States and Iran after President Donald Trump blamed assassinated Iranian General Qassem Soleimani for a spate of terror attacks, including one in Delhi, a charge Iran's Ambassador to India has denied.

In a statement in Washington, Mr. Trump justified the killing of Soleimani in a missile attack on his convoy outside the Baghdad airport, saying the head of Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps' (IRGC) international operations or "Qods Force" was responsible for several terror attacks and was planning

"Soleimani made the death of innocent people his sick passion, contributing to terrorist plots as far away as New Delhi and London," Mr. Trump said.

Iran's Ambassador to India Ali Chegeni denied the allegations. "Mr. Trump can say anything he likes, he can give any list of attacks that he likes. But this is a big lie. General Soleima-

The Ministry of External Affairs declined to comment on Mr. Trump's statement, which brought New Delhi into the rising tensions between Washington and Tehran.

Mr. Trump is believed to have referred to the car bombing of an Israeli diplomat in Delhi in February 2012. The diplomat, who was also the wife of the Israeli defence attaché, was injured in the attack, along with three others. At the time, the Delhi police's special cell that investigated

the case believed it was connected with attacks on Israeli diplomats in Tbilisi, Georgia, as well as Bangkok, Thailand, and was reportedly carried out by IRGC agents in retaliation for attacks on Iranian nuclear scientists.

Delhi Police officials say the case has not moved since 2013, when one suspect, an Indian journalist with an Iranian news agency, was granted bail, a decision that was upheld by the Supreme Court. Two Iranian suspects were named in the FIR but they haven't been traced by the police, and no charges have been framed in the case

Sadaf Jafar, Darapuri among 14 granted bail

They were booked for Lucknow violence

Congress worker Sadat Jatar and retired IPS officer S.R. Darapuri were among 14 persons granted bail by a Lucknow court on Saturday in connection with violence in Lucknow on December 19 during protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019.

Additional Sessions Judge S.S. Pandey passed the bail order and asked the accused to furnish two bail bonds of ₹50,000 each and personal bonds of the same amount. The 12 others granted bail included Dalit lecturer Pavan Rao Ambedkar.

As per the FIR, 34 named persons were charged under 18 Sections of the IPC and the Public Property Act.

While granting bail, the court considered the admission of the prosecution that there was no clear evidence

so far against the accused regarding their involvement in the violence and the police were trying to collect more evidence. However, the charges have been questioned by the Congress and families of Ms. Jafar and Mr Darapuri.

In a memorandum signed by party general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra and submitted to the U.P. Governor, the Congress said Ms. Jafar was arrested "without cause or reason" while she was recording a video when the protests turned violent. The party and Ms. Jafar's family also alleged that she was "brutally assaulted" in custody.

The family of Mr. Darapuri also questioned his arrest. The 76-vear-old retired IPS officer and Ambedkarite activist, was under house arrest on December 19 when the violence took place.

A 47-year-old woman died and eight other members of her family, including five minors, suffered injuries when the roof of their house collapsed in west Delhi's Uttam Nagar on

Saturday. The deceased has been identified as Dulari Devi.

Delhi Fire Service Director Atul Garg said that a call was received regarding the collapse at 3.01 p.m. after which fire personnel and local police reached the spot. "Three fire tenders were pressed into service. Nine persons were rushed to Deen Dayal Upadhyay Hospital by the locals," Mr. Garg said. Dulari was declared dead in the hospital. The other eight sustained minor injuries and were discharged after treatment.

Several accounts try to lure users posing as women and offering fake Netflix discount

NEW DELHI From free Netflix subscriptions to chats and dates with 'lonely women', a variety of "services" were advertised by Twitter handles by Saturday, inviting people to call 88662-88662. The only catch

was that the number

protests against the CAA, which fast-tracks citizenship for Sikhs, Hindus, Jains, Parsis,

Christians and Buddhists who fled persecution in Pakistan, Bangladesh or Afghanistan, the BJP had launched the dial-in campaign to mobilise support for the law.

In a tweet on Thursday, the BJP's official handle (@BJP4India) asked people to give a missed call on 88662-88662 to register their support for the CAA. While many BJP leaders also shared the number, other users on Twitter used it for different purposes.

"This is absolutely fake,"

U.S.-based online streaming provider Netflix tweeted on Saturday, reacting to the tweets about free subscriptions to its service. "If you want free Netflix

please use someone else's account like the rest of us," the Netflix India account replied to a tweet that promised a 6-month free subscription. A few Twitter users tried to dissuade people from calling the number, raising the spectre of a data breach, and theft of bank details, Aadhaar and PAN numbers.

Asked to comment about the use of the number for other purposes, BJP national secretary Tarun Chugh told *The Hindu* that the "IT cell will have to look into it".

Naresh Koch became the first "declared foreigner" to die in captivity in the New Year. He belonged to the Koch-Rajbongshi community that has been demanding the Scheduled Tribe status along with five other indigenous communities in Assam.

Doctors at the Guwahati Medical College Hospital said Koch, who was in his mid-50s, died on Friday night from health complications. He was brought in a critical condition from the Goalpara detention centre, about 140 km west of Guwahati, 10 days ago. Goalpara is one of the six detention centres functioning from central jails in Assam. Together, they house some 1,000 people declared foreigners by 100 Foreigners'



Tribunals in the State.

Koch, officials at the detention centre said, was lodged in March 2018 after a tribunal in Goalpara district marked him a foreigner.

"The man suffered a stroke and died in the hospital. He was from the Mornoi area [near Sainik School, Goalpara]," Superintendent of Police, Goalpara, Sushanta Biswa Sarma told The Hindu.

la Shah, whose father Keshav Prasad Gupta had come from Bihar and settled down in Sonitpur district during the British rule. Another is Puna Munda, a tea plantation worker, whose family traced its roots to Sekai village in Jharkhand.


BJP MP sits on dharna against violence

Air quality stays 'very poor' in city

The air quality of the city continued to be in the 'very poor' category on Saturday and may slightly improve over the next few days, said forecasting agency SAFAR.

The Air Quality Index (AQI) on Saturday was 334, slightly down from Friday's 352, as per Central Pollution Control Board bulletin. The average level of PM2.5 was 197.4 ug/m3, over three times the safe limit of 60 ug/m3, in Delhi-NCR at 6 p.m.

'AQI may improve to the lower end of 'very poor' category by Sunday," SAFAR said, adding that air quality may reach the 'poor' category by January 6.

"Surface winds have picked up and direction has become westerly... The minimum temperature may increase by 2-3 degrees Celsius over the next two days. The increase in ventilation is improving air quality," SAFAR said.

Increase in temperature and faster winds help disperse pollutants. Vinobapuri, GT Road and Bawana may be the top three pollution hotspots on Sunday.



We will not move an inch till citizenship law is rolled back'

Protest at Shaheen Bagh enters 22nd day as support continues to pour in

Demonstration at Shaheen Bagh against the amended citizenship law entered the 22nd day on Saturday with scores of people speaking out against the Act, the National Register of Citizens (NRC) and the National Population Register (NPR).

Mehrun Isha (50), who has been on a hunger strike for the past five days, said: "We demand the revocation of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, NRC and NPR. Most of us who are protest-

ing are very poor, we have lost our sources of livelihoods in the aftermath of demonetisation and now the government has come up with a new way of troubling us."


Yogesh Swami, who has been organising plays against the CAA and NRC in several parts of the city, said: "Cultural resistance is also a form of peaceful protest. So we sing songs and read out poems that embody these values. The government will not succeed in portraying this solely as

an issue about Muslims." Commenting on Union

Home Minister Amit Shah's statement that "the government would not go back an inch to revoke the legislation", Shabina, who came to Delhi from Rajasthan to show solidarity with the movement, said: "If the government will not move then even we will not move an inch. This is a crowd of angry mothers that has received support from students, locals and others. We will continue to stand against police brutality, CAA and NRC."

Amid loud chants of "Inquilab Zindabad" women protesters continued to occupy the stage as more people joined. Refuting rumours pertaining that the protest may be called off, Shahin Kausar (44), a homemaker, said: "People have come here from across the country and will continue to do so till the amended citizenship law is rolled back. Those who spread these rumours are upset that a nonviolent protest has continued for so long."

Nankana Sahib attack: protests near Pakistan High Commission

Delhi Sikh panel, Congress, BJP hold separate agitations

Scores of people gathered on the road leading to the Pakistan High Commission in central Delhi on Saturday to protest against the attack on Nankana Sahib Gurdwara near Lahore, Pakistan.

Separate protests by the Delhi Sikh Gurdwara Management Committee (DSGMC), Indian Youth Congress (IYC), and Delhi BJP Sikh Cell were held throughout the day.

The protest by the DSGMC started at 1 p.m. while the demonstration by the IYC began at 3.30 p.m. at the same place. The BJP protest started later. The protesters raised slogans against Pakistan. One placard read: "Double standard of Imran Khan, Sikhs are being tortured in Pakistan".

Sikh community members also submitted a memorandum at the Pakistan High

Commission asking the Pakistan government to explain the failure of law-enforcement agencies, the DSGMC said. The protest was led by DSGMC chief Manjinder Singh Sirsa. Shiv Charan Singh Lamba, DSGMC member, said the gurdwara was the birth place of Guru Nanak Dev and that the vandalism was highly condemnable.

Mohan Singh, a driver and resident of Kalyanpuri who was at the protest, said: "70%

of our places of worship are in Pakistan. PM Imran Khan is vocal about everything and has spoken out against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act in India as he believes that Muslims are being cornered... Why hasn't he spoken about what has happened at Nankana Sahib?".

The protesters said they expect the Indian government to pressure Pakistan into probing the incident.

BJP national secretary R.P. Singh said: "People opposing the amended citizenship law should learn a lesson from this incident... this law is for the minorities who are tortured in Pakistan, Afghanistan, Bangladesh and to protect their religion."

IYC president Srinivas BV said: "Pakistan is playing with our emotions and the time has come when we need to teach them a lesson."

Officials summoned over 3 malfunctioning STPs

Sewage flowing into Hindon, Yamuna

The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has summoned senior officials of the Uttar Pradesh Jal Nigam, Ghaziabad Development Authority and Ghaziabad Nagar Nigam after a report furnished by the Central Pollution Control Board and the Uttar Pradesh pollution control board indicated that three sewage treatment plants in Indirapuram were malfunctioning and leading to pollution in Hindon and

Yamuna rivers. A Bench headed by NGT Chairperson Justice Adarsh Kumar Goel observed: "The very purpose of the STPs is defeated. Encroachments have not been removed and dumping of solid waste is taking place." While noting that the "overflowing sewage" was discharged directly into the Hindon, which leads to pollution in the Yamuna,

the Bench said that "apathy

of authorities" was reflected by the lack of remedial action. "Coercive measures must be taken by authorities, and remedial action is needed for preventing untreated sewage from being discharged directly into the river system," the Bench said.

The green panel also directed the U.P. Chief Secretary to monitor the situation and ensure that appropriate action plans are prepared within a month.

The directions came on a plea moved by Hindon Resorts Pvt. Ltd. and others, which alleged that three STPs in Indirapuram were malfunctioning. "The sewage is overflowing due to obstruction and dumping of garbage by scrap dealers on the side lines of the open drains and due to encroachment by high-rise complexes and shops," the Bench observed while noting the allegations made in the plea.

Poster war takes over Delhi roads, barbs reach crescendo

Ahead of Assembly polls, AAP, BJP put up hoardings questioning each other's claims

The poster war between the Aam Aadmi Party and the BIP- aimed at questioning everything from each other's claim to form the next government in the Capital to the capability of their respective leaderships - went up a notch here on Saturdav.

The hoarding, supposedly installed by an individual – Deepak Madan – who is associated with the Rashtriya Swayamsewak Sangh (RSS), the Bajrang Dal and the BJP, sought to argue that while the "country wants Modi", the people of the Capital "want Kejriwal."

A picture of the hoarding was first put out by Abhishek Gupta from AAP's national social media team on Twitter on Friday evening following which it was shared by the party's spo-Saurabh kesperson Bharadwaj.

AAP takes to Twitter

Mr. Gupta's post was captioned as: "When those from the RSS and the BJP's own workers start saying 'Dilli Mein to Kejriwal' you can gauge which way the wind is blowing [sic]."

"Yes, I have put up the hoarding. Thirteen of them have been installed at several locations in Delhi till now and one more will be put up by tomorrow. If one speaks from the heart, there is no denying that Kejriwal has done a lot of good work for the city. However, that may not be the official line of the party one is associated with," Mr. Madan told The *Hindu*. He also said: "I have been with the RSS since I childhood and then got associated with the Bajrang

Dal of which I am a member.

I am now the Paschim Vihar Mandal president of the BJP. But let me clarify, the hoardings say what I feel in a personal capacity."

Whodunnit

Meanwhile, the BIP claimed Mr. Madan had "nothing to do with it and was certainly not an office-bearer" of its State unit. This, even as an AAP insider said similar hoardings, claiming that outfits associated with the BJP were in support of Mr. Kejriwal, had emerged prior to the Delhi Assembly Elections in 2015.

A BJP source said: "This is clearly an attempt by AAP to try and confuse voters with elections around the corner, to portray that the BJP has no confidence in its leadership. It is a ploy which is both sad and desperate." In response to this, an

AAP insider said: "The onus of proving whether the person who installed the hoardings belongs to the RSS or the BJP is on them; it is not our prerogative."

Project proposed at ₹550 crore: DDA

The Delhi Development Authority (DDA) on Saturday said Home Minister Amit Shah will lay the foundation stone for the Delhi Cycle Walk, which is proposed to be a ₹550-crore project, at Tughlakabad on January 6.

The project, likely to be completed in four years, will make mobility economical for Delhiites, fight pollution and also transform the city into "the most walkable and cycle-friendly city," the DDA

Under the project, cycling tracks called "On Grade Tracks" will connect busidistricts, offices, schools, colleges and metro stations, said officials

"The Delhi Cycle Walk will be a controlled track with defined and secure entrance points near residential areas and exit points near places of work, schools and so on. These points of entry will be called origin-destination plazas and will have facilities like washrooms, cycle parking and repairs points among other facilities," a senior official said. While the entire network is projected to span over a 200km area, the first phase, including three corridors will cover an The project, likely

Cycle Walk tracks shall move seamlessly from one forest to another."

"The Cycle Walk has been conceived with the objective to take a few million car rides out of Delhi roads and allow people to walk and cycle safely," the land-owning agency said.

Former T.N. Speaker P.H. Pandian no more

He sparked controversy with rulings

Former Assembly Speaker and the AIADMK's legal advisor P.H. Pandian died of cardiac failure at a private hospital in Porur in Chennai on Saturday morning. He was 74. He had been under medical treatment for cardiac-related problems.

He is survived by daughter and four sons. The funeral will be held on Sunday evening in

Chennai. Best known for his statement during his term as Speaker that the presiding officer had "sky high powers", Mr. Pandian hailed from Cheranmahadevi in Tiruneveli . A product of the Pachaiyappa's College and Law College in Chennai, he enrolled at the Madras Bar

in April 1968. After M.G. Ramachandran formed the AIADMK in October 1972, Mr. Pandian joined his party and was elected to the Assembly for the first time from the Cheranmahadevi constituency (now abolished) in 1977. He went on to win in 1980, 1984 and 1989. In the 1989 Assembly polls, he was the only nominee of the AIADMK (Janaki faction) to win.

11th Assembly Speaker Mr. Pandian became the 11th Assembly Speaker in February 1985, a post he held for four years.

Five months later, the Assembly awarded S. Balasubramanian, then editor of the Tamil weekly Ananda Vikatan, three months' rigorous imprisonment for publishing a cartoon. For the next couple of days, when the State was rocked by the controversy, it was left to Mr. Pandian to defend the House's decision. The row was resolved a few days

later with the Speaker ordering the release of the journalist in deference to the Chief Minister's wishes.

There were other controversies associated with Mr. Pandian's innings. In a first of its kind, the Assembly, in December 1986, expelled 10 MLAs of the DMK for taking part in an agitation to burn the Constitution. In January 1988 when the Janaki Ramachandran Ministry sought a vote of confidence in the House, Mr. Pandian, in a single day, disqualified 33 MLAs belonging to the rival faction of the AIADMK led by Jayalaithaa.

When the AIADMK factions led by Janaki Ramachandran and Jayalalithaa merged in February 1989, Mr. Pandian opted out.

In August 1993, he returned to the AIADMK. In 1999, he was elected to the Lok Sabha from Tirunelveli and headed the AIADMK's parliamentary party in the Lok Sabha.

After Jayalalithaa's death, Mr. Pandian refused to accept the leadership of V.K. Sasikala and aligned with O. Panneerselvam who had led the AIADMK's revolt against Sasikala in February 2017.

Chief Minister Edappadi K. Palaniswami described Mr. Pandian's passing as a "huge loss" to the AIADMK.

Community members have threatened to relaunch their agitation if the State government does not concede their decade-long demand for an increase in the quota.

Mr. Sriramulu, who was projected as the leader of the Valmiki community by the BJP during the Assembly elections, has been sulking since he was denied the Deputy Chief Minister's post in the B.S. Yediyurappa-led go-

Mr. Jarkiholi, who defected from the Congress to the BJP and was re-elected in the bypoll, has also been doing all he can to get the Deputy Chief Minister's post. He has been meeting community seers and lobbying hard. Cabinet expansion is expected to take place this month.

to awareness in the initial months before moving to prosecuting offenders. We have prosecuted nearly 500 people since then. It seems to have worked as we have been able to arrest the increasing trend of incidents in the six-month period ending December 31," the RPF official said.

Kerala to take more cover under Miyawaki forests

Concept helps to increase green cover in urban areas

The Miyawaki method of afforestation, which has revolutionised the concept of urban afforestation by turning backyards into mini-forests, is to add green cover on government office premises, residential complexes, school premises, and pu-

ramboke land in Kerala. The government intervention comes in the wake of the highly successful technique, pioneered by Japanese botanist Akira Miyawaki, and adopted in the State by individuals to increase the green cover in urban and semi-urban areas.

The Forest Department is

By promoting natural vegetation on land destroyed by natural calamities and due to human activity along the Japanese coastline, Miyawaki managed to raise miniforests. The replication of the model across Kerala, which has suffered floods, landslips and soil erosion,

The Miyawaki afforestation method has been adopted in 15 places with the support of the Nature's Green Guardians Foundation (NGGF), an NGO.

'Will help combat spread of resistance'

pathogen-specific drugs

Concerns surrounding antibiotic use, including environmental hazards and the appearance of multi-drug resistant bacteria, can be minimised by designing antibiotics that are specific to each species of pathogen, instead of using the broadrange antibiotics that are currently favoured, Ada E. Yonath, winner of the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 2009, said here on Saturday. She was delivering a talk on ecofriendly antibiotics at the 107th Indian Science Congress.

"I have started work on degradable antibiotics that are effective only for the target pathogen. This will reduce environmental hazards and combat the spread of resistance," Prof. Yonath, who is with the Weizmann Institute Science in Israel.

"The increasing appearance of multi-drug resistant strains, together with the negligible number of new antibiotic drugs that are presently undergoing development, is a big problem. We may soon revert back to the pre-antibiotic era, when

simple pathogens could cause very severe infections. This may result in a 3.8% loss in global economy by 2050. Something has to be done," she said.

Later, speaking to The Hindu, Prof. Yonath said that the danger of antibiotics is the potential damage that they cause to the microbiome. Changes to the composition of the human microbiome can cause disease, she said. Most antibiotics are made up of small, toxic, organic molecules that cannot be digested and are expelled into the environment, she said.

"They are so small that most purification facilities cannot catch them, so they penetrate irrigation systems and eventually come back to us." she said

Two persons were injured in the collapse and were taken to Bardhaman Medical College and Hospital.

"So far there are no reports of any one trapped under the debris. We are trying to assess the situation," said Ishaq Khan, Divisional Railway Manager, Howrah.

Mr. Khan said since the railway platform was not affected, services would not be disturbed.

The entire area around the building was evacuated as authorities fear that the remaining structure could also come down.

Bardhaman is a junction on the Howrah-Delhi main line of the Eastern Railway, about 90 km from Kolkata, and is usually very crowded.

Singh Puri shared a video of the mob outside the Nankana Sahib gurdwara on Twitter and said: "Murderous mob which laid siege to Sri Nankana Sahib has also threatened to change the name of this holiest of holy places to Ghulam-e-Mustafa. Persecution of minorities in Pakistan is for real. Do those opposed to CAA still need more proof? (sic),"

In Chandigarh, the SGPC chief said they would sens a delegation to meet with Punjab Governor and Chief Minister in Pakistan and urge them to ensure the safety of Sikhs. "Pakistan should take an immediate and strict action against all those who were involved in this condemnable act of attacking the historic gurdwara. We have decided to send a four member delegation to Pakistan, which will asses the ground situation there-"said SGPC president Gobind Singh Longowal.

India caught in crossfire as Trump invokes Delhi

Ahmed Patel meets Sonia as MLAs feel hurt over 'raw deal'; tensions rise with Sena over Savarkar book

Days after the expansion of the Maharashtra Cabinet, there is unrest within the Congress camp about the party getting a "raw deal" in the Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government.

With ally Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) likely to get both the Finance and Home portfolios besides 16 berths, a section of the Congress is unhappy over the reported allocation between the allies.

Senior Congress leader Ahmed Patel is reported to have discussed the Maharashtra issue with party chief Sonia Gandhi but there was no official word on the 45minute meeting on Saturday.

Apart from the Ministry allocation, the Congress stance on Hindutva ideologue Vinayak Damodar Sa-

varkar, especially a controversial booklet taken out by the Congress Seva Dal in Madhya Pradesh, has added to the tensions with ally Shiv

"We are different parties with different ideologies and there would be differences over some issues. We expect the Shiv Sena as a political party to speak out, but we hope it won't affect the functioning of the government," said a State Congress leader.

Several Congress leaders in Maharashtra are also upset at not being accommo-

dated in the Cabinet, with MLA from Jalna Kailash Gorantyal issuing a fresh threat on Saturday that he would resign from all party posts along with his supporters.

Burnt in effigy

On Friday, Congress workers in Solapur burnt an effigy of senior leader and State incharge Mallikarjun Kharge for including local MLA Praniti Shinde in the Cabinet.

A three-time legislator from Solapur City Central, Ms. Shinde is the daughter of veteran Congressman, former Chief Minister and Union Home Minister Sushilkumar Shinde. With 44 MLAs, the Con-

gress has been given 12 berths, apart from the Speaker post to Nana Patole. Distribution of portfolios have made matters worse as key Ministries have either gone to the NCP or the Shiv

Though the Congress was keen on having some of the key Ministries like Rural Development, Agriculture, Transport and Housing Development, it will have to settle with the Revenue and Public Works Ministries.

"We have got a raw deal both in terms of portfolios as well Ministries. We should have stuck to 14-14-14 formula where each ally would have got 14 berths," a Congress functionary familiar with the State told The Hindu.

Former Chief Minister Ashok Chavan, who was inducted as a Cabinet Minister in the December 30 Cabinet expansion, and State Congress chief Balasaheb Thorat have been asked to speak to the disgruntled MLAs.

Withdraw Savarkar booklet: NCP

The Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) has demanded that a Seva Dal booklet containing "insulting" remarks against Hindutva ideologue Vinayak Savarkar be withdrawn.

The booklet issued this week claimed Vinayak Savarkar and Mahatma Gandhi's assassin Nathuram Godse were in a physical relationship. The NCP on Saturday said this was not a fair claim to make when the persons in question was not alive. The Congress and the NCP are coalition partners in Maharashtra in the Maha Vikas Aghadi government.

"Since Savarkar is not alive, it is not correct to make this claim," said State Minister and senior NCP leader Nawab Malik.

CAA: Sinha announces protest yatra

Former Union Minister Yashwant Sinha on Saturday announced a nationwide 'Yatra' (tour) in protest against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, the National Register of Citizens and the National Population Register.

The campaign, organised under the banner of his organisation Rashtra Manch, would be called "Gandhi Shanti Yatra", Mr. Sinha told presspersons here in the presence of former MP Shatrughan Sinha and former Gujarat Chief Minister Suresh Mehta.

The Yatra will start at Mumbai's Apollo Bunder on January 9, pass through Maharashtra, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Harayana and Delhi and cover over 3,000 km, he said. It would end at the Raj Ghat in Delhi on January 30, Mahatma Gandhi's death anniversary. Accusing the BJP-ruled States of using violence to suppress protests against the CAA, he lamed the government for disturbing peace.

Venkaiah for easing plaint rules against MPs

Complaints against 19 MPs returned

Rajya Sabha Chairman M. Venkaiah Naidu wants the procedure to raise complaints against members to be eased after it emerged that action could not be taken against 19 members in the past four years because the complaints did not comply with the procedure.

Plaints returned

A review conducted by this committee last week revealed that 22 complaints against 19 members in the past four years had to be returned without examination since they did not comply with the procedure.

Vyapam scam: CBI secures 94 convictions in 4 years

The investigation agency is pursuing 154 cases in the exam scandal in Madhya Pradesh

Pursuing as many as 154 cases on the Vyapam scam for four years, the Central Bureau of Investigation has so far secured 94 convictions against those who subverted the entrance tests for admission in educational institutions and government jobs in Madhya Pradesh. More than 3,100 accused persons have been chargesheeted.

The convicts have been awarded three to 10 years of imprisonment, based on the

145 charge sheets against the accused persons. They include the masterminds, middlemen, a large number of candidates, impersonators and former Vyapam officials. Over 130 of them have been arrested. Complaints against suspects who were minors have been filed in juvenile justice courts.

CAA ends Assam Accord betrayal: BJP

'Act will undo damage done by setting the cut-off year for accepting foreigners as 1971 instead of 1951'

Leaders of the BJP's Assam unit said here on Saturday that the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA) was designed to undo the damage done by the leaders of the Assam agitation who settled for 1971 as the cut-off year for accepting foreigners instead of 1951.

Former Chief Minister Prafulla Kumar Mahanta was the president of the All Assam Students' Union (AASU) when it led the agitation from 1979 to 1985. That stir ended with the signing of the Assam Accord, which prescribed deportation of "illegal immigrants" who entered the State after March 24, 1971.

"Assam was made to absorb the burden of illegal immigrants for 20 years by accepting 1971 as the base year instead of 1951 for accepting

them. This was because of the Accord the AASU had signed with the Rajiv Gandhi government. Wasn't that a betrayal by those who are

Show of strength

The rally was a show of strength after other parties including the Congress had joined hands against the BJP in the past few days.

The BJP had been on the back foot after the stir shook the State in December with protesters attacking the houses of party MLAs and leaders.

Mr. Sarma was particularly severe on Mr. Mahanta, who had gone against the Asom Gana Parishad leadership to slam the CAA that he said would open the floodgates for "Hindu Bangladeshis" to threaten eventually the existence of the Assamese people.

The anti-CAA activists say the law violates the Assam

"Samujjal [Bhattacharyya, chief adviser to the AASU] said the Accord was the best agreement. Why then was there no outrage when the Citizenship Act was amended in 1987 and 1992 for granting citizenship to the children of illegal Bangladeshi immigrants," Mr. Sarma said.

People flustered

He said the first step toward setting things right was taken by the Atal Bihari Vajpayee government when it decided not to let the children of illegal immigrants become Indians.

"Some people get flustered when we talk about the Hindus. The Congress has nothing against the CAA. They want the Muslims to be included. In Parliament, they had said they were opposed to it as the Muslims were not considered," Mr. Sarma said.

Sushil Modi dares Bengal, Kerala CMs

'No State govt. can refuse CAA, NPR'

Senior Bihar BJP leader Sushil Kumar Modi on Saturday dared the Chief Ministers of West Bengal and Kerala, Mamata Baneriee and Pinaravi Vijayan respectively, not to implement the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA) and the National Population Register if they can.

Mr. Modi, who is also the Bihar Deputy Chief Minister, asserted that there is no question of discussing the issue of National Register of Citizens (NRC) as Prime Minister Narendra Modi has made it clear that the government never discussed it.

"NPR and NRC are two different things," he told newsmen here and blamed the Congress and the Rashtriya Janata Dal for the confusion on them and the CAA.

'Statutory provision'

"No State, including West Bengal, Kerala, Rajasthan, can refuse to implement the CAA or NPR as the Centre has the power to bring legislation over citizenship. Preparing NPR is a statutory provision which no State can refuse to implement," Mr. Modi said.

'No Chief Ministers, even if he/she is opposed to CAA and NPR, can refuse to implement them. Neither West Bengal CM Mamata Banerjee nor Kerala CM P. Vijayan can say that they won't implement NPR in their States. They can say anything for public consumption, but they can't say no to CAA and NPR... A census director in each State has already been appointed, including in West Bengal," he added.

The process of preparing the NPR began in 2010 during the UPA regime, which was completed between April 1 and September 30 that year, he said.

The Centre is just "updating" the NPR 2010 in 2020

just before the 2021 census.

The NPR process in 2020 will be carried out between April 1 to September 30 in the country. In Bihar, it will be done between May 15 and May 28, 2020, Mr. Modi said.

Administrative and punitive action will be taken against officials if they refuse to carry out the NPR, he added.

The Deputy Chief Minister expressed satisfaction that there were no incident of major violence as people, especially Muslims, understood that the CAA is not meant to take away anyone's citizenship.

Asked whether respondents will have to disclose the date and place of birth of their parents in the NPR, Mr. Modi said there is no mandatory provision for it. He also stressed that no documents like birth certificate or land documents will be sought from the respondents.

Replying to a query, Mr. Modi favoured adding a caste column in the Census 2021 and said that he would request the Centre for it as the State legislature has passed a resolution in this regard.

Replying to a query on Union Home Minister Amit Shah's statement that NRC will be implemented across the country by 2024, he said: "There is no importance of anyone's statement once the PM has the said that the government has never dis-





Thousands mourn Soleimani in Iraq

Political leaders, clerics attend mass ceremony to honour slain Iranian commander

Tens of thousands of Iraqis, many chanting "Death to America", on Saturday mourned a top Iranian commander and others killed in a U.S. drone attack that sparked fears of a regional proxy war between Washington and Tehran.

The killing of Iran's Major General Qassem Soleimani on Friday was the most dramatic escalation yet in spiralling tensions between Iran and the United States, which pledged to send thousands more troops to the region.

Iraqi political leaders and clerics attended the mass ceremony to honour Soleimani and the other nine victims of the pre-dawn attack on Baghdad international airport.

Stopping a war

U.S. President Donald Trump said he had decided to "terminate" Iran's military mastermind to prevent an "imminent" attack on U.S. diplomats and troops. "We took action last night to stop a war," he insisted. "We did not take action to start a war." But a furious Iran has vowed revenge for the killing of Soleimani, the chief architect of its military operations across West Asia.

"The response for a military action is a military action," Iranian Ambassador to the United Nations Majid Takht Ravanchi told CNN, calling the strike an "act of war". "By whom, by when, where? That is for the future to witness."

In the hours after the strike, the U.S. reached out to Iran, with which it has had no direct diplomatic ties for decades.

Switzerland, whose embassy in Tehran represents U.S. interests, confirmed on Saturday its charge d'affaires


Call for revenge

Dressed in black, they waved white Hashed flags and massive portraits of Iranian and Iraqi leaders, furiously calling for "revenge". The remains were then moved to the shrine city of Karbala and would ultimately end up in Najaf, where the Iraqis will be buried. The Guards' remains would be flown to Iran, which has declared three days of mourning and religious rituals.

Iraqis worry the U.S. strike could unleash a new wave of destabilisation for Iraq.

Amid the tensions, the Pentagon said up to 3,500 additional U.S. troops would be dispatched to Iraq's neighbour Kuwait, to boost some 14,000 reinforcements already deployed to the region last year. About 5,200 U.S. troops are stationed across Iraq to help fight the IS. As a result of the tensions, NATO said it was suspending its training activities in Iraq and a U.S. defence official said that American-led coalition forces would "limit" operations. U.S. citizens were meanwhile urged to leave Iraq immediately and American staff were evacuated from oil fields in the south.

Iraq's pro-Iran factions have seized on Soleimani's death to push Parliament, which convenes on Sunday, to revoke the security agreement allowing U.S. forces on Iraqi soil.

Australia PM criticised for bushfire ad

Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison faced renewed criticism on Saturday, after sharing bushfire themed party campaign ads that opponents condemned as "disgusting" and a respected defence association

Targeted for mocking Saudi royals through satire

Ghanem al-Masarir's videos have been viewed more than 300 million times on YouTube

No one has skewered the Saudi royal family as gleefully as Ghanem al-Masarir.

In hundreds of videos posted to YouTube – which have been viewed more than 300 million times - Mr. al-Masarir sits at a desk, usually at his home in North London, offers a jovial greeting in Arabic, then launches into a series of embarrassing Saudi-related stories. The tone is sharply satirical, the delivery a bit hammy.

One of his favourite targets is Mohammed bin Salman, the Saudi Crown Prince, whom he long ago tagged with a nickname, now widely used by detractors, that translates to "the bear that has gone astray." Nippon MF, Credit Suisse, IRDAI spat headed to SAT

Dispute about pledging Reliance General Insurance shares

ASHISH RUKHAIYAR MUMBAI

An ongoing tussle between the Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India (IRDAI), Nippon India Mutual Fund and Credit Suisse is likely to head to the Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT) after the insurance watchdog declared that the pledging of shares of Reliance General Insurance with the two entities was in violation of the law.

According to persons familiar with the development, the two entities intend to contest the IRDAI directive as they believe that the pledge was created to safeguard the interests of their investors and unit holders without an intent of owning the shares of the insurance company.

Reliance Home defaults "The pledge was invoked af-

ter a default by Reliance Home Finance and was done purely based on the fiduciary responsibilities and the share pledge agreement," said a person familiar with the matter.

"The IRDAI directive has created a scenario wherein the issuer has already defaulted and the bond holders no more have access to the collateral that was placed while restructuring the payment terms," he added on the condition of anonymity.

The matter goes back to March 2018 when Reliance Home Finance issued nonconvertible debentures to raise about ₹400 crore. The bonds were subscribed by Nippon India MF and Credit

Thereafter, the bonds matured in June 2019 but Reliance Home Finance was unable to meet the payment

obligations and hence sought restructuring of the terms wherein the maturity date was extended to October 31, 2019 and additional security was brought in by Reliance Capital,the promoter of Reliance Home Finance.

For the additional collat-Reliance Capital pledged its 100% shareholding in Reliance General Insurance Company.

Payment default

The company, however, again defaulted on its payment obligations and both, Nippon India MF and Credit Suisse invoked the pledge as per the deed of guarantee dated July 19, 2019 and the amended and restated share agreement dated pledge Iune 26, 2019.

IDBI Trusteeship, which was acting as the debenture trustee, took possession of the shares of Reliance General Insurance from the depository account of Reliance Capital.

This pledge or the transfer of shares, as per IRDAI, is a violation of Section 6(4)(b) (iii) of the Insurance Act 1938 along with Regulation 3 of IRDAI (Transfer of Equity Shares of Insurance Companies) Regulations 2015.

In its letter dated Decem-

ber 27, IRDAI declared the pledge as "null and void ab initio" while also stating that Section 2(7A) of the Insurance Act caps the foreign holding limit in an insurance

While both, Credit Suisse and Nippon India MF are foreign entities, the foreign holding for an insurance company is capped at 49%. While a spokesperson for Credit Suisse declined to comment, an e-mail query sent to Nippon India Mutual Fund remained unanswered

till the time of going to press.

"Transfer of shares is sacrosanct in depository system, and SAT, that hears appeals against orders issued by SEBI and IRDAI, has consistently taken a position that reversal of a transfer or invocation of pledge should not be allowed to maintain the sanctity of the market," said a securities market lawyer wishing not to be named.

Interestingly, in a release issued on December 29, Reliance Capital said that the IRDAI decision has "protected the interest of all lenders and debenture holders" of the company and will help in monetising its stake in the insurance company to reduce its overall debt.

TCS moves SC against NCLAT order on Mistry

Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), the flagship firm of the Tata Group, on Saturday said it has filed an appeal in the Supreme Court against the NCLAT order that directed the reinstatement of Cyrus Mistry as a director of the company.

In a filing with the stock exchanges, TCS said the National Company Law Appellate Tribunal (NCLAT), vide its judgment on December 18, 2019, had directed the re-instatement of Mr. Mistry as director of the company for rest of the tenure.

"... the company, based on a legal opinion, has on January 3, 2020 filed an appeal in the Supreme Court of India (i) to set aside the said judgment qua the company and (ii) [to give an] interim stay on operation of the said judgment to the extent it relates to the company," it added.

Use working capital limits: SBI

In the past, there had been instances of such receivables shown in the balance sheet but the government department saying it did not owe any money, Mr.

Kumar told a FICCI event. The SBI head sought to underscore the need for corporates to work towards building trust.



"Traditionally lending is always on trust... but last few years have not been good because of breach of trust," he said, even while pointing out to the significance of encouraging entrepreneurship and accepting business failures.

The problem comes when the failure is not necessarily on account of business circumstances.

"When an enterprise closes down, its employees suffer... but we find no impact investment, he added.

In the backdrop of the U.S. election, Brexit and challenges in Europe, Indian technology providers seem to have increased their focus on the home market, where sectors such as retail, telecom, media, travel, logistics, oil, power and hospitality are poised for deeper tech deployments, say global

Hansa Iyengar, senior analyst, advanced digital services, Ovum, said, domestic market, in the current context, would be much better for Indian technology providers than chasing newer customers in key markets such as Europe and the U.S.

"Retail, telecom, media, travel, logistics and hospitality are important sectors, and most desi providers



much better for Indian firms, says Hansa Iyengar.

have existing engagements in some of these verticals. In this year and near term, we expect these relationships to grow substantially with India as a whole being on a rapid modernisation drive," she added.

Commenting on the market scenario, R. Ray Wang,

principal analyst, founder, and chairman of Californiabased Constellation Research, Inc. said, "There are too many sellers chasing buyers in key markets. We expect clients to reduce the number of vendors they work with and seek more help in digital, AI and automation.'

Growing North America So, the home market would open up near-term growth opportunities for Indian providers, although the longterm prize would still be around growing accounts in North America and increasing market share in EMEA (Europe, Middle-East and Africa), stated Mr. Wang.

As per Chicago-based analyst firm HFS Research, data explosion, digital disruption and customer experience have emerged as the top three drivers impacting business operations. Offshoring and traditional outsourcing has lost its mojo. But the promise of emerging technologies across the Triple-A Trifecta (automation, analytics, and artificial intelligence), cloud, IoT and blockchain is unquestionable.

"However, the "how" to scale these technologies to realise their promise continues to be a black hole. Indian service providers, who can help clients get to the promised land beyond the piecemeal initiatives, POCs (proof of concepts) and pilots are the ones that are likely to succeed," said Saurabh Gupta, chief research officer at HFS.

On the changing environment, Mr. Gupta said, a clash of cultures was imminent.



Tussle over Belagavi

What is the border dispute between Maharashtra and Karnataka all about and what is the Central government's stand?

SHARATH S. SRIVATSA

The story so far: Last month, Maharashtra Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray appointed Ministers Chaggan Bhujbal and Eknath Shinde as coordinators to oversee the State government's efforts to expedite the case related to the boundary dispute with Karnataka. On the floor of the Assembly, Mr. Thackeray said Prime Minister Narendra Modi understands the PoK issue, but not Maharashtra's border issue. This triggered a response on the Karnataka side, with the Karnataka Rakshana Vedike condemning Mr. Thackeray's statement. Adding fuel to the fire was the case of blackening of Kannada boards in Kolhapur in Maharashtra and stopping of a Kannada film being screened citing law and order issues. The border areas, including Belagavi (earlier Belgaum), the epicentre of the issue for over six decades, remain tense.

What is the controversy?

In 1957, slighted by the implementation of the States Reorganisation Act, 1956, Maharashtra demanded readjustment of its border with Karnataka. It invoked Section 21(2)(b) of the Act, and submitted a memorandum to the Ministry of Home Affairs stating its objection to Marathi-speaking areas being added to Karnataka. It claimed an area of 2,806 square miles that involved 814 villages, and three urban settlements of Belagavi, Karwar and Nippani with a total population of about 6.7 lakh, all part of the Mumbai Presidency before Independence. The villages are spread across Belagavi and Uttar Kannada in north-western Karnataka, and Bidar and Gulbarga districts in north-eastern Karnataka – all bordering Maharashtra.

Later, when a four-member committee was formed by both States, Maharashtra expressed a willingness to transfer 260 predominantly Kannada-speaking villages with a population of about 3.25 lakh and total area of 1,160 square miles in lieu of accepting its demand for 814 villages and three urban settlements, which was turned down by Karnataka.

What was the basis of Maharashtra's claim?

Maharashtra's claim to seek the readjustment of its border was on the basis of contiguity, relative linguistic majority and wishes of the people. If the claim over Belagavi and surrounding areas was based on Marathi speaking people and linguistic homogeneity, it laid its

claim over Karwar and Supa where Konkani is spoken by citing Konkani as a dialect of Marathi. Its argument was based on the theory of village being and enumerated linguistic population in each village. Maharashtra also points out the historical fact that the revenue records in these Marathi-speaking areas are also kept in Marathi.

What is Karnataka's position?

Karnataka has argued that the settlement of boundaries as per the States Reorganisation Act is final. The State argues that the issue would reopen border issues that have not been contemplated under the Act, and that such a demand should not be permitted. Initially, Karnataka was open to adjusting the border in the 10 mile belt from the drawn boundary.

Did the States make an effort to find a solution? In 1960, both States agreed to set up a four-man committee with two representatives from each State. Except on the issue of contiguity, the committee could not arrive at a unanimous decision, and respective representatives submitted reports to their government. Between the 1960s and 1980s, the Chief Ministers of Karnataka and Maharashtra have met several times to

How has the Union Government responded?

Under sustained pressure from Maharashtra, in 1966, the Centre announced setting up a one-man commission under the former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of India, Meher Chand Mahajan, to look into border issues between Karnataka (then Mysore state) and Maharashtra. The commission was also asked to look into Karnataka's demand for integration of Kannada-speaking areas in Kasargod in Kerala.

While Maharashtra reiterated its demand, Karnataka sought areas in Kolhapur, Sholapur and Sangli districts from Maharashtra, and Kasargod from Kerala. The commission received more than 2,200 memoranda and met over 7,500 people. It submitted its report to the Union Government in 1967. The commission's report was placed in Parliament in 1972. The commission rejected Maharashtra's claim over Belagavi city while recommending transfer of about 260 villages to Maharashtra and about 250 villages in Maharashtra to Karnataka. Maharashtra said the report was inconsistent and an unfair application of its own principle. It also said that the report was not a final word on the issue. Karnataka, however, agreed to the report.

Last week, in response to Mr. Thackeray's statement, Karnataka Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa reiterated that the Mahajan Commission report was final and "the question of transferring even an inch of land does not arise". In 2004, Maharashtra had approached the Supreme Court for a settlement under Article 131 (b) of the Constitution. Karnataka has questioned it. With one of the judges recusing, the court has to set up a new bench.

Is West Asia headed for war?

How will the killing of top Iranian general Qassem Soleimani, in a U.S. drone attack, impact the region?

The story so far: Relations between the United States and Iran hit a dangerous new low on Friday, January 3, 2020, when Major Gen. Qassem Soleimani, a top Iranian commander, was killed in a U.S. air strike outside Baghdad airport. Gen. Soleimani, who the U.S. held responsible for the deaths of scores of American soldiers in Iraq, was the commander of the Qods Force, the external intelligence and security unit of the elite Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC). A furious Iran has now vowed a forceful revenge for the killing, raising the risks of a direct war between the U.S. and Iran to an all-time high

Why did the U.S. launch the drone attack?

As the main architect of Iran's foreign operations, Gen. Soleimani has been in the cross hairs of the U.S. for years. Ever since he took over the Qods Force in 1998, he expanded the operations of the unit, by deepening Iran's links with its proxy groups such as Hezbollah and the Badr Organisation, or building new militias such as the Shia Popular Mobilization Units and Houthis. As a leading figure of the Iranian regime, he was seen in public quite often, either attending events in Iran or on the front lines of Iraq or Syria. Attacking him with high-precision air strikes was not an impossible option for the U.S., but U.S. President Donald Trump's predecessors chose not to take that path as the risks outweighed possible benefits. Mr. Trump ordered the hit as tensions between the two countries were soaring, especially in Iraq.

The latest spell of the crisis was triggered after a rocket attack by Iran-trained Iraqi militias in which an American military contractor was killed in Iraq last month. In retaliation, the U.S. launched air strikes at Kataib Hezbollah in Iraq, a Shia paramilitary group trained and funded by the Iranians, killing at least 25. This was followed by an attack on the American Embassy in Baghdad on Tuesday by protesters. The Trump administration held Iran responsible for the storming of the Embassy, and warned of serious repercussions. On Friday, in retaliation, Mr. Trump ordered the drone hit on Gen. Soleimani, who was practically the commander of the Kataib Hezbollah and other Shia militias operating in Iraq. U.S. officials also say that Iran proxies under Gen. Soleimani's leadership were planning to carry out more attacks on U.S. interests in West Asia and that the assassination was carried out to deter them.

Why is the U.S. targeting Shia militias? Also killed in Friday's air strike was Abu Mahdi al-

Muhandis, the deputy commander of the Popular Mobilisation Forces (PMF), an umbrella organisation of pro-Iran Iraqi militias in which Kataib Hezbollah is a member. The PMF was founded in 2014 under Gen. Soleimani's supervision when Iran was trying to put together militias in Iraq and Syria in the wake of civil wars in both countries. Iran's main goal was to save the embattled regime of Bashar al-Assad in Syria and defeat the Islamic State (IS) in Iraq, which was threatening the Baghdad government in 2014. The PMF is constituted of dozens of militias, including the Kataib Hezbollah, Badr Organisation and Kataib al-Imam Ali, through which Gen.



Soleimani and Iran in general exercised enormous influence on Iraqi politics. The PMF played an instrumental role in defeating the IS. The militias fought alongside the Iraqi Army, with the U.S. providing air cover, and liberated Iraqi cities in the north and west from the clutches of the IS. But once the IS Caliphate was destroyed and tensions were on the rise between Iran and the U.S. after the U.S. pulled out of the Iran nuclear deal in 2018, the PMF militias started targeting U.S. forces

rocket attack on Basra airport close to where the consulate is located. As U.S.-Iran tensions soared in the wake of Washington doubling down sanctions on Iran, U.S. forces in Iraq came under several rocket attacks. The U.S. repeatedly blamed Iranbacked militias for the

The decision followed a

attacks. Unlike the previous attacks that did not have any American casualty, the rocket attack on a military base in Kirkuk on December 28 killed an American civilian contractor, following which the U.S. launched the hit on Kataib Hezbollah.

What is Iraq's position?

Iraq is caught between the U.S. and Iran. The U.S., since Saddam Hussein's regime was toppled, has been a major security partner of Iraq. At present, America has about 5,000 troops deployed in various parts of Iraq. On the other side, Iran is Iraq's more powerful neighbour. Most Shia political parties and leaders in Iraq have deep, historical ties with the Iranian regime. Also, the Shia militias are a parallel military force; it takes its orders directly from Tehran rather than from Baghdad. Thus, Iraq cannot totally ignore Iran. The U.S.'s unilateral use of air power within Iraq targeting Iraqi militias without the permission of the government has upset Baghdad. The Iraqi government had strongly condemned the U.S. air strikes on Kataib Hezbollah; a huge crowd participated in

the siege of the American Embassy. The assassination of Gen. Soleimani triggered instant street protests in Iraq, with protesters chanting "Death to America".

It is a complex situation. The Iraqi government is being pushed to a point where it has to choose between Iran and the U.S. And given the intricacy of Iraq's domestic power dynamics and the influence Iran wields over the Iraqi polity, Baghdad is unlikely to antagonise a wounded Tehran.

Iraqi Prime Minister Adil Abdul Mahdi has said Parliament will meet in the coming days to discuss "appropriate measures to preserve the dignity of Iraq and its security and sovereignty". The question is whether the Iraqi government will ask the U.S. to leave the country. Already, calls are getting louder from the Iraqi political class to expel U.S. troops from the country.

So is war inevitable?

It depends on Iran's response. After killing Gen. Soleimani, the U.S. has said it is committed to deescalation. The U.S. is saying that it does not want the situation to spiral out of control. But for Iran, this is not just another attack. Gen. Soleimani was one of the top generals of the regime. Self-preservation or protecting the lives of the top leaders is the primary objective of any regime. A failure means a hole in its deterrence. If Iran's deterrence capacity prevented previous American Presidents from taking such a step, Mr. Trump decided to ignore that, taking a huge risk. So it is upon Iran not only to take revenge for Gen. Soleimani's death but also to bolster its deterrence. If not, there is no guarantee that the U.S. or Israel would not carry out attacks in the future, targeting other Iranian leaders. Iran cannot afford to take such a risk.

Iran has multiple options for retaliation. It can target U.S. troops in Iraq, either using mid-range rockets or ballistic missiles. Iran-backed proxies in the region, from Hezbollah in Lebanon to the PMF in Iraq and the Houthis in Yemen, can carry out attacks, targeting America's allies and assets. The decision is up to the Supreme Leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. He could also wait for an appropriate time, plan and execute a surprise asymmetric attack - which is Iran's main military response model - on the Americans in the region. The risk is that an Iranian attack could trigger a cycle of violence, with both sides targeting each other in West

Why has the U.S. crippled the functioning of the WTO?

Is the World Trade Organization dying? Why does America disregard the authority of the Appellate Body?

The story so far: Even as the trade war between China and the United States shows no signs of ending, Washington has paralysed the World Trade Organization's Appellate Body, which acts as a supreme court for international trade. In December 2019, the U.S. chose to spike the Appellate Body by starving funds for its functioning. It also stalled the selection process for filling six vacancies at the Appellate Body. Consequently, the Appellate Body is left with only one member, who will not be able to deliver any rulings on pending trade disputes a minimum of three members is required to adjudicate any dispute.

What is the World Trade Organization's Appellate Body and why is it in the news?

Global trade disputes are complex and difficult to resolve. For proper enforcement of trade rules, a binding, twostage dispute settlement system was established at the World Trade Organization in the 1990s. The Appellate Body is the scaffolding of the dispute settlement system,

with seven standing members. In the first stage for adjudicating trade disputes, a panel would decide cases brought before it by the members. Rulings issued by the panels can be appealed at the Appellate Body. As part of the second-stage of adjudication, the Appellate Body can uphold, modify or reverse the legal findings and conclusions of a panel. Therefore, the Appellate Body's decisions are final and adopted within 30 days by the dispute settlement body. Sanctions can be imposed on a member in case of its failure to comply with the Appellate Body's rulings.

The panels and the Appellate Body have issued rulings in almost 200 disputes involving bananas, cotton, aircraft, beef, tuna, trade, 'shrimp-turtles', hot-rolled coils, subsidies for renewable energy, and gambling. Cases involving trade remedies such as countervailing and anti-dumping measures, and the use of a controversial practice called the zeroing methodology that inflated the anti-dumping duties, dominated the disputes among the WTO members.

The establishment of the Appellate Body has given teeth and credibility to the rules-based multilateral trading system. Moreover, it provided security and predictability in the multilateral trading system. But the U.S. chose to spike the highest appeals body for global trade disputes by alleging that it has gone astray.

Why did the U.S. choose to strangulate the **Appellate Body?**

The smooth and effective functioning of the Appellate Body, which is regarded as the jewel in the crown, has posed hurdles to the U.S. for adopting unilateral measures. Several U.S. provisions for imposing countervailing and anti-dumping measures were found to be inconsistent with core provisions of the WTO

Finally, the U.S. chose to spike the Appellate Body by resorting to starving funds for its functioning as well as blocking the selection process for filling six vacancies. Consequently, the Appellate Body is left with only one



member, who will not be able to deliver any rulings on the pending trade disputes. A minimum of three members are required to adjudicate any dispute.

Why did the U.S. block the selection process for filling six vacancies?

The independent and impartial functioning of the Appellate Body in complex trade disputes has become a problem for Washington over the past many years. While the U.S. has accepted favourable rulings that served its interests in global trade, it raised intransigent concerns about adverse decisions that struck down the U.S.'s trade measures. Washington has repeatedly accused the Appellate Body of allegedly straying away from the dispute settlement understanding (DSU) in several disputes involving the U.S.' measures that were challenged by other members. It has maintained that the Appellate Body failed to issue rulings within the 90-day deadline. The U.S. says the Appellate Body's rulings failed to adhere to the provisions in the dispute settlement understanding in cases involving countervailing (antisubsidy) and anti-dumping measures based on the zeroing methodology. It argues that the the Appellate Body's decisions "assert a precedential value for its reports...". It has suggested that "some Appellate Body members view themselves as 'appellate judges'... serving on a 'World Trade Court' that is the 'centerpiece' of the WTO dispute settlement system ... rather than one component of it." The U.S has argued: "Such an expansive vision of the Appellate Body is not reflected in the DSU and was not agreed to by the United States." Finally, "there has been no discussion of why the Appellate Body has departed from its agreed role," it has maintained.

How did other WTO members respond to the barrage of criticism levelled by the U.S. against the **Appellate Body?**

Many WTO members did not agree with the U.S. about the functioning of the Appellate Body. Early last year, a facilitator was appointed by WTO members at a general council meeting to address the specific concerns raised by the U.S. about the Appellate Body. The facilitator, who is also the chair for the WTO's dispute settlement body, Ambassador David Walker of New Zealand, held several rounds of consultations with members to finalise a draft decision on unblocking the crisis at the Appellate Body. The draft decision included a package of reforms to improve the functioning of the Appellate Body as well as

the immediate launching of the selection process for filling six vacancies to ensure that the Appellate Body remained functional after December 11, 2019.

There was an overwhelming acceptance for the facilitator's package of reforms at the WTO General Council meeting last month. But the U.S. trade envoy, Ambassador Dennis Shea, rejected the facilitator's draft decision on grounds that it failed to address the issues raised by Washington about the Appellate Body's overall functioning. "Today's failure makes it happen that the Appellate Body, an important component of effective WTO dispute settlement mechanism, will temporarily go

lights out," the Chinese trade envoy Ambassador Zhang Xiangchen said, after the U.S. spurned the facilitator's report. China maintained: "This is no doubt the most severe blow to the multilateral trading system since its establishment."

Said India's trade envoy Ambassador J.S. Deepak: "At the core of a functioning multilateral trading system is an effective dispute resolution

mechanism." He added: "Although not perfect, the dispute settlement system has led to meaningful reductions in unfair trade practices and has helped to strengthen the rules-based international trading system." The U.S. has been one of the bigger users of the dispute settlement system and also a beneficiary "of this public good," India said, cautioning that "unless the Membership acts in concert ... to lift the block on AB vacancies, we are going to lose this public good which has served all of us so well."

How will the U.S.'s unilateral stand affect developing countries?

Undoubtedly, it is a tremendous loss for the majority of WTO members who are all developing and poor countries. Clearly, they "lack the political and economic clout to enforce their rights and protect their interests in a system governed by power and not rules," said Mr.

What is the future for an organisation that will not be able to enforce rules?

The strangulation of the Appellate Body is a reflection of unilateralism and protectionism that are on a sharp rise. China has said: "It is therefore not surprising that someone attempts to use its might rather than WTO adjudications to change trade polices of other Members." The absence of the Appellate Body will create a jungle raj and paves the way for a steep descent into the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, 1947 rules.

Contrasting water-wetting behaviour used for anti-counterfeiting measure

The smart interface embedded with two water wettabilities can hide or reveal information

Researchers at the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Guwahati have developed a new approach to anti-counterfeiting measures. They have developed a smart interface embedded with two different water wettabilities

- extremely water repelling (superhydrophobic) and extremely water loving (superhydrophilic) - which can hide information or make it visible under certain definite conditions. Adding a layer of complexity, the researchers used a molecular printer to imprint a pattern of micron size (500 x 500 microns) that will become visible only when dipped in water or when moist air is blown.

The team led by Uttam Manna from the Department of Chemistry and Centre for Nanotechnology at IIT Guwahati first dip-coated a glass surface for 10 minutes in a mixture of two chemicals and air-dried it to make it hydrophobic.

Reactive coating

The coating is not only hydrophobic but is also reactive. Taking advantage of the reactive surface of the coating, the researchers used a chemical (glucamine) to write letters on the coated surface. The glucamine-treated region becomes selectively and extremely water-loving (superhydrophilic) and hence becomes visible to the naked eyes when dipped in water or when moist air is blown.

region of the coated surface is still chemically reactive, they modified it using another chemical (octadecylamine) to make the surface chemically inert. "At the same time, the octadecylamine makes the surface extremely water-repelling (superhydrophobic). So we introduced two extremely different water wetting behaviours to the surface to make only the pattern visible when immersed in water while the rest of the surface remains opaque as it is highly water-repelling," Prof. Manna says.

The printed letters or pattern be-

Since the rest of the hydrophobic come visible when dipped in water or when most air is blown. It once again becomes invisible when the pattern becomes dry. The transient and reversible identification of the hidden information was tested 100 times by exposing the pattern to mouth mist. The pattern becomes visible in 99%

humid air. "The pattern which is highly water-loving allows water to get in thus allowing light to pass through without much scattering. This makes the pattern visible when it is wet," explains Supriya Das from IIT Guwahati and first author of a paper published in the journal ACS Applied Materials & Interfaces. "The rest of the region is highly water-repelling so there is trapped air that scatters light and hence remains opaque."

"We initially tested the concept using a glass surface and then tested it using a filter paper. Since it is surfaceindependent, we can achieve similar results even when plastic, cloth or any other materials are used," he

Using micropatterns

Initially, the researchers use a pen containing glucamine chemical to write letters on the coated surface. To make the invisible text more complex and restrict it to a small region the IIT team turned to Dr. Michael Hirtz and his team at the Institute of Nanotechnology & Karlsruhe Nano Micro Facility at the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology in Karlsruhe, Germany, Dr. Hirtz produced micropatterns using a molecular printer.

The team found the patterned coating to be physically durable even when exposed to a very high (100 degree C) and very low temperature (10 degree C). Using an adhesive tape the researchers tested the durability when exposed to wear and tear. Though the top portion of the pattern was abraded during the peeling of the adhesive tape, the pattern continued to exhibit the same properties and became visible when exposed to

The double burden of malnutrition: need for urgent policy action

India has addressed the problem but more needs to be done

Last year was a remarkable one for nutrition in India. After years of slow and somewhat tentative action to acknowledge, understand and act on the challenge of undernutrition, India's National Nutrition Mission brought focus and ambition and a range of actions followed. National and State governments were mobilised, district administrators engaged, the private sector mobilised in its own way, while civil society continued to push for accountability and action.

As researchers committed to evidence-informed policies and programmes, we welcome India's nutrition efforts. We call for even stronger systems to support the use of data and science to inform India's efforts, to track progress and to learn from both successes and failures.

The mission of using evidence to inform policy in nutrition in India goes back to the days of India's 'father of nutrition', Dr. C. Gopalan, someone whom both of us had the privilege of knowing and working with closely. He invested in connecting science with the policy world, but he also served in a world where information systems limited the reach and connect between science and policy. Today, that world has changed, information flows have been dramatically reshaped by technology - the science and evidence community must use these new tools, new networks and new ways to engage the public and the policy community on critical issues such as nutrition.

Key challenges

What are some challenges that face India on the nutrition front as we approach the decade of action for the SDGs?

First, work led by ICMR and published recently in the Lancet Global Health shows that progress in maternal and child undernutrition varies tremendously by State. It also highlights how malnutrition contributes the most to child deaths as well as disability in adults. Saving lives of children under five in India will require a steady focus on

Second, new data on malnutrition among children from the Comprehensive National Nutrition Survey highlights how challenges of overweight, obesity and even +early non-communicable disease, are no longer adult challenges. About 10% of children under 19 years have pre-diabetes. Coherence is needed in areas of public policy across multiple ministries - incentivising the cultivation and consumption of a range of food commodities; using the levers of government financing to buy better nutrition (not just more calories) in programmes such as the PDS, ICDS and school meals; ensuring optimal healthcare of adolescents, pregnant women and young children; restricting the marketing of unhealthy foods and drinks; and expanding efforts to improve nutrition

Third, India's adults also bear a tremendous double burden of malnutrition. Recent work from IFPRI and Emory University, has highlighted how economic progress is a double-edged sword - reducing underweight among women while also exacerbating the challenge of overweight among others. Today, some districts in India have levels of overweight that are as high as 40%.

Fourth, a range of studies published by researchers in India and abroad, demonstrate that social determinants related to gender, education, sanitation and poverty are key drivers of stunting and undernutrition. Early-life undernutrition is an important risk factor for later-life adult disease, along with food environments, physical activity and preventive healthcare.

Programmes and policy

Today, India's efforts in tackling malnutrition have already come a long way - a range of programmes and policies have been launched against child undernutrition (POSH-AN Abhiyaan), anaemia (Anaemia Mukt Bharat) and healthy eating (Eat Right India). However, malnutrition does not exist in isolation - individuals, households and communities share multiple forms of malnutrition. Therefore, it is imperative that policy efforts also come together under a common umbrella and an overarching body is needed to ensure convergence.

Given the diversity and complexity of the challenge, we call for an even sharper evidence-based and data-driven approach to diagnosing the challenge of malnutrition in India's states, districts and communities. We call for a nuanced understanding of the risk factors that contribute the most to the multiple burdens. And we call for the use of data on the reach of programmes and interventions to identify critical gaps and fuel rapid action.

The underlying data that is now available to undertake these assessments, such as the Comprehensive National Nutrition Survey, must be made available to the scientific community. Silos in data systems should be broken and community health-workers and anganwadi workers provided feedback on areas of good performance and where improvement is needed.

On actions, a range of evidence-informed options are available to India as they are to the global community the World Health Organization's updated Essential Nutrition Actions Across the Life Course, is a critical guide that must be adapted to India's needs.

Addressing the double burden of malnutrition will take an unrelenting focus in coming years - the challenge is complex, the actions needed must come from different sectors, and data and accountability mechanisms must absolutely inform what happens next. The consequences of poor nutrition are too broad, too deep and too costly for society to ignore.

WHO prequalifies Serum's low-cost pneumococcal vaccine

The vaccine will cost only \$2 per dose, which is 30% cheaper than the Gavi price

Pneumococcal vaccine developed by the Pune-based Serum Institute of India has been pre-qualified by the World Health Organisation (WHO) in the third week of December 2019. The prequalification of the vaccine by WHO was based on the results of a phase-3 trial (the final phase of human clinical trial) carried out in 2,250 children in Gambia, a small West African country.

According to a November 2019 UNICEF report, pneumonia caused 1,27,000 deaths in India in 2018, the second highest number of child morunuer tne age of five in the world. In India, pneumonia and diarrhoea cause the most deaths in children under five years.

The pneumococcal vaccine PNEU-MOSIL is a conjugate vaccine to help produce stronger immune response to a weak antigen. Serum Institute had optimised an efficient conjugate vaccine manufacturing processes for its meningitis A vaccine (MenAfri-Vac), which was used for manufacturing the pneumococcal vaccine. This helped the company reduce the manufacturing cost of pneumococcal vaccine.

Low cost vaccine

"We intent making the vaccine available to low- and middle-income countries for about \$2 per dose, while countries pay nearly \$3 when the vaccine is co-funded by Gavi," says Dr. Rajeev Dhere, Executive Director of Serum Institute, "This will make the vaccine 30% cheaper than the Gavi price and dramatically lower for countries that do not get the vaccines through Gavi."

The company already has a licence to manufacture and export the vaccine. The company has just completed the phase-3 trial in India and will soon be submitting the data to the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI) for licensing.

In 2017, pneumococcal conjugate vaccine was included in the under India's Universal Immunisation Programme (UIP). It has been introduced in a phased manner starting with Himachal Pradesh, parts of Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan. A vaccine manufactured by a multinational company is

The efficacy of the Serum vaccine was tested against an already approved pneumococcal vaccine (Synflorix). In the Gambia trial, three doses of the vaccine were given to 2,250 infants at 6, 10, and 14 weeks and a booster dose was given to 675 infants at nine months age. "The efficacy of our vaccine was comparable with the existing approved vaccine tested during the trial," says Dr. Dhere. "It was based on the clinical trial data that the WHO prequalified the vaccine."

Offers wider protection

There are about 90 serotypes of pneumonia-causing bacteria (Streptococcus pneumoniae). The disease serotypes vary from one region to another. The 10 serotypes that are widely prevalent and responsible for causing pneumonia in Latin America, Africa and Asia, including India have been chosen for Serum's pneumococcal vaccine so that the vaccine confers greater protection.

vaccine, Serum's vaccine contains two serotypes that are present in 13valent pneumococcal vaccine. "The two serotypes present in the 13-valent vaccine have been included in our 10-valent vaccine to offer wider coverage of serotypes seen in Africa and Asia," says Dr. Dhere. This makes Serum's pneumococcal vaccine better than the currently available 10-valent vaccine.

Clinical trials

Phase-1 and phase-2 trials were earlier carried out in India. A phase-3 trial on 600 infants carried out in different places in India has just been completed. The trial tested the efficacy of the vaccine when given at 6, 10, and 14 weeks without a booster dose. "Since the phase-3 trial data from Gambia were already available before the trial could begin in India, the DCGI permitted the trial to be carried out on fewer children and without the booster dose," says Dr. Dhere. The trial was carried in collaboration with PATH with funding from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Currently, Serum is conducting another trial in Gambia and India where the vaccine is given at 6 and 10 weeks and a booster dose at nine months of age. Using the two primary dose and a booster dose will help reduce the cost of immunisation. The two primary and booster dose schedule provides almost the same immune response as the three primary and a booster dose schedule.

'The three primary doses coincide with the pentavalent immunisation schedule, while the booster dose at nine months coincides with the first dose of measles vaccine," says Dr. Dhere.

How humans affect genetic connectivity of four mammals

Four wide-ranging mammals — jungle cats, leopards, sloth bears and tigers — were studied in central India

Changing landscapes, habitat loss, fragmentation, and global climate change have been listed as the main reasons for biodiversity decline worldwide. Now, a new study from the National Centre for Biological Sciences (NCBS), Bengaluru, has added to the growing knowledge that anthropogenic activities can impact genetic connectivity or the movement among habitat patches usually resulting in mating

and genetic exchange. "In several mammalian carnivores, juveniles disperse away from their mother's territory to establish their own territory. Males are known to travel longer distances than females. Isola-

tion of habitat patches (due to habitat destruction and fragmentation) can restrict animal movement among habitat patches and thus reduce genetic exchange and increase the probability of extinction. Hence maintaining connectivity is critical to

ensure long term persistence of a species," Prachi Thatte explains. Dr. Thatte is the first author of the paper published in Diversity and Distributions and now works with WWF-India on connectivity conservation

Four wide-ranging mam-

sloth bears, tigers -were investigated for the genetic differentiation in central India, which is a critical landscape for several species. The DNA extracted from faecal samples were used for understanding genetic connectivi-The samples were collected from nine protected areas during the period 2012-2017. The team looked at how

mals –Jungle cats, leopards,

land-use, human population density, nearby roads and traffic affected the genetic structure. The paper notes that tigers were impacted the most by high human footprint. "Although known to travel long distances and move through agricultural fields to some extent, tigers in central India do not have

equally high genetic exchange throughout the landscape. Some protected areas like Bandhavgarh tiger reserve seem to be getting relatively isolated (the 2014 tiger census report also shows the same)," explains Dr. Thatte.

Jungle cats were found to be the least impacted. "That is likely because in central India, they occupy a variety of habitats including forests, scrublands, grasslands and even irrigated agricultural fields close to the forests," she explains.

Despite being the least impacted by human activity, the team encountered several jungle cat road-kills while carrying out fieldwork. She explains that with increasing infrastructure and traffic, systematically studying the impact of roads on smaller species like jungle cat and jackals and ensuring the presence of mitigation structures like underpasses and overpasses would be crucial to ensure that we don't fragment the currently well-connected populations.

IIndia has also started paying attention to wildlife corridors and encouraging engineering reforms to promote wildlife movements. Last year, the Ministry of Environment along with the Wildlife Institute of India released a document that lays out the regulatory requirements for developing roads, railways, powerlines while recognising the impacts on wildlife and people. NHAI and all PWDs have been instructed to follow the guidelines.

When Conservatives and Greens join hands

Sebastian Kurz, 33, is set to return as Austria's Chancellor with support from the Green Party

With the start of 2020, it became clear that a new government was go-

For the first time in Austria's history, a coalition formed by the Conservatives and the Greens will rule the country. Elections took place last year after the previous government, consisting of the conservative People's Party and the far-right Freedom Party, collapsed after a corruption

Before New Year's eve, both the People's Party and the Austrian Green Party agreed to form a new government. According to initial reports, 11 Ministries will go to the Conservatives, while members of the Green Party will take over four departments. In the September election, more than 37% of the electorate voted for the Conservatives, while around 13% voted for the Greens.

It was clear even before the election that the People's Party's leader, Sebastian Kurz, was going to become the Chancellor again. The 33-yearold Mr. Kurz, who was the youngest head of government last year, was leading in most opinion polls.

The "Ibizagate", the corruption scandal that brought down the government, mainly damaged the Freedom Party. The crisis hit the coalition when Heinz Christian-Strache, the then Vice-Chancellor and leader of the Freedom Party, was filmed while offering lucrative government contracts to an alleged Russian oligarch. However, Mr. Kurz played an impressive political game in the aftermath of the scandal. He ended the coalition and sought a

fresh mandate. In the September election, the Freedom Party suffered a setback as its vote share fell by 9.8 percentage points to 16.2%

'Sebastian Kurz is taking over again. In his last term, he normalised the far-right and he even copied large parts of their political programme. I think he is just adapting to everything that might help him keep power. This time, it's the Green Party," said Thomas Wurzacher, 27, a teacher from Innsbruck. "Everyone is talking about Greta Thunberg, climate change and all these issues, and he [Kurz] even made it possible to benefit from that," he underlined.

'Islamophobic agenda'

"We chose a new path," Mr. Kurz said on January 2 when he formally announced the coalition. "It was a challenge for both sides, because the differences between the two sides are big." Werner Kogler, the Greens leader, who will become Vice-Chancellor, added: "We were elected for different things."



The Conservatives are set to take over key Ministries. Klaudia Tanner, a senior member of the People's Party, is expected to become the country's first woman Defence Minister.

The Conservatives will also keep the Department of Integration,

which has raised criticism. Rusen Timur Aksak, a spokesman of the Islamic Faith Community, described the decision as a "remarkable sign for the bad gambling of the Greens", on his social media account. He also hinted that anti-Muslim activists might be happy about the decision.

"During his last term as Chancellor, Kurz pushed an Islamophic agenda. He justified the hijab ban and regularly tried to use Muslim-related topics to fish for right-wing votes. It's obvious that he will continue doing that," said Mohammad Shakil, 23, an Austrian Muslim rights activist from Innsbruck.

He pointed out Mr. Kurz's anti-migrant policies might continue as well. "During his chancellorship, apprentices from Afghanistan and other countries were deported although they had work or school agreements. Who can guarantee that such things will not happen again?" he asked.

According to the coalition agreement, the hijab ban and deportation centres for unsuccessful asylum seekers will continue while the government will introduce a carbon tax on airline tickets and set a target to make Austria carbon neutral by

The Ministries of Justice, Social Affairs, Culture and Environment will be run by the Greens.

Many European media outlets reacted positively about the new government. According to German conservative daily Die Welt, many people in Germany "dream about what is happening in the neighboring country". Italian newspaper Il Messagero wrote about a "new chapter" in Austria's history. "The Greens are leaving their traditional role as an Opposition party and are now moving as a coalition partner of the young and charismatic leader of the People's Party", the newspaper wrote.

Meanwhile, Mr. Strache, who left politics and was expelled by his Freedom Party, is planning to make a comeback. He says he still wants to shape Austria's politics.

New law but old problems

The Opposition is critical of the changes brought by government in the Accountability Ordinance

countability law - the National Accountability Ordinance, 1999 through a presidential ordinance promulgated on December 27. Under the new ordinance, the powers of the National Accountability Bureau (NAB), an anti-corruption watchdog, were curtailed and its jurisdiction limited.

The NAB has been under severe criticism from the Opposition parties ever since the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) government came to power in 2018. Both the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) and the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) allege that the cases against their members un-

der the NAB law were politically motivated. PML-N leaders, including Nawaz Sharif, Shehbaz Sharif and Maryam Nawaz, have faced action under the NAB. Former President and PPP leader Asif Ali Zardari, too, was remanded in NAB custody in a corruption case last year.

Both parties had demanded changes in the NAB law.

According to the amendment, the NAB will now take up cases involving corruption exceeding an amount of 500 million Pakistani rupees, and no action will be taken against government employees in case of departmental deficiencies. The watchdog is also barred from confiscating property of any public office holder without approval of the scrutiny

The Opposition parties, however, are critical of the changes, saying the new law was promulgated to benefit



the leaders of the ruling party.

PML-N spokesperson Marriyum Aurangzeb said the law was brought into effect bypassing the entire parliamentary legislative process. "The Opposition is clearly the chief stakeholder in this process. The ordinance is not a reform document but is actually tailored to benefit Imran Khan and his cronies.

Speaking to The Hindu, Ms. Aurangzeb said not much has changed with the new ordinance. Various provisions such as the remand period, burden of proof resting on the accused, rules on bail, and the trial period remain unchanged. "The observations by the High Courts and the Supreme Court say a lot about the truth regarding these issues but they have not been addressed."

According to Ms. Aurangzeb, the PML-N started a consultative process for proper reformation of the accountability system in 2016. "But because the PTI had already planned to use the NAB as a tool for political victimisation, it stalled that process."

Parliament route

The PML-N spokesperson believes that the only logical way to move towards an effective system is to scrap the NAB and formulate a new system of accountability through parliamentary consensus after debate.

"This ordinance benefits only bureaucrats and businessmen; politicians remain the NAB's target for political coercion, manipulation, and engineering. Prime Minister Imran Khan had said the ordinance would grant insulation to the business community from the scrutiny of the NAB," she added.

"This ordinance is an NRO for the corruption committed by the PTI," she said referring to the National Reconciliation Ordinance, which was issued by former dictator General Pervez Musharraf. The NRO, which had granted amnesty to politicians, political workers and bureaucrats who were accused of corruption, was struck down as unconstitutional by the Supreme Court in 2009.

Senator Quratulain Marri of the PPP said the NAB law was made with the intention to victimise people. "In principle, we are against the NAB law. It's a black law.'

On the amendments, Senator Marri said the government has now bas-

ically realised what President Zardari said a while back - that the economy and the NAB can't go together because the NAB is harassing people intending to invest in our economy.

The PTI's Maleeka Bokhari, however, said the criticism of the Opposition lacks merit or substance. "The PTI government inherited the NAB accountability system and other institutions as part of the governance framework of Pakistan. The NAB Ordinance, 1999 was enacted by previous governments and the Chairman of the NAB was appointed by the Leader of House (PML-N) and the Leader of Opposition (PPP)."

Ms. Bokhari told *The Hindu* that both these Opposition parties also used the NAB as a tool of political victimisation against each other in the

Return of the Green Shirts

Cadres of the Integralist Front, a group inspired by European fascism, are back in Brazil's streets

On December 24, when most people in the world's biggest Catholic coun-

Eve family dinners and prayers, two men appeared at the office of Porta dos Fundo (Back Door), a wellknown production company in Rio de Janeiro that makes content for television and online platforms, and flung a couple of Molotov cocktails at its front door. As the office entrance was blasted away and a blaze erupted inside, the attackers fled on a motorbike. The news of attack on Back Door productions, which currently has been streaming a comedy series on the life of Jesus Christ, spread like wildfire across Brazil. As it was a holiday, the office was closed and nobo-

try were preparing for the Christmas

dy was hurt in the attack.

In a country, where popular television shows and top stand-ups routinely make fun of everyone – from football icons to the President and the Pope – the bomb attack on the production company, run by some of the most-celebrated comic writers and actors, in the middle of Christmas holidays jolted Brazil.

As the police investigated the attack, there was more shock in store. On New Year eve, it was revealed that one of the main suspects was the local businessman Eduardo Fauzi who was a member of a group linked with the Brazilian Integralist Front (FIB), an organisation inspired by fascism and with a history of spreading violence, fear and lies. "We are not left or right or centre. We seek good ideas, wherever they come from. We are not interested in the ways of progressivism or liberalism. Nationalism is the only way!!!" says the group's description on Facebook

Mr. Fauzi has run away to Moscow and the FIB has distanced itself from the attack, but a fear has gripped the Brazilian streets – the Integralists are back. Integralism emerged in Brazil after the end of the First World War. The far-right movement was founded in 1932 under the name of Brazilian Integralist Action (AIB, the party's logo given in picture) by Plínio Salgado, a journalist who articulated his ideas in a document called the "October Manifesto". In the 1974 book, Integralismo, Brazilian writer Hélgio Trindade explained how Integralism borrowed its concepts from fascism but tried to be original by claiming to be "spiritualist". "Their thinking was that the basic principles of fascism must be adapted to the local conditions to create an original political doctrine," wrote Mr. Trindade in his book.

During the 1930s, when Brazil had a robust communist movement that

was becoming increasingly popular among the working class, the AIB cadres - all White - began to hold their meetings and marches in pu blic squares with the message of "God, motherland and family". From Sao Paulo, the biggest city in the country, to small towns in the north and south, such marches have begun to take place in recent months. Dressed in long-sleeved green shirts with a buttoned collar and cuffs and trousers, the Integralist cadre stand in a military-style formation, wave blue flags with the symbol of sigma, the Greek letter that identifies Integralism, raise their right arm in a Nazi-like salute and shout "God, motherland and family!" after the leaders.

'Ghosts of our past'

"When I saw them doing a march in downtown Sao Paulo, I was amused and scared at the same time. They looked like clowns but it appeared as ghosts of our past have come back to haunt us," says Marcos Silva, 22, a



university student who was approached by a man in a green shirt to join the group. "I used to think they were history.'

To the young, the Integralists might look like relics of Brazil's past, but those who follow the country's history know that the Green Shirts never went away. They were always lurking around, having embedded themselves in the establishment and political parties. Daniel Hunt, a writer and music producer, points out that Miguel Reale, an Integralist leader in the 1930s, was not only involved in the U.S.-backed military coup of 1964 but he also drafted a notorious law, AI-5, which was used to arrest and torture leftist activists during the darkest days of dictatorship that lasted 21 years. "His son Miguel Reale Jr drafted (President) Dilma Rousseff's impeachment, thus ending 14 years of Workers' Party rule in the country," says Mr. Hunt.

It was during Ms. Rousseff's impeachment that Jair Bolsonaro positioned himself as a potential candidate for President. Today, Mr. Bolsonaro is Brazil's President. More than a week has gone but his government has so far not condemned the bomb attack in Rio. No wonder, the Integralists are feeling emboldened to march the streets of Brazil.

'No network' in times of crisis

Bangladesh shut down telecom services along the border citing security reasons, but revoked it later

Bangladesh shut telecom networks along the border on December 29

apparently to forestall any inflow of undocumented migrants in the aftermath of India's new citizenship law. Just two days later, regulators reversed the ban, saying the restriction was temporary.

Telecom outage was expected to hit 10 million people living within 1 km of border areas. The worst was soon averted as the ban was quickly lifted, but it illustrates a growing trend of shutting telecom and Internet networks by governments in

South Asia and beyond. "It is impossible to thwart any illegal border crossing by shutting down mobile networks," said Abu Saeed

Khan, a senior policy fellow at LIR-NEasia, a Colombo-based ICT policy think-tank. "The movement of human beings across the border is unstoppable unless you erect a wall the way Israel did or whatever Mr. [Donald] Trump is contemplating," Mr. Khan said. "If a group decides to cross the border, they will cross the border at any cost. There may be a debate on the motivation of such migration, but the fact remains that it's happening and it will keep on

Key challenge

Authorities may reduce or stop the flow in some hotspots, but the huge border with India is a key challenge. "If you stop at one place, they will find out another," Mr. Khan said, referring to a fertile frontier of more than 4,000 km that the two countries share.



With the focus cast on the frontier, Major General Shafeenul Islam, Director General of Border Guard Bangladesh, provided some clarity on illegal border crossings. Bangladesh arrested about 1,000 people for illegal crossings in and out of India in

2019, with 445 of them returning home in two months: November and December, Mr. Islam said at a media briefing in Dhaka on January 2.

After the Upper House of the Indian Parliament passed the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill in December, it sparked fears of illegal crossings into Bangladesh. Mr. Islam, however, did not link the arrests to the fallout of India's new law. He said those migrant workers, all identified as Bangladesh nationals, crossed into India in search of jobs. Jhenaidah and Satkhira emerged as the two major illicit migratory routes.

Risks of illicit crossings across the frontier deepened after all residents of the State of Assam, along the Bangladesh border, had to produce documentary proof that they or their ancestors had lived in India since 1971. About 2 million of Assam's population of 33 million - a mix of Hindus and Muslims - failed the test. They now run the risk of becoming state-

As the protests over the new law

spread, India shut down the Internet in Assam and some other areas. The Internet shutdown in Kashmir is now the longest-ever imposed in a democracy, according to Access Now, an international advocacy group that tracks internet suspensions.

Mr. Khan calls it counterproductive. "In doing so, India is antagonising its own people. And telecom carriers are losing money," he said.

The shutdowns of mobile and internet networks have unintended consequences and take a toll on economic life in both urban and rural areas. In Bangladesh, for example, mobile phones are the fastest way for people to transfer money in outlving border areas, where conventional banking is almost non-exis-

That means the network suspension is akin to shutting down a large part of business activity in remote areas. Millions of Bangladeshis living alongside the frontier are largely engaged in cross-border trade of medicines, agricultural commodities,

milk and livestock. "More and more society migrates into digital payment systems, the Internet becomes more important simultaneously. It's like oxygen in life."

Bangladesh has a history of shutting down or slowing the Internet over security concerns. During a road safety campaign by students in 2018, regulators briefly blocked 3G and 4G mobile Internet services to quell

protests, leaving users in the lurch. "I find no reason to shut down the Internet to thwart civil protests because people communicate despite the shutdown. These are not political decisions, but bureaucratic decisions. The bureaucracy has taken over the politicians' space and their over-adventurism is the prime driver of this hegemony," Mr. Khan said.

The regulator's latest decision to shut the frontier mobile networks and retract it shortly afterwards reflect a lack of coordination between government agencies and weakness of the regulator itself, according to Mr. Khan.
